



# ANNUAL REPORT OF THE SECRETARY: DEXTER NESMOE

This has been a year of learning and growing. I was selected as the delegate-at-large to the National Convention. It was indeed a very great honor. It was my priviledge to serve as a Sergeant at Arms, a duty I also performed in the service, only in the Navy we called it Petty Officer of the Watch. In the service we checked I-D's and had a 45 sidearm. At National Convention we just passed out literature! I was relieved long enough to collect ballots and return them to the ballot committee. I was personally sorry that our Candidate, Neil Buchanan was not elected to the National Board, but their loss was our gain, as he is still serving us in Washington State.

As you all are probably aware, the election at last year's convention was contested. As a result, new Constitutions and By-Laws were not printed by your Secretary. The Department of Labor asked for my copy of the last year's convention proceedings, including the Postman and tapes, which were never returned, so I have been working in the dark except for minute notes taken at convention.

Our association is doing very well as far as membership. Only 167% compared to over 200% for some states. Maybe we can do better this year, with the new RCA bidding rights, etc. Our 1987 membership stands at 1068 and our 1988 membership is already at 808 with the cash paying members with another week to pay up. Ususally the cash payers take until September to be current!

The family plan adopted at last year's convention has raised a lot of controversy. For those persons on dues withholding, the dues are set up in January to go into effect in July and there is no way we can change this factor until the next year. For those persons that do not have a spouse or do not want their spouses to participate, please let the Secretary know so you can be reimbursed the six dollars next Spring.

REPORT OF THE AUTO INSURANCE DIRECTOR: MICKEY MACKEY

It has been a good year for the Auto Insurance Program in the State; membership is growing so the Insurance Program is growing and the pay back to the State Association is growing from the National Auto Plan. \$13,000 this year.

This auto plan is the best there is for the Rural Carrier because it is designed for Rural Carriers only. National General has discounts for <u>safe drivers</u>, <u>multi-car owners</u> and people who are <u>over 55 years of age.</u> I can save you approximately \$100.00 a year on auto insurance.

This policy is handled only by <u>mail</u> or <u>telephone----</u>no one will call at your home. Safe, responsible driving is the name of the game. We have a toll free number in our state or national paper to compare our price with others.

Subs are eligible for this auto plan even when driving a borrowed car and you are covered when someone else drives your car or hit by an uninsured driver.

We can give you lower rates because--you are covered by the government insurance under the "Torts Claims Act" when you are on the route or on government property or enroute to or from home.

Remember--if for any reason the Postal Service denies your claim-- the Rural Carrier Auto Insurance will cover you. This is a valuable feature. The Rural Carrier Plan will cover you if you carry collision and comprehensive.

There are 18 million auto accidents every year and the cost is in the trillions. Every accident has 3 collisions; first—the auto strikes an object, second—the driver strikes the steering wheel, third—the internal organs collide with each other and then with the front of the body. "THINK ABOUT IT!" Keep your auto in good repair and buckle up for safety.

REPORT OF THE OWCP DIRECTOR: RON SERAFINI

Since the last state convention your union leadership has taken a courageous dynamic step forward in union representation by establishing the WRLCA OWCP Director. This was done in response to massive abuses of rural letter carrier F.E.S.A. rights by U.S.P.S. mamagement. The following is an accounting of my activities as your OWCP Director. I have esentially done three things:

- 1). Attended numerous county, steward-training meetings conducting seminars outlining your rights under the F.E.C.A. in attempt of preventative medicine to head off any serious problems.
- 2). I've made myself available by phone or in writing to answer any questions regarding specific claims.
  - 3). I've interceded on behalf of Washington rural letter carriers by directly getting involved in claims by assuming power of attorney to contact doctors, witnesses, and claim examiners.

Your union dollars have been extremely effective. Since January 1st I have assumed power of attorney in numerous OWCP claims. None of which have been denied by OWCP. The more difficult claims have been forwarded on to Mike Watson of Labor's Community Service Agency, Inc. which your union has retained. He has been extremely helpful. I'm in contact with Mr. Watson weekly getting specific answers to specific questions. I look at the fee we pay Mike Watson, like I would look at an insurance premium on an insurance policy. We may not use it that often, but when we do, it is invaluable. I can say without any reservations that the WRLCA office of OWCP Director and it's relationship with Mike Watson together has formed a team that serves the Washington rural letter carriers better than any Federal employee labor organization nationwide on similar issues.

Finally, a look towards the future; I'm by nature an optimistic person, but I regret to say that there is a storm on the horizon that is intensifying and gathering speed. The USPS is one of OWCP's biggest customers, accounting for millions and millions of dollars per year in claim related expenses. Before the year is through the bill could average over one million dollars per day. The USPS has chosed to react in a fashion that in many instances is downright criminal and in blatant violation of the penalty provisions of the FECA.

OWCP, itself, is under tremendous pressure by all the employing agencies it oversees to be more "fair" in its awards. Congress under tremendous pressure from this conservative administration, in it's attempt to keep budgets down, has also put the screws on.

The bottom line is that each and every claim must be very carefully prepared and air-tight. The burden of proof placed on the claimant under the FECA has never been more scrutinized than today. The good news is that your union leadership has excercized unparallelled fortitude that insures that any rural carrier in this room or state can expect the finest, most effective union representation, if they ever sustain a work-related injury or illness. REPORT OF THE STATE STEWARD: NEIL BUCHANAN

Report to the Officers and Members of the Washington Rural Letter Carriers assembled in Spokane.

It has certainly been an eventful year! The challenge of the election at last years's State Convention has caused your board and employees to live a year under the shadow of an investigation and constant wonder of what it all meant.

Problems in the National office have been a cause of deep concern this year also.

RE ORGANIZATION OF THE POSTAL SERVICE: Under this change the regions were relieved of their responsibilies and almost all their people. In the region's place, Divisions were created. For a time it seemed that only the division commanders were assured of a job. Everyone else in Management had to wait and see if they were requested for a similar, higher level or lower level assignment or no job at all. It appears that part of the plan was to put new people in all slots. As near as I have been able to learn, not a single person in the Divisions or MSC's in Washington who was assigned responsibility over rural delivery ever had such a responsibility before.

It appears none of these people ever lived on a farm where the motto is, " if it ain't broke, don't fix it", because virtually all have attempted to force major changes upon the rural craft. Seems a miracle that the mail continued to go through. The clerks and carriers just kept going to work and delivering the mail. Can you imagine the chaos had these people all been changed so that they knew no more about their jobs than those knew, giving the orders.

A few of the changes these people have tried to impose are:

1) Conversions to City Delivery. These people seemed unaware of the commitment made to this Union in exchange for accepting the L-route concept.

2) Conversion to NDCBU Delivery. This has really slowed down, but remains a

problem for this craft.

3) One hour interim adjustment. MSC people in 2 MSC's have taken the position that Article 9, Section 2, Paragraph C and Article 9, Section 2, Paragraph C-2 supercedes Article 9 Section 2, Paragraph 12-A which requires a 2 hour growth or decline in delivery area to effect a salary change. The one hour change was accomplished by submitting a base hour change. My question to mamagement was, "if you can change the evaluation of a route by one hour by simply submitting a base hour change, how in the world is the Union supposed to police these changes?"

4) Keeping subs, RCR's. of RCA's under 40 hours per week to avoid payment of overtime: A Step 4 grievance award dated Feb. 26, 1987 stated that the subserving in the absence of the regular carrier must be allowed to work at least the evaluation of the route before interuption of service. This award will cor-

rect most of these problems if we will enforce it.

5) A similar or related problem arose first in Portland but appears to be spreading. That problem arised when a rural carrier starts the day, but for whatever reason is unable to complete the route. It has been long established practice that when the sub is called in to complete the day, the regular carrier started; the regular carrier takes the approiate leave and the sub is given the evaluated pay for the day plus the E.M.A. Portland has ordered that the regular carrier take the appropriate leave and that the sub be payed only for the hours actually worked. We have a grievance in on this and hope to keep this practice from spreading.

6) The problem that caused me the most grief for nearly a month was the Seattle division's order to eliminate the overtime pay in the rural craft. Seattle was putting out the order office by office using the phone and whenever I called the division I got a denial that there was such an order. Finally on May 11, 1987 Spokane rendered the Seattle Division's order to paper. One paragraph in that letter reads: "Any hours above 40 hours are paid at the overtime rate. These hours must be reduced if at all possible. Some suggestions are adjusting up or down to be in a lower option, add to or create an auxiliary route". Twice I called Dale Zinzer, the division Superintendant of Delivery and extracted commitments from him that this was not the intent of the Division and would'nt I just take him at his word, wait and see. When I finally got a copy of the Spokane MSC letter, we got a copy to Steve Smith and he shared it with headquarters. Mr. Zinzer then called me and expressed the fact that the rural carriers have always cooperated with the Postal Service and we don't want to lose that cooperation. I expressed the opinion that the ball is now in your court. You lied to me, you misled me, you decieved me. Why, unless you rescind your orders on cutting all routes whether overburdened or not to 40 hours, should we cooperate with you? He promised to take steps to modify if not rescind the order and further stated that no route in Washington or North Idaho will be adjusted until the paperwork has crossed his desk and been approved by him. We now know many scheduled adjustments have been cancelled. We will have to wait and see on many more. Incidentally, on 5/21/87, Spokane put out another letter. I will quote 2 papagraphs from that letter. "The revised relief policy allows us to only adjust those routes that require adjustment. Additionally, an adjustment to 48 standard hours allows carriers to maintain J or K route status (26 or 52 non-scheduled day annually) while improving our ability to control annual work hours". The final paragraph of the letter reads, "you have been asked to review all rural routes in your office to determine those routes that warrant relief and to plan relief action. This letter rescinds our letter of May 11, 1987. Should you have any questions, etc---".

7) Several offices ordered that rural carriers comply with the new Washington Seat Belt Law. We were promised an exemption to that law. This exemption was

granted by WAC 204-41-040.

8) Some offices ordered rural carriers to slide back under the wheel and install the seat belt when traveling more than a specified distance between boxes. This

too was grieved and the grievance sustained.

9) We are still battling the automatic SF-46 suspension policys. We have had 3 separate grievances sustained setting Spokane's policy. Their new letter is entitled SF-46 Revalidation Policy. My question is: "if it has not been suspended or revoked, why does it have to be revalidated?" The policy the Postal Service tries to impose with regard to the SF-46 causes me to make a comparison. Suppose the State Patrol took the same approach. Suppose everyone even remotely involved in a fender bender in the fog, or on the ice, had their State drivers license revoked until we had gone to school, retested and sat in the hot seat. I believe the legislators in Olympia would have a war on their hands. Why should we tolerate such from the Postal Service?

10) Hiring Freeze: At one time or another during the past couple months we have been told by our Postmasters that there is a hiring freeze and yes, it applies to the rural craft as well. Whenever I call Art Cowans, Director of Human Relations in the Seattle Division, he responds, "the rural contract does not allow for a hiring freeze, so no there is NO freeze in the rural craft". This merry-goround has gone on for weeks. Almost daily carriers call to tell me there is a hiring freeze.

11) There is a hiring and purchasing slow down. It is hard to take the Postal Service seriously when they plead with the local offices to work in the cold, turn out the lights, don't order supplies, and so on when you know the Postal Service spent more than 42 million to shuffle offices and people around with the latest re-organization. They paid a consultant \$900 a day or \$170,000 to tell

the Postal Service how to re-organize and now they are paying the same consultant another \$170,000 to tell them why the re-organization isn't working.

One of the good things that came upon the craft this year was the creation of the RCA Rural Carrier Associate position. The memo of understanding that created the RCA was worked out by the National level Quality-of-Work-Life Committee. The other side of the creation of the RCA position was the choas the Postal Service made out of the training to take tests and the conversion of RCR to RCA. I have attempted to monitor the progress and point out the errors. This has really been resented by management.

I hope something can be done for those with less than three years of service and not easily reached on the hiring rosters.

Another of the good things the Union was able to get for the craft this year is the memo that resulted from the time study ordered by the arbitrator who wrote our last compensation package.

- 1) This memo makes a cluster box worth as much to an L-route carrier as to a non-L2) The L-route carrier can flip-flop as we used to say about the RCS carrier who
  was sometimes paid by the mile and sometimes by the evaluated schedule. Effective with this September count, the L-route carrier whose routes has dropped to
  less than 12 boxes per mile will no longer be compensated as an L-route, In
  other words, he will get a raise.
- 3) The third thing this memo did was get the auxiliary carrier compensated on the evaluation of the route rather than on the clock.

One of the good things your state association did for the membership this year was to secure the services of Mike Watson and our own Ron Serafini to help those with O.W.C.P. claims. This has secured many dollars in benefits for our injured members and it has speeded up the process dramatically for others. I have never been more pleased to give up a responsibility than I was to give up this one and it is done so much better now.

We hope those who suffer on the job injuries or job related illnesses will document the threats and coercion that their managers impose upon them when they attempt to file claims. We need to put a stop to this harrassment. If we are to be successful, we must have carefully documented cases.

One of the biggest disappointments of this past year is the continued failure of the QWL/EI process to come to the State of Washington.

We were told to have our people appointed and ready by November of 1985. We did this. Some of those people have since retired, therefore won't have the privilege of working to make the process work in Washington.

I have gone through the training for Joint Steering Committee member and also the Facilitator training. After the training I am still convinced we want the process as soon as we can get management who will welcome and support it.

THE STEWARD SYSTEM: The Union's legal council Bill Peer has told us that we had better improve our steward system. Some of us expect that the system will undergo some dramatic changes at this year's National Convention or soon thereafter. One change that I think we can expect is mor area stewards and fewer local stewards and none will be certified until they have attended training.

One of the changes that we as a state can impliment is the funding of a greater portion of the cost of the Steward Program. If resolutions that I have seen passed at County meetings are adopted at this state convention, it should no longer be necessary for any Stewards, local or area, to donate time or funds while serving the membership or fellow craft members. I think it is time to do this. I am reminded of the very first training meeting this Union called. It was a snowy day in February. One of those appointed as an area steward purchased a bus ticket to safely cross the snowy Cascades, and stayed overnight at the motel where the meeting was held. When he turned in a bill to be repaid for his out of pocket expenses, he had to be told that there was no authorization to repay these expenses. The steward immediately resigned with these words, "I thought we had ceased being an association and had become a Union!" This individual was no fly by nighter. He had served approximately 8 years on the state board including 2 years as President. This was in February 1971 folks! Perhaps it is time we listened to our legal council Bill Peer. Bill calls us a Mom & Pop organization that has been awfully lucky. Perhaps it's time to stop relying on luck and become professional.

When I became your State Steward, there was a problem that always bothered me. We still have that same problem and I don't feel any closer to a resolution. The problem is how can we as a craft get the members of our craft to become informed members?

Most of the problems that we as Rural Carriers encounter result from lack of knowledge of how to do our jobs, how our pay is computed, what our rights are under the contract, what our rights are under O.W.C.P., how our mail is counted and how that relates to our salary checks and on and on.

This Union is willing and anxious to train everyone in all these areas and more, but when barely 20% of the members avail themselves of the training put on by the Union, what is the answer?

We will be holding schools in July that will be poorly attended even though none of us know how many years this count will determine our pay.

I am reminded of 2 statements made by Bernard Cushman when he was Chief spokesman for all the Postal Unions including ours at the first two contract negotiating sessions.

- 1) The contract is not worth the paper it is written on unless you the Union members enforce it.
- 2) You must make it more expensive for the Postal Service to violate the contract than to live with it.

GRIEVANCE SUMMARY: We appealed 46 grievances to the region this year. This is how they break down.

- 1) Of the 46, 27 were contract disputes appealed to Step 3.
- 2) 19 were discipline grievances appealed to 2-B.
- 2a) of the 19, 9 were to appeal letters-of warnings.
- 2b) 4 were to appeal suspensions
- 2c) 6 were to appeal removals

One of last year's removals was restored to her rural carriers job by using an attorney, the newspaper, and television. The Union had struck out because of Article 15,4-E that prohibits the Union from appealing a case beyond Step 2-B if a formal EEO complaint has been filed. This carrier had filed an EEO complaint

because she was suffering descrimination in the work place.

2 rural craft employees were restored to work as a result of 2-B appeals.

1 rural carrier removal was rescinded when Mike Watson was successful in getting her on the job injury accepted by 0.W.C.P.

4 removals were turned around at Step 1. Karen handled 2 of these.

2 removals are still in the appeals process as of this writing.

All the costs were down this year for my office except L.W.O.P. and money spent for publications such as contract booklets, M-37, M-38, Federal Times, Postal Employees News Digest and things like that.

I took 121 days L.W.O.P. to work for the Union. This is 2 more than last year. I could have done a better job with more time. The more time I spent in the office, the more there was to do. It really takes a long time to talk to anyone in management. When you call, they have always stepped out. It often takes 3 or more attempts to get through. Some will call you back, but it generally takes a long time.

I drove 13,917 miles for the Union. This is 6,810 less than last year because of consolidating trips.

The total cost of the state stewards office not counting ass't. state steward or area stewards was down by \$4,577.00 this year. One would have to share the credit for this with assistant state steward Karen De Bella and O.W.C.P. Director Ron Serafini. Karen has handled many problems on the West side and Ron has relieved me of most of the O.W.C.P. responsibilities.

We have tried to visit the county meetings where we get special invitations to take part in the program. If there are no special or urgent invitations, then we try to accept an invitation in a unit we have not already visited in the past year. We would like to attend a meeting in each county unit once each year. It seems we are almost always 1 or 2 counties short when the convention comes aroumd. That is the case again this year. My apologies to those units we missed. Please be assured that we missed no county intentionally.

The membership has been served by a good board this year. The election challenge was a worry for the whole board, but more for President Bob. I feel he has handled the challenge very well. It seems to me that he represented this Union with integrity and good will at all times.

I don't believe there can be any question but that Dexter handled the secretarial duties very well. He paid expense claims promptly and I don't believe anyone can question his accuracy.

Midge will be getting off the board with this election. We hope it will not be for long before she will be able again to serve as a state officer. Midge has been a steadying influence. She has had the courage to ask the tough questions and insist that the board take a course that cannot even look inappropiate. She is a good officer and we will miss her.

Joe will be leaving this year also. You know he and Hazel put out the best paper we've seen in many a year. I hope their replacement will not be expected to as good a paper right off.

Guess we should'nt look back. Dave will be a good President and we have good people running for the board. They will be joining capable people.

It has been an honor to serve another year as your state steward. Each year seems shorter and busier than the last. We appreciate the kindness and courtesies we encounter at each meeting. Rural Carriers have to be the best people one can serve.

The President, Bob Lange then announced the lunch break and asked that every one return at 1:30 p.m.

JUNE 22, 1987 1:30 p.m.

President Bob Lange called the meeting to order and showed us an antique strapping out bag. He then announced a change in order, Ron Serafini would speak before our National Committeeman.

Ron Serafini, O.W.C.P. Director instructed us on what to do when involved in an on the job injury or illness. This was very informative and helpful to us to know our rights and our responsibilities in this area. Some of the most important things are; to be sure you are filling out the right forms, to keep accurate records, to make sure your doctor understands what kind of work you do, and to follow up on what has happened to your claim.

Secretary Dexter Nesmoe held the Roll Call and all were present but those who working on committees.

Our National Committeeman, Roger Moreland, adressed the Convention on the following issues:

- 1) We currently have a 200% membership, and he asked that we not rest on that but to contact other rural carriers and RCA's and convince them to join the Union.
- 2) He realized our disappointment that QWL/EI had not yet reached Washington State, but assured us that it would eventually get here and help improve our work environment. He asked that we be patient a little while longer.
- 3) He encouraged rural carriers to learn your rights and responsibilities regarding O.W.C.P., knowing that would help your claims through faster.
- 4) In order to stop the hiring "pause" by management, he asked us to file a grievance if there is a vacancy for a RCA and management has taken more than a reasonable time to fill the position.
- 5) He discussed the proper way to install the new rural carrier cases.
- 6) He cautioned us to be aware if anyone was taking home "pay to the bearer" coupons or any other bulk mail, etc. This is a serious offense and can cost your job. Handle all mail properly.
- 7) He discussed the availability of the new long-life Postal vehicle, and doubted that it would be available to rural carriers for some time.
- 8) He discussed what was most important to members across the nation for the upcoming contract negotiations.
- 9) He discussed what to do to correctly document a question on your mail count.

President Bob Lange then announced the Retired Carriers Banquet on the third floor of the Spokane Sheraton and adjourned the meeting.

# TUESDAY MORNING JUNE 23, 1987 8:30 A.M.

Auxiliary Vice President, Virginia Mackey opened the Memorial Service in remembrance of members of our Postal family that have passed away. She sang two lovely songs "This is My Task" and "The Lord is My Salvation".

President Bob Lange called the meeting to order and introduced Harley Robb our P.A.C. Director.

Harley Robb our PAC Director explained what happens to our PAC dollar and how it is distributed through our Lobbyiest Ken Parmalee in Washington D.C. PAC started in 1975 and contributions have gone from \$60,000 to 307,000 in 1986. NRLCA P.A.C. is one of the most respected for their honesty and hard work. If you contribute \$50.00 in one year, you earn a gold Leadership pin.

The Safety Speaker, Trooper Derrick of the Washington State Patroladdressed the Convention on the importance of wearing seat belts, obeying the speed limit, not driving under the influence of alcohol or drugs and keeping our vehicle in good repair. He then answered questions from the floor.

President Bob Lange announced a 10 minute break.

# TUESDAY MORNING JUNE 23, 1987 10:30 A.M.

Carol Eden, Past National Auxiliary President spoke to the Convention on the Auxiliary's projects for the year; the National Heart Project and collecting money for P.A.C.

Secretary Dexter Nesmoe called Roll Call and all were present except those working on committees.

President Bob Lange held a discussion on how the resolutions would be voted on. The Chairman of the Resolutions Committee would read the resolution and give their recommendation. If there were no objections, the resolution would be passed at the drop of the gavel. If there was an objection, the resolution would be set aside until all the resolutions had been gone through, then those that were objected to would be discussed, admended, or rejected altogether. This method was agreed to by all present.

After the Department of Labor had checked our Constitution and By Laws, it was decided at this time that Alaska's 4 votes could not be voted as part of Mutual County's votes.

# REPORT OF THE CREDENTIALS COMMITTEE:

Vi Gilliam, Chairperson of the Credential Committee verified all delegates were paid up members and ready to vote. The Credentials Committee had three recommendations for the next convention.

- 1) A new credentials form be made to include whether the delegate was a regular carrier, R.C.A., R.C.R. or retiree, to make it easier to verify each delegates credentials.
- 2) That the county name be-indexed out beyond the regular pages of the book to make it easier and faster to find each county.
- 3) That the county officers be sure to include the county name on each credential certificate.

A motion was made and seconded to accept the Credentials Committee report. The motion carried.

# PRELIMINARY REPORT OF THE RESOLUTIONS COMMITTEE:

Joanne Nelson, Chairperson of the Resolutions Committee, reported that there were forty one resolutions and the committee had made copies for all the delegates so everyone would have a chance to read the resolutions and the committee's recommendation on each one, before they were brought on the floor. Mickey Mackey, Chairman of the Washington Rural Postman Committee reported that the committee had a new editor in mind. They were also investigating the costs of different formats and printing methods for the paper, since the present equipment was no longer any good.

The convention allowance to remain at \$1.25 per regular member and \$.25 per Retiree. Keep the door prize allowance of \$300.00 per state convention and \$125.00 for each District meeting. Have an equipment fund of \$2,000 in addition to any carry over.

Marion Personett, Chairperson of the Time and Place Committee reported that the Convention is to be on the West side of the state and recommended the Association accept the invitation of Skagit County. The place to be Mount Vernon, the time to be June 20 through June 23, 1988, tentatively.

The Director of the Rural Letter Carrier Health Plan, Larry Waligora announced the Health Plan was putting all their health records on micro fische to save space and the financial records on computer. He discussed the reasons behind the increase in premium costs in the Health Plan. He asked the membership to encourage all RCA's to look at the Associate Hospital Plan. He discussed the new term life insurance available from NRLCA. He discussed the mail order prescription plan and noted that Walgren's had updated their service and stated it should be much better now. He discussed the speed of processing claims and encouraged members to send claims in promptly. He answered questions from the floor and offered to be available to help solve anyone's individual problems with the Health Plan.

# RESOLUTION # 2

WHEREAS: Other crafts COLA was uncapped in 1981, resulting in an approximate \$1.995.00 per annum pay difference based on 40 hours;

THEREFORE: Be it Resolved, that rural carriers be compensated at level 6 attained step.

Passed

# RESOLUTION # 3

WHEREAS: L-Route carriers have great difficulty getting stamp purchase credit; THEREFORE: Be it Resolved, that L-Route carriers be credited with 15 minutes stamp purchase allowance per week.

Objected to

#### RESOLUTION # 4

WHEREAS: Rural Carriers are expected to depart the office within 20 minutes of same time each day;

THEREFORE: Be it Resolved, that each post office be required to use enough clerk time in the morning so that a cuttoff time can be established and abided by.

Objected to

RESOLUTION # 5

WHEREAS: It seems that RCR's with less than 3 years of service as of April 11, 1987 are being discriminated against:

THEREFORE: Be it Resolved, that when an RCR has served 3 years of satisfactory and has a passing score that this RCR be converted to an RCA.

Passed

RESOLUTION # 6

WHEREAS: Earnings statement form 1223 offers no explanation when pay adjustments are made;

THEREFORE: Be it Resolved, that all pay adjustments be accompanied by an explanation.

Passed

RESOLUTION # 7

WHEREAS: The 1986 State Convention passed the Auxiliary Family Membership Plan and effective July 1, 1987, all Association members' spouses will automatically become members of the Auxiliary and;

WHEREAS: This membership is only cancelable by written request to the State Secretary for a refund of withheld dues:

THEREFORE: Be it Resolved that this Family Membership Plan dues collection procedure be rescinded.

Objected to

RESOLUTION # 8

WHEREAS: Postmasters or Supervisors are following rural carriers on the mail route without prior notice of doing so. The practice of following carriers on their routes has caused unsafe conditions (unable to see traffic). The carrier feels harrassed and humiliated, and in some cases do not know who is following them;

THEREFORE: Be it Resolved, that Postmasters or Supervisors must give advance notice to rural carriers that the carrier will be followed on that day.

Objected to

RESOLUTION # 9

WHEREAS: ARTICLE 15., SECTION 4.E. of the USPS-NRLCA AGREEMENT supposedly prevents the NRLCA from pursuing a case to arbitration if a formal EEO complaint has been filed in the same or a similar fact situation,

WHEREAS: ARTICLE 15., SECTION 4. E. may even jeopardize the hearing of a case in Federal Court because the courts often refuse to hear a case in which it is perceived that the grievant failed to first exhaust all administrative remedies; and

WHEREAS: ARTICLE 15., SECTION 4. E. is a serious abridgement of a grievant's

civil rights; and

WHEREAS: No such exclusion exists in the collective bargaining agreements of either the NALC or the APWU pertaining to EEO complaints, thereby demonstrating that no such exclusion need exist in the USPS-NRLCA agreement;

THEREFORE: Be it Resolved, that the NRLCA demand that any exclusion for EEO complaints such as ARTICLE 15., SECTION 4. E. be abolished from all future USPS-NRLCA collective bargaining agreements, and that if necessary the NRLCA agressively pursue the matter before an arbitrator and/or the national labor relations board and/or federal court until such exclusion is abolished.

RESOLUTION # 10

WHEREAS: Employees who work in a "Bad Office" have many problems and have to suffer through the long, slow processes of the grievance procedure;

THEREFORE: Be it Resolved, that to rectify this horrendous situation special procedures be established so immediate action and a priority be given to problems and grievances in these offices.

Objected to

RESOLUTION # 11

WHEREAS: The National Rural Carrier Magazine publishes a small number of obituaries and retirement notices of the membership and the cost of the magazine is very high;

THEREFORE: Be it Resolved that these obituary and retirement notices be eliminated from the magazine.

Objected to

RESOLUTION # 12

WHEREAS: The Union represents all Rural Craft employees and wishes to be democratic and there is no procedure for the membership to vote on national officers;

THEREFORE: Be it Resolved, that the Union change it's Constitution and By Laws to allow the membership to vote on all National officers.

Passed

RESOLUTION # 13

WHEREAS: Members of the other postal labor organizations vote directly to ratify their national agreements, and;

WHEREAS: Many NRLCA members feel they have little input into the negotiation of the USPS-NRLCA agreement;

THEREFORE: Be it Resolved that the USPS-NRLCA agreement be ratified by a direct vote of the membership.

# RESOLUTION # 14

WHEREAS: There is little published in the Rural Letter Carrier Magazine of such urgency that it couldn't be published monthly, thereby saving great expense to the association, and;

WHEREAS: A reason often cited by national officers that direct ratification of the agreement is unfeasible because publication of the tentative agreement would be too costly, and;

WHEREAS: Urgent information could still be sent to the membership by special supplemental issues on rare occasions;

THEREFORE: Be it Resolved, that the Rural Letter Carrier Magazine be published monthly instead of weekly, with special supplemental issues when necessary, and that the monetary savings be applied to publishing a tentative agreement for the persual of the membership prior to ratification.

Objected to

RESOLUTION # 15

WHEREAS: In the past area stewards have been discouraged from billing the WRLCA for their time spent evenings and weekends investigating and processing grievances, and;

WHEREAS: It is unreasonable to expect anyone to spend so much time pursuing official Union business without compensation;

THEREFORE: Be it Resolved, that area stewards be reimbursed for all time spent investigating and processing grievances by accruing said time until the daily evaluation of their route has been reached and submitting a bill to the WRLCA State Steward for a day's pay, to be paid by the State Secretary/Treasurer.

Passed

RESOLUTION # 16

WHEREAS: ARTICLE 13., SECTION 3 of the USPS-NRLCA Agreement was originally intended to prevent members of other crafts from using regular rural routes as light duty assignments, and;

WHEREAS: The postal service has been misinterpreting this to mean that there are no light duty assignments available for injured rural carriers;

THEREFORE: Be it Resolved, that ARTICLE 13., SECTION 3 of the USPS-NRLCA Agreement be amended to read "at any local installation, regular rural routes shall not be considered as light duty assignments for members of other crafts".

Objected to

RESOLUTION # 17

WHEREAS: The time factor presently used by the Postal Service in regards to the handling of circulats and/or boxholders is not realistic;

THEREFORE: Be it Resolved, that time allowances be reviewed and appropriately changed to be on a more equal basis to that of addressed mail of like type. As such letter-size circulars would receive a more equal allowance similar to addressed flats.

Passed
