



#### FROM THE PRESIDENT'S DESK



This year seems to be moving at break-neck speed. Our State Convention will soon be here. Make plans to attend to express your feelings and concerns and to take part in the deliberations and election of your officers for the coming year. I would love to see you there.

Janet and I were able to attend Western States Conference in Mesa, Arizona, along with a good representation from Washington. We not only had a good time but received much information.

Wilbur Wood spoke on our P.A.C. Program. He brought out that our organization is among the leaders of the Federal P.A.C. We are second in per capita in the Federal Employee groups.

One thing Wilbur said was that we are not buying the congressmen's vote, but we are opening the door to present our case.

On Saturday afternoon Olin Armentrout spoke about some of the achievements of the past year of the R.L.C.A. They have computerized most of the office functions and are considering a computer for each of the four field representatives.

Our membership has increased considerably since the formation of the L Route concept. We have increased from 34,000 to 41,000. We have achieved over 200% membership on a national basis.

Other areas covered were the R.C.R. to R.C.A. program with bidding rights to come for R.C.A.'s. Also, some relief was gained on the L Routes, with a minimum of one minute per box. Auxiliary routes will go on an evaluated basis instead of an hourly rate.

One area the National Officers were pleased with was the success of the Legislative Seminar. Those attending received much knowledge regarding the legislative process. One gain was that we have now 30 out of the 36 congressmen on the Ways and Means Committee as co-sponsors of our E.M.A. Bill. Check your May 9th issue of the National Rural Letter Carrier magazine for complete information regarding who to write to and how to help this bill get passed.

#### A SHORT AGENDA FOR THE STATE CONVENTION IN SPOKANE.

The Officer's reports will be Monday morning, followed by an address from our National Guest, Roger Moreland in the afternoon. The Preliminary reports of the committees will be given Tuesday morning. (Some of these will be final reports.) Tuesday afternoon Larry Waligora, manager of our health plan will have an address. This will be followed by the report of the resolutions committee with discussions and passage or rejection of the resolutions. Resolutions must be in the hands of the resolution committee by Monday, June 22nd at 1:00 P.M. to be considered. Resolutions will not be accepted from the floor. Please abide by this rule. Election of Officers will be held Wednesday morning.

I am looking forward to seeing all of you there.



Those of you who have less than 3 years in by 3-31-87 and who will not be converted 4-11-87, I would like to give you some positive thoughts.

Anyone who wants to be a career postal employee must first take a competitive civil service exame and second, qualify in that exam. The next step is establishing the register of eligibles.

Those who were hired as 73's ("subs") had to do exactly that. The office where the substitute vacancy existed contacted the individuals on the register and by starting with the person at the top of the list began calling for interviews. Many R.C.R.'s are receiving letters from offices that have substitute (R.C.A.) vacancies.

If you receive such a letter informing you of an interview for an R.C.A. opening you must inform your supervisor immediately. You will then be converted to R.C.A. Make sure your form 50 says that you are being converted. Don't take this for granted. You do not have to go for an interview or change offices where you work to be an R.C.A.

The mere fact that your name was reached will be the criteria needed for your conversion to R.C.A. You must see that it is taken care of.

Your 1 year service as an R.C.A. will begin effective with the date on your Form 50. So don't hesitate informing your supervisor or following any other additional instructions that may appear on your letter for R.C.A. interview.

Some of us are unhappy about the one year wait for R.C.A.'s to bid. There is a reason for this waiting period. Some individuals on a rural carrier register expected to be called for a full time position. They are saying no to the R.C.A. job offer. This year is giving the Postal Service time to get through those individuals names and hopefully reach all R.C.R.'s on the register.

Some registers are in the mid 80's already after only one month, so all is not lost, and don't give up hope.

#### "HIRING FREEZE"

I have heard persistant rumors for weeks that the Seattle Division had imposed a hiring freeze. When I finally got hold of a copy of the written policy, it said all hiring must have MSC approval. This is not new. It was already that way.

Approximately May 12 Midge Braman called and said that the Spokane MSC claimed that Division Manager Craig Wade this morning imposed a complete hiring freeze on all crafts.

I was sure that either the report or the order was in error. I checked with our National Office today, May 15th, and was told that yes we have been hearing from the State of Washington rumors that there was a hiring freeze. We called Postal Service headquarters and were assured that there is no hiring freeze in Washington or any place else.

I then placed a call to Art Cowans, Director of Human Relations, Seattle Division. Art was out of his office. I told his receptionist why I was calling and was told Art would call me back. He has not done so.

My advice to anyone who wants or needs an R.C.A. is to grieve management's hiring freeze under Article 29, Section 2 "new language". If you are aware of a rural vacancy that is not being posted and awarded, please let me know.

The contract language for hiring R.C.A.'s and filling rural routes has to prevail. No local hiring freeze can supersede that.

#### "ROUTE CUTS"

For the last week or so this office has been busy answering calls about route adjustments with the express purpose of reducing or eliminating heavy duty or overtime hours. It has been ordered that these "savings" be imposed even in offices where no one is overburdened or having 2080 hour problems.

This has turned into an extremely difficult and depressing problem to attempt to head off. I felt I had very positive and concrete assurances from Dale Zinzer, the

Seattle Division person in charge of rural routes, that it was not the intent of the Seattle Division that such cuts take place in an office unless there were 2080 problems or overburdened routes. I soon learned that Dale's words were either misunderstood by me or he was not truthful. I have been in conversation with Dale twice more since this first conversation which took place May 7th.

Today I was told that some MSC's and Postmasters had over reacted and that all route adjustments had to be approved by the Seattle Division and that it appeared that many, if not most, would be rejected.

Please keep me informed as to whether or not this information told to me is correct. a Production of the Street Production of Special Science and Contract Contr

Please enforce Article 30, Section, paragraph J if you are notified of a proposed adjustment on your route. Article 30, Section 1 requires that carrier to be notified in advance of proposed route adjustment and provides for the carriers' ideas to be heard and considered.

#### "MAIL COUNT SCHOOLS"

All rural routes will count for a month this September. It appears that we will have the count schools during July, between the State and National Conventions. Please make plans, one and all, to attend one of these schools. This September's count may well determine your salary for a long time. At this time we do not know when the next count after the September '87 count may take place. You want every dime coming to you in the way of salary and you are not apt to get it if you do not know how the count on your route should be conducted.

I am writing to you to hopefully warn you to avoid what has happened to me and my other machinist brothers and sisters in this plant.

We were once members of the International Machinists Union with the usual gripes about union dues, slow grievance procedures, seniority disputes, incentives, overtime arguments, etc. says years associate discon interesting the second of the

We thought of our stewards and union officers as freeloaders with jobs that commanded no respect and that the company would treat us just as good with or without them, and were in agreement when someone said, "The union is selling us out," never the company.

Well, this was in 1978 and now we no longer have these old problems for in October, 1978 we voted to decertify and break away from the International Union. We are now nonunion and no more dues!

We no longer have seniority disputes because we are placed by ability, which means whoever is the boss's pet. And the same with overtime. Our grievance procedure is no longer slow, it is nonexistent.

We don't have an absentee problem: if you miss one day you must have a doctor's slip, so most "absentee problems" were fired long ago with nobody to represent them.

Our incentives now are: Do more work or you will be disciplined for refusal to work. All this for less money, smaller hospitalization benefits, fewer holidays and 7 (work) days without overtime (pay), if it is an emergency -- which is almost every week.

Our ex-stewards and union officers are no longer a problem; most of them have been discharged on one technicality or another, or set-up in a discharge situation. How did this happen? Well, one night at a local tavern a supervisor I know got drunk and was laughing and bragging to a friend of his about how they got rid of the union. This is what I overheard from my booth in the tavern: The supervisor said the company hired a union-busting firm out of Chicago at several hundred dollars an hour to come in and train their supervisors and foremen in the skill of union busting, with the threat that any foreman disclosing this would be fired.

He explained that there are a lot of companies in the business (of union busting) now because they think the time is right with high inflation, plant closings, conservative Republicans and Democrats being elected and a general fear of a job loss in a lot of plants. He said they held a lot of management classes and were taught the following ten rules (he held a piece of paper that he read them from -- I tried to jot them down).

- 1. Try to confuse the seniority system for layoffs, moveups and overtime to get employees jealous of one another. Then, when employees complain, send them to the union thereby shifting the blame, even if you have to use racial or sexual disputes. Most important: Create fear and mistrust.
- 2. Draw out grievances as long as possible.
- 3. Threaten employees if they file grievances or safety complaints.
- 4. Increase discipline for even minor offenses to cause an overload for the union, slowing down their effectiveness on timeliness.
- 5. Make sure employees get all benefits books or letters on insurance benefits, pensions, etc., that the company gives -- not union negotiated.
- 6. Increase management trainees or substitute foremen.
- 7. Get your stool pigeon -- big mouth employees, every area has them, to criticize union officials and union dues. (You know who they are.)

- 8. Hold department meetings with employees to convince them that you agree with their problems, but that the union has to do something. (Deliberately scheduling improperly is a very good example to use this step.)
- 9. Convince them that you are on their side about a job class increase or incentives on the job, but that your hands are tied and it's up to the union.
- 10. Last but not least, the company must become the big brother, the good guy, and the union become the enemy by distorting the truth on arguments. By the time the truth is known they won't trust the union anyway.

When I heard this I realized they followed the game plan perfectly. All of these things happened to us and they were laughing at us the whole time. So, I felt I had to write this letter to warn you how easily we were led down the road to disaster. I only hope in some little way this will help you avoid what happened to us. Don't go back 40 years in time like we have. Are any of these things going on in your company? They may be training your management now, beware!

I cannot sign this letter in fear of my job and family. Hopefully, someday I will be back with you without fear; it's a terrible lesson to learn.







# The farm country's best 'product' may be a man

Who likes Vern Anderson?

All 80 residents of Edwall. Plus rural dwellers in the entire area around Edwall.

Might as well include all of Lincoln County.

That just starts the long list of fans four generations deep whose lives in the county have been different because of Vern.

He isn't a "sometime" thing in their lives.

He's been there every day in one capacity or another.

For 41 years, everybody who received a letter along the rural route for Waukon and Edwall got it from the hands of Vern.

They wanted to see him, not just get the mail. So parents and children often stood waiting for

him at the rural mailboxes along the road. Vern brought the mail and the families brought homemade cookies. Right there at the mailbox, they shared greetings and friendship, munching away by the mailbox a moment.

Vern retired from carrying mail about 10 years

But nobody forgot.

When he broke a leg and was hospitalized for surgery a couple of months ago at Holy Family Hospital, 40 kids in Christian Heritage School in Edwall wrote him. In short, they reversed roles with Vern; they "delivered" mail to the exmailman.

Some of them were too young to know he had carried letters to their parents, grandparents and even great-grandparents.

Everybody in the farm country knows Vern for other reasons than the mail route, too.

Some know him because for many years he


served as an Edwall volunteer fireman.
Tells his wife Sally: "We miss the fire phone in the kitchen which would ring at any time of the day or night. Vern specialized in resuscitation and

Things haven't been quite the same for Vern since a stroke three years ago left him paralyzed on the right side.

But he outwitted it.

Vern bought a computer and learned to use it. Typing with just one finger on his left hand, he continued writing his history of Edwall. He made banners for community events. A photography buff, he refused to let his paralysis rob him of his skill. Throughout Eastern Washington, Vern worked for Grange causes for 50 years. Hundreds came to



United Methodist Church Board met, there was Vern. His and Sally's three children were baptized in the church

Determined that things important to Lincoln County be preserved, Vern works with the Lincoln County Historical Society. At its museum in Davenport, one room is filled with furniture from Vern and Sally and pictures of his parents. Four grandchildren of Vern and Sally form the family's sixth generation as Washingtonians.

Still others know Vern because of his many offices in the Masons, community work with Lions Club and his World War II service as a pilot.

They remember, too, his tireless efforts for eight years as a member of the school board.

Wife Sally recalls that "the first time Vern was in a hospital was for a back operation. Then I had to phone or see him every day to tell him of the progress with our community water system. Previously, we had had artesian wells and the project was a big one for a small, unincorporated town. Vern was unofficially in charge of the project."
Then came his fall last winter when he broke

his right leg.
Wife Sally "phoned the ambulance at Sprague when he fell, and they verified our address by scanner which was heard by many of the farmers

All over the county, friends rallied. They prayed, wrote letters, sent gifts and thought about

Following surgery to repair the leg, Vern spent some time in a convalescent center.

Now he's home, in bed much of the time. According to Sally, he sits in a wheelchair for meals, but only briefly.

When they get ready to come to Spokane to a doctor, "we call on the fire department. A couple of firemen carry Vern down our six steps to the car. When we come back from Spokane, we look again for firemen. Usually it's the fire chief. Keith Cederblom, who's also the garage man in town, along with Al Stangland, secretary of the fire department, who runs the hardware store. They carry Vern up the steps and into the house for me."

Vern's 70 now.

Even now, he's trying to obtain a historic bell to send to represent Lincoln County in a Centennial Bell Garden in Seattle for the state's hundredth birthday

Edwall calls him its unofficial historian. All over Eastern Washington farm country people call him their friend.

Who likes Vern Anderson? Name one who doesn't.




