

Monday, June 23, 1997, 8:10 AM

A joint meeting of the Washington Rural Letter Carrier's Association and its Auxiliary was called to order by Convention Chairperson Donna Roakes in the Ballroom of Cavanaughs Inns in Kennewick, Washington. Chaplain Dale Ryan gave the invocation. The Presentation of colors was presented by Neil Buchanan and Ed Koschalk. Donna led the Pledge of Allegiance. "America the Beautiful" was sung by Alayna Melton. Patti Sue Ryan and David Ryan presented an instrumental of the "Battle Hymn of the Republic". The first verse of the "Star Spangled Banner" was sung by Allison Melton with everyone joining to sing on the second verse. An Americanism Program was presented by the Juniors in appreciation to teachers and farmers.

The addresses of welcome were given by Jeff Day, Postmaster, Richland, and Sherry Larson, Director of Catering, Cavanaughs Inns, Kennewick. Vice President Judith Peck and Auxiliary President Steve Roakes gave the welcoming responses. Pat English, Co-Chair of this years Convention, and the entire Convention Committee was asked to come forward and be recognized for doing a great job in putting together this years Convention. Donna Roakes then presented Charles Alexander with a gift for his years of service as President. Donna then presented the gavel to Association President Charles Alexander. Charles thanked everyone.

Auxiliary President Steve Roakes introduced the Auxiliary officers: Vice-President Janet Lange, Secretary/Treasurer Delores Robb, District I Representative Mike Peck, District III Representative Donna Walker, District IV Representative Sandi Reppe (District II was vacant). Steve also introduced the Junior officers: President Yvonne Spence, Vice-President Jamie Donaghue, Secretary/Treasurer Stacey Griemsmann.

President Alexander introduced the Association officers: Vice-President Judith Peck, Secretary/Treasurer Becky Wendlandt, Editor Dan Snydar, District I Representative Susie Juras, District II Representative Doug Rinehart, District III Representative Dan Schrup, District IV Representative and Convention Chairperson Donna Roakes, Retired Carriers Representative Harley Robb, State Steward Neil Buchanan, Chaplain Dale Ryan.

Charles then asked Judith to invite all retired carriers to come forward and introduce themselves. They were Wilbur Wood, Neil Buchanan, Roger Armstrong, Joe Rudy, Lynn Walker, Harley Robb, and Bob Lange. There was a total of 219 years of service put in between these gentlemen. Charles then called all the first-time attendees to come forward. There were 17 total. A few announcements were then read. Charles proceeded to read the "Resolutions Policy" as follows: "During new business, the delegates will decide whether or not to hear resolutions from the floor. To submit resolutions from the floor, the resolution must first be in proper form, and enough copies made for each delegate to have one by opening of business on Wednesday morning. The Resolutions Committee will have no responsibility for resolutions for the floor." Charles asked if there were any questions and there were none. Steve Roakes then asked guest Terry Hunter, National Auxiliary Treasurer to stand and be recognized and to thank her for attending.

President Alexander then introduced guest speaker Lawrence Adams, NRLCA Vice-President. Mr. Adams brought greetings from the National office in Virginia and stated how good it was to be back in Washington. He recognized Charles as being the Chairperson to the Constitution and By-Laws Committee on the National level this year. He also thanked everyone for contributing to this 100th year celebration of Rural Free Delivery by sending in so many articles for the national magazine.

Mr. Adams went on to discuss the issues that are present in U.S. Congress every year that are a concern to us. They were Balanced Budget Agreement, Consumer Price Index, Health Insurance, Postal Reform, EMA Tax Recertification and Medicare Reform.

The first topic he spoke on was the Balanced Budget. The agreement is the Budget should be balanced although not necessarily through a constitutional amendment but through the will of Congress buckling down and attacking the issues. This impacts the rural carrier craft because the Budget assumes statistical improvement of the CPI (Consumer Price Index). In regards to the retirees, he restated that the problems in relating to the delayed COLA (Cost of Living Adjustment) provision has been dropped. In doing our part, for Postal Employees along with Federal Employees, this will mean a 1/2% increase in your employee contribution towards your retirement system to begin in the year 1999.

The Consumer Price Index, Mr. Adams went on to say, was studied by a commission of economists in this country and was found, in quite a biased manner, overstated by 1.1%. It's been presented to politicians and to Congress that if the CPI was to lowered by that 1%, that the Federal Budget would save \$100 billion over a five year period. The big question is how the CPI will be adjusted; by a bureau of labor statistic adjustment or by a legislative act. We are fighting to keep the politicians out and letting the Bureau of Labor handle the situation as it affects each of us. If the CPI would remain stable, all

things remaining equal, that 1.1% change in CPI would mean regular carriers would stand to loose \$900 in additional wages over the next five years. The retirees would be affected more by possibly loosing \$2,000 plus. We are very concerned as the last three negotiation sessions with the Postal Service have pushed hard to do away with the CPI and go with the ECI (Employment Cost Index) or the ECI minus one, as the Postmaster General and other officials of the Postal Service claim that we are 30% overpaid. This will be a very tough issue in the next round of negotiations.

Next, Mr. Adams spoke on Health Insurance. A number of years back, the Postal Service's contributions hinged on the average of the six largest plans in the Federal Employee Health Benefit Program. About six years ago, one of those plans went out of business. To prevent much impact, Congress passed a legislation called a "Big Six Phantom." This allowed the five remaining plans to be averaged out and assigned to a 'Phantom Etna', which then allowed for a larger Postal Service contribution to your health insurance premium. In 1993, Congress passed legislation to start phasing out this 'Big Six Phantom' which will be begin this year and be totally eliminated by 1999. Congress must now do something or the premium will be raised as the average will be divided by only five plans instead of the six and today two of these top five plans are HMO's. Still in the works, however, is a replacement for the 'Phantom Six' called the 'Stable Fair Share Formula'. This plan starts with the computation of the average premium for a coming year, then takes the actual distribution of the enrolless buying the plan and options. At this point this plan will not impact us.

Another issue facing us is postal reform. There are certainly some changes needed as it has been twenty five plus years now since the Postal Service was reorganized from the old Post Office Department to the United States Postal Service Congressman McHughes is working in regards to this. With today's technology, i.e. faxes, computer, internet etc. the post office is having to deal with a lot of competition out there. The GAO (Government Accounting Offices) recently released a report that 58% of Americans surveyed favored express company's being allowed to put packages in mailboxes.

Mr. Adams went on to discuss Campaign Finance Reform. With the elections at the beginning of the year our PAC's (Political Action Committee's) seemed to be considerably threatened. And now, it seems that threat has been reduced. The media presented how wrong it was to get these contributions from individuals and corporations, but not once did you have that the PAC's had done anything wrong. Years ago, the Congress passed and the President signed legislation that tightly controls and regulates PAC's. There are now 4800 PAC's contributing nationwide and must be reported. In our PAC it is all a voluntary contribution, no dues deducted. Your contributions are greatly appreciated.

Another issue before us is EMA (Equipment Maintenance Allowance) Tax Simplification. In the past seven years, it has been approved by both Houses of Congress. However, when presented to the President, like almost all legislation, it always has an attachment to it. It is never just a single bill. Since it always has been part of a larger measure, in both the democratic and republican administration, the EMA Tax Simplification has been vetoed. Chairman Bill Archer out of Texas, has introduced the legislation in his sub-committee and it will also be in the Senate. This proposal asks for a special rate for rural carriers of 150% of the standard mileage rate. Those on short, heavy duty routes, will notice at the end of the year on your W-2 form, that some of your EMA has been taxed. This is because under the current legislation that is out there now, rural carrier's are allowed a standard deduction which is 150% of what the average citizen in this country is allowed. These carriers end up getting more per mile than what this 150% is. Therefore, there is a tax that is withheld from your EMA as well as from your salary. This proposal would repeal this tax and the rate of reimbursement by the Postal Service would be considered as an equivalent to the expenses the carrier has provided so no taxes would be deducted from EMA on the rural carriers' paycheck.

Mr. Adams then discussed another fraction of the Health Insurance. There was some legislation that passed the Congress last year on what is called the Portability and Accountability Act. This act allows Americans to leave one job, go to another (or leave work entirely) to carry whatever health insurance they have to another employer or another insurance broker. In the legislation, an organization such as ours, is not allowed to be involved in such actions. This organization is Mutual of Omaha's largest client and has agreed not to open up our Associate Hospital Plan to any outsiders. After July 1, 1997, enrollment will only be open to members and eligible dependents who lose the Rural Carrier Benefit Plan coverage. All insurance plans are doing quite well.

An issue that has surfaced, Mr. Adams commented, was a long-term disability insurance. Hartford Insurance put together a plan, however, it did not draw the number of participants Hartford was expecting. Part of the reason for this is that the plan can only be entered into as a payroll deduction. We have found after opening this plan, that a lot of our rural carriers are maxed out on allotments that the Postal Service is willing to make, which happens to only be two. This is being worked on to allow more allotments. Policy booklet certificates were mailed out in May. Mr. Adams asked that any questions regarding this be directed to the insurance group at the National office.

Mr. Adams ended his presentation by thanking Charles and everyone for their attentiveness.

President Charles then introduced Wilbur Wood with Atlanta Postal Credit Union. Mr. Wood expressed his gratitude for the wonderful hospitality that everyone has shown him.

Mr. Wood started his presentation with a little history of the credit union. The Atlanta Postal Credit Union was organized in the Atlanta Post Office in 1925 and was expanded in 1970 to serve all postal employees in this nation. It is the

oldest and largest in the nation to serve postal families.

The minimum balance required to open a share account is only \$25. Once you become a member, all members of your family (blood related) are eligible to join. Anyone who draws compensation from the postal service is eligible. A statement is sent out each quarter. A share account with at least a minimum balance of \$50 will receive a daily interest rate of 5.1%. Direct deposits are also available. Retiree's must have their whole check deposited. A twelve month certificate of deposit with a \$500 minimum will now receive a 6% interest return. Your share account also will earn some free life insurance. All accounts are insured by the Federal Government.

Mr. Wood went on to say that the Atlanta Postal Credit Union has the most attractive auto loan rates available on a consistent basis. A brochure will be mailed to every rural carrier in America. Their VISA credit card is offered with no yearly fee and only carries a 12.9% interest rate. He explained this credit union is there to serve the postal people.

Mr. Wood ended by saying he was very proud to be with this organization and offered to meet with anyone who had any questions or wanted more information.

President Charles then made a few more announcements and introduced Tom Scott with McCurtey Imports Subaru. A right-hand Subaru was located in the parking lot for viewing and Mr. Scott would be on hand to answer any questions you might have. An adjournment for a short break was called at 10:20.

At 10:40 the Convention reconvened. President Charles reviewed the Convention procedures regarding the voting on motions using the Yea/Nay cards that are also used at National. Becky Wendlandt, Secretary/Treasurer, then read roll call. All delegates and officers were present with the exception of District IV Representative Donna Roakes. Each committee chairperson along with each committee member was asked to come forward and receive their packets. The Committees for the 1997 Convention were as follows:

President and Assistant State Steward Charles Alexander then presented his Annual report:

Fellow Officers, Delegates, Members of the NRLCA and the Washington Rural Letter Carriers' Association, Guest and Friends:

STRENGTH THROUGH TEAMWORK

For the third and final time, I come before you as President of the Washington Rural Letter Carriers' Association with the opportunity to reflect on where we've been and what lies ahead. Presidents have many responsibilities, but none are more important than that of coach facilitator. Make no mistake, our success as individual rural carriers depends on the teams to which we belong and how individual members work to achieve shared goals. Each of us, not yet retired, belongs to the rural craft team in our respective offices, and Washington members of the NRLCA also belong the Washington Rural Letter Carriers' Association Team. Our State Association is in turn comprised of county teams, steward teams, delegate teams, and of course the team of elected officers known as your State Board. My job as President these last three years has primarily consisted of encouraging the best from the State Board Team and giving voice to their shared vision. The people you have elected to represent you on the "State Team" decided early on to use consensus wherever possible to encourage commonality of purpose. Consensus encourages the concept of teams working for common objectives, whereas voting, the fallback decision making process, tends to emphasize majorities of individuals seeking victory for their positions. Voting gives minorities their say and then moves on. Consensus requires compromise, buy-in, and resolution of differences. At meetings such as this State Convention, where relatively large numbers of elected delegates have limited time, voting is by necessity and constitutional requirement the only option for conducting business. With other smaller teams, where members meet more frequently, consensus is well worth the extra effort.

It is no accident that members of the State Board have referred to me from time to time by a varied assortment of terms referencing negotiation or some form of "feather smoothing." My job as President should involve a heavy dose of medication. Compromise and buy-in don't fall out of the sky; they have to be coaxed from divergent viewpoints. So I'm back to the view of presidents as coaches, coaches of teams with shared goals, looking for win-win solutions to problems that one way or another affect us all. My admittedly wide definition of a team encompasses any group of two or more that shares common interests and/or goals. A rural carrier and his/her leave replacement are a team of two with some shared goals and some potentially conflicting self-interest. No one on this team of two has been elected president, so both have the opportunity to assume the responsibility of coach/facilitator. In point of fact, all of us, president or not, have the chance to facilitate policies and agreements that benefit all of the members of the individual groups to which we belong. Too often we are taking the easy way out and pursuing our own interest exclusive of the other members of the team. Offices, at an alarming rate, are

developing factions of disagreement and discord that the Union is nearly powerless to resolve. On behalf of your State Board, which is unified in its resolve to bring you the best possible representation and training for the most affordable cost, I implore all of you to look for common ground.

AROUND THE NEXT BEND

As we accelerate to the next century, the pace of change itself seems to be on the increase. The USPS seems to have bet most of its money on automation, contracting out, service scores, pricing flexibility, and bonuses for executives. All of these strategies are designed to offset the technology-based erosion of our bread and butter first class mail volume and render us more competitive with the private sector. Our evaluated system has generally shielded us from the confrontations of the sort that have become common place between the city carrier craft and the USPS. Management, in a determined effort to achieve predicted savings from DPS, has upped the already supervision-intensive oversight of city carrier performance. A multifaceted pilot program, developed unilaterally by the USPS and termed, "Delivery Redesign," is searching for alternatives to the current model for city carrier compensation. Not surprisingly, even the test is running into considerable resistance from the NALC. The USPS will undoubtedly counter with aggressive negotiation strategies to attempt to force the NALC to modify the status quo. I wouldn't be at all surprised to see some form of an evaluated system imposed in a 1999 arbitrated contract. Meanwhile, the USPS is tired of the 30,000 plus NALC contractual grievances awaiting arbitration and the "teeth pulling" exercises for DPS savings. The lower consolidated cost per hour for rural delivery coupled with the annoyance factor for NALC vs. USPS confrontation, is steering most new delivery to rural rather than city. We stand to gain many new deliveries for the short run, but after that it's hard to say. Rural carriers have their own complaints about DPS standards, and who knows which issues we will be asking our National Officers to negotiate in 1999.

As long as I'm peering into the crystal ball, I will reiterate my expectation that at some point we will once again negotiate some way to monetarily share in the success we help create. The old SET Program was anything but perfect, but it was a far cry better than giving bonuses exclusively to managers who never "touch the mail."

We need to remain vigilant on contracting out. So far the clerks have taken the biggest hits. They lost the work at Remote Encoding Centers (REC Sites) and then gained it back through arbitration. Automation has resulted in permanent loses that will probably never be regained. The latest loss for the clerks is a new contract with Emery Air Freight to take over priority mail from Commercial airlines. Our biggest threat, Highway Contract Routes (HCR's), have not seen a net increase nation-wide. Since the Kane letter came out from USPS Headquarters, advocating managers take a close look at new deliveries and give highway contract due consideration, the NRLCA has been keeping a close watch for any unusual activity that might constitute an HCR initiative. To date, conversions of HCR to rural have pretty much matched the establishment of new Highway Contract Routes.

THE WRLCA NEEDS YOU

As an organization, the WRLCA is entering into what I see to be the second major phase of preparation for coping with changes brought about by a rapidly evolving U.S. Postal Service. During the last three years it has been my privilege to serve as your President, the Board has concentrated on revamping the steward system, refining the budget process, and recruiting new membership and participation. The number one essential ingredient for all these tasks has always been, and will always be people like you who saw the need and stepped forward to help.

Over 100 local stewards have volunteered to represent their offices. Three area stewards are serving as local stewards in some offices where no local steward has yet been elected, and four assistant state stewards are working with the State Steward to cover the remaining offices without stewards. This latter group of assistant state stewards also serves at the primary resource for local stewards seeking advice and training. While this network of representation is clearly a high water mark for our state, there are potential draughts still lingering on the horizon. Many stewards, at all levels, operate dangerously close to their threshold for burnout. The typical assistant state steward, for instance, spend the majority of nearly every night on the phone, and most weekends are also given over to union work. Some local stewards in offices with authoritarian managers and/or troubled carriers or carriers in trouble, are giving more than can be sustained over an extended period of time. All of us have other lives, jobs, and priorities. Representation has to be a team effort, or we will eventually lose it. Washington state has more rural craft stewards than ever before in history, but we also have more rural craft employees to represent. While the nation wide rural growth trend is clearly a tribute to the efficiency of our system, the responsibility for representation is emphatically a major worry. We need more people to share the load today, and the urgency increases logarithmically for the future. We also need new stewards and officers to replace those who have done their share and deserve the chance to pursue other priorities. Even if time or temperament prevents direct involvement, each of us can do our

best to support the team. Basic help such as trying to resolve conflicts before filing grievances, or coming prepared to win step one informal discussions, lightens the load of stewards. Reading the PO-603 to learn the duties and responsibilities of rural carriers, attending informational meetings and trainings are other ways to support the team. We all need you, all of you, to do whatever you can to make our Association a sustainable success.

Again, thank you for giving me the opportunity to work with a World-Class Team. I unconditionally recommend the experience to each and every one of you.

Next, Secretary/Treasurer Becky Wendlandt read her Annual report:

Hello Fellow Members of the WRLCA and Honored Guests:

Looking back on this 96/97 year has been inspiring yet challenging. This has been the year for training stewards and putting that training to work with an unbelievable increase in grievances. It has challenged the board at each meeting to allocate the funds of the WRLCA wisely, keeping in mind at all times, that representation of our members in the grievance process is our most important function. I believe that we have done so, but at not only a cost to the WRLCA, but also at a unbelievable personal cost of their own time for those stewards representing the craft. These people are my heroes. Those that I have seen in action have my upmost respect. Let us honor those stewards, from local to area to assistant to state, that have represented another fellow rural carrier (member or non member) by having them stand now!!! You truly are our inspiration!

Thank you for giving of yourself. I know you have because I have the stats to prove it. In the 11 months of 95/96 the WRLCA used 176 LWOP days to represent our craft in the steward program. In the 11 months of 96/97 we have used 230 days LWOP in our steward program for a total of 54 more days. This just accounts for our State Steward, 4 Assistant State Stewards, 1 area steward, and 1 very overworked local steward. It does not take into consideration all the FREE time given by these stewards, as well as the free time from the 100 plus local stewards and other area stewards. It is not hard to see that grievance is at an all time high but I am truly amazed that the Postal Service allows this to continue. So much for a kinder, gentler Postal Service of the future. It's not happening! The breakdown on costs is as follows:

\$69,225.73

11 month 95/96 Total Steward Cost: (we had 1 State Steward and 5 Assistants)

11 month 96/97 Total Steward Cost: \$79,935.63

(we had 1 State Steward, 4 Assistants, and 2 Area)

Included in the above figures are the steward training expenses as follows:

11 month 95/96 Total Steward Training Expense: \$12,486.29

11 month 96/97 Total Steward Training Expense: \$ 9,576.48

I have asked Charles to start a tracking form on the number of grievances and type, so that in the future we can get a feeling on how much the cost per grievance is, on an average. This will really help in future budget planning sessions.

Not to be forgotten have been those carriers under attack. I have seen unbelievable hardships and mental blows to an entire office that I not only can not understand, but do not comprehend why management allows and even supports it. I feel for all of you going through this strife. While it takes forever to turn these situations around, your board is committed to doing all we can to support you. This is the number one goal of the WRLCA!

My heart also goes out to Marc McIntosh. Marc's son, Mike, was in a car accident and has spent weeks in intensive care, struggling to come back. Marc, you truly are the greatest example of what a father should be, and we all value your friendship and give you our support.

I would like to go over our dues structure. We were at one time one of the higher dues structure for the nation, but I think those days are over thanks to not having a state dues increase in the last 4 four years.

I do not think that we need a State dues increase nor am I recommending one to the finance committee. What National decides is another matter!

I have enclosed a copy of the WRLCA Board Policy. This was started July 1, 1993 and is reviewed and/or updated at each board meeting. This was started by a suggestion at the National Secretaries' Conference. This is used to keep all the board members up-to-date on current policy and can only be changed at a board meeting. It has proven very beneficial when new board members come on line and also as a reference for all the board members. While this was only a suggestion by National to help comply with Department of Labor standards, it shows the intent of the WRLCA board to not only meet but exceed Department of Labor standards.

So far in 96/97 I have written 573 checks (all good) and made 37 deposits, as well as balancing to the penny our \$200,493.86 income. We have made a slight increase in membership:

93/94: 1342 members 94/95: 1633 members (reliefs went on dues withholding this year) 95/96: 1732 members and for 96/97; 1742 regular members and 10 Associate members for a total of 1752. While that is only 20 members over last year, I sent in to National 271 memberships this 96/97 year, as well as processed the over 400 changes in membership such as address, designation, retirement, deceased, new appointments, etc. We are a craft on the move!

I have noticed a slight increase in regular carriers asking to drop their membership. This seems to come after a poor 2 week count, or being put on DPS AFTER route cuts and posting the auxiliary. (Does anyone in the Postal Service have a clue to DPS deployment or is the overall strategy hit and run? I think Charles Alexander's article about super tankers is right on - no one is steering the ship)

I want you to know that is NOT how your board oversees the WRLCA. I do not know of any State that reviews budget in such detail, or plans to the penny each function to better serve and educate our membership. I am proud to have served with such dedicated and exemplary board members. I want to thank them for this last year of setting the standard high. I personally want to thank Charles for his excellent leadership by example and high ethical standards. He is this boards' inspiration!

I have included a couple of pages of membership stats per county and district, as well as a complete financial statement. Updated 4/6/97 at Board Meeting in Kennewick, WA

LWOP:

August 29, 1993 Everett, WA

1. The union will only reimburse LWOP upon receipt of a Approved PS Form 3971.

2. Any required meeting, when a persons total travel/meeting time exceeds 12 hours in 1 day, that person is eligible for LWOP the following and/or preceding day.

3. The board policy is to preview LWOP needs for future meetings.

July 23, 1996 Spokane, WA

4. The Assistant State Stewards will notify the State Steward when using any LWOP for travel.

LOST SICK LEAVE AND ANNUAL LEAVE:

July 23, 1996 Spokane, WA

1. Lost Annual and Sick Leave when using LWOP chart:

PER DIEM AND MILEAGE:

June 29, 1995 Spokane, WA

- 1. Per Diem paid when overnight stay is required.
- 2. Mileage paid to driver only.
- 3. Current per diem rate is \$60.00 no matter what the motel costs.
- 4. Current mileage rate is \$.30 per mile.

June 29, 1995 Spokane, WA

5. Local Steward reimbursement for training will be established by the board on a meeting by meeting basis.

MAILING LISTS:

April 21, 1996 Bellingham, WA

- 1. All board members will receive a complete printed state member list by name and craft list by office. Those who have a computer will also receive a full disk.
- 2. The Assistant State Stewards and State Steward will also receive a complete printed state member list by name and craft list by office and also a disk if they have a computer.
- 3. County Secretaries will receive a printout and/or disk of all members and non members in their county only. This list will only include name, address, designation, and phone number.
- 4. Certified local stewards will receive a printout and/or disk of members and non members in their office. This list will only include name, address, designation, and phone number.
- 5. All mailing lists to be used for Association business only.
- 6. Any board member or steward doing a mailing will send to the State Secretary, a copy of that mailing, who it was sent to, and date, to be kept on file in the secretary's office.

July 23, 1996 Spokane, WA

7. The auxiliary will receive a membership list showing name, designation, and address twice a year.

CAMPAIGNING:

July 23, 1996 Spokane, WA

- 1. Campaigning only allowed in the Spring Issue of the "Washington Rural Carrier" and at meetings where the meeting notice states "Campaigning will be allowed".
- 2. Campaigning in the "Washington Rural Carrier" will be unedited and no more than 1/4 of page in size.
- 3. No board member shall include campaign announcements in their reports.
- 4. State mailing list is not available for campaigning.
- 5. When mailing meeting notices and membership recruitment notices the address on the envelope will not have a name, just the office position.

BOARD REPRESENTATION AT COUNTY MEETINGS:

August 29, 1993 Everett, WA

- 1. The board recommends that county meetings holding elections have state officer(s) in attendance.
- 2. District Representatives should attend each county meeting in their District if possible. If they can not attend, they should notify another board member or designee.
- 3. If a board member receives a written invitation to be the speaker at a county meeting other than their own they should consult with the President or V. President first. (This applies to District Representatives only if the county meeting is outside their district.) Mileage is paid and per diem if overnight stay is required. (If at all possible a local speaker should be used to

save travel expenses). Any board member can go to any meeting at their own expense without consulting with the President or Vice President.

July 23, 1996 Spokane, WA

4. The State Steward, when requested in writing to be the main speaker at county meetings, once approved by Hoard or President, should coordinate with appropriate Assistant State Steward and District Representative. He/She is entitled to per diem if overnight stay is required and mileage.

REIMBURSEMENT OF EXPENSES:

August 29, 1993 Everett, WA

- 1. No vouchers are paid without receipts.
- 2. All expenses must be turned in on a WRLCA Expense Claim Form that is signed, dated and includes receipts. (Original Receipts when-ever possible.)

July 23, 1996 Spokane, WA

- 3. All vouchers from board members should be turned in at least monthly. All vouchers from local stewards should be submitted to the State Steward for approval at least every three months.
- 4. Secretary to review all bills before paying. Secretary to call the President with any questionable bills. President then will call person submitting the bill, After explanation, the President talks with the Secretary and then notifies the rest of the board if problem still exists. All bills and vouchers can be reviewed if requested. The President will review all bills.

June 30, 1994 Puyallup, WA

5. No board member or employee should turn in any expenses for any person other than themselves. Dinner for guest speakers at organized functions will be paid by the State Secretary/Treasurer.

January 27, 1997 Renton, WA

6. For State Steward, Assistant State Stewards, and Secretary/Treasurer, the board recommends a separate dedicated phone line for union business and the WRLCA will pay all costs, including installation, associated with that union line upon receipt of voucher and bill.

NATIONAL GENERAL INSURANCE:

April 9 & 10, 1994 Ellensburg, WA

1. All National General Insurance Policy Holders Should Be Members. For those regular carriers who are not members every attempt should be made to enlist them as members.

CONTRACTS AND PO 603 'S:

July 23, 1996 Spokane, WA

1. The PO 603's and contracts will be sold at their cost (currently \$1.00 each) to any one who requests them. They will be available at board meetings to save the cost of postage. Payment is expected at time of transaction unless special arrangements have been made with the secretary/treasurer and have board approval. Certified local stewards will receive at no cost one copy of the PO 603, contract, and supervisors guide to discipline after certification.

July 23, 1996 Spokane, WA

1. Carrier of the Year Forms to be available from all Officers and at District Meetings. Form will also be printed in the "Washington Rural Carrier." The Vice President will send forms to all county presidents and/or secretaries once a year.

January 29, 1995 Wenatchee, WA

- 2. Selection Committee to be all members of the Board not nominated for Carrier of the Year.
- 3. Nominations for Carrier of the Year to be postmarked no later than 14 days prior to opening day of State Convention.
- 4. Nominations to be sent to Vice President.

5. Decision will be made at Board Meeting before State Convention by secret ballot. Nominee must receive more than 50% (majority) of the votes cast.

July 23, 1995 Spokane, WA

6. The Vice President will be responsible for securing photo and plaque, and writing a short article for the convention and fall issue of WRC.

ASSISTANT STATE STEWARDS:

June 29, 1995 Spokane, WA

1. Service will be continuous until terminated upon recommendation of the State Steward to the State Board, by the State Board excluding the Assistant State Steward in question, or by the National Board, or by resignation.

AREA STEWARDS:

January 27, 1997 Renton, WA

1. When an Area Steward is required to travel over one hour to another office they will be compensated \$10.00 an hour for their time, including the first hour. Bills and voucher to be submitted to the State Steward and forwarded on to the Secretary/Treasurer. They will also be compensated \$.30 a mile for all union business, as well as reimbursed for phone bills and office supplies used for union business.

STATE CONVENTION:

July 23, 1996 Spokane, WA

- 1. Mileage committee to use AAA official road map for miles and not ask paid delegate for their mileage. They can also use a computer program if available. Mileage to be figured to nearest city where they live by AAA official road map then by road map to their home town if necessary. Eight Percent will be added to the calculated mileage to allow for variances.
- 2. During new business the delegates will decide whether or not to hear resolutions from the floor. To submit resolutions from the floor they must first be in proper form and enough copies made for each delegate to have one by opening of business Wednesday morning. The resolutions committee will have no responsibility for resolutions from the floor. This procedure for handling resolutions from the floor will be printed in the convention program and in the appropriate issue of the "Washington Rural Carrier".
- 3. Concerning Procedure of Delegates Names to National Convention:
 - A. All eligible names submitted get placed on the ballot.
 - B. Names listed by order received in secretary's office.
- C. Secretary to ask at State Convention for those who were on the ballot to sign a form indicating their intention of going or not going to National Convention.
- D. Secretary to send a certified letter to those who have not signed a form asking that they notify the Secretary by July 10 or they will not be eligible for reimbursement.

DOOR PRIZES AT DISTRICT MEETINGS AND STATE CONVENTION:

April 6, 1997 Kennewick, WA

- 1. WRLCA Elected Officers and Spouses are not entitled to door prizes. Elected Officers are President, Vice President, Secretary/Treasurer, Editor, District Representatives, and Retired Carrier Representative.
- 2. WRLCA Appointed Officers and Spouses are not entitled to door prizes. Appointed Officers are National General Auto Representative, Provident Guild Director, PAC Representative, State Steward, Assistant State Stewards, and Area Stewards.
- 3. WRLCA Auxiliary Officers and Spouses are not entitled to door prizes.
- 4. Children are not entitled to door prizes.
- 5. Only WRLCA Members and WRLCA Auxiliary Members, in their respective district(s), are entitled to door prizes.

Next, State Steward Neil Buchanan presented his Annual report:

Vice-President Adams, President Charles, officers, Delegates and Friends.

This should be my 26th annual State Stewards report to the officers and members in session at a State Convention.

Of more interest, of course, is that this is my last report to you as State Steward. I retired from the Postal Service on April 1, 1997, and plan to tender my resignation as State Steward at the Board meeting at the conclusion of this convention.

As you know, there are four Assistant State Stewards and three Area Stewards sharing the State Stewards work load, and my budget was reduced to reflect this fact. Therefore, my travel and costs have been greatly reduced again this year.

May 30, 1996, thru May 30, 1997, I used 80 days of leave without pay to work for you. I drove 8,900 miles for the Union. SecretaryTreasurer Becky has or soon will provide you with a financial report with all the details.

It has been another busy year in the Labor Relations or Grievance activity area. We have tried to maintain our practice of resorting to a grievance only when all other efforts to resolve problems have failed. In spite of all the good Q.W.L. or Quality-of-Work Life has done for the Postal Service and for the Rural Craft, problems including discipline of Rural Craft employees continues to increase.

As of the date of this writing, we have four Rural Carriers laboring under notice of removal.

We lost our first arbitration case this year. This involved a Rural Craft employee who was reported by fellow craft members to have threatened a Supervisor.

Some of the numbers sound good, but in my mind do not paint the true picture. We have only appealed four grievances to Step 3 this year. Of those four, three were removals.

I pre-arbed one removal successfully and was able to prevail at Step 2 on two more removals. Terry Leeper was able to negotiate the reversal of a removal at Step 3 and we are glad about that. However, the lost time that this person suffered is to be treated as a lengthy suspension as if she was guilty as charged. Mr. Shirkey apparently thought removal was too harsh a sentence. I remain convinced the employee was not guilty of any of the charges.

Except for the removals, we continue to have approximately ninety percent of our problems in five or six Post Offices. If we could persuade the Postal Service to promote these five Postmasters to civilian life, the Union would have lots less work and the Postal Service would save hundreds of thousands of dollars and life would get lots better for many Rural Carriers. The amazing thing to me is when you tell Postal Management what I just said, they can name the Postmasters without hesitation.

I wish I could say and believe that I leave this job to my successor in better shape than when I took it on. The Postal Service has changed a lot in twenty-six years, but so has the craft. I don't want to duck any tomatoes, but I feel the need to quote my favorite past National President, Lester Miller. Long ago he and I were discussing the various appointment procedures that have been in force in the securing of Rural Carriers for the Postal Service. Lester said: "You can say what you want to, but when we hired Rural Carriers directly from a community register and a congressional endorsement was a pre-requisite, we got the cream of the crop out of those communities."

Time to wind this up. These twenty-six years have been a labor of love for me. I have been blessed by the forming of great friendships, certainly my fellow Rural Carriers, but also with great leaders among the Managers in the Postal Service.

It would not have been possible for me to have done as well as I have, had it not been for the love and support I received from my good wife, Myrtle, and those four children she raised. Myrtle always exhibited complete trust in me no matter where I went or with whom I went. I can't express how much that has meant to me. On top of this, she has spent countless hours typing, copying, and collating so that the work got done.

I hope you, the members, of this Washington Rural Letter Carriers can find my work and my report satisfactory.

The Annual Report of the Vice President and Assistant State Steward

The Annual Report of the Editor

Fellow Rural Carriers, Delegates, and Guests:

It has been another busy year as your Editor. Twice this past year the Post Office changed the bulk mailing requirements, and I had to learn new sacking and labeling procedures. I've got those memorized now, so that will no longer cause me grief. If you don't already know, after the paper is printed, I put all the address labels on by hand, with labeled and addressed papers all over the place as I'm working. They then go in bundles of 5 digit zip code, or by the first 3 digits of the zip code, depending on the number of papers per zip. Then I sack them by zip code, such as 980, 981, 982 and so on. The sacking procedure also requires I pay attention to the number of pieces, or total pieces by weight, to a zip code area. Sacking is based on 125 pieces or 15 pounds. I've got the whole complicated procedure in my head, so when the USPS makes changes, it's not like I have to learn it all over again, just incorporate those changes into what I already know. The paper is printed at the Lynden Tribune in Lynden, WA. They provide us a quality job at a very reasonable price. I have a good working relationship with them now, so they always try to put the "Carrier" ahead of the line. I'm very satisfied with them and the job they've been doing for us the past several years. This past year, I used 12 days of annual leave while working on the paper.

Concerning the annual NALC Food Drive, I'm confused about some of the memo's that I've read about the participation of rural carriers. In one sentence they say that "no rural carrier can be required to participate......", then in the next sentence, it goes on to say, "if required to participate,.....be paid on form 8127.......". etc. There are far too many instances where MOU's or contractual statements will specify that no carrier can be required to perform a certain task, then the next sentence goes into the procedures to use if a carrier is required. Why the contradictions? If it's not a requirement, then there should be no exceptions! No wonder there are so many grievances. We should get these "should be's, could be's and may be's" out of the contract and MOU's and use more "will be's and shall be's"!!

If you aren't a subscriber to the "Federal Times", you missed a good letter-to-the editor in one of the May, 1997 issues. The writer, addressing violence in the work place, makes the statement that "Violence in the U.S. Postal Service is a postal supervisor saying, "We need you to come in," when a worker calls in to ask for time off because of his grandmother's death. Violence is a postal manager who says, "I do not have to abide by the contract. I do what I want." Violence is management knowing the only consequence for their actions is a transfer and/or a promotion....." The letter was from an employee in Sand Springs, Oklahoma.

It's great to see rural carrier's honored with achievement awards from the Post Office that also include money, usually in the amount of \$500.00. Every now and then, though, instead of a hard working carrier being rewarded, you see some management "pet" being recognized. It kinda cheapens the whole thing, but then you gotta remember that worthy people also receive those awards, so better to let a few bad ones slip through then trash the whole reward system.

This past publishing year, in about every issue of the Washington Rural Carrier, I have been nagging about us Rural Carriers passing the one man-one vote concept. I really believe that we would not have "L" and "non-L" routes right now if we had membership wide voting rights on the national contracts. We would probably still have Sub. of Record, Des. 73's, instead of the parade of RCR, RCA, and TRC that we currently have. Those Sub. 73's would also be having their years of service credited towards sick and annual leave, not to mention retirement. One man-one vote always goes down big at National Convention, and I can never figure out why?!

It was an honor to represent you as one of your delegates to the National Convention last year in Charleston, WV. I have the large panoramic photo that was taken during opening day on display. Look for it if you haven't seen it yet. As will many of you, I'll be attending the convention again this year in Portland, OR. This will be my 12th.

Hope you found the "Washington Rural Carrier" interesting and informative. Thank you for all the opportunities to serve and represent you.

Annual Report of National General Auto Representative, Provident Guild Director Congressional Contact, and Political Action Committee Representative

Marc McIntosh's son, Mike, has been in a car accident and is in a coma in intensive care. Marc, his daughter Liz, and his parents have spent their days and nights at the waiting room of Deaconess Hospital, in Spokane. Our prayers and support are with him!

National General Auto Insurance:

Last year (95-96) we received \$22,311.00 for promotional allowances from National General. This year (96-97) we

received \$23,442.00 for promotional allowances. This was a pleasant increase and not expected since many carriers are now using LLV's. It appears that many of the membership still uses National General for their personal vehicle as well as home coverage. As always, we encourage members to get quotes and compare, and most of the time, National General is cheaper for the same or better coverage, as well as providing business coverage on the route vehicle. We have sent one mailing, including an invitation to join the WRLCA, to all non-members this past year and continue to hand out National General brochures with the new craft packet to all RCA's going through the Ad Hoc Program. This seems to be very effective. As of April, 1997, we have 699 automobile policies, 7 motorcycle policies and 84 homeowner policies.

Provident Guild:

Thanks to the inquiry from a member whose wife is deceased, Dexter Nesmoe, Marc has submitted a resolution that has passed at the county level and will be reviewed at the State level and hopefully go to National. This resolution has asked for the time limits to claim death benefits be changed from 30 days to 90 days. Dexter was unable to receive full benefits because he had filed a claim over 30 days. The board felt 30 days was not enough time to file, especially since many retired members winter in the South and come home in the summer, thereby not having records where they need them to meet the 30 day requirement for filing. Hopefully your delegates to National Convention can help pass this in Portland.

Congressional Contact and Political Action Committee Representative:

President Charles then asked Jim Hemrich, Chairman Charter Committee on State Structure to come forward and make a presentation of what this committee will be doing. Jim explained the Charter Committee met for the first time in April and was given three basic objectives in looking at the structure of the State in regards to the four Districts and County units. These objectives were as follows: (1) balanced and fair representation for all members, (2) to best and most efficiently use the states' resources, and (3) to best minimize both mileage and travel time of the majority of county unit members and the State Board members required to attend county meetings. He stated that this was a very broad undertaking and perhaps for the first time have actually counted the actual number of members on a county-by-county basis. Jim then read a few of the suggestions the committee had from that first meeting and welcomed any information or other suggestions anyone might have. Maps were posted with the State divisions and statistics in the back of the meeting room for viewing.

President Charles then asked Judith Peck to come forward and discuss the questionnaire that had been passed out. This was designed by the Board to get member feedback in regards to District meetings and Steward Enhancement Training. Each one was asked to fill these out and return them to a Board member by Conventions end. She then entertained questions. Charles then made a few announcements and adjourned the meeting at 12:20 P.M. (Monday afternoon was dedicated to allowing time for delegates to work on committees.)

Tuesday, June 24th, 1997, 8:35 A.M.

At 8:35 A.M., President Charles Alexander called the meeting to order. He then introduced Terry Hunter, National Auxiliary Treasurer. She brought greetings from the National Auxiliary Board.

Terry spoke about the Program of Kindness and Commitment to Children. This years Americanism program was designed with a mission in mind and to get the message out....."It isn't supposed to hurt to be a child". An average of five children a day die because of child abuse. About forty percent of child abuse is related to alcohol or drug abuse and over fifty-five percent of all abused children have at least one parent that was also abused. She then went on to tell a very touching true story of a twelve year old girl named Valerie that died as a result of child abuse. Child abuse is a disease that is killing children. Please, get involved in some way to stop the disease from spreading.

Your National Auxiliary and Juniors are selling mailbox lapel pins, ornaments, notes and school kits for donations to go towards this project. Remember, spread these words, "It's not supposed to hurt to be a child".

She ended by thanking everyone for their attention and support of this years' program of kindness and commitment to children.

President Charles then welcomed Lawrence Adams once again. Mr. Adams stated that he thought the Auxiliary project

this year, Prevention of Child Abuse, was especially touching and commented on how many letters he has received across his desk for the National Magazine this year regarding this program. He thanked Terry Hunter and the rest of the Board for bringing this message out.

He started his presentation by saying that membership, in general, is up 203.67 %; as of May, Washington is up 186.21%. Membership should not be all up to your state officers. It is the carriers out on the working floor that need to up that number. Please renew your efforts to bring that membership up here in Washington.

We have been experiencing tremendous growth in this National Rural Letter Carriers Association of ours. In regular routes alone in the last year, we have grown 2,000 routes and some 3,000 members. Contrary to some other organizations. we are very much a growing organization with many challenges ahead of us as a union and organization. We are very grateful for this increased growth and membership. As of May, we were four routes shy of 59,000 rural routes in this nation which included the regular and the auxiliaries. Sixty-five percent of all routes in this nation are K routes. K routes are the largest number of routes that we have in this country, approximately 38,541. About 73% of all L routes happen to be K routes. The average route in this country, auxiliary and regular, works out to be 48 hours and 10 minutes. Regarding standard versus work hours actually put in, calculated by your time card, by in large there is only one pay period that we collectively exceed the time standards. (This has been calculated over the last four years.) These figures have a bearing when it comes time to negotiate pay increases. The truth of the matter is, we are beating standards by some four hours a week, which translates to about eight percent of a bump. In private industry, people that work on an incentive basis on an evaluated system, Nationwide industry standard is a three percent bump. Postal headquarters management is aware of the spread between the evaluated and actual time, but would very much like to put city carriers on the evaluated system as well. However, the Board of Governors is beginning to raise some questions, i.e. why are the rural carriers being paid for four hours of work a week that they did not do, but where as a few years back, it was only one hour per week. There is an increased discipline over safety issues with an incentive system evaluation which we are not very pleased with. Perhaps to meet the standard time more, maybe we need to slow down and be more careful. We are finding out that some carriers are falsifying their time cards. This reflects bad on us as a group collectively and could account for the large variance on time cards submitted as a whole when actual time is being calculated and averaged.

Mr. Adams then went on to say that there are more leave replacements in the craft then we have regular carriers. The craft is composed of 52% females and 48% males. Our average age is 43 1/2 years of age and the average regular carrier is 47 1/2 years of age. Up until the beginning of June, the oldest regular carrier in our craft was 84 years of age out of Georgia (just recently retired). The youngest regular carrier at that same time is 20 years of age. The oldest leave replacement in the craft is an RCR who is 86 years of age and the oldest RCA is 81 years of age.

The schedule for an actual mail count is September 2nd through the 29th of this year. You have the ability to either optin or opt-out of that count. The option forms need to be completed and signed by June 27th. You should be having a precount conference with your supervisor or Postmaster to decide on various issues that come up. If you are not having the opportunity of being involved in these conferences with management, contact your local, area or state steward. Every year we receive calls and letters at the National offices that the Form 4239 is not being issued by management to carriers on a daily basis. If you are not receiving these on a daily basis, again, contact your steward. With respect to certification of the count, if there is anything on there that you disagree with, do not sign to the correctness of the count. However, sign the option that you do want the high or low option, though you do not sign for the correctness of the count, you will need to provide a statement as to why you are not signing the count and as to what your disagreements are with. With respect to the mail count, Mr. Adams had a draft that they would be signing, regarding the guaranteed year. The guaranteed year used to be in November and has now creeped up to the end of October. The Postal Service is claiming they do not have enough time to do all the necessary work and input into computers and get the 4241 A's back out into the field. He then proceeded to read a copy of this draft.

The postal service is also coming out with a new delivery confirmation being made available nationwide. The National Delivery Test in regards to Priority Mail concluded on the 7th of May and the statistics were gathered. They made an announcement on that day stating that the Board of Governors have approved almost three quarters of a billion dollars for scanners, data base improvements and other expenses to support the delivery confirmation for express mail, priority mail, parcels, etc. As in the past, each time the postal service does take a look at automation, they might want to again recheck those time standards. We need your input out there in the field on this issue. Your customers will also have to meet certain criteria to receive this service. Because of this criteria, everyone will not be using this new system. Therefore, we might need to keep some of the time standards that we now have.

Mr. Adams went on to talk about the safety blitz that the post office has going on right now. Carriers are being disciplined left and right. Safety is being pushed and it's all coming back from the issue of EVA (Economic Value Added)

and managers being paid bonuses based on merit and performance. Part of this merit system is driven by their safety record. The pressure comes from high up and is put on everyone. It would behoove you to be more careful and slow down on those routes.

If you recall, back in 1992 and 1993 we had a reconstructing of the postal service and had offered an opportunity for an early out. Because of this, we saw new people coming into positions with no experience. These people did not know about HCR's (Highway Contract Services). Headquarters redesigned a package that they provided to the field which told managers one of their options was Highway Contract Route box delivery. This HCR would do everything as a rural carrier does and that also includes the discipline. Stewards were given a questionnaire regarding information they were getting from the field on this issue. We also contacted headquarters to get a listing of Highway Contract Routes around this country broken down by districts. As of April there were 4, 777. There has always been HCR's that have come about and we want to be protective of all the territory that comes to us. Keep in mind, the postal service has the right to assign any territory to the craft they want. We cannot stop all the HCR growth out there, however, there are some cases we will be interested in, and we encourage you to remain vigilant to these. If you believe the area should be ours, please get in touch with your steward.

The DPS and the rural craft continue to grow. We are not maxed out. The last guaranteed year we had some 16,151 routes that were DPS and raw mail. Since that time, it has increased to 17,267. Postal headquarters are surprised in the amount of routes that are still coming up DPS. On the other side however, there are 35,000 routes still with no automation. We are doing 926 pieces of DPS a day. We hear criticism out in the field that city delivery, as of '87, has 114,368 city routes that were on DPS at the time whereas you have an option. City carriers have lost 1710 city routes which were eliminated in the last twelve months ending in March '97. City carrier career employment has dropped 2.1% in the past year. As city delivery is becoming more and more efficient it is putting pressure on the rural routes. Right now, city delivery is costing the postal service a little bit better that fifty cents per delivery. Rural is about forty-two cents per delivery and HCR about twentyeight cents per delivery. As more DPS occurs on city delivery and we max out, that spread will start narrowing. Many of you may not know how the L route came about. The L route concept came about when the postal service found it more cost effective to deliver mail to suburban America on city routes rather than on rural routes. There came a point in Texas, when the postal service converted all at one time, 52 rural routes to city delivery. We grieved the issue and prevailed at the arbitration. The reason was the postal service had not followed procedure when converting those routes. So the routes were given back to rural delivery. Only two months later, they were converted again to city delivery and procedure was followed. We went back to arbitration but lost that time. At that point the L route concept was born. If city delivery keeps doing better with their DPS, we could be caught in the same dilemma, however, we cannot say what the future holds.

As you know, you have a National headquarters office Alexandria, Virginia. This is a four story, 25,000 plus square foot building. A building this size does require a lot of maintenance. Just recently, we've completed a new re-roofing job, brick work and duct work. At the same time we've extended a lease with one of our tenants to occupy two floors which will bring in considerably more income which will help on the payment of that building. This building is financed through the Atlantic Postal Credit Union. In reviewing our needs, we are also looking into new or updated computers along with computer training. Part of this review also included salaries being looked at.

Other activities taking place at the National level include the Constitution and By-Laws Committee, Steward Training Task Force I, a Reference Guide Task Force II, and a Standardized Officer Training and Reference Manual. If you have not used the Web site, please do. It has been a great resource to many carriers out there.

There will be some issues at National Convention this year that the National Board has taken position on. One of these is a Constitution and By-Law change that we were proposing to put into place. Last year this same proposal was shot down. However, after the close of that Convention, something transpired that caused the Board to bring it up again. What in effect happened was there were multiple ballots that had been filled out by the same person or persons. We have nothing in our National Constitution and By-Laws that speaks to the issue regarding ballots and non-present delegates. We're proposing that states have a choice of one of the following three options as how to deal with the ballots of absent delegates: (1) the delegate-at-large could cast the unclaimed ballots at his or her discretion, (2) a majority of the delegates present could caucus and vote the ballot of the non-present delegate, or (3) abstain and cast no ballot whatsoever.

Another issue will be binding or non-binding resolutions. Last year there was an Appeals Committee appointed to hear several appeals that were brought forth by various dissatisfied members of this Association. Unfortunately they wanted to address all the appeals in one report. Part of this report stated that commencing in 1997 Convention, that all resolutions that are directed toward a National office have the power to be implemented without having to involve others. Your National organization operates under the Revised Robert's Rules of Orders with state resolutions being binding. We have in the past, operated under a position that resolutions are non-binding. This also translates to your Association. Please think very carefully about what kind of bind that you might be putting not only your National officers in but also your State officers.

Mr. Adams then went on to discuss the possibility of a small increase in dues to provide for additional AEC's (Assistants

to the Executive Committeemen). They would render assistance to committeemen, help in grievance activity, state steward turnover and field assistance to members. There will be statistics at National Convention when we do the presentation there. We feel this will be cheaper than electing more National officers. The continuation of an elected eight-member board is the direction we hope you would want to continue.

Mr. Adams ended his presentation by saying thank you for everyone's attentiveness and offered to answer any questions throughout the remainder of the Convention.

President Charles thanked Lawrence Adams for all this information. Charles then made a few announcements and then adjourned for a break at 10:30 A.M. and reconvened at 10:45 A.M. Becky Wendlandt read the roll call. All delegates and officers were present and accounted for. At this time President Charles then called the Credentials Committee to come forward and give their Final Report. Ginny Seay read the Final Report as follows:

"We the Credential Committee find all credentials to be in order except, due to brain failure of those officers in attendance, one county unit member was voted on as a State paid Delegate, when they are an officer of the State. The total number of votes reflect one less officer vote. As a non-binding recommendation, we recommend that all delegates be seated by the final report of the Credential Committee. We the committee suggest this be added in our Constitution and By-Laws next year.

Each of these delegates present came forward to receive a declaration statement to National Convention. President Charles thanked and excused the Tellers Committee. Charles then called the Auditing Committee to come forward and give their Final Report. Chair Kit Witt read their report as follows:

"We the Auditing Committee have reviewed a random sampling of revenue and expense reports, as well as payroll and tax reports. We also have randomly audited these revenue accounts and compared deposit slips to NRLCA reports, check stubs, remittance forms and bank statements. We feel the figures in this random sampling have proven to be accurate. The Treasurer's Financial Statement appears to be true and correct for the period July 1, 1996 - May 31, 1997. As a binding recommendation we would like to suggest that a full audit be performed whenever a Secretary/Treasurer leaves office. Thank you Becky for having such a complete and orderly system".

The geographical area served by each Assistant State Steward shall be determined by the State Steward in conjunction with the Board. At the State Convention, a salary will be determined for all Assistant State Stewards and administered in the same fashion as for the State Steward. Provision for mileage, per diem, flying and LWOP apply in the same manner as with the State Steward.

Proposed Language:

SECTION 4B The State President in conjunction with the Board and the State Steward, shall recommend to the NRLCA the members that the WRLCA would like to have appointed as Assistant State Stewards and Area Stewards. Their service shall be continuous until terminated by the State President in conjunction with the Board, or National Board, or by resignation. The Assistant State Stewards and Area Stewards shall work with and be subject to the State Steward. The geographical area served by each Assistant State Steward and Area Steward shall be determined by the State Steward in conjunction with the Board. At the State Convention, a salary will be determined for all Assistant State Stewards and Area Stewards and administered in the same fashion as for the State Steward. Provision for mileage, per diem, office supplies, telephone, flying,

LWOP, and all other expenses apply in the same manner as with the State Steward.

Joanne Blackburn moved to accept proposed language. Becky Wendlandt moved to delete underlined wording. This was seconded the amendment was passed.

Proposed language passed as amended.

Found in the By-Laws, Article VI (State Officers' Expense), Section 4C (New Section to be added) Present Language:

Proposed Language:

SECTION 4C The State President in conjunction with the State Steward and the Board, shall recommend to the NRLCA the members that the WRLCA would like to have appointed as Area Stewards. Their service shall be continuous until terminated by the State President in conjunction with the Board or National Board or by resignation. The Area Stewards shall work closely with the Assistant State Steward and the State Steward, and be subject to the State Steward. The geographical area served by each Area Steward shall be determined by the State Steward in conjunction with the Board. The Board will also determine the compensation for time and mileage for all appointed Area Stewards.

Joanne Blackburn moved to accept proposed language. Dale Ryan moved to amend by adding underlined wording. This was seconded and the amendment passed. Bill Allen moved to have this postponed indefinitely. This was seconded and passed.

In the By-Laws, Article XI (Committees), Section 9.

Present Language:

SECTION 9 The duties of THE WASHINGTON RURAL CARRIER Committee shall be: To review the expenses to publish and mail THE WASHINGTON RURAL CARRIER and to make any suggestions concerning future publications.

Proposed Language:

To eliminate section 9 and renumber in proper sequence.

Joanne Blackburn moved to accept proposed language.

Proposed language was defeated.

In the Constitution, Article VIII, Section 1

Present Language:

SECTION 1 The officers of the WRLCA shall consist of: President, Vice-President, Secretary-Treasurer, Editor of the WASHINGTON RURAL LETTER CARRIER, four (4) District Representatives and the Retired Carriers' Representative who shall be elected at the State Convention and serve one year, except the District and Retired Representatives, who shall serve two years, or until their successors are elected and installed.

Proposed Language:

SECTION 1 The officers of the WRLCA shall consist of: President, Vice-President, Secretary-Treasurer, Editor of the WASHINGTON RURAL LETTER CARRIER, four (4) District Representatives and the Retired Carriers' Representative who shall be elected at the State Convention and serve one year, except the District and Retired Representatives and the Editor of the WASHINGTON RURAL CARRIER, who shall serve two years, or until their successors are elected and installed.

Joanne Blackburn moved to accept proposed language and it was seconded. Doug Rinehart moved to amend to delete underlined wording. This was seconded but amendment was defeated.

Proposed language was defeated.

In the Constitution, Article IV (Representation), Section 1.

Present Language:

<u>SECTION 1</u> Each County Unit shall be entitled to one delegate for each five (5) members or major fraction thereof, and one (1) Delegate-at-Large. The Delegate-at-Large shall cast the entire vote for his/her delegation. Each County Unit is entitled to one (1) vote for each five (5) members or major fraction thereof.

Proposed Language:

SECTION 1 Each County Unit shall be entitled to one delegate for each five (5) members or major fraction thereof, and one (1) Delegate-at-Large. The Delegate-at-Large is responsible for collecting the ballots for his/her delegation and for returning the ballots to the Teller's Committee after his/her county delegates have voted. Joanne Blackburn moved to accept proposed language and it was seconded. Dale Ryan moved to have this postponed indefinitely. This was seconded but was defeated. Dale Ryan then moved to have all bold type, second sentence only, deleted. This was seconded but was defeated.

Proposed language was passed.

In the Constitution, Article IV, Section 1.

Present Language:

SECTION 1 Each County Unit shall be entitled to one delegate for each five (5) members or major fraction thereof, and one (1) Delegate-at-Large. The Delegate-at-Large shall cast the entire vote for his/her delegation. Each County Unit is entitled to one (1) vote for each five (5) members or major faction thereof.

Proposed Language:

SECTION 1 Each County Unit shall be entitled to one delegate for each five (5) members or major fraction thereof, and one (1) Delegate-at-Large. Claudia Brown moved to accept proposed language and it was seconded.

Proposed language passed.

In the Constitution, Article IV (Representation), Section 4.

Present Language:

SECTION 4 Delegate positions vacant at the time of the State Convention may not be filled by a vote of the delegates present from the subject County Unit or District or from other County Units or Districts.

Proposed Language:

SECTION 4 Delegate positions vacant at the time of the State Convention may not be filled by a vote of the delegates present from the subject County Unit or District, or from other County Units or Districts, or from delegates at the State

Claudia Brown moved to accept proposed language and it was seconded. Neil Buchanan moved to amend by deleting underlined wording. This was seconded and passed.

Proposed language passed as amended.

Susie Juras moved to suspend the rules and refer the rest of the Constitution and By-Laws to after the election and installation of officers. This was seconded but was defeated. Charles adjourned at 12:15 P.M. for a short break and reconvened at 12:50 P.M. The Constitution and By-Laws were then continued.

Found in Constitution, Article VIII (Officers), Section 5

Present Language:

SECTION 5 The election of officers shall be by vote of the elected delegates, and in no case by acclamation except by unanimous consent. It shall require the majority of all votes cast to elect. The Delegate-at-Large shall cast the entire vote for his/her delegation. Where there are more than two (2) the least number of votes on each ballot shall be dropped until the election is had.

Where there are more than two (2) candidates for the same office after the second ballot, the one receiving the least number of votes on each ballot shall be dropped until the election is had.

Claudia Brown moved to accept proposed language and it was seconded. Bill Allen moved to amend by deleting underlined wording in both sections (5 & 6). This amendment was seconded and passed.

Proposed language as amended was defeated

In the Constitution, Article IX (National Delegates), Section 8.

Present Language:

SECTION 8 The National-paid Delegate-at-Large to the National Convention shall be the delegate receiving the most votes. Other National-paid delegates shall be the delegates receiving the next most votes. Delegates shall be listed according to the number of votes received. The required number of delegates for the WRLCA, in accordance with Article IV, Section I of the National Constitution, shall be declared regular delegates and the remaining candidates shall be declared alternates in the order of their finish.

Proposed Language:

SECTION 8 The National-paid Delegate-at-Large to the National Convention shall be the delegate receiving the most votes. Other National-paid delegates shall be the delegates receiving the next most votes. Delegates shall be listed according to the number of votes received. The required number of delegates for the WRLCA, in accordance with the National Constitution, shall be declared regular delegates and the remaining candidates shall be declared alternates in the order of their finish. Claudia Brown moved to accept proposed language and it was seconded.

Proposed language passed.

In the By-Laws, Article I (Duties of Officers--President), Section 2

Present Language:

SECTION 2 Previous to the first day of each State Convention, he/she shall appoint from the list of regularly elected delegates, then in the hands of the Secretary, a committee of three (3) on Credentials, a committee of four (4) on Teller's, a committee of three (3) on Constitution and By-Laws, and a committee of three (3) on Resolutions. On the first day of the State Convention he/she shall also appoint from said delegates an Auditing Committee of three (3) members; a committee of three (3) on Mileage and Per Diem; a committee of three (3) on Finances; a committee of three (3) on THE WASHINGTON RURAL CARRIER; and a committee of three (3) on Time and Place. He/She shall be responsible that a

Nominating Committee be appointed according to Article VIII of the Constitution of the WRLCA. He/She may appoint any other Convention Committee advisable and may also appoint more delegates to serve on a committee if so needed.

Proposed Language:

SECTION 2 Previous to the first day of each State Convention, he/she shall appoint from the list of regularly elected

delegates, then in the hands of the Secretary, a committee of three (3) on Credentials, a committee of four (4) on Teller's, a committee of three (3) on Constitution and By-Laws, and a committee of three (3) on Resolutions. On the first day of the State Convention he/she shall also appoint from said delegates an Auditing Committee of three (3) members; a committee of three (3) on Mileage and Per Diem; a committee of three (3) on Finances; and a committee of three (3) on Time and Place. Claudia Brown moved to accept proposed language and it was seconded. Bill Allen moved to have this postponed indefinitely. This was motion seconded and passed.

In the By-Laws, Article V (Editor), Section 1.

Present Language:

SECTION 1 The Editor shall publish four issues of the WASHINGTON RURAL CARRIER as a convention issue, fall issue, winter issue, and spring issue. At the first Board meeting after the State Convention, the Board will determine the mailing deadlines for the fall, winter, and spring issues of THE WASHINGTON RURAL CARRIER. In addition to articles and information, each specified issue will contain the following: The fall issue will contain the fall booster announcement and reports of all delegates to the National Convention. The winter issue will contain information on up-coming District Meetings and the up-coming State Convention, and the spring issue will contain information about the up-coming State Convention, campaign announcements and criteria for Carrier of the Year.

Within forty-five (45) days following the receipt of the minutes of the State Convention, the Editor shall publish a convention issue of THE WASHINGTON RURAL CARRIER containing the proceedings of the State Convention, including the updated Constitution and By-Laws, and distribute the same to all members at the expense of the WRLCA.

The Editor will publish all Board minutes and WRLCA financial statements as they occur in a timely manner in THE WASHINGTON RURAL CARRIER.

Proposed Language:

SECTION 1. The Editor shall publish four issues of the WASHINGTON RURAL CARRIER as a convention issue, fall issue, winter issue, and spring issue. At the first Board meeting after the State Convention, the Board will determine the mailing deadlines for the fall, winter, and spring issues of THE WASHINGTON RURAL CARRIER. In addition to articles and information, each specified issue will contain the following: The fall issue will contain the fall booster announcement, and if enough space, reports of all delegates to the National Convention. The winter issue will contain information on up-coming District Meetings and the up-coming State Convention, and the spring issue will contain information about the up-coming State Convention, campaign announcements and criteria for Carrier of the Year. Within forty-five (45) days following the receipt of the minutes of the State Convention, the Editor shall publish a convention issue of THE WASHINGTON RURAL CARRIER containing the proceedings of the State Convention, including the updated Constitution and By-Laws, and distribute the same to all members at the expense of the WRLCA. The Editor will publish all Board minutes and WRLCA financial statements as they occur in a timely manner in THE WASHINGTON RURAL CARRIER.

Claudia Brown moved to accept proposed language and it was seconded. Doug Rinehart moved to <u>add "full"</u> after "..At the first" (beginning of second sentence). The was seconded and the amendment was passed. **Proposed language as amended was defeated.**

Susie Juras moved to suspend the rules and proceed with the election of officers and continue with Constitution and By-Laws after the election of officers. This motion was seconded and passed.

President Charles at this time accepted nominations for President. Charles made one nomination for Judith Peck for President. Dan Snydar moved to close nominations for President and it was seconded and passed. Secretary/Treasurer Becky Wendlandt cast a unanimous vote to elect Judith Peck for President.

President Charles accepted nominations for Vice-President. Charles made one nomination for Donna Roakes for Vice-President. Cindy Norman moved to nominate Brenda Hayes for Vice-President and it was seconded. Bill Allen moved to close nominations and a secret ballot be conducted for office of Vice-President and it was seconded. Donna Roakes then declined her position to run for Vice-President. The motion for secret ballot failed. Jim Hemrich moved to close nominations for Vice-President and it was seconded and passed. Secretary/Treasurer Becky Wendlandt cast a unanimous vote to elect Brenda Hayes as Vice-President.

President Charles accepted nominations for Secretary/Treasurer. Charles made one nomination for Becky Wendlandt for Secretary/Treasurer. Tammy Donaghue moved to close nominations for Secretary/Treasurer and it was seconded and passed.

President Charles accepted nominations for Editor. Charles made two nominations, Dan Snydar and Doug Rinehart, for Editor. Bill Allen moved to close nominations for Editor and for a secret ballot to be conducted. It was seconded and passed. Charles then called for the Tellers Committee to come forward to conduct the secret ballot for the office of Editor. Bill Allen moved that a secret ballot be defined as one delegate/one vote duration of this years Convention. It was seconded and passed. Pat Thompson demanded a rising vote and it was seconded. Each candidate was asked to come up and speak. The chair ruled that the election of officers could be done with a secret ballot.

While the Tellers Committee was counting the votes, President Charles called Jim Hemrich, Chair of the Charter Committee to come forward. Jim asked that everyone please review the charts on display in the back of room and give their opinion to help the committee.

Becky Wendlandt moved to have the Mileage and Per Diem Committee come back up as one officer, Retired Carrier Harley Robb, had been accidentally omitted. It was seconded and passed. Carol Avery moved that the Mileage and Per Diem Committee be dismissed and it was seconded and passed.

President Charles adjourned at 2:40 P.M. for a break and reconvened at 2:50 P.M. Charles called for the Tellers Committee to come forward and give the results of secret ballot conducted for the office of Editor. Chair David Ray explained that there was one more vote than delegates, but the results would not have changed either way. Bill Allen moved to accept the vote as is and it was seconded and past. The results were 68 votes were cast; 33 votes for Dan Snydar and 35 votes for Doug Rinehart. Doug Rinehart was elected as Editor. Doug Rinehart at this time resigned from the District II Representative position. The Tellers Committee was then excused.

President Charles accepted nominations for District I Representative. Charles made one nomination for Pat Alexander for District I Representative. Bill Allen moved to close nominations for District I Representative and it was seconded and passed. Secretary/Treasurer Becky Wendlandt cast a unanimous vote to elect Pat Alexander for District I Representative.

President Charles accepted nominations for District II Representative. Melvin Walker made one nomination for Joanne Blackburn for District II Representative. Kathy Brown made one nomination for Ann Lamm for District II Representative. Bill Allen moved to close nominations and for a paper ballot to be conducted for the office of District II Representative and it was seconded and passed. The Tellers Committee was to conduct a paper ballot vote. While the votes were being counted, Lawrence Adams came up to give some closing remarks before having to leave. He also authorized Charles Alexander to administer the oath of office and install the new officers. The authorized form was given to the Secretary/Treasurer to keep on file. Mr. Adams invited everyone to the National meeting in Portland. He again thanked everyone for their attendance at this Convention.

The Tellers Committee came forward with the results for the office of District II Representative. Chair David Ray read the results as follows: 350 votes were cast, 86 votes for Ann Lamm and 264 votes for Joanne Blackburn. Joanne Blackburn was elected as District II Representative.

President Charles accepted nominations for District III Representative. Charles made one nomination for Dan Schrup for District III Representative. Dale Ryan moved to close nominations for District III Representative and it was seconded and passed. Secretary/Treasurer Becky Wendlandt cast a unanimous vote to elect Dan Schrup for District III Representative.

President Charles accepted nominations for District IV Representative. Charles made one nomination for Jim Hemrich for District IV Representative. Bonnie Brown made one nomination for Donna Roakes for District IV Representative. Bill Allen moved to postpone the election of District IV Representative to the end of election of officers and it was seconded. Mike Cammack moved to limit this process to ten minutes after the conclusion of business by the Association and it was seconded. This amended motion and motion to postpone failed. Donna Roakes then declined her nomination. Bonnie Brown moved to close nominations for District IV Representative and it was seconded and passed. Secretary/Treasurer Becky Wendlandt cast a unanimous vote to elect Jim Hemrich for District IV Representative.

President Charles accepted nominations for Retired Carrier. Charles made two nominations, Lynn Walker and Neil Buchanan, for Retired Carrier. Bob Lange moved to close nominations for retired carrier and conduct a paper ballot vote. It was seconded and passed. The Tellers and Credentials Committee's were called to conduct the paper ballot vote. While the votes were being counted, Charles called on the Constitution and By-Laws Committee to once again come forward.

In the By-Laws, Article VI, Section 4, Paragraph a. Present Language:

a) Make all Step 2-B and Step 3 Grievances appeals, coordinating all efforts closely with the Regional Representative and report monthly to the appropriate Local Steward and grievant.

Proposed Language:

a) Make all Step 3 Grievance appeals, coordinating all efforts closely with the Regional Representative and the Assistants to the Executive Committeemen and report monthly to the appropriate Local Steward and grievant.

Claudia Brown moved to accept proposed language and it was seconded.

Proposed language was passed.

In By-Laws, Article VI, Section 4A

Present Language:

SECTION 4A The salary of the State Steward shall be decided at each State Convention of the WRLCA after the Finance Committee reviews the suggestions of the Board. The State Steward shall be reimbursed for sick and annual leave days lost due to LWOP days taken in performing his/her responsibilities for the WRLCA. When grievances are being processed and it is essential that the State Steward be on LWOP, the WRLCA shall pay his/her wages at the same rate of pay as earned when serving his/her route, not to include EMA. The State Steward shall be allowed a mileage allowance for all Steward business. When an overnight stay is required in order for the State Steward to conduct necessary Steward business, the State Steward shall be entitled to lodging and meals per diem. The rates for mileage, lodging per diem and meals per diem will be determined at the State Convention after the Finance Committee reviews the suggestions of the Board. The State Steward is encouraged to fly rather than drive whenever flying results in significant savings to the WRLCA. In cases where travel shall be by commercial airlines, the mileage factor shall not apply. The cost of the lowest reasonable airline fare shall be reimbursed in lieu of mileage. The State Steward shall be reimbursed for one (1) day LWOP for steward training at National Convention and four (4) days while attending the National Convention if he/she is elected as a delegate.

Proposed Language:

The salary of the State Steward shall be decided at each State Convention of the WRLCA after the Finance Committee reviews the suggestions of the Board. The State Steward shall be reimbursed for sick and annual leave days lost due to LWOP days taken in performing his/her responsibilities for the WRLCA. When grievances are being processed and it is essential that the State Steward be on LWOP, the WRLCA shall pay his/her wages at the same rate of pay as earned when serving his/her route, not to include EMA. The State Steward shall be allowed a mileage allowance for all Steward business. When an overnight stay is required in order for the State Steward to conduct necessary Steward business, the State Steward shall be entitled to per diem. The rates for mileage and per diem will be determined at the State Convention after the Finance Committee reviews the suggestions of the Board. The State Steward is encouraged to fly rather than drive whenever flying results in significant savings to the WRLCA. In cases where travel shall be by commercial airlines, the mileage factor shall not apply. The cost of the lowest reasonable airline fare shall be reimbursed in lieu of mileage. The State Steward shall be reimbursed for one (1) day LWOP for steward training at National Convention.

Claudia Brown moved to adopt proposed language and it was seconded.

Proposed language passed.

Bill Allen objected to the consideration of the question regarding the next Constitution and By-Law change as it was identical to the previous one. This was seconded and was avoided altogether.

President Charles then called for the Tellers Committee to come forward and give the results of the paper ballot vote for the office of Retired Carrier. Chair David Ray read the results as follows: 350 votes were cast, 168 votes for Lynn Walker and 181 votes for Neil Buchanan and one ballot was blank. Neil Buchanan was elected as Retired Carrier. The Constitution and By-Laws Committee continued.

The Assistant State Stewards shall work with and be subject to the State Steward. The geographical area served by each Assistant State Steward shall be determined by the State Steward in conjunction with the Board. At the State Convention, a salary will be determined for all Assistant State Stewards and administered in the same fashion as for the State Steward. Provision for mileage, per diem, flying and LWOP apply in the same manner as with the State Steward.

Proposed Language:

The State President in conjunction with the Board and the State Steward, shall recommend to the NRLCA the members that

the WRLCA would like to have appointed as Assistant State Stewards. Their service shall be continuous until terminated by the State President in conjunction with the Board or National Board or by resignation. The Assistant State Stewards shall work with and be subject to the State Steward. The geographical area served by each Assistant State Steward shall be determined by the State Steward in conjunction with the Board. At the State Convention, a salary will be determined for all assistant State Stewards and administered in the same fashion as for the State Steward. Provision for mileage, per diem, flying and LWOP apply in the same manner as with the State Steward. The Assistant State Stewards will be reimbursed for one (1) day LWOP for steward training at National Convention only if the Director of Labor Relations authorizes their attendance in writing.

Amy Jacqmin moved to accept proposed language and it was seconded. **Proposed language was defeated.**

In the By-Laws, Article VII (Revenues and Dues), Section 1 and 2. Present Language:

SECTION 1 The revenues of the WRLCA shall be derived from per capita dues and allowance for insurance promotions. The State portion of the per capita dues shall be decided at the State Convention. The portion of the State per capita dues to be distributed to the County Units, Auxiliary, Convention Fund and other special funds shall be decided at each State Convention.

SECTION 2 The Board may levy a special tax when conditions seem to demand it, but the whole amount of such levies in any one year shall not exceed the amount of State per capita for that year.

Proposed Language:

SECTION 1 The revenues of the WRLCA shall be derived from per capita dues and allowance for insurance promotions. The State portion of the per capita dues for regular carriers is \$182.00 per annum, for relief carriers is \$29.00 per annum, for retired carriers is \$19.00 per annum, and for associate members is \$182.00 per annum. The National portion of the per capita dues is decided by the delegates at the National Convention. The membership and fiscal year shall begin July 1 and end June 30. The portion of the State per capita dues to be distributed to the County Units, Auxiliary, Convention Fund and other special funds shall be decided at each State Convention.

Eliminate Section 2 and renumber in proper sequence.

Amy Jacqmin moved to adopt proposed language and it was seconded. **Proposed language was defeated.**

Currently Found In By-Laws, Article VII, Section 1 & 2.

Present Language:

SECTION 1 The revenues of the WRLCA shall be derived from per capita dues and allowance for insurance promotions. The State portion of the per capita tax shall be decided at the State Convention. The portion of the State per capita tax to be distributed to the County Units, Auxiliary, Convention Fund and other special funds shall be decided at each State Convention.

SECTION 2 The Board may levy a special tax when conditions seem to demand it, but the whole amount of such levies in any one year shall not exceed the amount of State per capita for that year.

Proposed Language:

SECTION 1 The revenues of the WRLCA shall be derived from per capita dues and allowance for insurance promotions.

SECTION 2 The Board may levy a special tax when conditions seem to demand it, but the whole amount of such levies in any one year shall not exceed the amount of State per capita for that year.

SECTION 3 The State shall underwrite the County Units, Auxiliary, the Convention Fund and any special funds. The State portion of the per capita tax shall be decided at the State Convention (currently \$182.00 for regular carriers, \$29.00 for relief carriers, \$19.00 for retirees and \$182 for associate members). The portion of the State per capita tax to be distributed to the County Units, Auxiliary, Convention Fund and other special funds shall be decided at each State Convention.

Amy Jacqmin moved to adopt proposed language and it was seconded. Becky Wendlandt moved to <u>add</u> at the end of section 3 "The National portion of the per capita dues is decided by the delegates at the National Convention. The membership and <u>fiscal year shall begin July 1 and end June 30.</u> This amendment was seconded and passed.

Proposed language passed as amended.

Currently Found In By-Laws, Article VII (Revenue and Dues), Section 3.

Present Language:

SECTION 3 A regular carrier (designation 71) having a 30 hour or less evaluated route, shall pay 80% of the existing annual dues.

Proposed Language:

Section 3 will be eliminated.

Amy Jacqmin moved to adopt proposed language and it was seconded.

Proposed language passed.

In the By-Laws, Article X (Rules Governing County Units and District Associations), Section 3.

Present Language:

SECTION 3 Each County Unit shall immediately after the regular annual meeting of said Unit fill out credentials of Delegates-at-Large and regular delegates to the State Convention in duplicate. The duplicate is to be retained for identification by the delegate. The names of newly elected officers should also accompany this report. Such newly elected officers shall not assume office until the beginning of the WRLCA year. Each County Unit shall elect its delegates to the State Convention by written or secret ballot at its annual meeting.

Proposed Language:

SECTION 3 Each County Unit shall elect its delegates to the State Convention by written or secret ballot at its annual meeting. Each County Secretary shall immediately, after the regular annual meeting of their County Unit, fill out in duplicate, credentials of delegate-at-Large, regular, and alternate delegates to the State Convention in order of votes received. The duplicate is to be retained for identification by the delegate and the original is to be sent to the State Secretary with proper endorsement by the County President and the County Secretary. Also each County Secretary shall submit the names of the newly elected County Officers to the State Secretary. Such newly elected Officers shall assume office upon election.

Amy Jacqmin moved to adopt proposed language and it was seconded. Dale Ryan moved to amend by deleting underline wording adding "not assume office until the beginning of the WRLCA fiscal year". This amendment was seconded but was defeated.

Proposed language passed.

In the By-Laws, Article XI (Committees), Section 4 and 5.

Present Language:

<u>SECTION 4</u> The duties of the Committee on Constitution and By-Laws shall be: To examine all changes proposed for amending or changing the Constitution and By-Laws, and may propose changes themselves if they see fit. They may examine and correct, when called upon, proposed laws governing County Units or District Associations so that they will not conflict with the National or State Constitutions.

<u>SECTION 5</u> The duties of the Committee on Resolutions shall be to examine all proposed resolutions and present same to the elected delegates with the committee's approval or disapproval.

Proposed Language:

SECTION 4 The duties of the Committee on Constitution and By-Laws shall be: To examine all changes proposed for amending or changing the Constitution and By-Laws that have been passed and submitted by the county units. They may examine and correct, when called upon, proposed laws governing County Units or District Associations so that they will not conflict with the National or State Constitutions.

SECTION 5 The duties of the Committee on Resolutions shall be to examine all proposed resolutions passed and submitted by the county units and present same to the elected delegates with the committee's suggestions. The Resolutions Committee can also propose any courtesy resolutions they deem necessary and present same to the elected delegates at State Convention.

Amy Jacqmin moved to adopt proposed language and it was seconded.

Proposed language passed.

In the By-Laws, Article XII (Mileage and Per Diem), Section 1 and 2.

Present Language:

SECTION 1 The WRLCA shall pay mileage to each Delegate-at-Large, State Officer, Insurance Director, Political Action Committee Director, State Steward and Assistant State Steward attending the State Convention. The mileage table printed on the standard automobile maps shall be used as a guide. The mileage rate shall be decided by each State Convention of the WRLCA.

SECTION 2_The WRLCA shall pay a per diem allowance to each Delegate-at-Large, State Officer, Insurance Director, Political Action Committee Director, State Steward and Assistant State Steward attending the State Convention. The amount of per diem allowance shall be decided at each State Convention of the WRLCA. When more than one (1) person otherwise entitled to mileage and per diem travel to meetings together, only one (1) shall be paid mileage. In addition to paying travel allowance and per diem of one (1) Delegate-at-Large for each County Unit, the WRLCA shall pay mileage and per diem on the same basis as paid the Delegate-at-Large of one (1) regular delegate for each one-hundred (100) county members. Provided this shall in no way increase the total number of delegates to which each County Unit is entitled.

Proposed Language:

SECTION 1 The WRLCA shall pay mileage to each Delegate-at-Large, State Officer, Insurance Director, Political Action Committee Director, State Steward, Assistant State Steward, and Area Steward attending the State Convention. The mileage table printed on the standard automobile maps, or a computer mileage program, shall be used as a guide, along with 8% mileage addition to allow for detours, members living outside of city limits, etc. The mileage rate shall be decided at each State Convention of the WRLCA.

SECTION 2 The WRLCA shall pay a per diem allowance to each Delegate-at-Large, State Officer, Insurance Director, Political Action Committee Director, State Steward, Assistant State Steward, and Area Steward attending the State Convention. The amount of per diem allowance shall be decided at each State Convention of the WRLCA.

<u>SECTION 3</u> In addition to paying mileage and per diem for one (1) Delegate-at-Large for each County Unit, the WRLCA shall pay mileage and per diem on the same basis as paid the Delegate-at-Large for one (1) regular delegate for each one-hundred (100) county members, provided this shall in no way increase the total number of delegates to which each County Unit is entitled.

Amy Jacqmin moved to adopt proposed language and it was seconded.

Proposed language passed.

Currently Found In National Constitution and By-Laws, Article IV.

Present Language:

The parliamentary authority of the Association shall be Robert's Rules of Order Newly Revised.

Proposed Language:


The parliamentary authority of the Association shall be Robert's Rules of Order Newly Revised excepting the portion on resolution. Resolutions for this Association shall be advisory only.

Amy Jacqmin moved to adopt proposed language and it was seconded. Mike Cammack moved to add at the end "only...unless specifically passes as binding by this body." It was seconded and passed.

Proposed language passed as amended.

Amy Jacqmin moved that the Constitution & By-Laws Committee be dismissed and it was seconded and passed. President Charles then asked for unfinished business and there was none. Charles then asked if there was any new business and there was none. Bill Allen moved not to accept any resolutions from the floor. It was seconded and passed. President Charles then called the newly elected officers to come forward to be sworn in. Charles, by written authority of Lawrence Adams, installed the 1997-1998 officers. Bill Allen moved to dismiss the Tellers Committee and it was seconded and passed. Karen Crombie moved to dismiss the Credentials Committee and it was seconded and passed. Susie Juras was asked to come forward and give some brief information about the 1998 Western States Conference.

The colors were retired by Neil Buchanan and Dan Schrup with Mike Peck retiring the Juniors flag. Bill Allen moved to adjourn the meeting and it was seconded and passed. The 1997 Annual Convention of the Washington Rural Letter Carriers' Association was adjourned at 5:30 P.M. on June 25, 1997.

CONSTITUTION

ARTICLE I (NAME)

<u>SECTION 1</u> This association shall be known as the Washington Rural Letter Carriers' Association (here-in referred to as 'the WRLCA').

ARTICLE II (OBJECT)

SECTION 1 The object of the WRLCA shall be: to unite fraternally all regular rural carriers, substitute rural carriers, rural carrier reliefs, rural carrier associates, retired and auxiliary carriers of the State of Washington for the improvement of their own conditions and that of the rural carrier service; to assist in establishing and maintaining County Units, and supporting the National Association and to cooperate at all times with the United States Postal Service (USPS) for the advancement of the Service.

ARTICLE III (MEMBERSHIP)

<u>SECTION 1</u> Active members of all County Units shall be eligible for membership in the WRLCA; such members to be regular rural carriers, substitute rural carriers, rural carrier reliefs, rural carrier associates, retired or auxiliary carriers.

<u>SECTION 2</u> Also eligible for membership in the WRLCA are associate members (non-rural craft employees) that may elect to be a member by paying associate member dues. Associate members are not entitled to vote, hold office or be a delegate to National Convention.

<u>SECTION 3</u> Membership shall be in the County Unit and District representing the office from which the route emanates. A Retired Carrier shall have the option of being a member of the County Unit and District in which he/she resides or in the County Unit and District where previously employed as a regular rural carrier.

ARTICLE IV (REPRESENTATION)

SECTION 1 Each County Unit shall be entitled to one delegate for each five (5) members or major fraction thereof, and one (1) Delegate-at-Large. The Delegate-at-Large is responsible for collecting the ballots for his/her delegation and for returning the ballots to the Teller's Committee after his/her county delegates have voted. Each County Unit is entitled to one (1) vote for each five (5) members or major fraction thereof and one (1) vote for the Delegate-at-Large.

<u>SECTION 2</u> No delegate can be seated from any County Unit without properly signed credentials and current membership dues paid.

<u>SECTION 3</u> Delegate positions vacant at the time of the State Convention may not be filled by a vote of the delegates present from the subject County Unit or District or from other County Units or Districts, or delegates at the State Convention.

<u>SECTION 4</u> Election of delegates shall be by written or secret ballot in all cases where there is more than one candidate for each delegate position.

ARTICLE V (MEETINGS)

SECTION 1 The WRLCA shall meet annually (here-in referred to as the State Convention) on a date and place assigned to Districts on a rotation basis in the following order: District One, District Four, District Two, District Three. If for any reason the date or place so assigned shall be undesirable or for reasons deemed advisable by a majority of the State Officers, the Board shall have the authority to change said date or place or set up a date and place by giving official notice to the County secretaries not less than sixty (60) days before the new date.

SECTION 1A If due to war or other conditions that would make it impossible or impractical to hold a State Convention, the Board shall have the authority to discontinue the State Convention entirely by giving the official notice as provided in Section 1 of this Article.

SECTION 2 Special sessions may be called by the President upon written request of one-half of the County Units in good standing.

<u>SECTION 3</u> At each State Convention a report in writing must be rendered by each State Officer and the report then placed on file by the State Secretary.

SECTION 4 Informational and/or training meetings may be authorized by the Board.

ARTICLE VI (QUORUM)

SECTION 1 Seventeen (17) members representing not less than six (6) County Units shall constitute a quorum for the transaction of the business of the WRLCA, but a lesser number than that may adjourn to some future time.

ARTICLE VII (PARLIAMENTARY AUTHORITY)

SECTION 1 The parliamentary authority of the WRLCA shall be ROBERT'S RULES OF ORDER REVISED.

SECTION 2 Any elected delegate may call for a roll call vote.

<u>SECTION 3</u> A secret ballot vote can be called for by a simple majority vote of the delegates present at the State Convention.

ARTICLE VIII (OFFICERS)

SECTION 1 The officers of the WRLCA shall consist of: President, Vice-President, Secretary-Treasurer, Editor of the WASHINGTON RURAL CARRIER, four, (4) District Representatives and the Retired Carriers' Representative who shall be elected at the State Convention and serve one (1) year, except the District and Retired Representatives, who shall serve two (2) years, or until their successors are elected and installed.

SECTION 1A Each district shall nominate its own District Representative at a District meeting prior to the State Convention. Notice of said meeting will be sent to all members at least fifteen (15) days prior to the meeting. Such nominations shall then be presented to the Nominating Committee, who shall place them before the State Convention. In case no nomination is made by the District, the Nominating Committee at the State Convention shall select and place in nomination the name of a member of said District. Any delegate who is a member of said District is entitled to nominate from the floor any additional nominees who are qualified.

SECTION 1B The Retired Carriers' Representative shall be a retired carrier, nominated by a retired carrier and elected by the delegates at the State Convention assembled who shall have been elected and installed.

SECTION 2 There shall be a Board of Control (here-in referred to as the Board) consisting of: President, Vice-President, Secretary-Treasurer, Editor, four (4) District Representatives and the Retired Carriers' Representative. This Board shall meet upon the call of the President or by a majority vote of the Board to the Secretary when matters of importance arise that need immediate attention during the interim between meetings of the WRLCA. Each elected officer shall be entitled to a vote on every question before the State Convention.

SECTION 2A There shall be an Executive Committee consisting of the four (4) District Representatives and the Retired Carriers' Representative.

SECTION 3 Any officer of the WRLCA who shall be separated from the rural service through no fault of his/her own, as determined by the Board, shall hold office until the next State Convention of the WRLCA. However, a former rural carrier who has been appointed to the position of Postmaster, Officer-in -Charge or other supervisory position, may not vote, hold office or be appointed to any committee.

SECTION 4 The nomination of officers shall be made by a Nominating Committee of five (5): two (2) of whom shall be selected by the President, one (1) by the Vice-President, one (1) by the Secretary-Treasurer, and these four (4) so chosen shall select the fifth member. This Committee shall report their list of nominations when called upon. However, before closing the ballot on the nominations submitted by the Committee, the President shall state, "Are there any other nominations?". If so, then the names of the additional nominees shall be added to the list. The election of officers shall take place at each State Convention of the WRLCA. The installation of officers shall take place immediately before adjournment.

SECTION 5 The election of officers shall be by vote of the elected delegates, and in no case by acclamation except by unanimous consent. It shall require the majority of all votes cast to elect. The Delegate-at-Large is responsible for collecting the ballots for his/her delegation and for returning the ballots to the Teller's Committee after his/her county delegates have voted. Where there are more than two (2) the least number of votes on each ballot shall be dropped until the election is won.

SECTION 6 No State Officer may be declared a National delegate by virtue of his/her office.

SECTION 7 To be elected an officer of the WRLCA, one must be a dues paying member of the craft and is ineligible for election if dues are in arrears.

ARTICLE IX (NATIONAL DELEGATES)

SECTION 1 Nominations for National Delegates will be accomplished by submitting nominations on a Nominating Ballot which will be published in THE NATIONAL RURAL LETTER CARRIER in the first issue of February, March, April, and May. Such nominations may include self-nomination. The nominating ballot shall be signed, showing the name and address of the member making the nomination. No member shall be nominated or be a National Delegate who, from the time of nomination through the end of the National Convention, holds a position in management (either permanent or temporary) in the Postal Service; in any other postal craft; or any other job which competes with the Postal Service and/or the NRLCA. A retired Associate member, a non-member or a craft member who has been separated involuntarily from the Postal Service cannot be nominated, elected or seated as a National Delegate. Delegates must be an active or retired carrier, in paid status, at the time of nomination, election and seating as a National Delegate.

SECTION 2 Nominations for candidates for National Delegates shall be in the office of the State Secretary at least forty (40) days prior to the opening of the State Convention.

SECTION 3 The State Secretary shall arrange for the rental of two (2) post office boxes; one post office box for receipt of the ballots and the other for return of undeliverable ballots. It shall be the duty of the State Secretary to prepare a ballot listing the nominees for the position of Delegate to the National Convention and to mail said ballot to all members at least twenty (20) days prior to the opening of the State Convention. The listing of the nominees on the ballot for the position of delegate to the National Convention shall be in order of receipt of their nominating ballot in the office of the State Secretary.

SECTION 4 An envelope marked "Ballot" in which to send the ballot shall be provided each member.

<u>SECTION 5</u> The sealed envelope containing the ballot shall be mailed in another envelope by the member to the designated post office box. The other envelope also marked "Ballot" shall clearly identify name, address and county unit of the member to permit verification of membership enrollment and to maintain the integrity of the voting procedure.

<u>SECTION 6</u> A Teller's Committee shall be appointed by the State President. No member whose name appears on the ballot may serve on the Teller's Committee. Any candidate may observe the ballot tabulation. Ballots shall be returned to a post office box accessible only to the Teller's Committee. At the end of the cut-off period, said ballots shall be collected and counted at the State Convention.

SECTION 7 The number of candidates to be voted upon by each member shall not be more than the total number of delegate votes to which the WRLCA was entitled the previous year. Appropriate instructions shall be on each ballot stating the number of delegates to be elected and the mailing address of the designated post office box at which it must be received prior to the cut-off date. In reporting the results of the vote tabulation, the candidates shall be placed on a roster in accordance with the number of votes received.

SECTION 8 The National-paid Delegate-at-Large to the National Convention shall be the delegate receiving the most votes. Other National-paid delegates shall be the delegates receiving the next most votes. Delegates shall be listed according to the number of votes received. The required number of delegates for the WRLCA, in accordance with the National Constitution, shall be declared regular delegates and the remaining candidates shall be declared alternates in the order of their finish.

SECTION 9 The WRLCA will pay mileage one way and per diem allowance to all regular State paid delegates to the National Convention. The per diem allowance will be paid for the days the convention is in session. The rate of pay for mileage and per diem shall be decided at each State Convention of the WRLCA.

SECTION 10 Paid delegates to the National Convention are required to submit a report of said Convention, in writing, to the State Secretary-Treasurer prior to October 1. If no report is submitted, the state paid delegate will repay the WRLCA all monies received.

ARTICLE X (IMPEACHMENT AND REMOVALS)

SECTION 1 In case of neglect of duty or violation of this Constitution on the part of any officer in the WRLCA or subordinate Unit thereof, in the interim of State Conventions, the Board shall have the power to suspend such officer after a fair hearing and subject to an appeal to the next State Convention.

SECTION 2 In case an officer shall prove unfaithful to the WRLCA, he/she may be impeached and removed from office and lose his/her membership in the WRLCA when mandated by two-thirds vote of the State Convention.

ARTICLE XI (AMENDMENTS)

SECTION 1 The Constitution and By-Laws shall take effect immediately upon its adoption.

SECTION 2 This State Constitution and By-Laws shall be in harmony with the National Constitution and By-Laws. The county Unit is subordinate to the WRLCA and the WRLCA is subordinate to the NRLCA. Any provisions of this Constitution and By-Laws which conflicts with any Federal or State Law, regulation or ordinance shall be inoperative as to those jurisdictions in which said Federal or State Law, regulation or ordinance is in force.

SECTION 3 Constitution and By-Laws amendments shall become effective upon adjournment of the State Convention unless otherwise stipulated and can only be amended by submitting the amendment in writing at a State Convention and shall require a two-thirds vote to amend.

BY-LAWS

ARTICLE I (DUTIES OF OFFICERS--PRESIDENT)

SECTION 1 The President shall preside at all méetings of the WRLCA and of the Board and enforce all laws thereof. He/She shall sign all papers and documents that require his/her signature to properly authenticate them.

SECTION 2 Previous to the first day of each State Convention, he/she shall appoint from the list of regularly elected delegates, then in the hands of the Secretary, a committee of three (3) on Credentials, a committee of four (4) on Teller's, a committee of three (3) on Constitution and By-Laws, and a committee of three (3) on Resolutions. On the first day of the State Convention he/she shall also appoint from said delegates an Auditing Committee of three (3) members; a committee of three (3) on Mileage and Per Diem; a committee of three (3) on Finances; a committee of three (3) on THE WASHINGTON RURAL CARRIER; and a committee of three (3) on Time and Place. He/She shall be responsible that a Nominating Committee be appointed according to Article VIII of the Constitution of the WRLCA. He/She may appoint any other Convention Committee advisable and may also appoint more delegates to serve on a committee if so needed.

SECTION 2A The President can, if necessary, ask the Constitution and By-Laws Committee, the Resolutions Committee, and/or the Teller's Committee to meet one (1) day prior to the State Convention. These persons would be only State paid delegates to the Convention and would receive one (1) additional day per diem.

SECTION 3 His/Her decisions upon all questions of law shall be final during the recess of the WRLCA. He/She shall report all such decisions to the WRLCA at its State Convention for approval or rejection. Such decisions, when approved or revised by the WRLCA, shall have all the effect and force of the general laws of the WRLCA.

SECTION 4 At the close of each State Convention he/she shall, in conjunction with the Board, appoint the Auto Insurance Director, Provident Guild Director, Political Action Committee Director, and have the authority to fill any vacancies therein during the recess. Also, in conjunction with the Board, he/she shall evaluate the work of the State Steward, and if in the best interest of the WRLCA, terminate the incumbent State Steward and nominate a replacement.

<u>SECTION 5</u> He/She shall fill all vacancies pro tem. caused in any way in the Board of the WRLCA subject to the approval of the remaining members of the Board.

SECTION 6 He/She shall have power to grant charters and, in conjunction with the Secretary, issue them during the interim between State Conventions of the WRLCA. He/She shall perform other duties as the Constitution and By-Laws require.

ARTICLE II (VICE-PRESIDENT)

SECTION 1 The Vice-President shall preside in the absence of the President, and in the case of death, resignation, disqualification, refusal or neglect of the President to discharge the duties of his/her office, the Vice-President shall become the President and serve until such time as his/her successor shall be duly elected and installed.

ARTICLE III (SECRETARY-TREASURER)

SECTION 1 The Secretary-Treasurer shall keep a correct record of the proceedings of the WRLCA, read or cause to be read, all communications, reports, etc. He/She shall affix the seal of the WRLCA to all official documents, prepare for publication a correct copy of the entire proceedings of the WRLCA at its State Convention or special meetings, not later than one (1) month after the close of each State Convention or special meeting, and shall also present on the first day of the State Convention a complete statement of the condition of the WRLCA, including a statement of the membership of same.

<u>SECTION 2</u> He/She shall conduct the correspondence of the WRLCA, keep a record and submit same when demanded by the Board.

<u>SECTION 3</u> He/She shall have charge of the seal, books, papers and documents belonging to the WRLCA; shall deliver to the WRLCA, or his/her successor, all property of the WRLCA at the expiration of his/her term of office, or upon an earlier termination thereof; he/she shall be given an itemized receipt for all property delivered by the party or parties receiving same.

<u>SECTION 4</u> He/She shall keep a true and correct account between the WRLCA and the County Units.

<u>SECTION 5</u> He/She shall perform all the duties of the Treasurer as are required by this office.

<u>SECTION 6</u> He/She shall receive all monies due the WRLCA and shall deposit all monies in a convenient depository; such deposits to be made in the name of the "Washington Rural Letter Carriers' Association" and any interest thereon shall be credited to the funds of the WRLCA.

<u>SECTION 7</u> In drawing the checks on the WRLCA, the Secretary-Treasurer shall use a form that will show for what the money was used and that will require the signature of both the President and the Secretary-Treasurer.

<u>SECTION 8</u> The Secretary-Treasurer may at each State Convention employ a stenographer to take down the proceedings and the cost shall be paid out of the treasury of the WRLCA.

<u>SECTION 9</u> He/She shall render a report to the WRLCA at its State Convention or to the President and Board when they may request it, showing in detail the receipts and expenditures of the WRLCA's funds as shown by his/her books.

<u>SECTION 10</u> After the close of each State Convention the Secretary shall send the appropriate resolutions to the National Secretary-Treasurer, keeping a copy on file.

SECTION 11 Upon receipt of the nominations for the position of Delegate to the National Convention, he/she will prepare a ballot listing the nominees for the position of Delegate to the National Convention and will mail said ballot to all members at least twenty (20) days prior to the opening of the State Convention. He/She will fulfill all duties concerning delegates to National Convention in accordance with Article IX (National Delegates) of the Constitution of the WRLCA.

SECTION 12 He/She will notify all members, at least fifteen (15) days prior to the opening of the State Convention, of the time and place, the nominating and election procedures and the offices to be filled. This notice may be included with the National Delegate ballot mailed to each member.

<u>SECTION 13</u> He/She will retain for one (1) year in a safe location all ballots used at the State Convention. These ballots should be placed in envelopes marked to indicate for which election they were used.

ARTICLE IV (EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE)

<u>SECTION 1</u> The Executive Committee, or a majority of them shall act as Trustees of the WRLCA, and in conjunction with the President, have general supervision and control of the WRLCA.

SECTION 2 At the expiration of their term of office, or upon an earlier termination thereof, they shall turn over to the WRLCA or their successors, all books, papers, and other property they may have in their possession belonging to the WRLCA.

<u>SECTION 3</u> It shall be the duty of the Executive Committee members to aid in keeping carriers in their particular Districts interested in WRLCA work and in keeping up the membership of their Districts. They shall perform such other duties as the WRLCA may, from time to time, direct.

ARTICLE V (EDITOR)

SECTION 1 The Editor shall publish four issues of the WASHINGTON RURAL CARRIER as a convention issue, fall issue, winter issue, and spring issue. At the first Board meeting after the State Convention, the Board will determine the mailing deadlines for the fall, winter, and spring issues of the WASHINGTON RURAL CARRIER. In addition to articles and information, each specified issue will contain the following: The fall issue will contain the fall booster announcement and reports of all delegates to the National Convention. The winter issue will contain information on up-coming District Meetings and the up-coming State Convention, and the spring issue will contain information about the up-coming State Convention, campaign announcements and criteria for Carrier of the Year. Within forty-five (45) days following the receipt of the minutes of the State Convention, the Editor shall publish a convention issue of the WASHINGTON RURAL CARRIER containing the proceedings of the State Convention, including the

updated Constitution and By-Laws, and distribute the same to all members at the expense of the WRLCA. The Editor will publish all Board minutes and WRLCA financial statements as they occur in a timely manner in the WASHINGTON RURAL CARRIER.

SECTION 2 The Editor will receive a salary after the mailing of each issue of the WASHINGTON RURAL CARRIER. Said salary will be determined at each State Convention. The salary will be reduced 10% for each week that the mailing exceeds the Board-determined deadline for mailings, unless waived by the Board. The Editor will also receive a salary for the publication of the State Convention program. Said salary will be determined at the State Convention.

SECTION 3 The Editor shall mail each issue of the WASHINGTON RURAL CARRIER to all members of the WRLCA and will be reimbursed for all expenses incurred in publication and mailing.

ARTICLE VI (STATE OFFICERS' EXPENSE)

SECTION 1 No State Officer shall receive a salary except the Secretary-Treasurer and the Editor. The salary of the Secretary-Treasurer and Editor shall be decided at each State Convention of the WRLCA after the Finance Committee reviews the suggestions of the Board and delegates at the State Convention. The State Convention delegates vote on the Finance Committee recommendations.

SECTION 2 The officers, Insurance Director and Political Action Committee Director of the WRLCA shall be reimbursed for all postage, office supplies, telephone calls and mileage to all meetings outside of their own County Unit, connected with the business of the WRLCA. Per diem will be paid if business necessitates an overnight stay. Expenses incurred in excess of per diem will be reimbursed with the approval of the Board. Reimbursement of said expenses shall be made by the Secretary-Treasurer upon receipt of a voucher and supporting documents. Leave Without Pay (LWOP) will not be compensated to attend the State Convention or National Convention while they are in session, but may be authorized by the Board for other required business. All State Officers attending the State Convention shall receive mileage at the same rate as paid to the Delegates-at-Large. Officers are encouraged to fly rather than drive whenever flying results in a significant savings to the WRLCA. In cases where travel shall be by commercial airlines, the mileage factor shall not apply. The cost of the lowest reasonable airline fare shall be reimbursed in lieu of mileage.

<u>SECTION 2A</u> When the Board requests that a State Officer attend any National training, the officer will receive mileage and per diem or actual expenses whichever is less, and LWOP, not including EMA, for travel (unless already funded) and days of training. This must be approved in advance by the Board.

SECTION 3 The State President in conjunction with the Board, shall recommend to the NRLCA the member that the WRLCA would like to have appointed as State Steward. His/Her service shall be continuous until terminated by the State President in conjunction with the Board or National President or by resignation. The State Steward shall work with and be subject to the State President and the Board. The State Steward shall supervise and administer the Steward Program within the State using the following guidelines:

- A) Make all Step 3 Grievance appeals, coordinating all efforts closely with the Regional Representative and the Assistants to the Executive Committeemen and report monthly to the appropriate Local Steward and grievant.
- B) Be responsible for certifying and maintaining certification records of all local and area stewards.
- C) In the event there is a need to fill or replace an Area or Local Steward position, the State Steward has the responsibility to the WRLCA and NRLCA in naming an individual to temporarily serve as steward.
- D) Be responsible for the distribution of Steward Manuals and Grievance forms to each Area and Local Steward, as well as for steward training.
- E) The State Steward may approve payment of expenses incurred by the Assistant State Stewards, Area and Local Stewards, while involved in grievance-related business. Reimbursement shall be made by the State Secretary-Treasurer. Expenses shall be submitted no later than three (3) months after the expense has been incurred.

SECTION 3A The salary of the State Steward shall be decided at each State Convention of the WRLCA after the Finance Committee reviews the suggestions of the Board. The State Steward shall be reimbursed for sick and annual leave days lost due to LWOP days taken in performing his/her responsibilities for the WRLCA. When grievances are being processed and it is essential that the State Steward be on LWOP, the WRLCA shall pay his/her wages at the same rate of pay as earned when serving his/her route, not to include EMA. The State Steward shall be allowed a mileage allowance for all Steward business. When an overnight stay is required in order for the State Steward to conduct necessary Steward business, the State Steward shall be entitled to per diem. The rates for mileage and per diem will be determined at the State Convention after the Finance Committee reviews the suggestions of the Board. The State Steward is encouraged to fly rather than drive whenever flying results in significant savings to the WRLCA. In cases where travel shall be by commercial airlines, the mileage factor shall not apply. The cost of the lowest reasonable airline fare shall be reimbursed in lieu of mileage. The State Steward shall be reimbursed for one (1) day LWOP for steward training at National Convention.

SECTION 3B The State President in conjunction with the Board and the State Steward, shall recommend to the NRLCA the members that the WRLCA would like to have appointed as Assistant State Stewards and Area Stewards. Their service shall be continuous until terminated by the State President in conjunction with the Board, or National Board, or by resignation. The Assistant State Stewards and Area Stewards shall work with and be subject to the State Steward. The geographical area served by each Assistant State Steward and Area Steward shall be determined by the State Steward in conjunction with the Board. At the State Convention, a salary will be determined for all Assistant State Stewards and administered in the same fashion as for the State Steward. Provision for mileage, per diem, office supplies, telephone, flying and LWOP apply in the same manner as with the State Steward.

SECTION 4 Each State Officer and Appointed Officer will submit a proposed budget for the operating expenses of their office for the coming fiscal year to the Board for approval.

SECTION 5 The WRLCA will operate on a budget each year.

ARTICLE VII (REVENUES AND DUES)

<u>SECTION 1</u> The revenues of the WRLCA shall be derived from per capita dues and allowance for insurance promotions.

<u>SECTION 2</u> The Board may levy a special tax when conditions seem to demand it, but the whole amount of such levies in any one year shall not exceed the amount of State per capita for that year.

<u>SECTION 3</u> The State shall underwrite the County units, Auxiliary, the Convention Fund, and any special funds. The State portion of the per capita dues shall be decided at the State Convention (currently \$182.00 for regular carriers, \$29.00 for relief carriers, \$19.00 for retirees, and \$182.00 for associate members). The portion of the State per capita dues to be distributed to the County Units, Auxiliary, Convention Fund, and other special funds shall be decided at each State Convention. The National portion of the per capita dues is decided by the delegates at the National Convention. The membership and fiscal year shall begin July 1 and end June 30.

<u>SECTION 4</u> New Relief Carriers who join the WRLCA by paying cash and who do not complete their probationary period will be refunded their total cash paid, less National per capita, upon written request.

ARTICLE VIII (CHARTERS)

<u>SECTION 1</u> Charters shall be granted County Units upon members' application and payment of one (1) years dues for each member. The amount of dues shall be specified in ARTICLE VII of the By-Laws.

ARTICLE IX (FISCAL YEAR)

SECTION 1 The fiscal year of the WRLCA shall be from July first (1) to June thirtieth (30th). The term of the officers of the WRLCA shall be from the time of installation to the installation of their successors.

SECTION 2 The fiscal year of the County Units and District Associations shall be from July first (1) to June thirtieth (30th).

ARTICLE X (RULES GOVERNING COUNTY UNITS AND DISTRICT ASSOCIATIONS)

SECTION 1 Districts and Counties:

DISTRICT ONE (1) shall be composed of the County Units of: ISLAND-SKAGIT-SAN JUAN (Island, Skagit and San Juan Counties); K-S (King and Snohomish Counties); WHATCOM (Whatcom County).

DISTRICT TWO (2) shall be composed of the County Units of: KITSAP (Kitsap County); CLALLAM-JEFFERSON (Clallam and Jefferson Counties); LOWER COLUMBIA (Clark, Skamania, Cowlitz, and Wahkiakum Counties); MUTUAL (Pierce, Grays Harbor, Thurston, Mason, Lewis, and Pacific Counties)

DISTRICT THREE (3) shall be composed of the County Units of: CHELAN-DOUGLAS (Chelan and Douglas Counties); LGA (Lincoln, Grant and Adams Counties): OKANOGAN (Okanogan County); NORTHEAST WASHINGTON COUNTIES (Stevens, Ferry and Pend Oreille Counties); SPOKANE (Spokane County)

DISTRICT FOUR (4) shall be composed of the County Units of: SOUTHEAST WASHINGTON (Walla Walla, Columbia, and Garfield Counties); WHITMAN-ASOTIN (Whitman and Asotin Counties); YAKIMA VALLEY (Franklin, Kittitas, Yakima, Klickitat, and Benton Counties).

SECTION 1A Each District shall hold at least one (1) meeting a year and all members of said District shall be notified of the time and place of said meeting or meetings. Notice will be sent to all members fifteen (15) days prior to an election.

SECTION 2 Secretaries of the County Units shall remit to the State Secretary-Treasurer within fifteen (15) days of their receipt, all monies for per capita dues along with the State and National portions of the membership card. County secretaries shall also inform the State Secretary-Treasurer of any changes in membership (such as change of address, resigned or deceased) in a timely manner.

SECTION 3 Each County Unit shall elect its delegates to the State Convention by written or secret ballot at its annual meeting. Each County Secretary shall immediately, after the regular annual meeting of their County Unit, fill out in duplicate, credentials of Delegate-at-Large, Regular, and Alternate delegates to the State Convention in order of votes received. The duplicate is to be retained for identification by the delegate and the original is to be sent to the State Secretary with proper endorsement by the County President and the County Secretary. Also each County Secretary shall submit the names of the newly elected County Officers to the State Secretary. Such newly elected officers shall assume office upon election.

SECTION 3A The County Secretary, when submitting resolutions and proposed changes to the Constitution and By-Laws to the State Secretary, shall submit them in the proper form as follows: Make a copy of each resolution and proposed change to the Constitution and By-Laws, preferably typewritten, following the form provided by the State Secretary-Treasurer, and state whether it is a resolution or a proposed change to the Constitution and By-Laws.

SECTION 4 Each County Unit shall hold its annual meeting after October 1st and at least forty (40) days prior to the State Convention and the regular meeting shall be designed by statute. The County Secretary will notify all County members, their District Representative, State Secretary, State President and State Steward at least fifteen (15) days prior to the election of County Officers and Delegates. They shall make and adopt such other By-Laws as their needs may suggest and such laws must harmonize with this code of laws.

SECTION 5 All County Unit or District Constitution and By-Laws shall be in harmony with the National and State Constitution and By-Laws.

SECTION 6 The County Unit or District Association is subordinate to the WRLCA. Likewise, the WRLCA is subordinate to the NRLCA. Any County Unit or District Association or any member thereof who shall cause to have introduced or endeavor to have passed in Congress or the State Legislature any measure relative to legislation for Rural Carriers which has not had the approval of the WRLCA or its officers shall have charges preferred against such County Unit, District or member, as the case may be, and if charges are proven true, the County Unit, District or member shall be indefinitely suspended.

ARTICLE XI (COMMITTEES)

<u>SECTION 1</u> The Committee on Credentials shall examine the credentials of all delegates to the State Convention.

SECTION 1A On the first day of the State Convention, the Credentials Committee will give a preliminary report. Final report of the Credentials Committee shall be submitted not later than ten (10:00) a.m. on the second day of the State Convention.

SECTION 2 The Committee on Audit shall examine the books of the Secretary-Treasurer, as well as the reports of the County Units, and shall report to the WRLCA when called upon.

SECTION 3 The Committee on Mileage and Per Diem shall make up payrolls wherein shall be recorded the name, residence and amount due each member entitled to mileage.

SECTION 4 The duties of the Committee on Constitution and By-Laws shall be: To examine all changes proposed for amending or changing the Constitution and By-Laws that have been passed and submitted by the county units. They may examine and correct, when called upon, proposed laws governing County Units or District Associations so that they will not conflict with the National or State Constitutions.

SECTION 5 The duties of the Committee on Resolutions shall be to examine all proposed resolutions passed and submitted by the county units and present same to the elected delegates with the committee's suggestions. The Resolutions Committee can also propose any courtesy resolutions they deem necessary and present same to the elected delegates at State Convention.

SECTION 6 The duties of the Teller's Committee shall be: To count the ballots for National Convention delegates and to total the results of paper count voting on the floor. If the Teller's Committee is off the floor then the Credentials Committee will act as a backup to the Teller's Committee concerning paper count voting on the floor.

SECTION 7 The duties of the Finance Committee shall be: To review the finances of the past year. To hear any suggestions from the board and delegates and then to propose financial suggestions concerning State, County, and Auxiliary dues, salaries and expenses for the upcoming year.

<u>SECTION 8</u> The duties of the Time and Place Committee shall be: To research facilities for future State Conventions as well as locations and report to the delegates.

SECTION 9 The duties of THE WASHINGTON RURAL CARRIER Committee shall be: To review the expenses to publish and mail THE WASHINGTON RURAL CARRIER and to make any suggestions concerning future publications.

<u>SECTION 10</u> The duties of the Nominating Committee shall be: To seek nominees for the offices open and present these names to the convention delegates.

<u>SECTION 11</u> The duties of all other committees shall be those usual to such committees and they shall report when called upon.

ARTICLE XII (MILEAGE AND PER DIEM)

SECTION 1 The WRLCA shall pay mileage to each Delegate-at-Large, State Officer, Insurance Director, Political Action Committee Director, State Steward, Assistant State Steward, and Area Steward attending the State Convention. The mileage table printed on the standard automobile maps, or a computer mileage program, shall be used as a guide, along with 8% mileage addition to allow for detours, members living outside of city limits, etc. The mileage rate shall be decided at each State Convention of the WRLCA.

SECTION 2 The WRLCA shall pay a per diem allowance to each Delegate-at-Large, State Officer, Insurance Director, Political Action Committee Director, State Steward, Assistant State Steward, and Area Steward attending the State Convention. The amount of per diem allowance shall be decided at each State Convention of the WRLCA.

<u>SECTION 3</u> In addition to paying mileage and per diem for one (1) Delegate-at-Large for each County Unit, the WRLCA shall pay mileage and per diem on the same basis as paid the Delegate-at-Large for one (1) regular delegate for each one-hundred (100) county members, provided this shall in no way increase the total number of delegates to which each County Unit is entitled.

ARTICLE XIV (PRINTING CONSTITUTION AND BY-LAWS)

SECTION 1 The Secretary shall have the Constitution and By-Laws printed in the Convention issue of THE WASHINGTON RURAL CARRIER, which will be mailed to all members.

ARTICLE XV (AMENDMENTS)

SECTION 1 The Constitution and By-Laws shall take effect as soon as adopted.

SECTION 2 This State Constitution and By-Laws shall be in harmony with the National Constitution and By-Laws. The County Unit is subordinate to the WRLCA and the WRLCA is subordinate to the NRLCA. Any provisions of this Constitution and By-Laws which conflicts with any Federal or State Law, regulation or ordinance shall be inoperative as to those jurisdictions in which said Federal or State Law, regulation or ordinance is in force.

<u>SECTION 3</u> Constitution and By-Laws amendments shall become effective upon adjournment of the State Convention unless otherwise stipulated and shall require a two-thirds vote to amend.



The following changes are presented as they were finally passed and adopted by the WRLCA Auxiliary at the 1997 State Convention in Kennewick, WA.

Constitution Article V Section 6

Present Language:

Section 6 No member of this Auxiliary shall be eligible as Delegate-at-Large to the National Convention more than twice in a period of five (5) years, unless no other qualified delegate is available.

Proposed Language:

Section 6 Any Auxiliary member interested for National Delegate positions should announce in the Spring (pre-convention) issue of the CARRIER. Elections will be held during Convention and additional nominations may be made from the floor. Members are qualified for National Delegates if they have attended State Convention and one-half (1/2) day of District meeting (subject to special appeal submitted to the Board). No member shall be eligible as Delegate-at-Large more than twice in a period of five (5) years, unless no other qualified delegate is available. The candidates qualified for National Delegate-at-large shall be voted on first. Then the remaining candidates and the rest of the nominees shall be voted on for the National-paid delegates. The remaining candidates from that election will be voted on for regular certified National delegates.

By-Laws Article VIII

Present Language:

The National Delegate-at-Large shall be given Fifty Dollars (\$50.00) each year by the Auxiliary before leaving to attend the National Auxiliary Convention.

Proposed Language:

The National Delegate-at-Large shall submit receipts for expenses incurred during National Convention in line with duties of that office not to exceed seventy-five dollars (\$75.00).

By-Laws Article XII New Section 6

Present Language: none

Proposed Language:

Section 6 Guests of Junior members shall be known as Honorary Members and may attend State

Convention Junior activities under the following conditions:

1. The registration fee will be double the Junior member fee;

- 2. Must have a letter of permission and release of liability from a parent or Legal Guardian for participation in activities that includes permission for an Association or Auxiliary Member to be responsible for the Honorary Member. This permission should specify the name of the Responsible Auxiliary or Association Member and should include the ability to make Emergency Medical Decisions.

CONSTITUTION AND BY-LAWS
OF THE AUXILIARY OF THE
WASHINGTON RURAL LETTER CARRIERS' ASSOCIATION

CONSTITUTION

ARTICLE I (Name)

This organization shall be known as the Auxiliary of the Washington Rural Letter Carriers' Association (WRLCA).

ARTICLE II (Object)

The object of this Auxiliary shall be to unite fraternally its members and to help create a greater interest in rural mail service and, through our united efforts, to seek beneficial legislation.

ARTICLE III (Membership)

Section 1 The membership of this Auxiliary shall consist of the spouses of all carriers eligible for membership in the National Rural Letter Carriers' Association (NRLCA).

Section 1(a) Widows and widowers of deceased carriers may retain full membership upon payment of dues.

Section 1(b) Partners of Rural Letter Carriers may be a guest, but have no voting rights.

Section 2 Any member whose membership is credited in one County Unit and later transfers to another County Unit shall be counted in the County Unit in which membership was credited until after the close of the State Convention, but the member may work with or represent the County Unit in which the member resides.

ARTICLE IV (Officers and Election)

Section 1 The officers of this Auxiliary shall consist of President, Vice President, and Secretary/Treasurer, who shall be elected for one (1) year or until successors are elected and installed; and a District Committee of four (4) District Representatives to be nominated by the District in which the member will serve at the Spring District Meeting, subject to the approval of the State Convention. Two (2) District Representatives will be chosen each year for a two (2) year term.

Section 2 There shall be a State Executive Board (herein called the Board) consisting of the President, Vice President, Secretary/Treasurer, and four (4) members of the District Committee, which shall meet upon the call of the President or a majority vote of the Board.

Section 3 Election of Officers. The nomination and election of officers shall take place at each State Convention of the Auxiliary. The installation of officers shall take place immediately after the election.

Section 3(a) The election of officers shall be by secret ballot. Where there are more than two (2) candidates for the same office. After the third ballot, the one receiving the least number of votes on each ballot shall be dropped until an election is made.

Section 3(b) Nominations for offices shall be made from the floor and will include any nominations for District Representatives from the District meetings.

ARTICLE V (Representation)

Section 1 Each County Unit shall be entitled to one (1) Delegate-at-Large, and in addition, one (1) delegate for each five (5) members or major fraction thereof. An alternate shall be designated to act in the case of the absence of the Delegate-at-Large. The Delegate-at-Large cast the entire vote of the delegation.

Section 1 (a) If no delegate holding credentials is in attendance to represent a County Unit, then a member from that County Unit may be appointed by the State Convention

attendees to be the Delegate-at-Large from that County Unit.

Section 2(a) Each County Unit is entitled to one (1) vote for each five (5) members or major fraction thereof and one (1) vote for the Delegate-at-Large. The Secretary-Treasurer or Credentials Committee shall announce the number of members and the corresponding number of votes each County Unit is entitled to cast.

Section 2(b) Each State Officer shall be entitled to one (1) vote.

Section 3 No delegate can be seated from any County Unit unless the delegate holds properly signed credentials.

Section 4 The Immediate Past President shall have the status of a Delegate-at-Large at the succeeding State Convention following retirement and shall be entitled to one (1) vote.

Section 5 No County Unit or Officer shall have the privilege of voting by proxy. Section 6 Any Auxiliary member interested for National Delegate positions should announce in the Spring (pre-Convention) issue of the CARRIER. Elections will be held during Convention and additional nominations may be made from the floor. Members are qualified for National Delegates if they have attended State Convention and one-half (1/2) day of District meeting (subject to special appeal submitted to the Board). No member shall be eligible as Delegate-at-Large more than twice in a period of five (5) years, unless no other qualified delegate is available. The candidates qualified for National Delegate-at-Large shall be voted on first. Then the remaining candidates and the rest of the nominees shall be voted on for the National-paid delegates. The remaining candidates from that election will be voted on for regular certified National delegates.

BY-LAWS

ARTICLE I (Duties of Officers and Delegates)

Section 1 PRESIDENT. The President Shall preside at all meetings of the Auxiliary and of the Board and enforce all laws thereof; fill all vacancies pro tem., caused in any way in the Board, subject to the approval of the District Committee; shall have general supervision over all of its affairs.

Section 1(a) The President shall appoint committees from the members present to work on Credentials, Auditing, Constitution and By-laws, Resolutions, and Mileage.

Section 1 (b) The President shall submit at each State Convention a written report of all activities or official acts during the term of office and shall perform such other duties as the laws, rules and regulations of this Auxiliary may require.

Section 2 VICE-PRESIDENT. The Vice-President shall preside in the absence of the President, and in case of death, resignation, disqualification; refusal or neglect of the President to discharge the duties of the office. The Vice-President shall perform all the duties incumbent on the President until an election shall be held or successor duly installed.

Section 2(a) The Vice-President shall prepare and present the Memorial Service; act as Historian of this Auxiliary; present a gift to the outgoing President; be responsible for the response to the welcome at the State Convention; and oversee the business meeting and election of officers for the Juniors (but does not have to be the Junior Sponsor, also).

Section 3 SECRETARY-TREASURER. The Secretary-Treasurer shall keep a record of all proceedings; have charge of all banking and money; conduct the correspondence; have charge of all books, seals, papers and documents belonging to the Auxiliary. All records shall be held open to reference or inspection by the President or Board at any time until delivered to the newly elected successor.

Section 3(a) The Secretary/Treasurer shall send fifty cents (\$.50) per member to active County Units holding at least one meeting per year.

Section 4 The DISTRICT COMMITTEE. The District Committee shall act as trustees of this Auxiliary and in conjunction with the President, have general supervision and control over the Auxiliary, subject to appeal at the next State Convention.

Section 4(a) Duties of the District Committee Representative:

1. Aid in keeping the Auxiliary members in the District interested in Auxiliary work and in keeping up the membership of the District.

- 2. Encourage the County Secretaries to contact spouses of new carriers, newly retired carriers and widows/widowers, and to keep the District Representative informed. The Secretary/Treasurer will provide a list of names and addresses of all County Unit Secretaries in each District.
- 3. Issue an invitation to the spouses of new carriers to attend County Unit meetings and to join our "bread and butter" organization. This shall be done by personal contact if possible.
- 4. Attend at least one (1) meeting in each County Unit in the District to bring greetings and information from the Board and to stress increased active participation in the Auxiliary. Urge members to write to their Congressman and Senators if so directed by the National Office.
- 5. Attend all Board meetings and be prepared to give a report of activities which includes: meetings attended, letters written, visits to obtain new members, and membership to date.
- 6. Write at least one article for THE WASHINGTON RURAL CARRIER (as requested by the State President).
- 7. Cooperate with the WRLCA District Representative in setting a time and place for the District Meeting.
 - 8. Preside at the Auxiliary session at the District Meeting.

ORDER OF BUSINESS:

- (a) Introduce yourself.
- (b) Call the meeting to order.
- (c) Invocation.
- (d) Appoint a Secretary to take notes, and dispense the minutes.
- (e) Introduce State Officers.
- (f) Ask each person to introduce themselves and give name of their home town
- (g) Ask the Secretary of each County Unit, or a representative, to give a report on meetings held and membership activities to date.
 - (h) Give "Pep Talk" on being an active member.
 - (i) Call on the State Officers for a message.
 - (j) Report on illnesses for the Sunshine correspondence.
 - (k) Call for resolutions to be presented to the State Convention.
- (1) If the two (2) year term of the District Representative expires, conduct nominations for a candidate whose name will be presented to the State Convention.
 - (m) Announcements.
 - (n) Adjournment
 - 9. Send a report of the District Meeting to THE WASHINGTON RURAL CARRIER.
- 10. Make a report of the years' activities at the State Convention. The written report is kept on file.
- 11. Entitled to one (1) vote at the State Convention as a member of the Board.

Section 5 Any officer failing to fulfill the duties of the office by January 1 after election shall be taken in hand by the Board, which shall have the power to request the resignation of the officer.

Section 6 The DELEGATE AT LARGE to the State Convention. It shall be the duty of the Delegate-at-Large to: have a written report from the County Unit to be presented at the State Convention; be available to serve on a committee as appointed by the State President; chair the County Unit delegation; poll the delegates for guidance in matters which come to a vote; and report back to the County Unit on the business and events of the State Convention.

ARTICLE II (Duties of Committees)

Section 1 The Committee on Credentials shall examine the Credentials of all delegates to the State Convention.

Section 2 The Committee on Audit shall examine the books of the Secretary-Treasurer, as well as the reports of the County Units, and shall report to the State Convention when called upon.

Section 3 The duties of the members of the Committee on Constitution and By-Laws shall be: To examine all changes proposed for amending or changing the Constitution and By-Laws, and may propose changes themselves if they see fit. They shall examine and correct, when called upon, proposed laws governing the County Units, so the laws will not conflict with the National or State Constitutions.

Section 4 The duties of the members of all other Committees shall be those usual to such Committees and they shall report when called upon.

ARTICLE III (Revenues)

The revenues of this Auxiliary shall be derived from a per capita tax of Two Dollars (\$2.00) per annum per member of each County Unit plus National per capita tax.

ARTICLE IV (Amendments)

This Constitution and By-Laws may be amended at any State Convention by a two-thirds (2/3) vote of the members present.

ARTICLE V (Parliamentary Authority)

The Parliamentary authority of this Auxiliary shall be ROBERT'S RULES OF ORDER, REVISED.

ARTICLE VI (Governed by WRLCA Constitution and By-Laws)

In any matters not taken care of by this Constitution and By-Laws or the National Auxiliary Constitution and By-Laws, the Auxiliary shall be governed by the Constitution and By-Laws of the WRLCA until further action can be taken.

ARTICLE VII (Order of Business for State Convention)

- (I) Call to Order.
- (2) Invocation.
- (3) Singing of "America".
- (4) Roll Call of Officers.
- (5) Reading of Minutes or presentation of printed minutes.
- (6) Appointment of committees.
- (7) Report of Credentials Committee.
- (8) Report of Officers.
- (9) Report of Delegate-at-Large to National Convention.
- (10) Report of Standing Committees.
- (11) Report of Special Committees.
- (12) Unfinished Business.
- (13) New Business.
- (14) Election of Officers.
- (15) Election of Delegates to National Convention.
- (16) Installation of Officers.
- (17) Adjournment.

The order of business may be transposed at any time as occasion may require by a majority vote of the delegates at the State Convention.

ARTICLE VIII (National Delegate-at-Large)

The National Delegate-at-Large shall submit receipts for expenses incurred during National Convention in line with duties of that office not to exceed seventy-five dollars (\$75.00).

ARTICLE IX (County Charters)

A County Unit having three (3) or more members may obtain a charter and its membership must not drop below that number to hold its charter.

ARTICLE X (Mileage and Per Diem)

Section 1 Mileage and per diem shall be paid to State Officers when traveling to Board meetings, Booster Meeting, and/or Slate Convention, in an amount in accordance with the WRLCA, except when traveling in the same vehicle with a spouse receiving mileage and per diem Per diem will not exceed one (1) day per meeting.

Section 2 Each officer shall have mileage ready to submit to the Secretary/Treasurer

before the opening of the State Convention.

Section 3 The President shall be paid mileage to attend District meetings in an amount in accordance with the WRLCA rate unless traveling with a spouse who has mileage and per diem expenses paid.

ARTICLE XI (Officer Expense)

Section 1 Every State Officer, except the Secretary/Treasurer whose expenses &e recorded in the report, shall have an expense account not to exceed Fifteen Dollars (\$15.00) per year for postage and telephone expenses. In addition, the President may submit bills for other expenses in line with the duties of the office.

Section 2 Each Officer shall have an expense account ready to submit to the Secretary/Treasurer before the opening of the State Convention.

ARTICLE XII (Juniors)

Section 1 The Board shall appoint an Auxiliary member as the Junior Sponsor. This member should live in the area where the State Convention will be held and will be responsible for arranging for the activities and supervisors for the Junior Program at the State Convention. A schedule of Junior activities shall be ready in time to be printed with the WRLCA and Auxiliary Convention Program.

Section 2 A meeting will be held Monday morning, one-half (1/2) an hour prior to staring of opening session, with the parents of all Juniors and the Junior Sponsor.

Section 3 The Auxiliary will not be responsible for Juniors if parents, grandparents

or guardians are not on site.

Section 4 A decision for a Junior registration fee for State Convention will be made on a yearly basis by the Board. This information needs to be decided on by the First (1st) of April so it can be published in the Spring issue of THE CARRIER.

Section 5 Juniors shall be from six (6) years of age to twenty-one (21) years of

age.

Section 6 Guests of Junior members shall be known as Honorary Members and may attend State Convention Junior activities under the following conditions:

1. The registration fee will be double the Junior member fee;

- 2. Must have a letter of permission and release of liability from a parent or Legal Guardian for participation in activities that includes permission for an Association or Auxiliary Member to be responsible for the Honorary Member. This permission should specify the name of the Responsible Auxiliary or Association Member and should include the ability to make Emergency Medical Decisions.
- 3. Will attend but have no voting rights in the business meeting and election of officers of the Juniors. It shall be the responsibility of the Auxiliary Vice-President to insure that the Junior meeting will be conducted properly.
- 4. Honorary members are expected to attend all of the functions for Junior activities and not pick and choose between the activities they are willing or not willing to attend.
