Raye Smith, Delegate-at-Large from Lower Columbia Counties, lodged a formal grievance in regards to the elections of the Lower Columbia Counties. The grievance was accepted by President Dave Stover, and will be dealt with according to proper procedure.

Reports of the State Officers, Stewards and Directors were

made as follows:

REPORT OF THE PRESIDENT

National Secretary/Treasurer Scottie Hicks, State Officers, Delegates, members and guests assembled here at Mt. Vernon for our 82nd Annual Convention:

One year ago I was elected your State President and the Delegate-at-Large to the National Convention in Reno,

Nevada.

It seems my year had a shaky start at the Board meeting following the Spokane Convention on Wednesday afternoon. There seemed to be bitter feelings on the race for Vice-President and the Steward not being voted full time Steward. At this Board meeting I appointed a committee Of Dan Snydar, Cindy Norman and Neil Buchanan to research the expense and the need for a full time State Steward. I also investigated into this matter. I met with Director of Labor Relations, Steve Smith at the National Convention. A second meeting took place with Cindy and Dan attending. We were told that the cost would include salary and all benefits, including retirement. These would have to be paid by the State Association as the Postal Service will pay none of this if the employee does not carry their route more than one-half of the year. We are talking in the neighborhood of \$50,000.00 plus the actual expenses. Mr. Smith also stated that he could not see the need for a full time Steward in Washington State. Neil also researched the cost of a full time Steward with a telephone call to National Vice-President Vernon Meier. A letter explaining the cost of such a program was mailed to Neil.

Shortly after returning from the National Convention, I was approached by our State Steward about borrowing ten or twelve thousand dollars so he could be paid for his expenses and salary. I phoned our Treasurer, Dexter Nesmoe and asked him how much we owed our Steward. He informed me that he had two vouchers totaling \$4,430.00. I could not understand how that much money could have been spent in just six weeks. I asked Dexter for a copy of these vouchers. Article VI, Section 5 of the Washington Constitution states the State Steward and Assistant State Steward are expected to attend the National Convention and other out-of-state meetings for Steward Training and Educaiton, and will receive mileage and per diem allowance. The Steward had claimed mileage and actual expense in the amount of \$1,125.00 instead of \$541.10 for

mileage and per diem.

A short time later the Steward phoned me and asked if I had done anything about applying for a loan. I said "No, I don't think it's legal". He asked me to poll the Board and I did. Only two members of the Board said they would be willing to sign a loan application. I phoned the Steward and told him of the results. He asked, "What do you want me to do? If you want me to quit and sue the Union, you'll have it." The next day I phoned National Headquarters for advice. Steve Smith told me it would be legal to borrow money for this purpose by approval of the Board. (National Constitution and By-Laws Article VII). Upon learning this I proceeded to call an Executive Board meeting. I looked at our State Constitution and By-Laws to see who was to come to this meeting. Article VIII, Section 2 states: "There shall be a Board of Control consisting of President, Vice-President, Secretary/Treasurer, Editor and Five Members of the Executive Committee. This Board shall meet upon call of the President or by a majority vote of the Board to the Secretary when matters of importance arise that need immediate attention during the interim between meeting of the Association. Each elected officer shall be entitled to a vote on every question before the State Convention." This description does not include the Steward so he was not invited.

At this meeting in Ellensburg on August 23, 1987 I recommended the following guidelines to cut expenses. I shall read a copy of the letter I sent to the State Steward and the letter of

ENCLOSED LETTERS

Neil Buchanan, State Steward, WRLCA Neil:

This is a report from the meeting held by the Executive Committee on this date. I sincerely hope that you understand the Committee does not doubt your honesty or integrity. Our only concern is what must be done to cut the expenses so we are not faced with the problem of being unable to pay our expenses and salaries on time again. The following guidelines were approved and we hope they are acceptable by you.

No LWOP to be taken for Steward work at home without

prior Presidential approval.

LWOP claims are to be submitted on a separate voucher accompanied by a copy of the leave requuest form and the claims itemized.

All expenses over \$5.00 to be accompanied by receipts or

copies thereof.

A limit on travel to the West Side except for grievances on

removal or suspensions of 7 days or more.

Appointment of a second Assistant State Steward on the West Side by the State Steward with the approval of the State President at a salary of \$200.00 per month.

The State Steward and Assistant State Stewards will be paid mileage and per diem only when attending County meetings. OWCP is to be accountable to the State President.

I have enclosed the two expense claim forms submitted by you for payment since the new fiscal year started. Please submit separate forms for LWOP days with copy of leave request form and itemized. Receipts are necessary for other expense for payment to be made. For any reimbursement for annual and sick days lost because of LWOP, itemize days taken and the payment for those will be made.

I am sure you can agree that good records not only protect the WRLCA association but they will also protect you. This practice is done at the National level and the National Constitution and By-Laws state that the State level must be in line with them. With dedication and willingness to make some changes we can work together for the betterment of this association.

RESPONSE TO DAVID STOVER'S **LETTER OF 8/23/87**

My concern with the letter as a whole is the holding of the meeting at which the decisions were reached.

It has to be considered most unethical to meet and criticize a colleagues work without that person being party to the discussion. In fact, those persons were barred from the meeting.

I cannot imagine such a meeting taking place while persons who had served us so well in the past were on the Board. Can you imagine LeRoy Neifert, Chuck Robinson, Roger Armstrong, T. Lynn Ricks, or Bob Lange being party to such conduct?

Secondly, it might be well to take a brief look at how we arrived at this financial condition. One has to really look no further back than the Bellingham State Convention. At the Bellingham Convention the delegates indicated they wanted the Steward system funded better. A couple of the items addressed were paying Stewards mileage and expenses to attend State Training meetings. The statement was made, "tell us how much more dues is needed and we will approve it." After some discussion, \$6.00 per member was agreed upon and approved by the voting delegates.

This dues increase should have raised approximately

\$6,000.00 per annum.

At the Board meeting following this Bellingham convention, the Board authorized paying mileage for certified stewards and the repayment of a higher percentage of their expenses. In other words, the dues increase was spent. The tough part is that the dues increase was never collected, leaving the union an income approximately \$12,000.00 less than the Board

anticipated.

This short fall is further aggravated by the addition of several other items of considerable expense. Salaries were instigated for previously unsalaried individuals on the Board: Secretary/Treasurer and Editor. Add to this the salary and expense of an Assistant State Steward, 2 O.W.C.P. experts, we now pay 4 persons to attend National Convention. We pay 3 persons to attend Western State Conference.

My point is this, don't keep all the blame on the Stewards and

the Steward program.

I really don't see why anyone was surprised by this short fall. Past President Lange can tell you that I made many inquiries as to our financial projecitons. I also made similar inquiries of the Secretary/Treasurer as recently as the S.K.I. County meeting just days before the Spokane State Convention.

I hope that you remember that I reported nearly \$4,000.00 decrease in the cost of my office in 86-87 over 85-86, while hand-

ling a much bigger workload.

(Para 4) I do not now nor have I ever objected to accountability including copies of receipts. If a single Board member in a regular Board meeting had asked the question, "Is it time that we began documenting out expense outlay with receipts?" I would have joined in that movement. I once talked with Secretary/Treasurer Dexter about this. The converstion went someting like this: "Dex, would you like me to start sending copies of receipts with my vouchers? I sure will if you think it is a good idea." Dexter's response: "I don't want your receipts. #1 - I trust you and I know they are not needed. #2 - If everyone starts sending me all their receipts the union will have to add onto my house so I'll have room to store them.'

(Para 5) Gives me a real problem. I am reminded of one of Dick Stultzs first official acts after being elected President. Dick wrote me a letter on W.R.L.C.A. stationary stating that in the interest of saving money you are to stay East of the Cascades and I will handle all the problems West of the mountains.

LeRoy Neifert was Secretary/Treasurer at this time. I phoned him and read him the letter. His instructions were: You ignore that letter. Pretend you never got it. I will take care of it." He stated further, "You are not one half the State Steward, you are State Steward of all of Washington and we want you to use your best judgement and where you can best

One of our most able regional representatives in one of the State Steward Training sessions told us: "When any rural craft employee gets written discipline if it is at all possible I want you on the scene while everything is reasonably fresh. We cannot expect an unexperienced local steward to conduct the kind of investigation including comprehensive interviews of the Postmaster, S.P.O. and other witnesses that may be necessary to turn the discipline around."

I have come to look at any written discipline as an announcement by the Postal Service that they intend to remove this person. Otherwise, verbal corrections would work as well or

better.

I lack the words to describe the trauma that one feels when they receive written discipline. Whether a letter-of-warning or a removal notice. This person no longer functions in the normal fashion and the union whould be perceptive of this fact.

I feel West side travel in discipline cases has to be decided on a case to case basis by the grievant and the Stewards.

(Para 6) I have to question. Why a second Assistant State Steward at this time when the announced intention is to save money? If we should appoint a second Assistant State Steward at this time and you add to the \$2,400.00 per annum salary the other costs the Constitution and By-Laws assigns to that person, we are talking between 4 and 6 thousand dollars for 1987-1988 alone. Karen and I can take a lot of time off our jobs and do a lot of traveling for those kinds of dollars not to mention the cost of training this individual.

(Para 7) Ten or twelve years ago I asked the Board to authorize mileage and expenses in lieu of mileage and per diem. They

did so for my office.

I am reminded of when Vernon Meier was our regional representative. He called and asked that I join him and Ron Lowe to spend the night at a Motel in North Seattle. When I made reservations, I learned that the rooms rented for \$90.00 and up. Those kind of expenses hurt folks, and I still had to eat.

(Para 10) AMEN --- Remember, I'm the guy who has brought his daily log to State Convention for 16 years and I'm also the guy that had to beg to get his records audited by an auditing committee so that there should never by any suspicion of misuse of union funds.

President's Report (Continued)

In this letter I mailed to the Steward, I had hoped to relay the message that the Executive Board met to discuss ways to cut expenses and that all the Board members discussed and

approved these guidelines.

This issue seems to be that the Steward was not invited. That such a meeting would not have taken place if LeRoy Neifert, Chuck Robinson, Roger Armstrong, T. Lynn Ricks or Bob Lange had been President. These past officers were not faced with a decision on whether to borrow \$10,000.00 or possibly face a lawsuit. Why wasn't Harley Robb or Alan Peterson included?

Yes, this financial problem has been evident for the past three years. Why did we pay out the salaries for our Secretary/ Treasurer, Editor, Assistant State Steward, two OWCP experts and the paying of more people to the National Convention and Western States before we had the funds that had been approved but not collected? Why didn't the State President of that time call an Executive Board meeting and resolve as to why the dues increase wasn't implemented? To spend the money before it is being collected is irresponsible.

In the Stewards letter of response he states that he has never objected to accountability. This should not have to be asked for, even though in the past three years a Resolution requesting this has been submitted and defeated twice. (Resolution #22, 1985 and Resolution #34, 1987.) Your current State President has mandated that receipts will be submitted before payment

will be made.

In his paragraph concerning Past State President Dick Stultzs, I feel he is comparing me to him. Mr. Stultzs wanted Neil to stay East of the mountains and he (Stultzs) would be the Steward on the West side. We had only requested that he not travel to the West side except for removals or suspensions. Doesn't the Steward have any confidence in his Assistant of three years? Isn't that why we have an Assistant State Steward? Isn't it to save travel expense and money?

In my original suggestion I had requested three Assistant State Stewards for the West side. Each located so there would be little travel. I had suggested that each be paid \$50.00 per month, which is in line with other States like Florida. Two members of the Board objected and stated that Karen would quit if we cut her salary. So the suggestion was changed to have one more Assistant State Steward at \$200.00 per month.

I question the expense of sending the Assistant Steward or Stewards to the National Convention, Western States and Alexandria, Virginia. Could not the State Steward bring the information to his assistants and save a great deal of money? In questioning State Presidents while I was at the National Convention in Reno, I found that if their Assistant Stewards were not elected Delegates to that Convention they did not

receive any payment to attend.

In Paragraph #7 the Steward states that 10 or 12 years ago he asked the Board to authorize mileage and expenses in lieu of mileage and per diem. The Board can only authorize this until the next State Conveniton. The Constitution and By-Laws must then be changed. He requested this of the Board in 1982. The Constitution and By-Laws were changed in 1984, but it authorized mileage and actual expenses only within the State in the administration of the Steward Program. Our Constitution and By-Laws also state in Article XII that only mileage and per diem is to be paid the Steward to attend the State Convention.

I think his letter of response is not facing the problem, only justifying it. I don't think these requests were too demanding.

At the Fall Board meeting in Fife, I was criticized for trying to run the Stewards Office. Again, I wish to state that the entire Board made the decisions.

At this Board meeting the Board decided to remove three of

the recommendations implemented at the Executive Board meeting in Ellensburg. These were a limit on travel to the West side, appointment of a second Assistant State Steward and the payment of mileage and per diem to County meetings.

At the Western States Conference in Bozoman, Montana on April 29 and 30 I learned that we had not paid the Auxiliary their money from the family plan and we did not have the money to do so. We owed them approximately \$5,000.00. Dexter met with the National Auxiliary Officers and worked out a solution.

Shortly after Western States I received a letter from the Steward requesting the State borrow money from the Atlanta Postal Credit Union. The Steward had met with the Credit Union Representative, Mr. Wilbur Wood while in Bozeman. He had asked Mr. Wood if it would be difficult to secure a loan. Once again I called an Executive Board meeting. Not wanting to hurt anyone's feelings I invited all of the Board members, noting that only the voting members would be paid mileage. Cindy Norman could not attend as she had traveled to New Jersey to see her husband. Cindy did send a letter to the meeting stating how she felt about a loan and a limit to the amount to be borrowed. At this meeting we listed how much we need to borrow and for what. Pay for Delegates to to the State Convention \$4,000.00, two issues of the Washington Postman \$2,000.00, postage to mail ballots for National Delegates \$225.00, postage for mailing Washington Postman \$150.00, Stenographer for State Convention \$500.00, cost of printing Convention program \$50.00, Supplies and Labels \$225.00, Printing Ballots \$30.00, Postage for membership letter \$440.00, Salary and expenses for Assistant State Steward \$3,340.00, Salary and expenses for State Steward \$4,860.00, Salary and expenses for Editor \$1,340.00, Salary for Ron Serafini \$1,250.00, Salary for Dexter Nesmoe \$1,600.00, OWCP Specialist Mike Watson \$655.00, Lynn Walker \$400.00, Gerald Thomson \$75.00, Dan Snydar \$85.00, Kit Witt \$250.00, Harley Robb \$15.00, David Stover \$525.00, Cindy Norman \$150.00, and \$5,500.00 for the Auxiliary. The total of these unpaid expenses and salaries is \$27,715.00. The Board voted to borrow \$25,000.00 at 9% interest rate to be paid in six quarterly payments starting October 1988 through January 1990. These payments will take over one-half of our dues increase that we will start receiving in October 1988. Our dues of \$260.00 per regular carrier will make Washington State the highest dues paying State in the Nation. You may have read on the back page of the June 11, 1988 issue of the National Rural Letter Carrier Magazine that the average is about \$129.00 per year for regular carriers, about \$29.00 a year for Subs/RCAs/RCRs and about \$25.00 a year for retirees.

I wrote an article in the February 1988 issue of the Washington Postman about our financial problems. I wish they were as good as I thought they were last January. I made some suggestions on how we could cut back, I stated some facts on salaries comparing Washington to other States. I got no satisfactory response from anyone. The only response I got was in that same issue from the Editor.

OWCP Director Ron Serafini submitted his letter of resignation to the Board effective June 1, 1988. There were reasons for this and I'm sure Ron will fill you in with his report. I think Ron did a fantastic job and is a credit to our Association. I wish him

success in his new venture.

I am requesting an audit as soon as possible after June 30, 1988. On May 25, 1988 I placed a call to LeRoy Stave of Moss Adams Accounting firm in Everett, Washington. They are completely independent of the Association. Mr. Stave told me it is hard to do a complete audit satisfactorily before seeing the books. This audit is necessary to answer all questions as to why our Association has this financial problem. I recommend this audit report be included in the next issue of the Washington Postman.

I would consider it adviseable to establish a budget for each office and allow no deficit spending or cash advances. The Board should be furnished a quarterly financial statement from the Treasurer so we are all aware of how the money is being spent.

The contracting of printing of the Washington Postman is not satisfactory. They do a good job of printing but the cost is

too high. The issues have been late and the issue for the State Convention program did not get to anyone in time to use.

I took an Oath of Office last June in Spokane to enforce complaince with the National and State Constitution and By-Laws. I tried to do this to the best of my ability.

My entire year has not been on the negative side. One of the highlights was when I was invited to visit National Headquarters in Alexandria, Virginia and to visit Washington D.C. in March. This was for a Presidents Legislative Seminar. It was my pleasure to meet the Editor of the Rural Carrier magazine Ms. Ruthann Saenger, the office staff, many guest speakers and of course our National Officers and all of the other State Presidents. I flew out on Saturday because my airline ticket was much cheaper if I could fly then. This gave me an extra day to do some sight seeing as I had never been there before. I want to thank the National Association for allowing me to come back there and for their generosity in supplying the hotel room and the meals for me. I did learn a lot and was privileged to visit the offices of three Congressmen and one Senator on Tuesday.

I apologize for the length of my report. As there were no minutes of any Board meeting printed in the Washington Postman as directed in Resolution #1 at the 1986 State Convention in Ocean Shores, this is the only way of informing the member-

ship of the happenings of this past year. Following is my financial report for the year 1987 - 1988.

REPORT OF THE VICE-PRESIDENT

National Secretary/Treasurer Scottie Hicks, fellow members of the State Board, Delegates, members and guests assembled for the 82nd Annual Convention of the WRLCA here in Mt. Vernon.

It has been an honor and a pleasure to have served as your Vice-President for this past year. I have enjoyed the chance to meet many of you at your County and District meetings during the course of the past year.

After State Convention last June, my year started out with a trip to Reno, Nevada to attend the National Convention. Reno's a great place to go to, but there are too many distractions there to want to attend many meetings.

After my trip to Reno, I attended the Fall Booster meeting in Fife, two SKI County meetings, one in Marysville in November and the other in Bellevue in January. Also in January was the Stewards Seminar in Tacoma. In February the other Officers and I traveled to Clackamas, Oregon, for the joint meeting of the Washington/Oregon State Officers. In March I attended a Mutual Counties meeting in Olympia, and District meetings in Districts 1, 2, and 3. The month of April saw me traveling to the District 4 meeting in the Tri-Cities, and to Bozeman, Montana for the Western States Conference. The District 1 meeting, and Western States Conference were at my own expense. I couldn't find my vouchers for the Fall Booster meeting or the SKI meeting in Marysville. It'll be interesting to see what they come up with. Mr. Mackley of the Federal Times doesn't put much faith in them. He seems to think that the first words out of their mouths will be "Contract Out". He also said that if the Postal Service didn't agree with the findings, they would just sweep it under the carpet, as they

have done with so many other studies.

Hopefully you have all been actively writing your Congressmen and Senators this past year, urging them to support Postal Programs and Federal Employees. When Ronnie goes out and Dukakis comes in, maybe we won't have to worry about our jobs as much any more.

I'm glad to see all of you here at Convention. Enjoy your stay

in Mt. Vernon.

REPORT OF THE EDITOR

National Officers, Fellow Officers, Honored Guests, Delegates, Union Brothers and Sisters. Thank you for the privilege of speaking to you today.

It has been an eventful year for the "Postman" and a year of learning for me. However, the more I learn about being your

Editor, the more I discover I need to learn.

It all started with a trip to Kelso last year to pick up the equipment from Joe Halleck. Up to that point everything was pretty easy but after that things started to go downhill fast.

I learned how the "Postman" is at the mercy of so many other determining factors; getting the articles in on time, equipment failures, financial problems and finally printer's schedules.

Rural Carriers don't stay in one place very long and few of you notify the "Postman" of your moves. We have processed over 150 changes of address this last year.

We have changed to a computer printed label which is less messy and faster to use. We've also changed to the typesetting/ printing format that you've seen in the last issues.

The "Postman" is currently in a period of transition. The mimeo process is finished - the machines are not working and out of date — the typesetting printing method we are currently using is very expensive and as I said before we have to conform to a printer's schedule. We looked into photocopying but it is too slow for a photocopier the Union can afford. We are also considering a computer for doing our own typesetting, but again the financial picture must improve before we can do that. So as changes are made in your "Postman" please let the Editor know of complaints, ideas, your likes and dislikes so we can produce a better magazine for you.

In the next year, I would like to see the "Postman" dedicated to encouraging new membership. I would like to send a copy of every issue to all non-members, not just one issue a year. Each issue should include an application for membership form and articles encouraging those non-members to join our Association. The increased cost of around \$300.00 per issue for extra copies and postage should be offset by new dues coming into the

Another thing I have learned about is the amount of travel a State Officer does. I attended all the District meetings, Fall Booster, Western States Conference, Area Officers meeting, two Board meetings, and a Steward Training and Mail Count Seminars. I have seen a lot of this beautiful state and met a lot of really great people.

REPORT OF THE STATE STEWARD

To the Officers and Members in Convention at Mt. Vernon, Washington:

This is my report to you for the year beginning July 1, 1987 and ending June 30, 1988.

It has been another busy year. It has been one I would surely

not want to repeat or do over.

Among the tasks performed for you this last year: Soon after attending the State Convention in Spokane in June, we attended the National Convention in Reno. Among the happening of interest at the Reno Convention: Olin Armentrout was defeated in his bid for a second term as President. This was the first time this has happened in the N.R.L.C.A. The main reason given for replacing Olin was that he took all the power and responsibility to himself and many times did not even let the other resident officers know what he was doing while meeting with Postal Officials.

Attended the Presidents and Stewards Conference in Reno in November, the Area Officers meeting in Portland where Dallas Fields was the National guest charged with explaining the changes in the new contract.

Karen and I put on 4 Steward training meetings and 2 mail

count schoools. Most were well attended.

Visited nearly every county unit one time during the year. Attended QWL/EI training at Sea-Tac and have met with the Steering Committee 4 times so far. The members of the Steering Committee selected Dale Zinser and me to serve as the Co-Chairs.

Not counting the QWL travel, drove over 18,000 miles on Union business this last year.

GRIEVANCES:

There were some 64 grievances appealed to Step 2B or Step 3. 12 of these were for discipline and the balance or 52 were for contract violations.

For each grievance appealed to Step 2B or Step 3, approximately 10 were settled at Steps 1 or 2. Karen was instrumental in getting one removal set aside at Step 1 and I helped get two other removals set aside at Step 1. These figures do not give a true work load picture because most problems we get involved in are resolved with a conversation or phone call. Usually when management is made aware that their order or conduct is a clear cut violation of the contract or a postal manual, that is all that is required

We had our fifth arbitration case this year. We were sustained in this one also. That means that of the 5 removals taken to arbitration in Washington we have prevailed in all. All 5 were restored to their jobs and all but 1 were awarded substantial amounts of back pay.

Removals keep happening though. We appealed a proposal to remove to Step 2B in the region just last week and the letter of decision is awaiting a hearing at Step 2A right now.

CONVERSION TO CITY:

Conversion of rural territory to city delivery raised its ugly head again this year. this Union agreed to the L-route concept to stop these conversions and for the most part the Postal Service has honored that agreement. However, this year rural territory was converted to city delivery in three different offices. Grievances were filed in all three offices and were upheld in 2 of the 3 and the third has been appealed to Step 4.

UNDER THE WHEEL:

In January 1988 a letter came out of the Tacoma MSC over Postmaster Boettger's signature order all rural carriers to be seated under the steering wheel before starting a left hand turn. I got more irrate phone calls on this one letter than on any other single happening in the last 17 years.

I, while working on this problem, was astounded to learn the variety of driving methods used by rural carriers driving left

hand vehicles.

Our regional representative and Labor Relations Officer soon made it abundantly clear that if we were to get any relief from this order, it would have to be worked out within the State, because it was the conviction of our National Officers that no high ranking Postal Official nor any arbitrator was going to grant and sign a grievance award which implied that it is safe to drive someplace other than seated under the steering wheel, outstanding safety record or not.

I got an appointment with MSC Postmaster Boettger and pleaded our case. After I pointed out much of the impact his letter was having on Rural Carriers, Postmaster Boettger agreed to form a committee of 4 persons, 2 from management and 2 from the union to meet and try to work out a compromise

solution to the situation created.

Jon Folk from Port Angeles and I represented the Union on this committee. Jon and a fellow Port Angeles rural carrier made a video tape showing some of the difficulties complying with this order created while serving the route from a car with a high hump with controls located between the driver and passenger. The management representatives were most reluctant to watch the film, but once they had their position was somewhat softened. They retained a copy of the film and it was shown to quite a few Postmasters and managers. It probably did as much as any other single argument in getting a modified version of the letter issued.

We were not successful in getting the letter rescinded. I did not expect to. However we did cause a milder version to be written. Compliance with the modified version has made many rural routes safer by the elimination of many left hand turns. If memory serves me correctly Rosa Papineau was able to change the line of travel on her route in such a way as to eliminate 30 of 33 left turns and cut 1 mile off the travel in the process. Our regional representative discussed the letter or order with Postmaster Boettger and informed me that all he ever hoped to gain from issuing the letter was for managers to closely inspect the rural routes for safety and eliminate all the left turns possible.

ADJUSTING ROUTES:

When the "re-alignment" of the Postal Service took place, that is when the Divisions were created and the regions deemphasized, there was a young man from Portland, Oregon assigned to the Seattle Field Division with the title "Manager, Delivery and Retail Program.".

It soon became apparent that one of his high priority projects was to adjust rural routes so as to eliminate over-time or heavy duty pay as we call it. He caused me to lose a lot of sleep while

he was attempting to attain his goal.

The order went out to the MSC's and many offices with rural routes. The second paragraph read: Any hours above 40 hours are paid at the overtime rate. These hours must be reduced if at all possible. Some suggestions are adjusting up or down to be in a lower option. Add to or create an auxiliary route.

All this was happening just a few months after the new M-38

language was adopted that stopped the adjustment of routes clear down to 42 H when adjusted.

Calls really began to come in when the order to reduce to 40 hours hit the A.O. Offices. In quite a few offices the rural carriers did not know their rights and really took a beating.

Labor Relations Officer Steve Smith no doubt got tired of my calls on this matter, however, he kept calling and visiting head-quarters and finally got what appeared to be an excellent letter to back up the new M-38 language. The key sentence in this Andrew S. Walker letter is: "The revised relief policy allows us to only adjust those routes that require adjustment".

I was really pleased when this letter was received, but this

guy in Seattle is hard to stop.

We have yet to properly test the part of the M-38 823.11 which reads: when providing relief to one or more routes in an office all routes should not be adjusted simultaneously unless it is in the best interest of the unit operation to do so.

MSC deliver analyst have been led to believe that the phrase "unless it is in the best interest of the unit" to be broad enough

to allow anything they choose.

We have what should be an excellent case as Step 3 right now. Walla Walla had 1 route at 59 hours and all others between 41 and 54 hours. The order came down from the Division, "cut all to 48 hours".

I have urged Roger on several occasions to hang tough on this one. In my opinion it is as clear cut as we will get and if we get a denial we will be seriously hurt for the foreseeable future.

There was asbsolutely no need to cut the routes in Walla Walla. They could have transferred a few hours from the 59 hour route to the light route that borders it. There, territory is very stable with only 4-5 boxes per year growth.

WASHINGTON D.C. TRAINING

Early this spring all the State Stewards were invited to National Headquarters in Alexandria, Virginia for the 1st Annual Steward Training session near Washington D.C. It was a good training and no doubt would have been even better except that Labor Relations Officer Steve Smith was quite ill. He attended the meeting against his doctors wishes. He was supposed to be in a hospital bed.

The National appointed Bob Locke from Alaska Assistant State Steward so that they could pay his way to come to the training. He felt the training could have been more basic since he is brand new, however, most State Stewards there were old

hands.

QUALITY OF WORK LIFE/ EMPLOYEE INVOLVEMENT:

the QWL/EI process has finally reached Washington. The Steering Committee and initial group of Facilitators have had their training. Everyone has been busy getting the training aids prepared and their presentations polished.

The letters of invitation to the initial group of Post Offices has been written and should be in the mail in the next couple weeks. We are frustrated because we will be slowed somewhat by the fact that we are now in the peak vacation period and it is hard to schedule meetings when all can attend.

I have been severely criticized because of those selected or not selected to serve on the Steering Committee and the initial

group of Facilitators.

I tried to diligently follow the instructions I was given. I was told that this is far too important to the rural carriers of Washington to make any chancy selections. One of the key instructions for Steering Committee members was that they must possess strong character, but not be abrasive, be completely trustworthy, and be able to trust others. I have been very proud of the conduct and performance of all those selected. I was told a number of times by the regional trainers that individually and as a group they have never trained better people than the rural side of this group of committee members and facilitators. In all honesty, I will have to add that most of the comments about the make up of our group has been very positive. One rural carrier upon seeing the list said, "Terrific!! If the choice had been mine I would not change a single person."

VOLUNTARISM:

Some time ago our State President wrote an article for the Rural Postman asking for more voluntarism. Perhaps I have been guilty of the same thing from time to time, however, at this

time I must respectfully disagree.

I feel I have volunteered quite enough to this Union. Not that I have anything against this Union. I have made it my life, and it is dear to me and I love and respect rural carriers. Some of you know that I served 4 years as District 3 Representative, 2 years as Vice-President, and 2 years as your President. There are few left in this State who know more of the history of this organization. My family and I have donated humdreds of hours and thousands of dollars to the service of this Union and feel no need of any repayment beyond the gratitude already expressed by many of you.

I would not dream of asking my mechanic to donate his time repairing my mail car, expecially when I know I make more money driving that car than he makes in his trade. We wouldn't ask our doctor, attorney, county road crew, or any others like them to donate their time and talents, why would we demand that a fellow carrier do so when working for us.

With very few exceptions what I hear from rural carriers is: we want a strong union. We want a good steward program. Tell

us what it will cost and we will vote it."

FINANCES:

Last June after the State Convention in Spokane, this Union was broke. Obviously this is the result of a runaway Steward program. How many times have you heard that this year?

Let me suggest one or two things that may be contributing factors in our current financial situation.

At the State Convention at Bellingham in 1984 there was considerable discussion on the floor of the convention about paying a share of the area and local stewards expenses. It was suggested that a place to start might be by paying mileage for stewards to attend training sessions. It was agreed that \$6.00 per member would cover this. A motion was made to raise the dues \$6.00 per member per year. The motion passed. At the Board meeting following this Bellingham convention,

At the Board meeting following this Bellingham convention, it was decided to pay mileage for certified stewards to attend training. In other words, the dues increase was being spent. The tough part is this dues increase was never collected leaving us approximately \$6,000.00 per year less income than

anticipated.

that was just the beginning. This short fall was further aggravated by the addition of several other items of considerable expense. Salaries were instigated or increased for previously unsalaried individuals on the Board. Add to this the salary and expense of an Assistant State Steward, 2 O.W.C.P. experts. We pay 3 persons to attend Western States Conference. I'm not saying that this is not money well spent. My point is, don't heap all the blame on the Steward program. As one of the Board members said at a recent Board meeting, "No need to point fingers, there is plenty of blame to go around."

As I said before, the Union was out of money at the close of

As I said before, the Union was out of money at the close of the 1987 convention. How does one suspend the representation that the law requires us to extend to our craft members? You cannot! It was not long after the State Convention that this association owed me in salary and expenses more than \$7,200.00 Now I suggest you try and find an extra \$7,200.00 in your budget. This was causing a real hardship and Karen was caught in the same plight. The Editor had no funds to publish the Postman and so on. I called President Dave and asked him to seek the consent of the Board and borrow the funds necessary to pay the bills and get us through the short fall until rescued by the dues increase.

For whatever reason, President Dave refused and launched an attack on the Steward program that would have virtually destroyed it had not three courageous Board members stuck by their principles until the attack was substantially modified. It appears to me that had these three board members not had the courage to stand up to the onslaught they were subjected to in August at an executive Board meeting, the labor relations program for the State of Washington would surely have been irre-

pairably damaged.

It was not until May 20th one month ago that President Dave

was persuaded to borrow the funds needed to pay all the wages and bills that the Washington Rural Letter Carriers owed.

The funds were so low that the Union phone service to your office in my home was twice disconnected. I have to ask, suppose during the 16 years I was reponsible for first paying the phone bill and then collecting from the union when you were using my phone, had phone service been disconnected for lack of payment? What would have been said to me?

DUES:

Beginning in July dues for a regular carrier is scheduled to go to \$260.00 per annum or \$10.00 per pay period.

Two separate county units submitted resolutions to the Spokane Convention advocating this level of dues. I had no part in causing these resolutions to be submitted, however, I remain in favor of this level of funding.

It is time we begen forgetting how it was to be an Association when a committeeman could settle a grievance by calling the MSC or District and ask that the problem be fixed and it was.

We are now a Union and are dealing with a Postal Service that imposes more discipline on rural carriers in a week than it did in a year, 20 years ago. Further we are required by law to represent all those in our craft to the best of our ability.

I'll give you an example of how poorly funded rural carrier organizations are. Several of our past regional representatives have stated that whenever there is an arbitration case scheduled in the Western Region, I want all of you in attendance for training. Recently we were scheduled to arbitrate a removal on the West side. I called Roger and asked about inviting the State Stewards to attend. He responded, "Good idea. I will let them all kinow." How many do you think came? Only one! Rose Denslinger from Oregon came at her own expense. Not a single state in the Western region had the funds to send their State Stewards to the one most educational happening of the year short of the National Convention. That's not being frugal folks, that is courting disaster, and we have been told just that by our legal counsel, Bill Peer.

A few years back the National treasury was next to being broke. That year the firm that audited the books recommended that a Union should have no less in reserve than the cost of 1 years operation. Former secretary Allen Peterson made that same recommendation to the Washington Rural Letter

Carriers. I also make that recommendation.

REPRESENTATION:

I wish to report to you that in spite of the financial hardships imposed upon the employees of this Union this last year, the rural craft members have been well represented. It was not easy, but it was done. It is not easy to do a good job when you know there are those for whom you work that are watching and hoping you will make a mistake so that you can be criticized or removed. There is a saying, "If you aren't making any mistakes, you are not trying." We made some mistakes. Bill Peer often says, "The law does not require you to be right everytime, but it does require that you never ever discriminate for whatever reason."

One area that we as a Union need to do a lot better at is educating our craft members so that they don't make the kinds of mistakes that get them into trouble. I'm not talking about mis-deliveries and things like that although discipline for this kind of thing is on the increase. What I'm talking about is delivering all the mail entrusted to you even if it is bulk mail. Don't let pay-to-bearer coupons ever stick to you when you go home. Even if there is 14 boxes of soap samples left over, none go home with you. Don't get creative during mail count and last but not least, be honest when making entries on your trip report.

In february of this year we arbitrated a removal in a Post office near Tacoma. David Cowen, an attorney from Bill Peer's law firm represented the Union at the hearing. After the hearing was over and David and Myrtle and I were in the car headed for Spokane to investigate another case that was scheduled for arbitration one week later. David asked me to critique his handling of the hearing. I did so. He had done an excellent job preparing the witnesses to testify. He made the Postal Service

advocate appear unprepared.

The only thing I had noticed that could border on criticism was the arbitrators body language seemed to indicate that David might be treating him kind of like a jury and over emphasizing the points of the case. David thanked me, then asked if he could critique my handling and preparation of the case up to arbitration.

I thought "OH! OH! This is going to be embarrassing and

right in front of Myrtle."

What David said was: "As you know, I go all over the U.S. to represent the N.R.L.C.A. in serious discipline cases." I said, "Yes." "What I want to tell you is, you did an excellent job for this rural carrier. If I worked for the Postal Service and if I were to be removed I tell you without hesitation I would want it to be in the State of Washington. I believe the chances of getting my job back would be greater than any place I have been."

At this point the convention was recessed for lunch until 1:30

The convention reconvened at 1:30 p.m. with President Dave Stover calling the meeting to order. He asked Janet Lange, Auxiliary President, to introduce the speaker for the joint session.

Janet Lange introduced Linda Hinken, Of Linden, Washington. Linda has Juvenile Diabetes and spoke on some of her experiences with the disease as well as some of the improvements in technology concerning this disease.

The President Dave Stover introduced National Secretary/ Treasurer, Scottie Hicks. Scottie spoke on a lot of subjects, ranging from COLA's to some of the legislation that is going through Congress at this time. It was a very informational address and was enjoyed by all.

The joint session then recessed for ten minutes to reconvene

in separate meetings.

The Association reconvened and was called to order by President Dave Stover. Secretary/Treasurer Dexter Nesmoe gave the roll call of the officers and delegates. All were present and accounted for.

At this time, the Annual Reports of the State Officers was continued.

REPORT OF THE ASSISTANT STATE STEWARD

Greetings and welcome to our distinguished national guests,

convention delegates, auxiliary members, junior members, and union brothers and sisters. It is with great honor that I am able to report to you as your Assistant State Steward for the third consecutive year.

The grievances that I worked on directly dealt with the

following subjects:

 LOW for mis-delivery of mail. Handled Steps 1 and 2A. Forwarded to State Steward for appeal to 2B.

 Removal for insubordination. Reinstated with back pay at Step 1.

3. LOW for insubordination. Reduced to a discussion.

4. Contract grievance on changing of work methods. Handled Steps 1 and 2A. Forwarded to State Steward for appeal to Step 3.

7-day suspension for failure to follow instructions.
 Handled Steps 1 and 2A. Grievance still pending.

6. LOW for failure to observe posted speed limits. Reduced to 6 months.

7. Contract grievance on illegal posting of routes. Forward

to State Steward for appeal to Step 3.

8. Contract grievance on special mail count not a respective period. Sustained and carrier will get a special mail count 9/1/88 through 9/15/88. Had the special count remained valid, the carrier would have gone from 52 hours a week to 47 hours per week, and would have changed from a K route to a LJ route, and would have remained there until the next national count in 1989.

 Did investigative interviews on 4 LOW for failure to work the evaluated hours as instructed by management. The postmaster informed local steward the next day that as a result of the investigative interview he decided to

pull all 4 letters of warning.

 Provided local steward with Step 2A arguments and documentation on 2 letters of warning that resulted in one being pulled and the other reduced to 6 months.

11. Assisted local steward on 4 contract grievances at Step 2A. I was able to attend and help argue 3 of the 4 grievances. All were sustained yet 2 are in appeals for a disagreement on the monetary award.

On the recommendation of the State Steward, I started two new assignments.

The HELP program and as a Facilitator for Quality of Work

Life.

The HELP Program is for carriers who need help improving their work methods. I spend a day in the carriers office observing their methods and also ride in their vehicle while they deliver the mail. I write a report to the postmaster and the carrier with suggestions to help the carrier work in a more efficient manner. I will not write anything that the carrier will not support. Instead I suggest that the carrier consider those suggestions even though they are not in my report.

Because this program has just begun I have not completed the first assignment. The carrier I am helping wishes to spend a day with me in my office and my manager has given his

approval for this to take place.

There are 7 rural carriers and 7 postmaster facilitators in the Seattle Division and I am extremely honored to be one of them. My facilitator partner is Tim Wilson the Postmaster of Roy, WA. Tim has done everything to support me emotionally and materially. For an example: When I have trouble getting paid he will fill out the paperwork, go with me to the MSC to get a draw, sign my time card, mail the timecards. He has provided me with all materials for the work team training in a briefcase containing pens, paper, a label maker, markers, etc. Ask any of

the other facilitators if Tim is committed to QWL. I am sure they will say emphatically YES.

Have you ever heard the story of 14 pit bulls in a circle? That is what it has been like for the 14 facilitators who went through the indoctrination of QWL. I've had a few task assignments regarding the implementation of this process and in developing

the materials.

The first was to draft on my computer a series of sample flip charts which were later updated and sent to Salt Lake to be enlarged. These flip charts will be used in the Seattle Division

for the 2-day work team training.

I have just been informed that I will have a second task involving flip charts. Kit Witt and I will develop the flip charts for the Divisional Joint Steering Committee. These will be used

for the work team orientation.

The hardest item for me as a facilitator is trusting management. I can say that with the support of my fellow rural carrier facilitators I have been able to overcome this. There were days when all of us wanted to throw in the towel but when you stick with the process and don't rush into a quick and easy solution the QWL Process will not fail you. I believe this will help the craft improve performance and attitude between management

and the public. I have been very fortunate to have served for the past three years under a State Steward who has 16 years of experience. Neil is one of the original State Stewards that were created when we had the postal reorganizatrion act. There is never a time when I can't call him or Myrtle for that matter. Neil had two removals this year that went to arbitration. Both carriers went back to work. The work that goes into a removal case is so important. You must do investigative interviews and review all the statements. If the work is not done properly at the lowest levels then it is much harder to win at the refion or arbitration. I was an observer and commentator at both arbitrations. I was able to observe Bill Peer and David Cohen interview the witnesses and the grievant in an informal setting. The observers were asked if they had any questions or comments. It was a team effort with a skilled team leader at each level of the grievance procedure that saved the jobs of those 2 rural carriers. How can one put a value on knowledge and experience? You can't.

This state association has been in a crisis situation since State Convention last year. I have remained silent on this issue but I feel I no longer can. The Postman seems to be a good place for our President to undermine the convention delegates, but he feels that the Editor has no place writing editorials.

The President's way of saving money is to scrap the Steward program. If he was so concerned about spending money, why did he still go to Washington D.C., Reno, and Bozeman, Montana at state expense? Why was the State and Assistant State Steward and the OWCP Director left out of an emergency Board meeting that was secretly called? When a person wants to destroy the Steward program all you have to do is replace the skilled leaders in this organization with a bunch of unskilled untrained and volunteer representatives. Wait and see what Yakima Counties proposed to do in one of their resolutions to the job of Assistant State Steward. I gave my rebuttal to the Board on the President's proposal to eliminate the Assistant State Steward. You will find copies of this rebuttal along with my report when you leave the meeting this morning. (Printed below).

The dictatorial leadership we have now has divided this association. The Steward program and your jobs are hanging on by a silk thread. How can we complain about ten dollars a payday when we have about a 30,000 dollar a year job with great benefits and job security? What kind of job protection will we have if we lose Neil and get some volunteer to represent us? You can bet that management will know who the leaders are. When the skilled leadership is cut free who will save you? I was sure lucky to have a State Steward come and represent me when I was suspended and when your Editor was fired.

There is a rural carrier who was reported saying that she would destroy Karen DeBella even if she had to destroy this association. Well she would now included Neil on her hit list too. What is the object of this association under Article II of our Constitution and By-Laws? We are to unite fraternally for the

good of the membership. Any one who says that they want or know what is best for this association is probably on a power trip and may even be joining forces with the current President

against the real good of the membership.

I stand for representative government. I believe in honesty. It is my hope that this association will take a turn in the direction of fair representation and honest leadership. There is an old saying that surely applies to us: "United we stand, divided

ANSWER TO THE COMING PROPOSAL FOR NO ASSISTANT STATE STEWARD

Karen already takes care of business on the west and Neil on the east, with a few exceptions. Karen has only gone east for one grievance when it would be closer for her and that was to

Four area Stewards would be a serious step backward for

this state.

c) Mileage would remain the same. There isn't anywhere Karen can't go in one day. Karen is strategically located in the center of the West side.

d) Expenses in training 4 area Stewards would skyrocket, and quality skills would be lost. Would you find the volunteers to do this job?

Personal equipment of Karen's: Computer.

Work load is driven by the postal service and not the Union. In order to take care of the case load you would have four instead of one not cutting any LWOP.

The morning session began with a memorial service led by Auxiliary Vice President Inez Nesmoe.

Next President Dave Stover Called the meeting to order. He asked the Secretary/TreasurerDexter Nesmoe to give his annual report.

REPORT OF THE SECRETARY/TREASURER

Secretary's Report:

National Secretary/Treasurer Scottie Hicks, fellow officers, delgates, friends, this is my annual report to the 82nd annual convention of the WRLCA, convened at Mt. Vernon, Washing-

ton, June 20, 1988.

REPORT OF THE DISTRICT 1 REPRESENTATIVE

At this time President Dave Stover gave his report as Delagate-at-Large to the 1987 National Convention.

REPORT OF THE 1987 NATIONAL CONVENTION

The National Convention was in Reno, Nevada starting with the Officers meetings on Monday morning on August 3. There were conferences for State Secretaries, State Stewards and State Presidents and Vice-Presidents. Vice President Day Snydar, Past President Bob Lange and I attended the Presidents conference. President Olin Armentrout and Vice President Dallas Fields discussed the disagreement between the Postal Service and the NRLCA as of June 1, 1987 to help negotiate the new contract. General Research is developing a package for EMA for NRLCA. The financial contract will follow the other Unions.

Tuesday morning was a joint session beginning with a memorial service. I was proud to advance the Washington State Flag and Vice President Dan Snydar advanced the Alaska State Flag in a colorful and moving ceremony capped by the Nevada Air National Guard advancing the combination of United States Flags beginning with the flag patterned after England's flag to the first 13 colonies flag, to Betsy Ross' flag to the present flag. The rest of the morning consisted of the introduction of dignitaries and the approintment of committees. I was appointed to the #1 Tellers Committee.

Tuesday afternoon began with a partial report of the Credentials Committee and the seating of delegates. Ken Parmelee, Director of Governmental Affairs (lobbyist) gave a P.A.C. report. Told us of a proposed budget cut of 1.9 billion dollars. Senator David Pryor (Ark) asked this to be cut in half and Congressman Flippo managed to have the House make almost no cuts. Mr. Parmalee reported that H.R. 2183 (EMA) bill is broadly supported by the Committee and he expects passage late this year or early next year. Then Lester Miller gave a presentation of P.A.C. awards. Following this program the National Officers gave their reports., Leon Smith gave a report of the Provident Guild. The NRLCA Legal Counsel William Peer gave an address.

Tuesday evening was filled with a banquet and entertain-

ment for Officers and their families.

Wednesday morning started with an address from Mrs. Pat Gardner, President of the Auxiliary. A final report of the Credentials Committee followed by an address by Donald Redmond, President of the National General Insurance Co. Thomas Markey of the U.S. Department of Labor informed us that the Department is getting more strict. It is harder to get on O.W.C.P. The report of the Mileage and Per Diem Committee was given and at that time I was informed it was 1,871 miles from Selah to Reno. I had some offers that if I split the money, no one would tell on me. I had the error corrected. A report by Larry Waligora, Manager of the Rural Carrier Plan was bad news to say the least. The changes expected at this time are \$160.00 to \$200.00 deductible for hospital admittance, \$200.00 to \$250.00 per person deductible and an increase to \$3.00 per prescription to Walgreens. They are still negotiating hoping for better news. I missed out on the Quality of Work Life presentation by Vernon Meier, National Co-Chairman QWL/EI, David Charters, Senior Assistant Postmaster General and Mary Jo Myers, Specialist, U.S. Postal Service. Cindy Norman, Dan Snydar and myself were in a discussion with Steve Smith, Director of Labor Relations.

Wednesday afternoon was filled with seminars. I assigned the following: State Editors, Joe Halleck; Auto Insurance, Mickey Mackey; Civil Service Retirement, Darline Kendall; Federal Employees Retirement System, Cindy Norman; O.W.C.P., Dan Snydar; Quality of Work Life, Kit Witt. I went to the Labor Relations Seminar, and State Steward Neil Bucha-

nan also attended.

Wednesday evening was a night of entertainment. The Ziegfield Theatre was bought out by the convention. 1800 people ate well and were entertained by Jim Nabors and Hello Hollywood Hello.

Thursday morning started with an address by Deputy Postmaster General Michael Coughlin. He stated, there are too many formal grievances in our system. I heartily agree and I wish they would improve their training of Supervisors and Postmasters. The morning was filled with reports and awards.

We were all happy to see Mickey Mackey presented with his Outstanding Carrier Award and his new watch with no hands. Since he is retired he doesn't need to know the time.

Thursday afternoon, Little Rock, Arkansas and Rapid City, South Dakota were nominated for the 1990 Convention. Little Rock won out on Friday's election. Constitution and By-Laws completed the days business. There were a total of 86 resolutions.

Thursday evening was a long series of caucus meetings. We listened and asked questions of candidates at our Western States Caucus. Some candidates were uncontested but most of the interest was in the National President contest.

Friday morning we were introduced to the newly elected Junior Officers and then we elected our National Officers for

For the 1988 National Convention, the State Steward shall be the only member paid by the State. The State Steward will receive \$1,500.00 total to attend the National Convention. Should the State Steward be one of the top 2 in balloting for National Delegate and elect to have his expenses paid by National, the \$1,500.00 will not be paid to anyone. The State Constitution and By-Laws will need to be amended for the fiscal year 1988-89 only. This is a one year proposal only. The \$1,500.00 includes 5 days LWOP.

seconded. Resolution 15 was defeated.

Ruth Walla moved to pass Resolution 17. Pat English seconded. Resolution 17 was passed.

Raye Smith moved to reject Resolution 18. Bob Lange

seconded. Resolution 18 was defeated.

Karen DeBella moved to accept Resolution 19. Lynn Walker seconded. Resolution 19 was passed and sent to the Constitution and By-Laws Committee.

Karen DeBella seconded. Vote on motion to amend passed. Ruth Walla moved to pass Resolution 23 as amended. Karen DeBella seconded. Amended Resolution 23 passed.

Dorothy Iannucci moved to reject Resolution 24. Raye Smith

Seconded. Resolution 24 was defeated.

Neil Buchanan moved to reject Resolution 26. Karen DeBella

seconded. Resolution 26 was defeated.

At this point, President Dave Stover recessed the convention until Wednesday Morning at 8:00 a.m.

Wednesday Morning, June 22, 1988, 8:00 a.m.

President Dave Stover called the meeting to order. Secretary/Treasurer Dexter Nesmoe gave the roll call of the Officers and Delegates. All were present and accounted for except for Mickey Mackey. President Dave Stover called for the amendments to Resolution 14, as it had been tabled the day before. Cindy Norman moved that Resolution 14 be amended to read: WHEREAS: Some County Units do not see a State Board Member at their meetings and others have several show up for which the state is paying mileage and per diem; THEREFORE: Be it resolved that each District Representative be responsible so that a Board Member is in attendance to each County Meeting where possible within their district, through coordinating with county officers of each county. All Board Members may contact the District Representative to make themselves available or to suggest they've something to share or information regarding a problem in that area and therefore would like to attend. Any duplication of expenses to any one meeting must have prior authorization from the State President. This should help to cut travel expenses, and yet bring good communication of Board Members as the District Representative must communicate with another to cover their meetings. Keep in mind your District Representative is a Board Member. Raye Smith seconded the motion to amend. Vote to amend Resolution 14 was defeated. Resolution 14 was voted on as submitted originally. Resolution 14 was defeated.

At this time, Resolutions from the floor were called for. Resolution 29 read: WHEREAS: In recent years, discussion of dues increases has been the source of much internal strife at our convention, and WHEREAS: A common formula throughout industry is to automatically peg duess to wages, eliminating the need for heated arguments over increases while at the same time encouraging the union to live within a projected budget; THEREFORE: Be it resolved that beginning July 1, 1989, WRLCA dues be pegged to the following formula, to be fixed at the beginning of each fiscal year: For regular carriers, on hour of lowest step RC Schedule wage per pay period. For 73 Subs, 22% of the annual regular dues, rounded to the nearest dollar. For RCR's and RCA's, 17% of the annual regular dues, rounded to the nearest dollar. For retirees, 14% of the annual regular dues; rounded to the nearest dollar figure conveniently divisible by twelve for purposes of withholding from annuity checks. Jon Folk moved to accept this Resolution. Lynn Walker seconded. The resolution was table to figure out what the actual dues would be under this formula. When the issue was again brought up, Jon Folk withdrew his motion to accept the resolution. Lynn Walker withdrew his second. The Resolution died

due to lack of a motion.

Resolution 30 read: WHEREAS: It takes a tremendous amount of time on Resolutions and Tellers Committees to accomplish their respective responsibilities at the State Convention; THEREFORE: Be it resolved that the Secretary/ Treasurer present to the President a list of the delegates 15 days prior to the convention for the President to name delegates for these said committees. This list may be incomplete. These committees should present themselves at the convention at 10:00 a.m. on the day prior to opening. If this requires overnight stay, that delegate will receive one extra day per diem. Lynn Walker moved to accept the resolution. Jessie Boren seconded. After some comment, Lynn Walker withdrew his motion and Jessie Boren withdrew her second. Ruth Walla moved to amend the resolution to include the Constitutions and By-Laws Committee. Karen DeBella seconded. Vote to accept the amendment was passed. Lynn Walker moved to accept the Resolution as amended. Karen DeBella seconded. The amended resolution was passed.

Resolution 31 read as follows: WHEREAS: RCA training time is not adequate and there is no consistency in training; THEREFORE: Be it resolved that more hours are allowed for training and a universal training plan be developed by U.S.P.S.

Joanne Black moved that the Resolution beaccepted. Bill

Lewis seconded. Resolution 31 was defeated.

Resolution 32 from the floor was the curtesy resolution. Neil Buchanan moved that the Severtary/Treasurer be instructed to send letters of appreciation to the appropriate people for their participation in this convention. Those people would include, but not be limited to, the Mayor of Mt. Vernon, the Manager of the Chamber of Commerce of Mt. Vernon, the Mt. Vernon Fire Department, Falcon Research Group, and Linda Hinken, the speaker on Juvenile Diabetes. Kit Witt seconded the motion. Resolution 32 was passed.

At this time, the Resolutions Committee was dismissed. President Dave Stover asked for the final Report of the Auditing Committee. Rita Youngs, Chairman of the committee,

gave the following report:

We, acting as the 1988 Washinton State Rural Letter Carriers Convention Auditing Committee find the books of the Assistant State Steward and the State secretary/Treasurer to be in order. An overage of \$3.00 was found in the State Steward's books due to the transfer of figures. This has been corrected. The State Steward's books are now in order.

In as much as we, the Auditing Committee, are limited in time and expertise to perform a proper audit and given the fact the National Association has a professional audit prior to each annual convention, we strongly recommend a professional audit be performed prior to each Washington State Rural Letter Carriers Annual Convention.

Karen DeBella moved to accept the report of the Auditing Committee and to dismiss the committee. Jessie Boren Seconded. Motion passed.

She also reported that the total number of ballots was 376. There were 2 voided, one due to 11 people marked, and one due to two types of markings on the ballot and it was impossible to tell who they were voting for.

At this time, Raye Smith, chairman of the Finance Commitee, gave the final report. It was the same as the preliminary report. At this time the recommendations of the Finance

Committee were voted on.

Regarding Recommendation 1 (printed on page 50), Neil Buchanan moved, and Dorothy Iannucci seconded that the recommended be defeated. A roll call vote was called for. 66 voted yes, 151 voted no, and 1 abstained. The recommendation was rejected.

Recommendation 2, (printed on page 50). Kit Witt moved and Icelia Peterson seconded that the recommendation be rejected. A roll call vote was called for. 20 voted yes, 198 voted no. The recommendation was defeated.

Recommendation 3 (printed on page 50). Pat Hulbert moved and Lyman Schooler seconded that this recommendation be accepted. A roll call vote was called for. 35 voted yes, 182 voted no. The recommendation was defeated.

Recommendation 4 was diverted to Constitution and By-

Laws for voting purposes.

At this point, Neil Buchanan moved to reject the report of the Finance Committee, go back to the 1987 recommendations, and dismiss the committee with thanks. Icelia Peterson seconded. Ruth Walla asked for clarification. It was stated that the recommendations adopted at last year's conventions would continue for one more year.

A roll call vote was called for. 153 voted yes, 65 voted no. The motion was passed, the Finance Committee was dismissed.

At this time, Ruth Walla, chairman of the Constitution and By-Laws Committee came forward to begin the voting on the proposed changes to the Constitution and By-Laws.

Article 10, Section 5 now reads: Each County Association shall hold their annual meeting between OCTOBER FIRST and MAY THIRTY FIRST and the regular meeting shall be designed by statute. The County Secretary will notify all members FIFTEEN (15) DAYS PRIOR to the election of County Officers and Delegates. They shall make and adopt such other By-Laws as their needs may suggest and such laws must harmonize with this code of laws.

Change to read: Each County Association shall hold their annual meeting after October 1st and at least FORTY (40) DAYS prior to the State Convention and the regular meeting

shall be designed by statute, The rest to remain the same.

Laver Root moved to accept the acclaimation. Lynn Walker

seconded. PASSED.

Page 9, Article VI, Section 2, Line 6: delete "itemized accounts". and add "receipts or copies thereof". Laver Root moved to accept the proposed change. Cindy Norman Seconded. Neil Buchanan moved to bote by acclaimation, and Lynn Walk-

er seconded. PASSED.

The next two proposed changes were deleted as they had

already been dealt with in earlier resolutions.

Page 3, Article VIII Officers. Section 1. Change to read: The officers of this association shall consist of: President, Vice-President, Secretary/Treasurer, Editor of Postman, four District Representatives and the Retired Carriers' Representative who shall be elected at the State Convention and serve one year, except the District and Retired Representatives who shall serve two years, or until their successors are elected and installed. No State Officer except Secretary/Treasurer, and Editor shall succeed himself more than once except by unanimous vote of the delegates. This is as it was amended. Raye Smith moved to accept this proposed change as amended, and vote by acclaimation. Icelia Peterson seconded. PASSED.
Seciton 1B change to read: The Retired Carriers' Reperesen-

tative shall be a retired carrier nominated and elected by the delegates of the convention assembled who shall have been elected and installed. Karen DeBella moved to accept. Icelia Peterson seconded. A roll call vote was called for. 163 voted yes,

55 voted no. PASSED.

Section 2. Change the first sentence to read: There shall be a Board of Control consisting of President, Vice-President, Secretary/Treasurer, Editor, four District Representatives and the Retired Carrier's Representative. Karen DeBella moved to accept the proposed change as amended and to vote by acclaimation. Kit Witt seconded. PASSED.

Article 1, Duties of Officers. President. Section 4. Change Executive Committee to read Board of Control on lines 2 and 5. karen DeBella moved to accept the proposed change and vote by

acclaimation. Raye Smith seconded. PASSED.

Mutual Counties delegate Karen DeBella then withdrew all proposed changes dealing with the splitting of the Secretary/ Treasurer position into two positions.

The next proposed changes dealt with retitling Article IV and changing some of the duties listed under this Article. These changes were tabled for further study by the Board.

Page 10, Section 5. Drop "within the State" on line 4. Karen DeBella moved to accept. Icelia Peterson seconded. A roll call vote was taken. 108 voted yes. 110 voted no. DEFEATED.

Page 10, Section 5. On line 7, add "Assistant State Steward" after State Steward. Val Beardsley moved to accept the proposed change, icelia Peterson seconded. A roll call vote was taken. 153 voted yes, 65 voted no, 2 abstained. PASSED.

Page 10, Section 5. On line 18 drop per diem allowance and change to read actual expenses. karen DeBella moved to accept. Icelia Peterson seconded. A roll call vote was taken. 108 voted yes, 110 voted no. DEFEATED.

Page 10, Section 5. On line 20 delete "per diem" was with-

drawn as the previous change was defeated.

The next proposed change was moot as it had been voted on

in previous resolutions.

Article X, Section 1, (District Two (2)). Change Mutual to (Pierce, Grays Harbor, Thurston, Mason, Lewis, Pacific Counties and the member of the State of Alaska). Raye Smith moved to reject the proposed change. Pat Hurlbert seconded. A roll call vote was taken. 154 voted yes, 54 voted no, 9 abstained, and 1 was not present. PASSED.

Article X, Section 3. Line 3, add after Substitute Carrier, "Rural Carrier Associate, and Rural Carrier Relief". pat English moved to accept and vote by acclaimation. Lynn Walker

seconded. PASSED.

Article XII Mileage and Per Diem. New Section 2. "The Association shall pay a per diem allowance to each Delegate-at-Large, State Officer, Insurance Director, Political Action Committee Director, and OWCP Director attending State Convention. The amount of per diem allowance shall be decided by each annual convention of the State Association. The State and Assistant State Stewards shall receive actural expenses." Ruth Walla moved to reject the proposed change. Pat English seconded. A roll call vote was taken. 142 voted yes, 76 voted no. DEFEATED due to lack of 2/3 majority.

Resolution #1 as sent to Constitution and By-Laws. Neil Buchanan moved to reject. Jessie Boren seconded. A roll call

vote was taken. 0 vited yes, 218 voted no. DEFEATED. Resolution #19 as sent to Constitution and By-Laws. Pat English moved to accept. Cindy Norman sedonded. A roll call

vote was taken. 218 voted yes, 0 voted no. PASSED.

Resolution #22 as sent to Constitution and By-Laws. Dorothy Iannucci moved to accept. Rose Papaneau Seconded. A roll call vote was taken. 155 voted yes, 56 voted no, 6 abstained, and 1 was not present. PASSED.

Finance Committe Recommendation #4 as sent to Constitution and By-Laws. Neil Buchanan moved to reject. Jessie Boren Seconded. A roll call vote was taken. 86 voted yes, 131 voted no.

1 was not present. DEFEATED.

At this time, Ruth Walla gave the following Final Report for

the Constitution and By-Laws Committee:

The Constitution and By-Laws Committee would like to recommend that in the future, recommended changes be submitted to the Committee in the following manner: single spaced, typewritten. This would save time and paper when copying for the delegation.

We also recommend that the County Secretaries determine

which resolutions passed at County Meetings are resolutions and which are changes in the Constitution and By-Laws and

submit them accordingly.

Also we would like to re-emphasize the importance of updating the present By-Laws to reflect the changes made in the years that have passed since the last update.

Neil Buchanan moved to accept the report and dismiss the Committee with thanks. Gloria Rector seconded. PASSED.

At this time, Karen DeBella gave the Final Report of the Time and Place Committee. It is as was stated earlier in the prelininary Report. Neil Buchanan moved to reject the report and dismiss the committee with thanks. The Board would then deal with the time and place of the next convention. Val Beards-

ley seconded. PASSED.

The Resolution Committee gave the following Final Report. All was taken care of. Lynn Walker moved to dismiss committee with thanks. Cindy Norman seconded. PASSED.

The seating of the delegates to National Convention was next. Neil Buchanan moved that he and Karen DeBella be moved to ninth and tenth in the voting, Kit Witt would be delegate-at-large, Dexter Nesmoe and Dave Stover would be paid delegates by National, and Mickey Mackey and Kit Witt

would be paid by the State. All other delegates would be in the same order as voted upon. Seconded by Karen DeBella. PASSED.
