#### Monday, June 24, 2002

At 9:05 a.m. a joint meeting of the Washington Rural Letter Carrier's Association and its Auxilian was called to order by Convention Chairperson, Ann Lamm, in the Admiral Ballroom of the West Coast Sheetale Hotel, Silverdale, Washington. President Schrup then asked all Ad-Hoc Trainers to come forward and be recognized. Next, the QWL-EI Facilitators were asked to come forward; none were in attendance. President Schrup then introduce Joyce Newman, NRLCA Auxiliary Secretary, as the Associations first guest speaker and presented her with an American flag pin also. President Schrup called the 96th Convention of the Washington Rural Letter Carriers' Association to order.

Secretary/Treasurer Becky Wendlandt then read roll call. All officers and delegates were present with the exception of Okanogan. Each Delegate-at-Large was asked to come forward and receive the Yea/Nay cards and redistribute to the other delegates in their county. President Schrup then read the Convention Standing Rules as follows:

#### **Convention Standing Rules**

- 1. Each session shall start at the time announced in the convention program.
- 2. The convention shall proceed using Robert's Rules of Order, Newly Revised (10th Edition).
- 3. Voting on specific issues shall be by the use of yea and nay cards.
- 4. Non-delegates may be recognized and allowed to speak at the discretion of the Chair.
- 5. Only duly elected and seated delegates shall be allowed to vote on issues before the convention delegates.
- 6. Before a member can make a motion or address the convention, the member must rise and be recognized by the chair, state his/her name, whether a delegate or non-delegate, and his/her county affiliation.
- 7. Resolutions shall be read and it no objection is voiced, they shall be considered passed at the sound of the gavel by the Chair.
- 8. All resolutions objected to shall be brought before the delegates for consideration after all resolutions have been presented.
- 9. Resolutions not passed at first reading shall be presented to the delegation for consideration. The delegate who objected to the resolution shall be allowed to present his/her argument or call for clarification at the second reading. The delegate at large for the county of origin or a designee shall be allowed to present the first arguments for the resolution.
- 10. During the second reading of resolutions, the time limit for consideration shall not exceed 10 minutes including all amendments to the resolution unless extended by a majority vote of the delegates.
- 11. During consideration of resolutions at the second reading, the con and pro shall alternate with a 2-minute time limit per person.
- 12. If there is no opposing position to be presented, the resolution shall be brought to an immediate vote of the delegates.
- 13. Campaign materials may only be distributed at or near the entrance of the convention floor.

14. The reports of the Officers of the WRLCA shall not be read to the delegation. Time shall be set aside during a question and answer period on the first day to allow delegates to question or comment on the reports. Reports will be available for dissemination in the morning on the first day of the convention.

These rules shall be in force throughout the convention unless amended by a 2/3's vote of the delegates.

Bill Allen made a motion to accept the Convention Standing Rules as read and Judi Peck seconded. The motion was voted on and passed. President Schrup adjourned for a short break at 10:37 a.m.

President Schrup called the meeting to order again at 10:55 a.m. Secretary/Treasurer read roll call All officers and delegates were present with the exception of Okanogan. President Schrup then read the following: "WRLCA Constitution and By-Laws, Article 1, Section 2B, states in part: "On the first day of the section the President will ask the elected convention delegates to decide by voting if they want to posed Resolutions and Constitution and By-Law changes from the floor during new business." New Buchanan made a motion to accept Resolution changes from the floor and Monte Hartshorn seconded. The motion was voted on and passed. Bill Allen made a motion to accept Constitution and By-Law changes from the floor and failed. Vice-President Particles and read the procedures presenting a Resolution from the floor. She read:

By-Laws, Article I, Section 2B

"On the first day of the State Convention the President will ask the elected convention delegates to decide by voting if they want to hear resolutions and proposed constitution and by law changes from the floor decide by business. The Resolutions Committee and Constitution and By laws committee will only be responsible to resolutions and proposed constitution and by law changes that have been submitted and passed by county units. If the delegation decides to hear resolutions and proposed constitution and by law changes from the floor decides to hear resolutions and proposed constitution and by law changes from the floor decides in the delegate who is submitting it must use the proper form, haven enough constitution." I have attended all Board Meetings, District Meetings, and as many county meetings as I could, and I plan to attend the State Convention and National Convention to represent the wishes of Washington Rural Carriers across the State. I answer telephone calls and E-mail as soon as I possibly can, and I enjoy visiting with rural carriers about issues of importance to our craft and association. After this disastrous arbitration and the poor count, I believe it is even more important for rural carriers to stand together and be strong. We can get through this. doing their part to help the Postal Service survive. It looks to me as if the rural carriers have been chosen to bear the brunt of the cost saving. I know when we were children, we would often say, "It isn't fair," and our parents would laugh and explain that life isn't fair, and we should just deal with what happens. However, it is not easy to deal with all the unfairness that came about from the arbitration. The only good news is that we have been told that Arbitrator John Calhoun Wells will never preside at another arbitration for us.

From May 19 to Mary 22, 2002, I attended the 2002 State Presidents' Legislative Seminar in Washington, D.C., with President Dan Schrup. Dan and I listened to Ken Parmelee and Cara James talk about issues of importance to the Postal Service and to rural carriers, including the Postal Modernization Act of 2002, as the NRLCA supports the effort to pass comprehensive postal reform legislation; the Use of Pre-Tax Annuities for FEHBP Premiums, S 1022/HR 2125, which would allow Federal and Postal retirees to use pre-tax dollars to pay their Federal Employee Health Benefits Program (FEHBP) insurance premiums, just as regular rural carriers can do with the Flexible Spending Account; Protecting Postal Service

Employees and Customers, and the NRLCA requests Members of Congress to support the full \$799 million FY 2003 appropriation for the Postal Service; the Tax Treatment of Rural Letter Carriers' Expenses, S 860/HR 2350, which will allow us to either deduct 100 percent of our EMA or have the alternative option of filing the actual expense method for employee business expenses; the Government Pension Offset Reform to help Civil Service Retirement System retirees whose Social Security spouse or survivor benefits are cut by an amount equal to twothirds of the retiree's CSRS annuity; and lastly, the Windfall Elimination Provision Modification of Social Security, HR 1073, which will modify the formula of the Windfall Elimination Provision to allow those of us who are on the Civil Service Retirement System and have paid Social Security at other jobs to keep from losing up to 55 percent of our Social Security benefits. Dan and I visited all 11 of your Washington State representatives in Washington, D. C., and we were pleased that they took notes and appreciated the one-page position papers that Ken

and Cara had developed for us. Incidentally, it is important to have only one issue on each page when we contact our representatives, as the issues are filed away under the subject.

Jim Slaughter, NRLCA Parliamentarian, spoke to us about Running a State Convention, State Constitution and Bylaws, Roberts Rules of Order, and State Board Policies. I gave copies of this information to Washington State Secretary-Treasurer Becky Wendlandt, and I have recommended that Jim speak to the Secretary-Treasurer National Conference. I have also been responsible for receiving the Carrier of the Year nominations.

#### 2002 ANNUAL REPORT OF WRLCA SECRETARY/TREASURER REBECCA WENDLANDT



Hello Fellow Members of the WRLCA and Honored Guests:

Looking back on this 01/02 year has been challenging, yet inspiring. Besides the National events which has upset all our lives, this has been the year for learning more about the Access program in conjunction with the upkeep of our 2,700 names data base, as well as working with the State Secretaries from Connecticut, Colorado, and Illinois, at our National office to develop the membership data base that can be used by all State Secretaries alike. We also are developing an SOP (Standard Operating Procedures) for all State Secretary/ Treasurers in the Quick Books Accounting Program, and creating a detailed calendar for all. Our Goal working at the National Office is to have a SOP so good, that anyone with computer skills and a little help from a neighboring State Secretary, or a Resource State Secretary, can be up and running within a day. I still remember starting as State Secretary in 1993 with no computer, so we have come along ways!

#### **MEMBERSHIP:**

Here are some membership stats:

93/94: 1342 members

94/95: 1633 members (reliefs went on dues withholding this year)

95/96: 1732 members (start of TRC designation)

96/97: 1752 members

97/98: 1805 members 98/99: 1785 members

99/00: 1773 members (new designation of PTF created this year)

00/01: 1738 members

01/02: 1749 members (National started a nation wide membership drive)

The good news is that our number of TRC's dropped in half from last year, thanks to the efforts of our State Steward and Assistants and Area Stewards. We still have 196 non-member regulars (941 regular members) and 485 non-member reliefs (468 relief members) that I send a mailing to twice a year, and National also sends a mailing to twice a year, to recruit them. Thanks to the recruitment efforts of the Ad Hoc Trainers, local stewards, board members, and this year the National Recruitment Drive, we are giving our best to increase membership. I am developing a plan this year to spread out the membership recruitment efforts to other members in our State (we have so many capable members who would be excellent at this), thus hoping to spin a different type of recruitment drive and increasing our numbers.

#### **BUDGET AND FINANCES:**

The WA-RLCA (and the craft!) really lost out due to the prolonged negotiations and arbitration because during the period that the contract was expired, no increases were made to the salary schedule, therefore, the dues structure that was passed to try to help keep the association "current" financially has not really been in force. The board and the stewards were very conscious of this and careful with each penny (to the point of donating even more time!). Because of this, we are doing better this year compared to the financially disastrous years of the past (Loss of \$ 8,288 for 00/01 Year; Loss of \$ 36,650 for 99/00 Year; Loss of \$ 1,460 for 98/99 Year)

This loss is a constant reminder not to let our dues drop because, just like with our budgets at home, it takes years to make up a loss of income. Although we will not have a loss this year, the MAIN reason is because we do NOT adequately fund some of the important trainings and programs in the steward program, as well as STILL expect our area, assistant, and State Steward to donate their own time and money to do their jobs. This has got to STOP, as we are doing what we file grievances about with management to our stewards. We Must give them the LWOP they need to complete their jobs without taking away from their families, just like if they were working their route. We MUST give them time off from the phones, and yet have a system that covers

the phones every night, that compensates who is managing the "hot line". This is not a "want to do" but a "MUST DO", to complete our duty of fair representation, as well as not overwork and burn out our stewards.

This takes money, and we need to make sure we fund this program, instead of making a steward feel guilty to use a day of LWOP to do their job! When you answer the question from a member "What do I get with my dues" you should be able to say, "See what our stwards are doing for you!" I think we need to let the members know what that is. Read Charles article if you have any questions how our stewards are under attack right now, and giving their heroic best to help the craft. Thank you Stewards, and thank you Charles for leading the fight! Remember, what has happened with our arbitration is not our Stewards' fault; so don't take it out on them! Their job gets little or no thanks as it is!

Did you know that Charles E mail updates are so popular that the other State Secretaries have asked to be on it? Charles has developed a information system that is used by the Nation, yet we still expect him to work his days off, answer E mails every night, purchase his OWN laptop and other equipment



be available any time a member calls. We actually expect more of him, and the other stewards, then a paramedic, firefighter, and police, because they get time off! Is this how we expect the Postal Service to treat us? I am asking us all to unite on doing the right thing by our stewards, and encourage and stand behind a budget that will pay for it!

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For 02/03 year so far, (the delegates voting at this convention can change that), our dues are \$378.00 for regulars (Nation's highest dues are \$390.00); \$100.00 for reliefs (Nation's highest dues are \$143.00); and \$54.00 for retirees (Nation's highest dues are \$61.00). Illinois is the highest state for regular carrier dues of \$390.00 (their relief dues are \$130.00), and they voted this in after being in the positive for years, and having almost a year's working capital in the bank. Their delegates saw the need to keep the money coming to help support their expanding steward system, and not draw on their reserves. Remember, Illinois is a state that the carriers have the same income as us based on our route evaluation, yet their cost of living can be double ours in many areas. Many times you will find the lower dues are in States such as Alabama, Georgia, Indiana, Kansas, and Mississippi that have an almost triple retirees membership then ours, which help to bring in dues that do not need steward representation normally.

- 4. The Assistant State Stewards will notify the State Steward on their LWOP usage. The State Secretary will send a copy of the Assistant State Steward vouchers to the State Steward.
- 5. The Area Stewards will notify the appropriate Assistant State Steward prior to using LWOP.

2. Campaigning in the "Washington Rural Carrier" will be unedited, no more than 1/4 of page in size, and must fit the paper's format.

August 16, 1998 Renton, WA

- 3. No board member shall include campaign announcements in their reports including the intent to run for reelection or for any other position. Reports are not to include candidate endorsements. March 5, 2001 Everett, WA
- 4. The WRLCA Secretaries office will make available to any candidate or candidate's campaign, self-adhesive, pre-printed address labels of all WRLCA Officers, State Steward, Assistant State Stewards, Area Stewards, and County Officers for any campaign announcement or mailing desired. The fee for the labels is 4 cents each. Requests must be made in writing and sent to the WRLCA State Secretary. The request must contain a statement that the purpose in obtaining the labels is for the announcement or campaigning related to the individual seeking a state officer position and/or as a delegate to national convention. A copy of that mailing must also be included with the request for the WRLCA files. The recipient will receive an invoice for the number of labels on the list at the time of mailing from the State office.
- 5. The WRLCA Secretaries office will also provide the Department of Labor rules concerning the use of the WRLCA membership's address being available for campaigning for state officer position and/or as a delegate to national convention. Once Department of Labor rules are complied with, the WRLCA State Secretaries office will honor any reasonable request by a WRLCA member candidate/delegate to distribute campaign literature to all WRLCA members at the candidate's expense. Requests will be honored in the order received. Campaign literature must be provided to the Secretaries Office in sealed, return address affixed, stamped envelopes, which are ready for mailing. Each candidate should check with postal officials to determine the proper postage.

The hourly cost to affix the label to each envelope will be the responsibility of the candidate, and the recipient will receive an invoice for the hourly cost at the time of mailing from the State office. The hourly cost will be the same hourly rate as a 48 K, step 12. The candidate will also need to provide with the request a statement that the purpose in using the WRLCA's membership labels is for the announcement or campaigning related to the individual seeking a state officer position and/or as a delegate to national convention. A copy of that mailing must also be included with the request for the WRLCA files.



# 2002 ANNUAL REPORT Charles Alexander WA State Steward

National Director of Labor Relations Randy Anderson, Fellow Officers, Delegates, Members of the NRLCA and the Washington Rural Letter Carriers' Association, Guests, and Friends:

We are at a critical time in our history as a craft and a Union. The Postal Service convinced an arbitrator to change our count period and enough of our standards so the average rural route in America lost over 3 hours in evaluation. Many carriers lost significantly more than 3 hours, and nearly all of us were dumb-struck by the feeding-frenzy zeal of the District Analysts who redlined markups, R time, loading time, and more, well beyond anything approaching reasonable or within the guidelines of Postal manuals. These unprecedented actions by the Postal Service have driven a wedge into the cooperative spirit that used to define our craft's relationship with senior management and has caused some of our own members to blame the Union for management behavior that was clearly beyond our control. As State Steward and the person responsible for seeing that the State's resources are efficiently allocated to cover all actual and anticipated needs for steward representation, it is my opinion that more than ever, we need to pull together to challenge management's assault on our evaluated system. As you will hear later in my report, your stewards have accepted the challenge by increasing their already staggering grievance workloads. My challenge to you is to raise your own level of knowledge of the rules and regulations that govern our craft and then seek to become as involved in your Union as your personal commitments will allow. Those who think turning from the Union to go it alone is a wise decision need to be convinced that only when they choose to exercise strength in numbers through their own and the personal involvement of others will we all collectively be able to counter the built-in advantage given to all employers.

#### **HUMAN RESOURCES**

Our stewards are among the most valuable human resources of the Union. All that stands between you and management's doing whatever they choose are the stewards who process your grievances and defend you from misdirected or over-zealous discipline.

Please welcome new Area Steward Patrick Pitts, a rural carrier in Port Orchard. Patrick is also a local steward in his office, and he will be helping rural carriers in Port Angeles, Poulsbo, and Silverdale, as these three large offices do not have local stewards at the present time. As you know, Area Stewards act as local stewards in up to 20 offices, and it is often the case that those offices without local stewards are the offices most troubled. Thank you, Patrick, for volunteering to be an Area Steward.

Pasco Post Office is no longer drudgery. No rural carriers are now working in the windowless room, and the formula was thrown out, happily for the Pasco rural carriers. Joyce has worked with the rural carriers, postmaster, and other managers in Pasco, and the rural carriers now have an atmosphere that they deserve. Hats off to Joyce and the new postmaster, but most of all, thank you, Pasco rural carriers, for not giving up, even in the worst of times.

At the present time, we have approximately 60 Step 2 grievances that the Assistants are handling. Some-

times the Assistants will meet on 10 or more grievances in a single day, and each of these grievances is very important to the individual grievant. Stewards try very hard to keep in touch with the grievant, letting the grievant know what is happening with the grievance at any particular time. Contact between the steward and the grievant is of the utmost importance, as situations change, and the steward needs to be kept informed of any changes. The

steward also needs to alleviate the anxiety that the grievant is going through, wondering what is happening at each step of the grievance.

I should mention here how important it is to communicate. When you have questions or concerns, please contact the Assistant State Steward assigned to your office, and if you do not hear back in a day or two, please call or E-mail the Assistant again, as messages can get lost or not be delivered. If possible, E-mail is the better way to contact the stewards, as it is then possible to reply late at night, without having to worry about whether a telephone call would awaken the caller. Of course, we realize that not everyone has E-mail, and telephone calls are quick and easy, even though a bit more expensive for the caller.

As you probably know, the Assistants are a fragile group, mostly because of their extreme workloads. From time to time, various Assistants have had to temporarily take time off from being Assistants, and each time they temporarily leave, one has to wonder if they will come back. We have lost Assistants in the past, sometimes for family reasons, sometimes for health reasons, and often, just because the workload is devastating. As I often say, "Stewards see the dark side of life, both from managers and rural carriers."

Area Steward Janice Sisley has been working hard to get local stewards in the offices she represents. If she can get a local steward in Shelton, she will have worked herself out of the position of Area Steward. Of course, Janice is also in charge of distributing Email articles to those local stewards who do not have E-mail at the present time. Thank you, Janice, for encouraging rural carriers to be the local stewards in their offices. Local stewards are paid Z time (Steward Time) when they are having Labor-Management Meetings (up to four times a year, if necessary), working on grievances, and interviewing/investigating problems and

investigating problems and grievances. After 8 hours of Z time has been accumulated by the local steward, then the local steward may take a day off at his/her discretion, providing a leave replacement is available. It is hoped that by having management pay for steward time, the number of grievances and problems in an office may be fewer.

When Area or Assistant State
Stewards have to go into an office, then it is the association that pays for the mileage and time. If there are no financial consequences to management's misdeeds, then there is no reason for them to try to get along with us, other than the goodness of their hearts, and after the arbitration and disastrous count, who among us believes in this anymore?

Area Steward Dan Schrup has a reputation of being firm, with a "take no prisoners" attitude. In truth, Dan follows the contract and supports the rural carriers in his offices. At this time, Dan helps take some of the load off Assistant State Steward Marc McIntosh, as Dan's offices are Colbert, Kettle Falls, Liberty Lake, and Ottis Orchards.

Assistant State Steward Joyce Patteson has been instrumental in resolving problems in the Pasco Post Office. I am sure that you remember that Pasco has been one of our most troubled offices, with mistreated rural carriers moved into a small, windowless room, the formula instituted into the office, and numerous grievances having to be filed. I am pleased to let you know that Pasco is now one of our best offices. There is a new postmaster who treats employees with dignity and respect, employees do not mind going to work, and at long last, working in the

Sometimes it is difficult to come back after representing someone who has been removed for alleged stealing, salacious behavior, violence, absenteeism, delay of the mail, destroying the mail, or even more often, just because a manager has it in for a particular rural carrier. At the present time, we have 6 removals the Assistants are working on, and this takes a great deal of energy and time. We have no assurance that we will get these rural carriers back, and we cannot guarantee them that they will get back pay if they do get their jobs back. Sometimes it takes more than a year after a rural carrier is removed before the grievance is settled, as it is unlikely that management at the local level, where the rural carrier was removed, will change their minds and bring the rural carrier back to work. Then the grievance is sent to Step 2, where it may take two or three months to discuss and receive a decision. After that, if a denial is received, the grievance goes to Step 3, where it can linger for six months or more. At that time, a decision is made on whether the grievance should go to Step 4 if it is denied at Step 3, and if a denial is reached at Step 4, there is always the arbitration process, but never again, I can assure you, with Arbitrator John Calhoun Wells as the arbitrator

There still continues to be more grievance activity in the Seattle District than in the Spokane and Portland Districts combined. As mentioned before, the Seattle District is on a course to try to bankrupt the union by denying legitimate count time. I have thought of asking for mediation between Delivery Programs and the union, but frankly, with the present group of employees in Delivery Programs, I cannot imagine that any of them would agree to meet with us to try to resolve problems in a civilized manner. One of the analysts once said that grievances were a cost of doing business, missing the point that rural carriers do not file grievances in a frivolous manner, as does the craft she once worked in. Management attitude is bad out there, essentially driven by Delivery Programs declaring that rural carriers are cheats and thieves, even though the evaluated system has been profitable for both the Postal Service and for rural carriers. The golden goose has been shot through the heart, and many states already have proposed resolutions to have rural carriers be on the clock. This should be a huge discussion at the National Convention in August.

To give you an example of the unprecedented grievance activity being assumed by your Assistant State Stewards, the June workload for the four Assistant

From all of the above, you can see how important it is to have a local steward in every office, as the local steward knows management and can often sit down and work out problems right in the office, at the lowest possible level, one of our mandates. Again, remember that local stewards are paid for steward time by the Postal Service.

At the present time, we have 70 local stewards (5 vet to be trained and certified), and even though this is not Steward Appreciation Week, please take the time to thank these local stewards, for they are on the front line, trying to do their best for the rural carriers in their offices, treating everyone with dignity and respect, and being sure that disparate treatment does not occur. Thank you, local stewards, for being the backbone of our steward system. Your hard work is very much appreciated.

#### **GRIEVANCE STATISTICS FOR 2001-2002**

I had hoped to bring better news to you this year about Washington grievance statistics, but once again, Postal management in the Seattle District has caused rural carriers grief, both for count issues and for contract and discipline issues. It has not been an easy year for any of our stewards; in fact, this has not been an easy year for rural carriers across the State and Nation. That being said, let's look at the grievance statistics for this year:

10 Step 3 Appeals of contractual grievances

8 Step 3 Appeals of serious discipline

- 2 Carefully edited Last Chance Agreements to avoid more serious discipline
- 2 Grievances remanded from Step 3 to Step 2 reappealed to Step 3
- 2 Disability Retirements approved for removed carriers
- 2 Removed carriers put back to work
- 8 Grievances withdrawn at Step 2
- 1 Grievance sustained at Step 2
- 20 Grievances settled at Step 2
- 5 Step 2 grievances remanded to Step 1
- 13 New grievances held in abeyance at Step 2 to bring total of grievances in abeyance to 30
- 1 Unfair Labor Practice filed which will be settled when the parallel grievance is ultimately appealed to arbitration

**WORKING WITH FLAWED SYSTEM** I think all of us realize that we are working with

flawed systems. We can start with the arbitration of our contract, the disastrous count, the rampant redlining/disallowances, contractual language that rarely requires management to do anything, and the unlikelihood of being able to resolve many grievances at Step 1, 2, or even 3.

Even if we give Arbitrator John Calhoun Wells the benefit of the doubt, and not many of us are willing to do that, and even if we grant that he thought that raising our salaries by 1.2% and 1.8% for the years we have been without a contract would make up for the change in our standards, and even if we believe that in an arbitration, each side asks for more than they think they will get, using this as a bargaining chip, let's face it, folks: We were taken advantage of by this arbitration of our contract.



To add fuel to the flame, the good, little city carriers who negotiated their contract were rewarded with 1.3% and 1.9% for the same time period. For some reason, the Postal Service has for-

gotten that the rural carriers have not arbitrated a contract since 1986; we have always tried to negotiate, and we would have done so for this contract, had we not been insulted by the Postal Service offer of a \$500 lump sum in lieu of a raise and discontinued COLAs. Our National Officers had no choice but to go to arbitration. No reasonable rural carrier would have accepted this slap-in-the-face offer from the Postal Service.

It was our hard luck to have to negotiate after 9-11 with all it brought, including lower mail volume. By the way, if any Postal manager says to you that the arbitrator gave us the new standards, then please don't accept these words, as the arbitrator would not have imposed these unfair new standards on us had the Postal Service not asked for these standards. In my humble opinion, the Postal Service was negotiating by asking for these standards, and the Postal Service was surprised to get the standards they requested, the one exception being 18 letters per minute instead of 20, a pittance of a difference.

The changes in our standards and the change in the time of the count hurt our evaluations, as did the low mail volume. Wouldn't you think that a reputable employer would realize that this was enough of a hit for a rural carrier? As the State Steward of Idaho relayed to me, "It is as if your dog got run over and and then you went out in the road and kicked it."

We were kicked as hard by the red-lining/ disallowances run rampant by Delivery Programs as by the arbitrator's Postal Service driven ignorance. Let's look at the situation during count: There is a Pre-Count Conference where management and rural carriers agree on the parameters of the count, the managers and counters in the office

measure, count and/or time each required task, and the Forms 4241

are sent in, awaiting the results of the count. Then in some Districts, especially the Seattle District, Delivery Programs looks at the information and declares that it is not

reasonable, so all the time is disallowed. Wait a minute: Delivery

Program people were not in the offices during count in most cases, although in Bainbridge Island, I was informed that two analysts from Delivery Programs came into the office three times to be sure flats were not counted as parcels, even if the flats had to be crammed into the case, damaging the parcels and making the rural carriers on these routes embarrassed to deliver the damaged parcels to their customers. Isn't it interesting that it took two analysts to make each of these three visits? Does the Postal Service really have this much money to waste?

There are other instances of red-lining/disallowances going awry: All Saturday closure time disallowed. all riffling disallowed, Edit Book/Red Book time reduced to 1 second a week, and so on. It seems to me that postmasters and counters should be trusted to correctly count the mail; instead, they are treated as though they are not capable of enforcing the rules. When all time is disallowed, the manager and rural carrier may resubmit the time, or submit a lower time, but since the time was recorded accurately, then the resubmitted time is a falsification. What happens to a rural carrier who submits an incorrect trip sheet? Wouldn't it be better to allow the count figures to stand as they are, and if there are any problems, then at the next Count Training, managers could be instructed better?

I have been told that I will not be allowed to attend Count Training for managers next year. Judi, Shawn, and Patricia were not allowed to attend Seattle District Count Training this year, as Delivery Programs said that they were disruptive. Does Delivery Programs think that it is disruptive to correct misinformation that is being given out to managers? Is this another instance of the count training being skewed to cheat the rural carriers once again.

and an analyst from
Delivery Programs taught the Count
School. It was not until
Feist retired that Delivery

Pro- grams in Seattle decided that secrecy was the way to handle count.

Incidentally, Patricia wrote to Seattle District Operations Programs Support Manager Bob Nelson to implore him to forget about red-lining/disallowances during the February-March 2002 count, as the Postal Service would realize a huge savings just from the change in standards, the change to two weeks in February-March, and the low mail volume. Needless to say, we are still receiving red-lining/disallowance letters for offices in the Seattle District.

We never used to have all these red-lining/ disallowance letters, and I have been told that since rural carriers receive any overtime as part of their retirement, then if management can cut our routes, then our retirement will be less. However, I think much of this red-lining/disallowance letter mess is a justification for the large number of analysts in Delivery Programs. If these people were not doing redlining/disallowance letters, what would they be doing?

I hope that all of you are documenting and/or grieving any legitimate time that was red-lined/disallowed. Some rural carriers are not grieving the time if it does not change their evaluation an hour, but my thinking is that evaluations should be correct, especially since the evaluation establishes the base for the route. Suppose your route gains enough boxes and miles for 60 minutes? Managers are being told to send a Form 4003 with the Edit Books/Red Books, and sometimes it takes 72 minutes to go

to the next hour, so if you send in 60 minutes worth of boxes and miles, and this is not enough for your route evaluation to change an hour, then you will have to wait until the next 60 minutes to get an hour change, so it has taken you almost two hours to get a one-hour change in evaluation. Always before, most of us have waited until we had an extra box or two to send in the request for an increase in evaluation, but now the information is being sent in the moment we reach 60 minutes.

As to contractual language that allows management to do nothing, I am thinking of the times that the contract says "may" instead of "must." We all know that "may" means "no" to many managers, especially the ones who have not recognized that dignity and respect will get them loyalty and honor from their employees. I believe we need stronger contract language so that we can insist on management following the contract and doing the right thing. Look at the Matrix: Management "shall" from time to time revisit the Matrix. This language is way too loose, letting management drag their feet, and leaving the Matrix often with big holes where leave replacements should be.

We are told to solve grievances at the lowest possible level, but in count grievances, managers are saying that they will be disciplined if they agree to resolve these grievances. I have heard of a manager who got a Letter of Warning for upholding the proper time for an item in count. Managers have come out of their offices, shaking their heads, telling rural carriers that they were not going to lose their jobs just to do the right thing during count. Can I prove any of this? Would any manager be willing to stand up and say that this is happening? I think not. We need to realize that managers are people, too, with families to support. They cannot risk doing the right thing just because it is right. I used to be more idealistic about this, for I believed that telling the truth and supporting one's fellow employee should carry weight over saving one's job or promotion.

Alas, I now understand that pragmatism is rampant in the Postal Service, especially with managers. Should they tell the truth and support our count claims? Of course, they should. Will they? In most cases, they will not, as they have been threatened and coerced. I feel saddened at the present state of the Postal Service.

At Step 2, the Assistants have a chance to resolve issues, but grievances that go to Step 3 are unlikely to be settled, unless they truly should have been settled at Step 1 or 2. Many grievances are held in abevance for years, and often the rural carrier has retired or moved to another route. When some grievances are finally settled, rural carriers have been working at higher evaluations, and in some cases, all this time they should have had lower evaluations and more days off, so Letters of Demand are issued, to the chagrin and surprise of the rural carrier. Sometimes we can invoke DACA 3 or 5 and get the grievance adjudicated to a "wash," meaning the money is equal, but in some cases, it seems that the Postal Service wants to punish the rural carrier who grieved the situation, so the fight is on, costing the Postal Service and the association much more time and money than necessary. Years ago, a manager in Delivery Programs told me, "The Postal Service has deeper pockets that your Union," and this is right, but at this time, settling grievances at the lowest possible level is good business sense both for management and rural carriers.

#### THE NEED TO STAY IN TOUCH

This year more than any other since I became State Steward, I have recognized an increasing desire of rural carriers to stay informed. We have had an arbitration award that came on suddenly; a count that we did not have time to prepare for, although interestingly enough, it does seem that managers had plenty of time to prepare; questions about pay; and the uncertainty of 9-11 and anthrax, mixed with the low mail volume. As has often been said,, "Knowledge

# PROVIDENT GUILD REPORT JUNE 2002 PATRICIA ALEXANDER

The Provident Guild is a Fraternal NON-PROFIT Death Benefit Department, open to all Regular, Substitute, RCR, RCA, and PTF Rural Carriers and their spouses. The only requirement is that the person enrolling must be 55 years of age or under, so be sure to enroll before you hit 56. Your choice of benefit classes ranges from \$10 to \$50 a year, and the available classes depend on your age at the time of application.

For instance, if you are between 50 and 55, your annual dues class would be \$10, and your maximum benefit would be \$1,000. Your heirs would receive 30% of this benefit, or \$300, immediately after the Provident Guild Secretary-Treasurer receives notification of your death. At the end of the fiscal year, a check for the balance will be sent. 100% of the annual dues is returned to the beneficiaries, pro-rated among all the claims for that year, and as we say with a smile, "Be sure you die in a year when not many people die so your heirs will receive more money!"

Your benefits DO NOT decrease as you grow older, and your dues payment remains the same. The class you choose remains in effect as long as you pay your dues. Once you are enrolled, you may stay with the Provident Guild as long as you pay the yearly dues. The way prices are now, \$10 a year will barely pay for two or three lattes a year, and wouldn't it be better to use this \$10 to give your loved ones an immediate inheritance to pay bills until your life insurance arrives?

If you would like to join the Provident Guild, please contact me so that I may give you enrollment forms.

#### RURAL CARRIER BENEFIT PLAN INSURANCE (RCBP) REPORT FOR 2002 STATE CONVENTION REBECCA WENDLANDT

Hello fellow rural carriers:

You may wonder what your union provides for you, especially if you are a relief carrier waiting for a regular route position. I know, I waited for 10 years! Here is very brief overview of what the NRLCA has provided for union members:

✓ RCBP Health Insurance for Regular Carriers and is also for relief carriers, however the relief carriers must pay 100% of the premiums. This is NOT a HMO (some call this Group Death), you get to choose your doctors, are encouraged to get second opinions, and has the most complete cancer coverage of any plan in the federal insurance benefit package. It has a GREAT mail in prescription plan that for a 3 month prescription costs only \$13 generic or \$18 brand name. It has a very limited dental plan, a routine eye exam benefit, 24-hour nurse line, and renal dialysis benefit.

- ✓ Delta Dental Group Wrap Around Coverage For Those With RCBP: Check into the no waiting period for dental coverage with this wrap around the RCBP dental insurance coverage. It is cheaper premiums then just the Delta Dental alone, and you will see extra coverage then what is available with RCBP.
- ✓ NRLCA Life Insurance Plan for all Members (regulars, PTF's, reliefs, and retirees) under age 60 which has up to \$200,000 term life, \$40,000 accidental death and dismemberment, and two family life insurance plans to choose from.
- ✓ New Vision Program for Members (regulars, PTF's, reliefs, and retirees), and their families. This is the latest out and is provided through Avesis Incorporated. There are two different plan options, superior and standard, with the standard option also available for your extended family.
- ✓ Voluntary Long Term Disability Income Protection Plan for regulars only. This plan has two choices, Option 1, which replaces up to 50% of our monthly rate of basic salary tax-free after 60 days of disability, or Option 2, which replaces up to 60% of your monthly rate of basic salary tax-free after 90 days of disability. I personally could not find a plan on the open market that would cover a rural carrier for this amount and type of insurance, especially at this rate! This covers you 24 hours a day, 7 days a week, no matter if it is accident or sickness!
- ✓ Group Long-Term Care Insurance. This coverage is provided to All Members (Regulars, PTF's, Reliefs, and Retirees) of the NRLCA under age 80 AND spouses, parents, stepparents, and parents-in-law of NRLCA members! Long term care covers confinements for skilled nursing care, intermediate nursing care and custodial care up to \$100 per day while in a nursing care facility. It also pays benefits for non-confinement care including home health care, adult care and respite care.
- ✓ Delta Dental Insurance: This is for all members, regulars, PTF's, and reliefs, and provides a comprehensive dental coverage for yourself, your spouse, and your entire family. Costs range depending on what region you live in.

During the mail count in March 2002, it took Washington State's rural carriers and their reliefs 60,499 hours to complete 58,873 hours of evaluation. Another way to look at the data is the following: The average standard hours for Washington State ended up being 44:16 for 6 days. Those same 44:16 hours took the carriers and relief carriers who worked during count 45:29 to complete. Is there anyone in America who thinks our standards were too high? If so, how about now?

Effective July 13, 2002 the equipment maintenance allowance (EMA) will increase from 38.0 cents per mile to 39.0 cents per mile.

Employees providing auxiliary assistance or serving auxiliary routes under provisions of Article 9, Section 2.J.5, receive an EMA of 39.0 cents per mile or \$4.50 per hour, whichever is greater, not to exceed the amount provided in the special equipment maintenance for the route stops and miles.

Dan then asked for copies of the Constitution and By-Law changes to be distributed to the Association. Mr. Anderson thanked the Associa-

tion and recalled that this was his third visit to Washington. He told a little about himself and how he started out as a rural carrier in 1976. Randy proceeded to speak on the following issues:

 Membership - approximately 1500 new members, good success with the National Membership Drive, Washington is a little below the national average.

 Website for Members - want only members to access, looking into using a portion of the members social security number for a password.

 Rural Carrier Benefit Plan - low participation is troubling to the board, encouraged everyone to look at the plan and especially its benefits, Caremark pharmaceutical for prescriptions.

 GMAC Insurance Company - used to be National General, relationship with the postal service is going on 50 years, great plan, asked everyone to into and again examine the benefits.

PAC - More important now then ever, it needs our support for us to be a major player, referred to UPS's involvement, we must pay attention to our Pac leader and legislation.

QWL-EI (Quality of Work Life - Employee Involvement) - AJSC's (Area Joint Steering Committee) divided, talk after arbitration in regards to the mail count was QWL-EI was possibly not such a good idea, National Board does not want to sever ties right now as dignity and trust values would be damaged, less attention is being paid to the workplace environment, a majority vote at National is needed to withdraw from QWL-EI.

- Arbitration Decision from 2-4-02 Spring '99 meeting was priority of the Board to discuss the financial (budget) challenge for this negotiation, Fall '99 more money to city carriers from general fund and National Board walked out of negotiations, talks began again and received tentative one-year extension, September negotiations began again with a fact-finding mediation process, decision in January not all in our favor, one item was a reduction is the time standard, mail count in September was an orchestration by management not seen before, unprecedented results called for three Step 4 grievances to be filed, last mail count not be thrown out but asking for another one than to pick which one to be used, membership supported the arbitration however it came at the worst time as confidence in the US Postal Service is down.
- Labor Relations waiting now for the denials then they will be appealed, 16 cases to the National docket, stated Article 16:6, wants to protect employee to no discharge imposed on said employee unless higher up management agrees.
- National Arbitration rigid articles in magazines, sizing on CD's (compact discs)
- Step 4 Grievances Step 3 hearing officers in each area, increase in number of appeals, hearing officers are now more confident
- Safety part of the Auxiliary Program, 280 rolled/runaways in the country, always be aware when getting
  out of your vehicle and keep focused on the job.
- Postal Service in General financial problems causing concern for over the next few years, we must operate like a business and provide service agreements as each customer is different, we must raise revenue and cut costs, MIRS (Mail Item Retrieval System), PARS (Postal Automated Redirection System)
- Electronic Recording of Time cannot afford to work off the clock working with time standards,
- standard hours against actual hours, rewards efficient and diligent workers, fair days work for a fair day's pay.
- National Convention in Portland, Maine, this year, National Board proposing the minutes not be published per batum.

Randy Anderson thanked the Association for their attentiveness.

President Schrup called for a break at 2:45 p.m. Dan called the meeting to order again at 3:00 p.m. He asked the Randy Anderson, NRLCA Director Labor Relations and the State Officers to come forward for a question and answer period.

- Q: With the new time standards since H routes have Saturdays free, can they (H route) be paid if they've volunteered to work their free Saturday because an RCA was not available? Pat English
- A: No, you're not going to get it when you've volunteered. Randy Anderson
- Q: In regards to the Postal Service arbitration and the National Magazine using our words against us, also used against us was the extreme expenditure they put into rural QWL-EI. Has this been addressed by the National Board? Jim Hemrich
- A: Non publication will not guarantee total immunity but it will take that away from them. I'm not sure if the NJSC has addressed the QWL-EI issue and the millions of dollars spent on QWL. Randy Anderson
- Q: I'm concerned about using our whole social security number to access our website with hackers and the issues with identity theft. Donna Roakes
- A: It's being discussed as one possibility. Only a portion of the member's social security number would be used as a password. Randy Anderson
- Q: Since our social security number is on the #4240 forms, which are on the clip boards that sit out, why couldn't someone get the number from that to access the website? Sharon Madison
- A: Nothing is going to be a full proof measure to guard some ones privacy to access the website. These clipboards in question should not be left sitting out with these forms on them. They should be put away (i.e. closed drawer). Randy Anderson
- Q: Regarding QWL-EI and the Board deciding not to pull out, it seems management gave QWL-EI a lot of lip service and not really supported to the lower management levels. Why does the National Board feel differently about it now? David Ray
- A: It's not perfect, but hopefully it opens up some communication. Before QWL we didn't see anyone but a postmaster. This allowed us to meet more of the higher ups. Many things have come out of the QWL process. Even in its imperfection we should not abandon at this time. Randy Anderson

- Q: In regards to the Seattle District, what the labor relations did, and the delivery programs costing lost of money, where does the Board stand on it costing so much? If it were a rural carrier, how and how long would they have been disciplined? Renee' Cowan
- A: We don't have the ability at this time to penalize. We can only have full control if we 'buy the store'. Even though we have very capable stewards, we still have to deal with the other side civilly and professionally. Unfair labor practices may be a possibility. Also, unless something falls through, the Inspector General for the Postal Service will be at our National Convention this year. Randy Anderson
- Q: Back to the Step 4. In talking with a local steward, a carrier in an office had put in to have a Monday through Friday off on an H route. They did not know they had to put in on the leave slip the two Saturday's they get free. The leave slip was denied. Can this be resubmitted? Monte Hartshorn
- A: If they have the leave available and somebody to work their route, submit another #3971. If unreasonably denied, file a grievance. No Step 4 in this instance. Randy Anderson
- Q: If a carrier calls in sick on a Friday at the end of a pay period and cannot get a leave slip submitted, and does not get one submitted by the Monday following when these hours are recorded, then they'll be charged with LWOP. Can an issue like this be trouble-shooted? Maybe some type of an affidavit? Shawn Johnson
- A: We're looking into using some type of legal form for situations like this. However, I was not aware of these specific instances. I'll look into. Randy Anderson
- Q: If you submit for a week of leave, the post office has to grant or deny the entire time. Can this time be split up? Sharon Madison
- A: The entire time period will be either granted or denied and it is up to you to accept or not. Randy Anderson.
- Q: I wrote a resolution binding to the Board on route adjustments. It passed at State Convention and at National but it died at the Board. What happened to it? Something needs to be done with these route adjustments when transferring territories. Donna Roakes
- A: Task Force I studied the issue and came up with an alternative, however it was more complex, and it was not accepted by the Board. To my recollection no further efforts on a direction was given to Task Force I to go back to the drawing board. This was not a conscious oversight to not revisit. I'll make a not of this and take it back to the Board at the pre-convention meeting. Randy Anderson
- Q: What's the perspective on the evaluations received from last mail count regarding the contract settlement with the NALC? Marc McIntosh
- A: I wasn't shocked. The NALC wasn't afraid of anything; they got their big win in '99. They were not going to get anything better. Randy Anderson
- Q: When Tacoma, a few years back, talked about annual leave in Article X, it was not detailed. Now with the new arbitration award, there are new things to consider (i.e. LWOP on Saturday's for J routes, Saturdays for H routes). What trumps what? Who get priority? We need rules to count on. Charles Alexander
- A: Most carriers are getting their time off when wanted. If the membership wants to pass a resolution to have looked at in the next negotiation on leave, how it requested, and who gets it, than the National Board should set about to do so. Other crafts leave is taken by seniority. The problem is the shortage of leave replacements. We have to look at the situation as the majority wanting to change the system or is just the minority impacted. Randy Anderson
- O: Can new members attend the committee meetings?
- A: Anyone can go to listen or give ideas to the committees. However, the Tellers Committee will not allow you to look at any of the ballots. Dan Schrup
- Q: There was a resolution submitted to National, and had passed at National, to look into right hand drive manufacturers past and present. A special committee was suppose to be assigned. Has a committee been assigned and what are some of their results? Janice Sisley
- A: The committee was appointed. As a result, in Portland, Maine, at National Convention, there will be two vehicles to look at. Both have had everything under the dash replaced just as if it had been made at the factory this way. Randy Anderson
- Q: Once an issue goes to Step 4, is denied, than set up for arbitration, what is the process of getting it actually addressed? How long does it take? David Ray

A: When at Step 4, they're heard as quickly as possible. Each one is discussed many times; not just once. It seems at times there's a little too much deliberation. Hopefully by July 24, we're looking at having discussed every case at least once. Lately we've been able to meet often; hoping this will speed up the process. Randy Anderson

Q: How do you approach someone who is working off the clock? Is it an insurance risk? Carolyn Triebenbach

A: They must be approached. Possibly address this issue to your postmaster. If still no help, a grievance may have to be filed. And yes, this is a big insurance risk. Randy Anderson

Q: The Spokane district had a mandatory safety talk that after returning to our vehicles, after each dismount, we were to walk entirely around the vehicle and look under the vehicle. Should not an extra dismount distance be given for this extra time? Also, in regards to address placements. On TV Guide and such, the Spokane CSA says they measure from the spine of any such bound item, outward. Now since coupon books, as an example, would be measured like this, should we not be receiving flat rate for these instead of letter? Jim Hemrich A: On the label orientation issue, we have some language that is very favorable to us and some very favorable to them. It really hasn't been a big issue in the past; but now as we've had things taken away from us, the smaller issues are beginning to get noticed. (Neil Buchanan and Ed Koschalk gave testimonials at this time regarding the insurance plan and the excellent cancer insurance coverage. Each spoke of nothing having to be paid out of their pocket on medical and only a very small amount on prescriptions.)

President Schrup adjourned the meeting at 4:20 p.m.

# **Tuesday, June 25, 2002**

President Schrup call the meeting to order at 8:30 a.m. Convention Chairperson, Ann Lamm, asked the Convention Committee to come forward. She thanked them for all their help and presented each one with a 'Thank you' basket. Secretary/Treasurer Becky Wendlandt read roll call. All officers and delegates were present with the exception of Okanogan. President Schrup then asked for the final report of the Credentials Committee. Chair Donna Lower read the following:

The Credentials Committee recommends that all delegates be seated by the passing of the final report of the Credentials Committee." Paula Kenck made a motion to have the final report of the Credentials Committee be accepted and Donna Roakes seconded. The motion was voted on and passed. Becky Wendlandt made a motion to reconsider previous motion of accepting the Credentials Committee final report and to amend the report by adding a delegate seated to Kitsap county. Ann Lamm seconded the motion. The motion was voted on and passed. The Credentials Committee read the amended final report. Donna Lower made a motion to accept the amended final report of the Credentials Committee and Donna Roakes seconded. The motion was voted on and passed. (The report is typed to reflect the amendment.)

Secretary/Treasurer Becky Wendlandt distributed the Yea/Nay cards.

President Schrup then asked that guest speaker, Randy Anderson, come forward again to address the Association. Mr. Anderson spoke on a the following issues:

- Labor Relations Issues complaints are being withdrawn from the Labor Board; cases must be filed in a
  timely manner, papers (i.e. documents, letters) must be sent to the grievant as soon as possible, file can be
  charged against grievance made.
- Good News index came out relating to the EMA, going up one cent by mid-July (Randy then took questions from the Association.)
- Q: In reading the MOU (Memorandum of Understanding) for vehicles, if the carrier the purchased a new car and now the postal service is putting a vehicle on the route, the carrier no longer has a choice. We signed that memorandum before we had the choice of an LLV (Long Life Vehicle) or OEMA (Optional Equipment Maintenance Allowance). Why did National do this? Donna Roakes
- A: You are still protected by the three-year clause in the original MOU on a vehicle. There is no more OEMA. If we (National) agreed to this there would be 15,000 vehicles, and they made us agree that the carriers not have the right to decline taking these vehicles. It was a give and take situation. Randy Anderson
- Q: During spring booster meeting, we heard there was a discussion during arbitration about trying to increase EMA. It's figured at the LLV cost of \$.62 per mile and we're getting \$.39 per mile EMA. The Postal Service figures carrier drives 75% of their vehicle on the route and 25% for personal use. Shouldn't we, based on these percentages, be getting more? Jim Hemrich
- A: The Postal Service believes that in 1995 we settled the EMA issue forever in going with the CPI-W Index, which involves maintenance issues along with the gas. In negotiations we were unable to get an increase. The \$.62 per mile also includes an administrative cost. A carrier only uses the vehicle for 5 days on the route and the other 2 days as personal use. Trying to get an increase in EMA is one of the hardest issues to negotiate.

EMA was never intended for purchasing a vehicle or providing insurance; maintenance only.

Q: In a formula office, I have carriers that have been regulars for 10-14 years and they've reverted back to Wednesday, Thursday and Tuesday days off. Is this ever going to change? Is this PTF and formula deal in forever? Any chance of these carriers ever getting back to Saturdays off? Larry Madsen

A: All of those issues will be on the table when we enter into negotiations for the next contract. I don't believe an office will be unformulated unless we get full complimented leave replacements. Extension talked a lot about formulating an office but no much on how to get out of one. I do believe the formula is here to stay and probably not changing through negotiations. At least the formula should guarantee and day off. Randy Anderson

Q: Regarding the grievance paperwork you spoke about earlier, who is that paperwork suppose to go to? Pat English

A: The grievant is to receive what we call 'the moving papers'.

Q: My office really no longer meets the criteria for being a formula office. Can we not just drop the formula since we don't fit the criteria any longer? Sandy Peterson-Smith

A: No. The formula will not just go away. The fact that some RCA's are sitting at home on a Saturday is not uncommon to hear; that can happen with a formula office. In the next contract we may need to make an attempt to change the language, but at this point, we have what we have.

President Schrup thanked Randy Anderson for providing the Association with answers to their questions. Dan then asked Sandy Reppe to come forward. Sandy spoke about her battle with ovarian cancer, the diagnosis, and the treatments she's gone through. She also spoke on prevention, testing, and facts. She thanked the Association for their love and support. President Schrup called for a break at 9:45 a.m. President Schrup called the meeting back to order at 10:00 a.m. Secretary/Treasurer Becky Wendlandt read roll call. All officers and delegates were present with the exception of Okanogan. Lynn Walker spoke briefly to the Association on PAC pins to be handed out to the member contributing to PAC. Each pin represented a different dollar amount donated.

President Schrup then asked for the Mileage and Per Diem Committee to come forward and give their preliminary report. Chair Janice Sisley introduced the committee as Jack Stewart and Sandy Peterson-Smith and read the following:

Preliminary Report of the Mileage and Per Diem Committee

"This is the preliminary report of the mileage and per diem committee. Round trip mileage and per diem for delegates-at-large, state paid delegates, board members, State Steward, Assistant State Stewards, and Area Stewards were computed using a door-to-door mileage program. Mileage was computed at \$.30 mile and per diem at \$70.00 per day for the 3 days of the State Convention. If anyone feels that their mileage is incorrect, or anything in this report is incorrect, please contact the committee immediately." (This report is typed later in the minutes when the final report was submitted.)

President Schrup then asked for the Finance Committee to come forward and give their preliminary report. Chair Joyce Patteson introduced the committee as Doug Rinehart, Cheryl Freeman, and Susie Hill. Copies of the report were distributed to the Association. Joyce then read the following:

**Preliminary Report of the Finance Committee** 

"We, the members of the Finance Committee at the 2002 State Convention in Silverdale, WA., have the following recommendations to submit to the delegates for consideration:

- We recommend that the dues structure remain the same.
- We recommend that the money returned to the county units remain the same.
- We recommend the salary for State Steward, Senior Assistant State Steward, Assistant State Stewards be increased by \$50.00 per month and the Editor be increased by \$50.00 per issue; Secretary/Treasurer and Area Stewards be increased by \$25.00 per month.
- We recommend the mileage be increased by \$.03 per mile and per diem increased by \$5.00 per day.
- We recommend the State Convention allowance, the Retirees Function at State Convention, and the Door Prize allowances remain the same.

Other Committee Recommendations as follows:

- 1. Next year's committee should review and possibly increase the mileage allowance.
- 2. The committee should review and possibly increase the per diem amount.

3. The steward salary schedule should be increased.

4. The Finance Committee can make no knowledgeable recommendation without a complete annual financial statement from the Auxiliary; therefore, no change is proposed.

We recommend a Constitution and By-Laws change to increase per diem for State Convention to 3 1/2 days. This is to address a safety concern. As many delegates are repeat delegates, and during a two-year cycle they are close to home one year and across the state the other year, this would average out the 1/2 day additional per diem per year for the possibility of a late Wednesday afternoon adjournment and the need for a room Wednesday night to prevent unsafe travel.

(The report is typed later in the minutes, as a whole, when the final report was submitted.)

President Schrup then asked for the report of the 2003 Convention. Noretta Stritzke read the following Report of the 2003 State Convention in Leavenworth

"Dates for the 2003 State Convention are Saturday, June 21, 2003, staring with the board meeting, Sunday, Jun 22, 2003 for the Labor Relations Training, and Monday through Wednesday, June 23, 24, and 25, 2003 for the State Convention.

The 2003 State Convention will be at the Enzian Inn at Leavenworth. Room rates are \$105.00 (\$116.55 including tax) for one queen size bed and \$110.00 for two queen size beds (\$122.10 including tax) based on double occupancy.

The charming village of Leavenworth is nestled in the heart of Washington State, at the foothills of the Cascade Mountains. Known as the "Bavarian Village", Leavenworth offers a unique and intriguing place for fun-filled family vacations, romantic getaways, and quick day visits.

The Enzian Inn is located in Leavenworth, on the famous Cascade Loop. It is 22 miles west of We-

natchee, 187 miles west of Spokane, and 116 miles east of Seattle.

ing: Report of the 2004 State Convention in Bellingham

The delegates were then asked to come forward and receive their verification and commitment forms to fill out and return to Secretary/Treasurer Becky Wendlandt. Mike Cammack then made a motion to have the report of the Tellers Committee accepted. Judy Peck seconded and the report was voted on and passed.

President Schrup then asked for the report of the Auditing Committee. Chair Renee' Cowan introduced the committee as Melvin Walker and Karen Crombie. Karen then read the following:

# **Report of the Auditing Committee**

"We the Auditing Committee find:

- 1. The Association's receipts were accurately reflected in the records.
- 2 The Association's disbursements were properly accounted for and made for legitimate purposes. We compared random samplings of vouchers and receipts to paid out entries in the check ledger and compared copies of checks to the ledger to verify the checks written matched the ledger entries and we checked to see if the account balanced at the end of each month.
- 3. There is a careful and complete accounting of wages, LWOP, and other corresponding disbursements (i.e., payments for unemployment tax, workers comp., 401K's, etc.) for employees of the Association and a complete file of W02's for each employee.
- 4. There is an accurate inventory of the Association's fixed assets (office equipment), stating value and location of each item.
- 5. There are complete files of LM forms for county units and copies of each county's end of year bank statements to provide a method to safeguard assets in county accounts.
- 6. All vouchers paid by the State Secretary/Treasurer are reviewed by the President and Vie-President to safeguard State Association funds.
- 7. There are copies of all forms complete for the IRS.

While we did not review all records available, we believe our random sampling to be a good indicator of the accuracy of the Secretary/Treasurers records. We commend our State Secretary/Treasurer for organized record keeping and wish to thank her for her help while we completed our task."

Renee' Cowan made a motion to have the report of the Auditing Committee accepted. Karen Crombie seconded and the motion was voted on and passed. Bill Allen made a motion to dismiss the Auditing Committee with the Association's thanks. Doug Rinehart seconded and the motion was voted on and passed. President Schrup adjourned for lunch at 11:30 a.m.

President Schrup called the meeting to order again at 12:45 p.m. Secretary/Treasurer Becky Wendlandt read roll call. All officers and delegates were present with the exception of Okanogan. Dan then asked for the report of the Washington Rural Carrier. Chair Jim Hemrich introduced the committee as Monte Hartshorn and Janie Walla. Jim read the following:

# Report of the Washington Rural Carrier Committee

"We, the Washington Rural Carrier Committee, believe the paper in its current form and number of issues is not meeting the needs of the membership, and this represents no reflection on the current or past editors.

This committee is making the following three recommendations to improve upon the services and benefits provided to the membership by the paper, and to the position of editor itself.

- 1. We recommend that the 'Washington Rural Carrier' be published monthly, ten issues per year, with the months of August and December excluded. this more frequent publication schedule would provide for better dissemination of much needed information to the members in a timelier manner, as well as reduce the required size of each issue to 8-16 pages form the present 32 plus. We estimate the increased annual expenses incurred in providing more frequent, smaller issues, to be approximately \$500 to \$600 in printing costs, and an as yet undetermined amount in mailing costs. Such a change would necessitate revisions to Article V of the WRLCA By-Laws (and Article VIII of the WRLCA Constitution) at a subsequent state convention.
- 2. We recommend that the Editor's elected term be increased to two years from the present one year. This

would facilitate the Editor's (a) familiarization with the job, (b) setting up a bulk or periodicals mailing permit, and (c) creating a working relationship with a suitable printer.

3. We recommend against allowing the publication of letters to the editor and/or opinion pieces in the 'Washington Rural Carrier', with the understanding that this issue will be addressed more fully by the assembled delegates present here in the consideration of Resolution #4."

Monte Hartshorn made a motion to have the report of the Washington Rural Carrier accepted and the committee be excused with the Association's thanks. Janie Walla seconded and the motion was voted on and passed. President Schrup then asked Dave Reppe to come forward and give a talk about the history of the WRLCA. Dave read the following:

# History of the WA-RLCA

"The year 2003 marks the 100-year anniversary of the NRLCA. But what is the history of the Washington State Rural Letter Carriers Association? The first rural route in Washington was started in Yakima in 1897. The first carrier was Frank Fry.

In 1904 when the Washington State Rural Letter Carriers Association began to organize, the total salary was \$600.00 a year. There was no maintenance allowance or any other benefits such as holidays, paid vacations, retirement benefits, sick leave with pay, no disability compensation, no longevity pay, no paper to keep us informed, no Washington D.C. office to look after and take care of our interests. Today we have all of these things and many more.

The first county unit in the State of Washington to organize was Whatcom County on March 13, 2904. Pierce County was the second county to organize on August 17, 2904. Charles P. Fenton of Tacoma was instructed by the National Organization to organize the state of Washington, and was offered assistance in the effort by the R.F.D. News

The <u>R.F.D. News</u> sent a sample copy of the paper to all cities in the state having rural delivery containing appeal for organization. Clarke County organized on October 15, 1904. Yakima County organized on October 28, 1904.

With four counties organized, Fenton arranged to hold election of State Officers by mail giving nominations to the counties in the order of their organization.

Whatcom County No. 1 chose the office of President and nominated Sherman Johnson of Custer. Pierce County No. 2 chose office of Secretary/Treasurer and nominated Charles P. Fenton of Tacoma. Yakima County No. 4 chose Vice-President and Named C.H. Furman of Toppenish to the position.

In 1905, all carriers in the state of Washington received copy of January R.F.D. News. On January 20th at South Tacoma, Washington State was formally organized. C.R. Fenton received two dollars to cover postage and expense of organization.

"It is the hope of the state officers that each county will organize as soon as possible and send in their dues to the Secretary/Treasurer. The dues are 50 cents a member for state and 50 cents a member for national dues. Any carrier in a county can call a meeting of the carriers, and when you meet elect your officers, adopt a constitution and by-laws, appoint a regular date for meeting and meet on those dates. The officers of the state will assist you as much as possible to get organized."

On February 20, 1905, the secretary received 50 blank county charters form F.K. Churchill of Oregon State Association for a cost of \$3.75. The charters were filled out, signed, and delivered to the four branches. County Charter fee was 50 cents.

On May 9, 1905, sent for State Charter, and sent letters to various counties urging the need of organization. Received discouraging letters from Whatcom and Clarke Counties. Also received letter from Windsor, Editor of R.F.D. News to be read at our State meeting. Offer from Harrington MFG. co. of Peoria, Illinois, to furnish free receipt book, order books, and letterheads. Offer accepted.

Received offer of Cunningham of Association Cart toe given to delegate attending National Association from this state. Made effort to secure someone to accept the offer. Made arrangements for carriers in organization to give \$2.00 each toward paying expenses of delegate. Vice-President Furman agreed to go but changed his mind. Sent credentials to the Oregon delegate asking him to represent us but he failed to attend.

August 15, 1905 received state charter. State executive committee decides to raise the price of a county charter to one dollar. Also received National Association request for twenty-five cents special assessment per member.

Thurston County refuses to organize on November 19, 1905.

King County carriers met in Seattle and arranged organization and elected officers. Met at Kent February 22, 2906, and completed organization and adopted constitution. Arranged union meeting of King and Pierce Counties at Auburn, May 30. On July 25, visited Thurston County Carriers at Olympia and secured their promise to organize. Letter received from President Lindsay of National Association. Laid plans for State Meeting Labor Day to be held in Tacoma.

On August 16 Thurston County organized 3 carriers. On August 16 also received 22 car tickets from Tacoma railway and Power Co., for use of visiting carriers at State Meeting. August 21 Walla Walla County organized as Branch No. 7 with 5 carriers.

Received sample copies of <u>R.F.D. News</u> for use at state meeting. Received news of revival of Yakima Co. Branch No. 4. Received another letter from Editor of <u>R.F.D. News</u> to be read at state meeting. Letter arrived from Walla Walla for state meeting and nominating Wm. L. Mays for State Officer.

September 2 letter arrived from Ernest Seaton Secretary King County Branch No. 5 regretting his inability to attend state meeting and enclosing his report of visit to Snohomish Carriers in which he finds them indifferent toward organization.

Pierce County Association arranged to provide for all visiting carriers so that they were to no expense while in the city.

On September 3, 2906, the first Washington State Rural Letter Carriers state meeting was held at the Y.M.C. A. in Tacoma and was called to order by C.P. Fenton at 9:00 a.m. Treasurer's report showed that \$53.65 was received and that \$47.65 was spent leaving a balance of \$6.00. Officer's elections: President Homer L. Clark of Kent, Vice-President Wm. L. Mays of Walla Walla, and Secretary/Treasurer C.P. Fenton of Tacoma.

Resolutions were adopted as follows:

- 1. Whereas, the rural carriers have been granted a fifteen day's vacation with pay, Resolved, That we appreciate and are thankful for the same.
- 2. Whereas, Come routes are being laid out very much in excess of twenty-four miles, Resolved, That we ask the department through the officers of the Nation Association that no routes under the most favorable conditions be made more than twenty-six miles in length.
- 3. Resolved, That we approve of the work of our national officers.
- 4. Resolved, That we appreciate the untiring efforts of our present state secretary in bringing the organization of the state to its present condition and trust that by continuing him in this office we will have the benefit of his ability in carrying on the work.
- 5. Resolved, That we thank H.H. Windsor, editor of the <u>R.F.D.</u> News for the interesting and instructive 1 letter addressed to this convention.
- 6. Resolved, That we thank the Y.M.C.A. management for the use of their rooms for the morning session of this convention.
- 7. Resolved, That we appreciate the notices given us by the press of this meeting
- 8. Resolved, That we thank the Tacoma Railway & Power Company for free transportation for our visiting delegates to Point Defiance and return.

Roll call of the Counties: Whatcom, was not represented; Pierce, 4 carriers; Clarke, no represented; Yakima, not represented; King, 4 carriers; Thurston, 1 carrier; Walla Walla, represented by letter only. The selection of National Delegate was left to the Executive Committee. Adjourned to meeting in Tacoma on September 2, 1907.

He also asked if anyone has any pictures and/or memorabilia, to please contact him for their use at National Convention for the 100 year anniversary. President Schrup then asked for the final report of the Mileage and Per Diem Committee. Chair Janice Sisley read the following:

# Final Report of the Mileage and Per Diem Committee

"This is the final report of the mileage and per diem committee. Round trip mileage and per diem for delegates at large, state paid delegates, board members, State Steward, Assistant State Stewards, and Area Stewards were computed using a door-to-door mileage program. Mileage was computed at \$3.0 mile and per diem at \$70.00 per day for the 3 days of the State Convention."

# RESOLUTIONS PASSED AND SUBMITTED BY THE COUNTIES TO THE 2002 WRLCA STATE CONVENTION SILVERDALE, WASHINGTON

#### Submitted by Chelan Douglas County:

#### 1. Non Binding

Whereas, no one in our craft should be trapped in less than full-time employment,

Therefore, be it resolved for both regular and relief carriers, the basic geographical unit for the accrual of seniority and bidding rights shall be expanded so that an office with no route rated at 39:30 Standard Hours (40H), or higher, is considered to be a part of the nearest office, in the same District, having at least one route rated at 39:30 Standard Hours (40H), or higher.

<u>Intent:</u> The intent is to provide all craft members with a chance to achieve full-time employment while causing the absolute minimum impact on other craft members.

# Objected, Donna Roakes

Joanne Blackburn made a motion to adopt Resolution #1 and Tammy Donaghue seconded. Discussion. The motion to adopt the resolution was voted on.. Resolution #1 was defeated

Therefore be it resolved, that the NRLCA arrange for an independent legal review of the closed door session of the arbitration panel in the 2001 and 2002 contract arbitration, with such review to be conducted at NRLCA expense by a major independent law firm which is recognized as being skilled in the field of labor relations and which would have no conflict of interest in issuing an independent report to the NRLCA membership.

Intent: To get an understanding of the proceedings in the closed-door session that led to the 2002 Arbitration Award.

Therefore be it resolved, the USPS provide adequate supplies of this necessary equipment to all Post Offices with rural delivery, prior to the beginning of any mail count.

Intent: to insure uniform measurement of mail and time.

Joanne Blackburn made a motion to adopt Resolution #12 and Tammy Donaghue seconded. Discussion. The resolution was voted on. Resolution #12 was passed.

#### 13. Non Binding

Whereas some mailers are sending extremely large box-holders, in excess of 2 pounds (i.e. telephone directories weighing 4 pounds or more),

Therefore be it resolved, that a carriers receive auxiliary assistance or additional compensation to deliver these over size items and an extension of the 3-day deliver time limit.

Intent: Protect carriers from accidents due to over loaded vehicles and physical injury due to repeatedly holding these heavy items at arms length.

Resolution #13 was passed by the drop of the gavel.

#### 14. Binding to the National Board

Whereas the dues paid by the entire membership of the NRLCA were used to pay for our representation at Contract Arbitration,

Therefore be it resolved, that the National Board report to the membership (via the National Magazine) the cost incurred by the Association for Arbitration; including but not limited to: payments to expert witnesses, cost of presentation preparation, payments to Steve Smith to continue as our Representative on the panel, and payments to legal counsel.

Intent: Inform the membership on arbitration expenditures Object, David Ray

Joanne Blackburn made a motion to adopt Resolution #14 and Tammy Donaghue seconded. Discussion. Karen Crombie made a motion to table this resolution. The motion was voted on.

Resolution #14 was tabled.

#### 15. Non Binding

Whereas it is important for Convention Delegates to be well informed on current issues in the Postal Service.

Therefore be it resolved, that only delegates paying dues at the current active carrier rate, in their respective State, be able to vote on contract related issues.

Intent: Only active informed carriers would be voting on contract issues.

Object, Kate Gaffey

Joanne Blackburn made a motion to adopt Resolution #15 and Tammy Donaghue seconded. Discussion. Sharon Madison made a motion to postpone discussion on the resolution until the start of Wednesday's morning meeting. Renee' Cowan seconded. The motion was voted on and passed. (Wednesday morning continuation typed now.) Sharon Madison made a motion to amend the resolution by adding (paragraph 1) ".... important for National Convention..." and (paragraph 2) "....resolved that only the delegates to National Convention paying dues at the current RCA or regular carrier rate, in their..." and "....related issues, other than contract ratification." Also striking (paragraph 2) "....at the current active carrier rate,....". Intent: only informed carriers would be voting on contract issues. Renee' Cowan seconded. Discussion. The amendment was voted on and passed. Discussion. The resolution as amended was voted on.

# Resolution #15 was passed as amended.

# Submitted by King Snohomish County

# 16. Binding to the National Board

Whereas the recent Arbitration decision has adversely impact rural carriers paid under the evaluated system and,

Whereas the impact on non L and L routes is not the same, nor is the impact on high-volume routes and low volume routes the same and,

Whereas the Postal Service has now represented that the evaluated system is not an incentive pay system,

Therefore be it resolved, that the National Board shall study or cause to have studied the FLSA Sec 7 as it applies to rural carriers and the National Board shall evaluate or cause to have evaluated the Postal Service's National Payroll Hours Report and the Rural Route Master List for the purpose of reporting to the membership the relative benefits and drawbacks of remaining on the evaluated system for L and non L route carriers as well s H, J, and K route carriers, with a volume factor specific analysis included. The resulting report will be published in the National magazine and posted on the Association website prior to October 1 of each of the next three calendar years in order to allow rural carriers nationwide to review the material and apply the examples to their particular situation prior to the beginning of the guarantee year.

Intent: So that rural carriers will understand the relative benefits and drawbacks to becoming hourly employees, with enough information to allow for an informed decision and to provide for compliance with FLSA.

Object, Charles Alexander

Joanne Blackburn made a motion to adopt Resolution #16 and Tammy Donaghue seconded. Discussion.

Shawn Johnson made a motion to postpone indefinitely this resolution and Melvin Walker seconded. The motion was voted on.

Resolution #16 was postponed indefinitely.

Donna Roakes made a motion to adjourn the meeting until Wednesday morning at Convention opening and Ann Lamm seconded. The motion was voted on and passed. Secretary/Treasurer Becky Wendlandt collected the Yea/Nay cards. President Schrup adjourned the meeting at 5:00 p.m.

## Wednesday, June 26, 2002

President Schrup called the convention to order at 8:00 a.m. Secretary Treasurer read roll call. All officers and delegates were present with the exception of Okanogan. Becky then distributed the Yea/Nay cards. Myrtle Buchanan came forward to announce the Auxiliary scholarship, in the amount of \$500.00, would be awarded to Susie Walker, granddaughter of Lynn and Donna Walker. # 17. Non Binding

Therefore be it resolved in an office that has had the formula implemented; when a J route (assigned Saturday) becomes a K route, the office be re-formulated, and if the formula allows, the Saturday held by the former J route will be offered to all carriers in order of seniority.

# Resolution #17 was passed by the drop of the gavel.

# 18. Non Binding

Whereas Rural Carriers often have to adjust their budgets and time responsibilities due to changes in evaluation, Therefore be it resolved that a minimum two-week notification must be made to Rural Carriers before a new evaluation may go into effect due to a rural count.

<u>Intent:</u> Downward adjustments in route evaluations create hardships for carriers, especially when not given any time to prepare. Then tendency of the Postal Service to hold onto evaluation notifications until mere days before they take effect exacerbates this hardship.

Object, Donna Roakes

Joanne Blackburn made a motion to adopt Resolution #18 and Tammy Donaghue seconded. Discussion. The resolution was voted on.

Resolution #18 was defeated.

# 19. Non Binding

Whereas Article 9.2.K.1 e reads - Rural Carriers working Auxiliary routes..... Effective with the 1987 Christmas period, rural carriers performing service on an auxiliary route shall be compensated on the basis of hours worked in accordance with Article 8, sec 3,

Therefore be it resolved that leave replacements serving an auxiliary route during the Christmas period shall be compensated the greater of actual hours worked or evaluated route hours, in accordance with Article 8, sec. 3.

Intent: To remove a loophole that can prevent Auxiliary carriers from at least receiving evaluation during the Christmas period.

Resolution #19 was passed by the drop of the gavel.

# 20. Binding to NRLCA

Whereas actual time is not always counted for on Rural routes,

Therefore be it resolved that the NRLCA negotiate with the Postal Service, either through the contract or MOU, a way of properly accounting for all time not normally accounted for on Rural Routes.

Intent: The so-called "bump" hurt rural carriers during arbitration. However, if a rural carrier goes home sick after beginning a route, that time is not accounted for, only the time used to finish the route. There are many other examples, such as, if a route is split out the time is accounted as auxiliary time and not accounted to the route. Carriers helping subs during training, other P.O. employees being put into service on a route, Supervisors casing on routes are all examples of time used on a Rural Route that is not accounted for. Since this "free time" is not accounted for, it goes to the "bump" and makes it appear that less time than the evaluation is used on rural routes.

Resolution #20 was passed by the drop of the gavel.

# 21. Non Binding

Therefore be it resolved that if an office, currently on the formula, re-formulates and additional Saturdays are authorized, that the days vacated be offered "be seniority" to all other carriers in the office.

Intent: To establish a fair and consistent assignment of relief days.

Object, Judy Peck

Joanne Blackburn made a motion to adopt Resolution #21 and Tammy Dongahue seconded. Judy Peck made a motion to table the resolution and Mike Cammack seconded. The motion to table the resolution was voted on.

Resolution #21 was tabled.

# 22. Non Binding

Therefore be it resolved that if an office, who has had the formula implemented, loses or acquires leave replacements causing reformulating the office, any changes will be done be seniority.

Intent: To establish a fair and consistent assignment of relief assignments.

Object, Charles Alexander

Joanne Blackburn made a motion to adopt Resolution #22 and Tammy Dongahue seconded. Charles Alexander made a motion to table the resolution and Renee' Cowan seconded. The motion to table the resolution was voted on.

Resolution #22 was tabled.

# 23. Binding to the NRLCA Board

Whereas the NRLCA organization and officers are accountable to the NRLCA membership,
Therefore be it resolved that an accounting breakdown of all or portions of organization expenditure of
the NRLCA be made available upon request by dues paying members. Intent: This frees up detailed information to Association members when investigation how Association funds are spent.
(This resolution was revisited after the reading of Resolution #26.)

Joanne Blackburn made a motion to adopt Resolution #23 and Tammy Donaghue seconded. Dale Ryan made a motion to amend the resolution by adding (paragraph 2) "....paying members excluding associate members." Sharon Madison seconded. Discussion. The amendment was voted on and passed. Discussion. The amended resolution was voted on.

Resolution #23 was passed as amended.

24. Binding to the NRLCA Constitution and By-Laws Committee to Report Out

Whereas in the National Constitution and By-Laws, in By-Laws, Article III, Section B States: Within two months after the close of each National Convention or special meeting, to prepare for publication in *The National Rural Letter Carrier* a correct copy of the entire proceedings of the National Convention, or special meeting of the Association, giving a complete statement of the financial conditions of the Association and a statement of the membership.

Therefore be it resolved: Within two months after the close of each National Convention or special meeting, to prepare for publication in *The National Rural Letter Carrier* an overview, previewed and approved by the National Board, of the entire proceedings of the National Convention, or special meeting of the Association, giving a complete statement of the financial conditions of the Association and a statement of the membership.

<u>Intent:</u> Since USPS management also receives our National Magazine, and uses misquoted parts from our National Convention against us in arbitration, we do not want ALL the proceedings to be printed for them to use.

Resolution #24 was passed by the drop of the gavel.

25. Binding to the NRLCA Board

Whereas anyone with access to a computer and the internet can hit our NRLCA web site and gain information meant for members only,

Therefore be it resolved that the NRLCA board research a way to allow only members to access our NRLCA web site by using members social security numbers, etc., and thus blocking the use of our web site by non-members and management.

<u>Intent:</u> Only PAID members in good standing should be receiving the information on the web site, thus creating another reason to join the NRLCA.

Resolution #25 was passed by the drop of the gavel.

26. Non Binding

Whereas in offices with DPS, raw mail takes much more time to case then as when all the letters were raw mail, if you were to take an average of both. The reason being that your today raw mail contains the entire letter mail this illegible, misaddressed, insufficient addresses, and machine-mutilated mail.

Therefore be it resolved that the time standard in DPS offices be raised for raw mail to offset the fact that this mail is not of the same type as it was before the introduction of DPS.

Intent: Time factor should change because of the extra time needed for the higher percentage of unreadable mail.

Object, Donna Roakes

Joanne Blackburn made a motion to adopt Resolution #26 and Tammy Donaghue seconded. Discussion. The resolution was then voted on.

Resolution #26 was defeated.

(Marc McIntosh made a motion at this time to reconsider Resolution #23. Dale Ryan seconded. Discussion. The motion to reconsider was voted on and passed. Resolution #23 was typed in numerical order to avoid confusion.)

27. Binding to the State Association and Delegates at this Convention

Whereas the District III Representative position was vacated mid-term and was filled "pro-tem." According to the Association Con/By-Laws which includes Robert's Rules of Order and,

Whereas the President "shall report all such decision to the WRLCA at its State Convention for approval or rejection..." (By-Laws Art. I Sec 3) and

Whereas past practice of the Association (since before 1979) has been to elect District Officers at the mid-term convention when a vacancy has been filled "pro-tem." During the recess of the Convention,

Therefore be it resolved that the District III Representative should be elected and installed at the 2002 convention. Intent: Gives the new officer all of the rights of an elected and installed member of the Board. "Pro-tem" officers do not have the same rights, because it is just a temporary appointment by definition. Object, Lynn Walker

Joanne Blackburn made a motion to adopt Resolution #27 and Tammy Donaghue seconded. Discussion. Monte Hartshorn made a motion to postpone discussion this resolution until the agenda of New Business and Jennifer Steffensen seconded. David Ray made a motion to extend time by two minutes for discussion on this resolution and Melvin Walker seconded. The motion to extend time was voted on and passed. Discussion. The motion to postpone this resolution until New Business and it was voted on and passed. (The following was discussed at New Business, but typed in this section for clarity.) Monte Hartshorn made a motion to postpone Resolution #27 indefinitely and Jennifer Steffensen seconded. The motion was voted on.

# Resolution #27 was postponed indefinitely.

Therefore be it resolved to rescind this section of the M-38. Intent: Operations Program Support disallows legitimate "R" time. Management in post offices, along with counters have signified that this "R" time is correct. Resolution #29 was passed by the drop of the gavel.

# 30. Non Binding

Whereas RCA's receive COLA at the end of the contract,

Therefore be it resolved that RCA's receive any lump sum in lieu of COLA at the same time as Regular Carriers and that all COLA increases rolled into Regular Carrier's salaries be rolled into the RCA hourly wage at the same time.

# 31. Non Binding

Therefore be it resolved that regular carriers be allowed to work their relief days during count if they wish, with no additional premium pay.

Intent: Relief employees do not always know the rules for the count.

Resolution #31 was defeated.

Whereas an RCA who serves an Auxiliary route and is also a leave replacement on another route only earns annual leave and sick leave for the time served on the Auxiliary route,

Therefore be it resolved that the RCA who is the primary leave replacement on one route and also serves the Auxiliary route, be able to earn annual leave and sick leave when serving either route. Object, David Ray

Joanne Blackburn made a motion to adopt Resolution #32 and Tammy Donaghue seconded. Discussion. The motion was then voted on.

Resolution #32 was passed.

# 33. Binding to the NRLCA Board

Whereas in the past, the NRLCA National Board has held an annual Christmas party entertaining Postal Management people and,

Whereas in Section 535.12 (C) (2), "In addition, any non-rigid article that does not fit in the letter or flat separations (where flat separations are used) with other mail is considered a parcel. (This includes articles that have not been prepared in accordance with DMM 121.42c, even thought the mailer has endorsed them DO NOT FOLD OR BEND. These non-rigid articles should be carried and credited as parcels, provided they do not fit in the letter or flat separation (where flat separations are used) with other mail without damage to the article)

Therefore be it resolved to say "In addition, any non-rigid article that does not fit in the letter or flat separations (where flat separations are used) with other mail without damage to the article or to the other articles in the separation is considered a parcel. (This includes articles that have not been prepared in accordance with DMM 121.42c, even though the mailer has endorsed them DO NOT FOLD OR BEND. These non-rigid articles should be carried and credited as parcels, provided they do not fit in the letter or flat separation (where flat separations are used) with other mail without damage to the article or to other articles in the separation)

<u>Intent:</u> This will correctly give a carrier proper parcel credit for those items which, if cased, may not themselves be damaged by casing, but will cause damage (e.g. ripping, tearing, or crumpling) to other mail already in the case separation.

David Ray seconded. Discussion. The amendment was voted on and passed. The amended resolution was voted on.

Resolution #35 was passed as amended.

President Schrup called for a break at 10:20 a.m. Dan called the meeting back to order again at 10:35 a.m. Secretary/Treasurer Becky Wendlandt read roll call. The combined State and National portions of the per capita dues for regular carriers, part time flexible carriers, and associate members shall be 1% of the yearly salary of a 40 hour route at Step 3 on the salary schedule as of January 15 of each year. The combined State and National portions of the per capita dues for relief carriers shall be 25% of the regular carriers' per capita dues as calculated above. The combined State and National portions of the per capita dues for retirees shall be 12.5% of the regular carriers' per capita dues as calculated above. - 4. We recommend a Constitution and By-Laws change to increase per diem for State Convention to 3 1/2 days. This is to address a safety concern. As many delegates are repeat delegates, and during a two-year cycle they are close to home one year and across the stat the other year, this would average out the 1/2 day additional per diem per year for the possibility of a late Wednesday afternoon adjournment and the need for a room Wednesday night to prevent unsafe travel.

Donna Roakes made a motion to change the Area Stewards salary back to \$50.00/month and the Editor's salary back to \$400.00/issue and Tammy Donaghue seconded. A discussion followed. The motion was voted and failed. Another discussion followed. Neil Buchanan made a motion to have the final report of the Finance Committee accepted as read and Renee' Cowan seconded. The motion was voted on and passed. Bill Allen made a motion to release the Finance Committee with the Association's thanks. It was seconded by Joanne Blackburn and was voted on and passed.

President Schrup then asked for the final report of the Constitution and By-Laws Committee. Chair Judi Peck came forward as introduced the committee as Marlene Hagedorn and Patrick Pitts and read the following:

# Final Report of the Constitution and By-Laws Committee

"Thank you to my fellow committee members, Marlene Hagedorn and Patrick Pitts. A very <u>special</u> thank you to Becky Wendlandt, Secretary/Treasurer, who prepared all of proposed changes and the packet for the committee.

There were 27 proposed Constitution and By-Laws submitted by the counties for consideration by the delegates. Of the 27 proposed Constitution and By-Laws, one was improperly submitted by not having a signature or date affixed. For that reason Constitution and By-Laws #22 was deemed invalid and was eliminated. Fortunately, Constitution and By-Laws #21 is identical to #22.

The committee made some adjustments to Constitution and By-Laws #6. The committee felt this change would be creating a new 'officer' position and would need to be added to Constitution, Article VIII, Section I, and the By-Laws, Article III. However, since this change was basically incomplete, the committee requests the delegates decide whether #6 will be heard or sent back to the county for further research.

In the interest of keeping the voting clear that a Yea vote will pass the proposed Constitution and By-Law change and a Nay vote will fail it, the committee will read the proposed Constitution and By-Law change and then will move to approve it. Another committee member will second it. The President will then bring it to the floor for discussion. One delegate will speak for it and another delegate will speak against it until the end of discussion. It will then take a 2/3 vote to conclude."

# (1) In WRLCA Constitution, Article IV, Section 1

# **Present Language:**

SECTION 1 Each County Unit shall be entitled to one delegate for each five (5) members or major fraction thereof, and (1) Delegate-at-Large. The Delegate-at-Large is responsible for collecting the ballots for his/her delegation and for returning the ballots to the Teller's Committee after his/her county delegates have voted. Each County Unit is entitled to one (1) vote for each five (5) members or major fraction thereof and (1) vote for the Delegate-at-Large. Proposed Language:

SECTION 1 Each County Unit shall be entitled to representation in this Association by one Delegate-at-Large. Each County Unit is also entitled to one delegate for each (5) members or major fraction thereof of its own members, based on the current membership year. Each Credential and Seated Delegate is entitled to one vote. The Delegate-at-Large is responsible for collecting the ballots for his/her delegation and for returning the ballots to the Teller's Committee after his/her county delegates have voted.

# Intent and Reason of Change:

To reflect the language and procedure used by National and printed in the National Constitution and By-Laws. Marlene Hagedorn made a motion to accept proposed language and Patrick Pitts seconded. Discussion. The motion was voted on.

Proposed language was passed.

# (2) In WRLCA Constitution, Article IV, Section 4

## **Present Language:**

<u>SECTION 4 Election</u> of delegates shall be by *written or secret* ballot in all cases where there is more than one candidate for each delegate position.

Proposed Language: SECTION 4 Election of delegates shall be by written or secret ballot in all cases where there is more than one candidate for each delegate position. If there is a tie for a delegate position, the county shall hold another election to break the tie. The delegates shall be listed in order of votes received, with the Delegate-at-Large being the one who received the most votes.

Intent and Reason of Change:

To reflect the language and procedure used by National and printed in the National Constitution and By-Laws. Marlene Hagedorn made a motion to accept proposed language and Patrick Pitts seconded. Discussion. Neil Buchanan made a motion to amend by striking "....hold another election to break...." and adding "hold another ballot to break...." and Becky Wendlandt seconded. Discussion. The amendment was voted on and passed. Bill Allen made a motion to amend by adding "Election of State Convention delegates by county units shall be by...." and Neil Buchanan seconded. The amendment was voted on and passed. The amended Constitution By-Law was voted on.

Proposed language was passed as amended.

# (3) WRLCA Constitution, Article VII, Section 1

Present Language:

SECTION 1 The rules contained in ROBERT'S RULES OF ORDER NEWLY REVISED (1990 Edition) shall govern the Association in all cases to which they are applicable and in which they are not inconsistent with the State and National Constitution and By-Laws and any special rules of order the WRLCA may adopt.

**Proposed Language:** 

SECTION 1 The rules contained in current edition of ROBERT'S RULES OF ORDER NEWLY REVISED shall govern the Association in all cases to which they are applicable and in which they are not inconsistent with the State and National Constitution and By-Laws and any special rules of order the WRLCA may adopt.

**Intent and Reason of Change:** 

To reflect the language and procedure used by National and printed in the National Constitution and By-Laws. Marlene Hagedorn made a motion to accept proposed language and Patrick Pitts seconded. Discussion. The motion was then voted on.

Proposed language passed.

# (4) WRLCA Constitution, Article VII, Section 2

Present Language:

SECTION 2 Any elected delegate may call for a roll call vote.

**Proposed Language:** 

Take out all of Section 2 and renumber. Intent and Reason of Change:

To reflect and language and procedure used by National and printed in the National Constitution and By-Laws. Note: According to Roberts Rules, taking a vote by roll call (or by yeas and nays, as it is also called) has the effect of placing on the record how each member votes, therefore it has exactly the opposite effect of a ballot vote. If there is no rule on how many can call for a roll call vote, then it takes the majority vote to pass a roll call vote one a delegate has requested a roll call vote, thus abiding by the majority of the delegates wishes.

Marlene Hagedorn made a motion to accept proposed language and Patrick Pitts seconded. Discussion. The motion was then voted on.

Proposed language passed.

#### (5) WRLCA Constitution, Article VII, Section 3

Present Language:

<u>SECTION 3</u> A secret ballot vote can be called for by a simple majority vote of the delegates present at the State Convention.

**Proposed Language:** 

SECTION 3 A ballot vote can be called for by a simple majority vote of the delegates present at the State Convention.

Intent and Reason of Change:

To reflect the language and procedure used by National and printed in the National Constitution and By-Laws. Note: According to Roberts Rules a "ballot" vote is defined as "Voting by ballot (slips of paper on which the voter marks his vote) is used when secrecy of the members' votes is desired". We do not need to use "secret" in from of ballot.

Marlene Hagedorn made a motion to accept proposed language and Patrick Pitts seconded. Discussion. The motion was then voted on.

Proposed language passed.

6)

Whereas:

The position of WA-RLCA Secretary/Treasurer is a vital part of the State Board.

Therefore Be It Resolved:

That an unpaid position of Assistant to the WA-RLCA Secretary/Treasurer be created, so if anything happened that caused the office to be temporarily vacated, someone would be able to continue to operate the office in the current manner. There would be a one week training course paid by the WA-RLCA. The position would remain unpaid until activation was necessary. The Assistant Secretary salary would be the same as is currently paid the State Secretary if the position were activated.

#### **Intent and Reason of Change:**

Other State positions have back up persons knowledgeable in the duties and responsibilities of the office and location of important papers. The Secretary/Treasurer should have this also.

Tammy Donaghue made a motion to remand this change back to the county from which is was written for further consideration and clarification. Janice Sisley seconded the motion and it was voted on and passed.

# (7) WRLCA Constitution, Article VIII, Section 1A

# Present Language:

Each district shall nominate its own District Representative at a District meeting prior to the State Convention. Notice of said meeting will be sent to all members at least fifteen (15) days prior to the meeting. Such nominations shall then be presented to the Nominating Committee, who shall place them before the State Convention. In case no nomination is made by the District, the Nomination Committee at the State Convention shall select and place in nomination the name of a member of said District. Any delegate who is a member of said District is entitled to nominate from the floor any additional nominees who are qualified.

#### **Proposed Language:**

Each district shall elect its own District Representative at a District meeting prior to the State Convention. Notice of said meeting will be sent to all members at least fifteen (15) days prior to the meeting. Any delegate who is a member of said District is entitled to nominate from the floor any nominees who are qualified.

# Intent and Reason of Change:

To let each District elect a Representative of its own choosing, at their own District meeting.

Marlene Hagedorn made a motion to accept proposed language and Patrick Pitts seconded. Discussion. The motion was then voted on. Proposed language was defeated.

# (8) WRLCA Constitution, Article VIII, Section 5

#### Present Language:

SECTION 5 The election of officers shall be by secret ballot (secret ballot defined as written) of the elected delegates, with one vote per delegate in attendance, and in no case by acclamation except by unanimous consent. It shall require the majority of all votes cast to elect. Where there are more than two (2), the one receiving the least number of votes on each ballot shall be dropped until the election is won. In case of tie of the final tow, the elected delegates will decide with another secret ballot, with one vote per delegate in attendance, until the election is won.

#### **Proposed Language:**

SECTION 5 The election of Officers shall be by ballot and, in no case, by acclamation, except by unanimous consent, and where there is more than one candidate for the same office, it shall require the majority of all votes cast to elect; and where there are more than two (2) candidates for the same office after the third ballot, the one receiving the least number of votes in each succeeding ballot shall be dropped until the election is had. Write-in votes shall not be considered valid.

#### Intent and Reason of Change:

To reflect the exact language and procedure used by National and printed in the National Constitution and By-Laws. (Page 33)

Marlene Hagedorn made a motion to accept proposed language and Patrick Pitts seconded. Discussion. The motion was then voted on.

**Proposed language was passed.** President Schrup then took a short break at 12:20 p.m. for box lunches to be brought in. Dan called the meeting to order again at 12:45 p.m. The Constitution and By-Laws Committee continued.

# (9) WRLCA Constitution, Article IX, Section 3

# **Present Language:**

SECTION 3 The State Secretary shall arrange for the rental of two (2) post office boxes; one post office box for receipt of the ballots and the other for return of undeliverable ballots. It shall be the duty of the State Secretary to prepare a ballot listing the nominees for the position of Delegate to the National Convention. The State Secretary shall verify membership as of April 15 and mail said ballot to all April 15 listed members at least twenty (20) days prior to the opening of the State Convention. This listing of the nominees on the Ballot for

the position of delegate to the National Convention shall be in order of random drawing. Random drawing will be done on the 39th day prior to the opening of the State Convention at the State Secretary's office, with tow other WRLCA members present that are not nominated and listed on the ballot. Any member may observe the random drawing.

**Proposed Language:** 

SECTION 3 The State Secretary shall arrange for the rental of two (2) post office boxes; one post office box for receipt of the ballots and the other for return of undeliverable ballots. It shall be the duty of the State Secretary to have prepared a ballot listing the nominees for the position of Delegate to the National Convention. The State Secretary shall verify membership as of April 15 and the ballot shall be mailed to all April 15 listed members at least twenty (20) days prior to the opening of the State Convention. This listing of the nominees on the Ballot for the position of delegate to the National Convention shall be in order of random drawing. Random drawing will be done on the 39th day prior to the opening of the State Convention at the State Secretary's office, with tow other WRLCA members present that are not nominated and listed on the ballot. Any member may observe the random drawing.

Intent and Reason of Change:

If the State Secretary is on the ballot, he/she cannot mail the ballot out without conflicting with Department of Labor guidelines for electing delegates. Marlene Hagedorn made a motion to accept proposed language and Patrick Pitts seconded. Discussion. The motion was then voted on.

Proposed language was passed.

# (10) WRLCA Constitution, Article XI, Section 1, 2, 3

Present Language:

SECTION 1 Any member aggrieved by any action of a State Association, or Officer thereof, shall have the right to appeal to the State Board. Such appeal must be in writing and must be filed with the State President within thirty (30) days of the action complained of. Within ten (10) days of receipt of such appeal, the State President will notify all members of the State Board, and, also, request that the charging party provide a letter outlining the specific charges and relief sought. This letter of specificity must be returned within twenty (20) days, and upon its receipt, the State Board will forward a copy to the charged party for response. The charged party will have twenty (20) days to respond in writing to the State Board. The State Board will review the charging party's letter of specificity and relief sought and the response of the charged party. If the State Board chooses not to or is unable to effect the relief sought, it will then establish an Investigating Committee which will have full authority to conduct a full, fair, and impartial investigation. One member of the Investigating Committee will be chosen by the charging party, one member will be chosen by the charged party, and the two original members will then choose the third member. All members of the Investigating Committee must be members of the State Association who do not hold an elected position on the State Board, and excludes Associate members. Within thirty (30) days of their appointment, the Investigating Committee will make a report, jointly, in writing, including the findings and recommendations to the State Board. The State Board is authorized, in consultation with the NRLCA assigned Executive Committee representative, to take the necessary action to resolve the issue within thirty (30) days, unless extensions, of time limits are necessary and approved by the State Board with concurrence from the assigned Executive Committee representative. All parties must be notified in writing of such action.

SECTION 2 Any member not satisfied with this decision, or any action of the State Board on said appeal, shall have the right to appeal to the National Board. This appeal must be in writing and must be filed with the President of the National Association within thirty (30) days of receipt of the State Board's decision.

SECTION 3 At any level of appeal, all members shall be afforded the rights of due process, and all members have the right to appeal an adverse decision to the next level. At any time the National Board shall have full authority to intervene to protect the members of this Association. All correspondence shall be by certified mail, return receipt requested. All costs of the State Investigation and action shall be borne by the State Association and will be reimbursed by the National Association upon proper documentation to the National Board and all costs of the National Review and Appeals Committees shall be borne by the National Association. No court proceeding may be instituted until and unless the appeal procedures herein have been exhausted.

**Proposed Language:** <u>SECTION 1</u> Any member aggrieved by any action of a State Association, or Officer thereof, shall have the right to appeal to the State Board. Such appeal must be in writing and must be filed

with the State President within thirty (30) days of the action. Within ten (10) days of receipt of such appeal, the State President shall cause to be notified all members of the State Board, and NRLCA Assigned Executive Committee Representative and, also, request that the charging party provide a letter outlining the specific charges, complete documentation and relief sought. The letter outlining the specific charges, complete documentation and relief sought must be returned within twenty (20) days of receipt of such request. Upon receipt, the State President shall cause a copy to be forwarded to the charged party for response. The charged party will have twenty (20) days to respond in writing and provide documentation to the State President. The State Board will review the charging party's letter of specificity, documentation, relief sought and the response of the charged party. The State Board is authorized, in consultation with the NRLCA assigned Executive Committee Representative, to take the necessary action to resolve the issue within thirty (30) days, unless extensions of time limits are necessary, not to exceed an addition fifteen (15) days. If the State Board resolves or is unable to effect the relief sought, all parties must be notified in writing. SECTION 2 Any member not satisfied with this decision, or any action of the State Board on said appeal, shall have the right to appeal to the National Board. This appeal must be in writing and must be filed with the President of the National Association within thirty (30) days of receipt of the State Board's decision. SECTION 3 At any level of appeal, all members shall be afforded the rights of due process, and all members have the right to appeal an adverse decision to the next level. At any time the National Board shall have full authority to intervene to protect the members of this Association. All correspondence shall be by certified mail, return receipt requested. All costs of the State Investigation and action shall be borne by the State Association and all costs of the National Appeals Committees shall be borne by the National Association. No court proceeding may be instituted until and unless the appeal procedures herein have been exhausted. Intent and Reason of Change:

To change the State language to reflect actual language in the National Constitution and By-Laws.

Marlene Hagedorn made a motion to accept proposed language and Patrick Pitts seconded. Discussion. The motion was then voted on.

Proposed language was passed.

#### (11) WRLCA By-Laws, Article I, Section 2B

# Present Language:

SECTION 2B On the first day of the State Convention the President will ask the elected convention delegates to decide by voting if they want to hear resolutions and proposed constitution and by law changes from the floor during new business. The Resolutions Committee and Constitution and By Laws Committee will only be responsible for resolutions and proposed constitution and by law changes that have been submitted and passed by county units. If the delegation decides to hear resolutions and proposed constitution and by law changes from the floor during new business, then the delegate who is submitting it must use the proper form, have enough copies for all elected delegates, and submit them to the Vice-President by the close of business the second day of the convention.

# **Proposed Language:**

SECTION 2B On the first day of the State Convention the President will ask the elected convention delegates to decide by voting if they want to hear resolutions and proposed constitution and by law changes from the floor during new business. The Resolutions Committee and Constitution and By Laws Committee will only be responsible for resolutions and proposed constitution and by law changes that have been submitted and passed by county units, and those submitted by the finance committee. If the delegation decides to hear resolutions and proposed constitution and by law changes from the floor during new business, then the delegate who is submitting it must use the proper form, have enough copies for all elected delegates, and submit them to the Vice-President by the close of business the second day of the convention.

# **Intent and Reason of Change:**

To have the Resolutions and Constitution and By Laws Committees' read out and if so choose, express opinions on, those resolutions and constitution and by laws submitted by the finance committee. Patrick Pitts made a motion to accept proposed language and Judi Peck seconded. Discussion. Bill Allen made a motion to amend by striking "....county units, and those submitted by the finance committee." and adding "....county units, and those Constitution and By Laws amendments submitted by the finance committee that directly relate to existing constitution and by laws articles that the finance committee report is involved with.

The finance committee must adhere to the standing rules relating to hearing resolutions or constitution and by law changes from the floor except on the costs and waiting for the New Business session. If the delegation...". Donna Roakes seconded. Discussion. The amendment was voted on and failed. Discussion. Patrick Pitts made a motion to amend by adding "....and those submitted by the finance committee that fall within the parameters of their responsibility. If the delegation..." and Mike Cammack seconded. The amendment was voted on and passed. Discussion. The proposed language as amended was voted on.

Proposed language was passed as amended.

Bill Allen made a motion to limit the time on each constitution and by law change to 15 minutes and Marlene Hagedorn seconded. This motion was voted on and passed.

# (12) WRLCA By-Laws, Article I, Section 5

Present Language:

SECTION 5 He/She shall fill all vacancies pro tem caused in any way in the Board of the WRLCA subject to

the approval of the remaining members of the Board. Proposed Language:

SECTION 5 Any Officer of this Association who otherwise voluntarily resigns from his/her office shall turn over to the State Board all property of the Association in his/her possession. The President shall immediately appoint a successor pro tem, subject to the approval of the State Board, unless such vacancy occurs within sixty (60) days preceding the next State Convention. The vacancy shall then be filled by an election for the completion of the term of office.

**Intent and Reason of Change:** 

To clarify how 2 year terms are filled when an officer resigns, and to follow National's Constitution and By Laws addressing the same issue.

Patrick Pitts made a motion to accept proposed language and Judi Peck seconded. Discussion. The motion was voted on.

Proposed language was defeated.

# (13) WRLCA By-Laws, Article I, Section 7 (new)

# Present Language:

None

**Proposed Language:** 

(New Section 7 proposed to be added to Washington Rural Letter Carriers' Association By-Laws under Article I, Duties of Officers - President.") <u>SECTION 7</u> The President, with approval of the State Board, may place in trusteeship any Local/County/District Association (Unit) or subordinate body for any of the following reasons:

a. To uphold the principles and integrity of this Constitution;

b. To correct corruption or financial malpractice;

c. To assure performance of collective bargaining agreements or other duties of a bargaining representative;

d. To restore democratic procedures, and

e. To otherwise carry out the legitimate objectives of the State Association.

SECTION 7A The trustee shall assume immediate control and authority of the Local/County/District Association, with full authority over the Officers and property thereof. The trustee shall continue to act in such a capacity for the duration of the trusteeship.

SECTION 7B Within 30 days of the imposition of the trusteeship, a hearing shall be held before an impartial member of the State Association acting as a hearing officer, to determine facts on continuing the trusteeship. All interested persons shall have the right to present evidence at the hearing to the hearing officer, who shall have the sole discretion on the conduct and procedures at the hearing.

SECTION 7C The hearing officer shall repot, as soon as practicable, after the close of the hearing, the findings and recommendations to the President. The President may accept or reject these findings and recommendations, and the trusteeship may be continued or terminated accordingly. SECTION 7D Upon a petition filed with the President, no earlier than six months after the appointment of the trusteeship, at six-month intervals thereafter, any party may request termination of the trusteeship. The President, acting on such petition, or at may time, may terminate the trusteeship and restore government to the Local/County/District Officers.

SECTION 7E Any party not satisfied with the decision of the President under Sections 7C or 7D shall

have appeal rights as provided under Constitution Article XI (APPEALS).

Intent and Reason of Change:

To bring our State Association into recommended compliance with NRLCA guidelines.

Patrick Pitts made a motion to accept proposed language and Judi Peck seconded. Discussion. The motion was voted on.

Proposed language was passed.

# (14) WRLCA By-Laws, Article III, Section 1

Present Language:

SECTION 1 The Secretary/Treasurer shall keep a correct record of the proceedings of the WRLCA, read or cause to be read, all communications, reports, etc. He/She shall affix the seal of the WRLCA to all official documents, prepare for publication a correct copy of the entire proceedings of the WRLCA at its State Convention or special meetings, not later than one (1) month after the close of each State Convention or special meeting, and shall also present on the first day of the State Convention a complete statement of the condition of the WRLCA, including a statement of the membership of same.

**Proposed Language:** 

SECTION 1 The Secretary/Treasurer shall keep a correct record of the proceedings of the WRLCA, read or cause to be read, all communications, reports, etc. He/She shall affix the seal of the WRLCA to all official documents. He/She shall prepare for publication in the WASHINGTON RURAL CARRIER, an overview of the WRLCA State Convention or special meetings speakers and a correct record of the business sessions of the WRLCA State Convention or special meetings, not later than one (1) month after the close of each State Convention or special meeting, and shall also present on the first day of the State Convention a complete statement of the condition of the WRLCA, including a statement of the membership of same. Intent and Reason of Change:

To save costs of recording and printing the speakers at the State Convention, since Department of Labor and IRS only require an accurate account of the business sessions. Also, since the magazine is sent to associate members, to not provide Postal Service Management with opportunities to misquote what was said. Patrick Pitts made a motion to accept proposed language and Judi Peck seconded. Discussion. Dale Ryan made a motion to amend by adding "...overview of the speakers at WRLCA State..." and strike "...or special meetings speakers and a correct...." and Tammy Donaghue seconded. The amendment was voted on and passed. The amended proposed language was voted on.

Proposed language was passed as amended.

# (15) WRLCA By-Laws, Article III, Section 8

Present Language:

<u>SECTION 8</u> The Secretary/Treasurer may at each State Convention employ a stenographer to take down the proceedings and the cost shall be paid out of the treasury of the WRLCA.

**Proposed Language:** 

SECTION 8 The Secretary/Treasurer may at each State Convention employ a stenographer to take down the proceedings as directed by the State Board, and the cost shall be paid out of the treasury of the WRLCA. Intent and Reason of Change:

To clarify the Steno's responsibilities, Patrick Pitts made a motion to accept proposed language and Judi Peck seconded. The motion was voted on.

Proposed language was passed.

#### (16) WRLCA By-Laws, Article III, Section 11

Present Language:

SECTION 11 Upon receipt of the nominations for the position of Delegate to the National Convention, he/she will prepare a ballot listing the nominees for the position of Delegate to the National Convention and will mail said ballot to all members at least twenty (20) days prior to the opening of the State Convention. He/She will fulfill all duties concerning delegates to National Convention in accordance with Article IX (National Delegates) of the Constitution of the WRLCA.

# **Proposed Language:**

SECTION 11 Upon receipt of the nominations for the position of Delegate to the National Convention, he/she will have prepared a ballot listing the nominees for the position of Delegate to the National Convention and the ballot shall be mailed to all members at least twenty (20) days prior to the opening of the State Convention. He/She will fulfill all duties concerning delegates to National Convention in accordance with Article IX (National Delegates) of the Constitution of the WRLCA.

# **Intent and Reason of Change:**

If the State Secretary is on the ballot, he/she cannot mail the ballot out without conflicting with Department of Labor guidelines for electing delegates.

Patrick Pitts made a motion to accept proposed language and Judi Peck seconded. The motion was voted on. **Proposed language was passed.** 

# (17) WRLCA By-Laws, Article V, Section 1

#### Present Language:

SECTION 1 The editor shall publish four issues of the WASHINGTON RURAL CARRIER as a convention issue, fall issue, winter issue, and spring issue. At the first Board meeting after the State Convention, the Board will determine the mailing deadlines for the fall, winter, and spring issues of the WASHINGTON RURAL CARRIER. In addition to articles and information, each specified issue will contain the following: The fall issue will contain the fall booster announcement and reports of delegates to the National Convention. The winter issue will contain information on up-coming District Meetings and the up-coming State Convention, and the spring issue will contain information about the up-coming State Convention, campaign announcements and criteria for Carrier of the Year. Within forty-five (45) days following the receipt of the minutes of the State Convention, the Editor shall publish a convention issue of the WASHINGTON RURAL CARRIER containing the proceedings of the State Convention including the updated Constitution and By-Laws, and distribute the same to all members at the expense of the WRLCA. The Editor will publish current Washington State board meeting minutes, the latest WRLCA financial statement, State Steward article, Association Officer articles and any received Auxiliary Officer articles, and a current list of Association Officers, Auxiliary Officers, and Junior Officers as they occur in a timely manner in each edition of the WASHINGTON RURAL CARRIER. In addition, all items mandated by the State Board.

#### Proposed Language:

SECTION 1 The editor shall publish four issues of the WASHINGTON RURAL CARRIER as a convention issue, fall issue, winter issue, and spring issue. At the first Board meeting after the State Convention, the Board will determine the mailing deadlines for the fall, winter, and spring issues of the WASHINGTON RURAL CARRIER. In addition to articles and information, each specified issue will contain the following: The fall issue will contain the fall booster announcement and reports of delegates to the National Convention. The winter issue will contain information on up-coming District Meetings and the up-coming State Convention, and the spring issue will contain information about the up-coming State Convention, campaign announcements and criteria for Carrier of the Year. Within thirty (30) days following the receipt of the minutes of the State Convention, the Editor shall publish a convention issue of the WASHINGTON RURAL CARRIER, with the proceedings of the State Convention that is provided by the State Secretary, including the updated Constitution and By-Laws, and distribute the same to all members at the expense of the WRLCA. The Editor will publish current Washington State board meeting minutes, the latest WRLCA financial statement, State Steward article, Association Officer articles and any received Auxiliary Officer articles, and a current list of Association Officers, Auxiliary Officers, and Junior Officers as they occur in a timely manner in each edition of the WASH-INGTON RURAL CARRIER. In addition, all items mandated by the State Board. Intent and Reason of Change:

To make the Convention issue more timely by having it out in 30 days (total of up to 60 days from end of State Convention).

Patrick Pitts made a motion to accept proposed language and Judi Peck seconded. Discussion. Shawn Johnson made a motion to amend by striking "....booster announcement and reports of delegates to the National..." and adding "....booster announcement and the report of the delegate-at-large to the National..." and David Ray seconded. The amendment was voted on and passed. Discussion. The proposed language as amended as as voted on.

Proposed language was passed as amended.

# (18) WRLCA By-Laws, Article V, Section 2Present Language:

SECTION 2 The Editor will receive a salary after the mailing of each issue of the WASHINGTON RURAL CARRIER. Said salary will be determined at each State Convention. The salary will be reduced 10% for each week that the mailing exceeds the Board-determined deadline for mailings, unless waived by the Board. The Editor will also receive a salary for the publication of the State Convention program. Said salary will be determined at the State Convention.

#### Proposed Language:

SECTION 2 The Editor will receive a salary after the mailing of each issue of the WASHINGTON RURAL CARRIER. Said salary will be determined at each State Convention. The salary will be reduced 10% for each week that the mailing exceeds the Board-determined deadline for mailings, unless waived by the Board. The Editor will also receive a salary for the publication of the State Convention program, if directed by the board to publish it. Said salary will be determined at the State Convention.

# Intent and Reason of Change:

The State Convention Program is formatted already on the computer, and just needs to be updated by the President and Secretary. Once completed, it can be taken to the printers. This year the editor did not feel comfortable taking a salary for something that just needed to be taken to the printers, however, in case the format changes in the future, it could be a future responsibility of the Editor, and thus he/she should be paid for it. Patrick Pitts made a motion to accept proposed language and Judi Peck seconded. Discussion. The motion was voted on.

# Proposed language was passed. (19) WRLCA By-Laws, Article VI, Section 3C, D, E Present Language:

SECTION 3C Charges against a State, Senior Assistant State, Assistant State, Area, or Local Steward must be in writing and filed with the State President by a member within thirty (30) days of the time that knowledge of the alleged offense comes to such members. Within ten (10) days of receipt of such appeal, the State President will notify all members of the State Board, and also request that the charging party provide a letter outlining the specific charges and relief sought. This letter of specificity must be returned within twenty (20) days, and upon its receipt, the State Board will forward a copy to the charged party for response. The charged party will have twenty (20) days to respond in writing to the State Board. The State Board will review the charging party's letter of specificity and relief sought and the response of the charged party. If the State Board chooses not to or is unable to effect the relief sought, it will then establish an Investigating Committee which will have full authority to conduct a full, fair, and impartial investigation. One member of the Investigating Committee will be chosen by the charging party, one member will be chosen by the charged party, and the two original members will then choose the third member. All members of the Investigating committee must be members of the State Association, who do not hold an elected position on the State Board, and excludes Associate members. Within thirty (30) days of their appointment, the Investigating Committee will make a report, jointly, in writing, including the findings and recommendations to the State Board. The State Board is authorized, in consultation with the NRLCA assigned Executive Committee representative, to take the necessary action to resolve the issue within thirty (30) days, unless extensions, of time limits are necessary and approved by the State Board with concurrence from the assigned Executive Committee representative. All parties must be notified in writing of such action. SECTION 3D Any member not satisfied with this decision, or any action of the State Board on said appeal, shall have the right to appeal to the National Board. This appeal must be in writing and must be filed with the President of the National Association within thirty (30) days of receipt of the State Board's decision. SECTION 3E At any level of appeal, all members shall be afforded the rights of due process, and all members have the right to appeal an adverse decision to the next level. At any time the National Board shall have full authority to intervene to protect the members of this Association. All correspondence shall be by certified mail, return receipt requested. All costs of the State Investigation and action shall be borne by the State Association and all costs of the National Review and Appeals Committees shall be borne by the National Association. No court proceeding may be instituted until and unless the appeal procedures provided herein have been exhausted.

# **Proposed Language:**

SECTION 3C Charges against a State, Senior Assistant State, Assistant State, Area, or Local Steward must be in writing and filed with the State President of the WRLCA by a member within thirty (30) days of the time that knowledge of the alleged offense comes to such members. Within ten (10) days of receipt of such

appeal, the State President shall cause to be notified all members of the State Board and NRLCA Assigned Executive Committee Representative, and also, request that the charging party provide a letter outlining the specific charges, complete documentation and relief sought. The letter outlining the specific charges, complete documentation and relief sought, must be returned within twenty (20) days of receipt of such request. Upon receipt, the State President shall cause a copy to be forwarded to the charged party for response. The charged party will have twenty (20) days to respond in writing and provide documentation to the State President. The State Board will review the charging party's letter of specificity, documentation, relief sought and the response of the charged party. The State Board is authorized, in consultation with the NRLCA assigned Executive Committee representative, to take the necessary action to resolve the issue within thirty (30) days, unless extensions of time limits are necessary, not to exceed an additional fifteen (15) days. If the State Board resolves or is unable to effect the relief sought, all parties must be notified in writing. SECTION 3D Any member not satisfied with this decision, or any action of the State Board on said appeal, shall have the right to appeal to the National Board. This appeal must be in writing and must be filed with the President of the National Association within thirty (30) days of receipt of the State Board's decision. SECTION 3E At any level of appeal, all members shall be afforded the rights of due process, and all members have the right to appeal an adverse decision to the next level. At any time the National Board shall have full authority to intervene to protect the members of this Association. All correspondence shall be by certified mail, return receipt requested. All costs of the State Investigation and action shall be borne by the State Association and all costs of the National Appeals Commission and Appeals Committees shall be borne by the National Association. No court proceeding may be instituted until and unless the appeal procedures provided herein have been exhausted. Intent and Reason of Change:

To change to reflect changes made in the National Constitution and By Laws.

Judi Peck made a motion to accept proposed language and Marlene Hagedorn seconded. Discussion. The motion was voted on.

Proposed language was passed.

President Schrup called for a short break at 2:05 p.m. Dan called the meeting to order again at 2:20 p.m. Secretary/Treasurer Becky Wendlandt then read roll call. All officers and delegates were present with the exception of Okanogan. Susie Hill made a motion to have the Constitution and By-Laws Committee read only the proposed language of the constitution and by-law changes along with the intent and reason of change for each one that still remains to be read. Kate Caffey seconded and the motion was voted on and passed.

#### (20) WRLCA By-Laws, Article VII, Section 3

# Present Language:

<u>SECTION 3</u> The State shall underwrite the county units, the Convention Fund, and any special funds. The combined State and National portions of the per capita dues for regular carriers, part time flexible carriers and associate members shall be 1% of the yearly salary for a 40 hour route at Step 3 on the salary schedule as of January 15 of each year. (Section language continues without change.) **Proposed Language:** 

SECTION 3 The State shall underwrite the county units, the Convention Fund, and any special funds. The combined State and National portions of the per capita dues for regular carriers, part time flexible carriers and associate members shall be 0.9% of the yearly salary for a 40 hour route at Step 3 on the salary schedule as of January 15 of each year. (Section language continues without change.)

#### Intent and Reason of Change:

After the 1.4% increase scheduled for November, the salary for a 40 hour route at Step 3 is going to be about \$38,626. This will result in a \$27 per year increase in a regular carrier's dues under the current formula. Using 0.9% gives a \$12 per year decrease, which is more appropriate under the circumstances. (Some other numbers considered were 0.925%, which results in a \$2 per year decrease and 0.95%, which results in a \$7 per year increase.)

Judi Peck made a motion to accept proposed language and Marlene Hagedorn seconded. Mike Cammack made a motion to amend by <u>striking</u> "....shall be <u>0.9%</u> of the yearly..." and "....schedule as of <u>January 15</u> of each year." He would also <u>add</u> "....shall be <u>0.975</u> of the yearly...." and "schedule as of the <u>final adjournment of the 2003 State Convention</u>." This motion was seconded by Bill Allen. Discussion. The amendment was voted on and failed. The motion to accept the original language was voted on.

Proposed language was defeated.

# (21) WRLCA By-Laws, Article VII, Section 4

# **Present Language:**

SECTION 4 The Auxiliary of the Washington Rural Letter Carriers' Association shall be funded through an annual assessment of \$7.00 for all members, excluding associate members. Said assessment shall be in addition to the current per capita dues of the members of the Association. If a member does not wish to pay the assessment he/she may request a refund of the current assessment from the Auxiliary Secretary/Treasurer.

#### **Proposed Language:**

<u>SECTION 4</u> The Auxiliary of the Washington Rural Letter Carriers' Association shall be funded through an annual assessment of \$8.00 for all members, excluding associate members. Said assessment shall be in addition to the current per capita dues of the members of the Association. If a member does not wish to pay the assessment he/she may request a refund of the current assessment from the Auxiliary Secretary/Treasurer.

#### Intent and Reason of Change:

The Association Board decided to defund the Auxiliary for the first 4 months of the dues period and that resulted in the depletion of the Auxiliary reserve fund. This is no way to rebuild the reserve and/or prepare for the possibility of an increase in the National Auxiliary dues. Also, the change to the Con/By-Laws at the 2001 Convention was not intended by the delegates to defund the Auxiliary, because of Association member requests for refund of their Auxiliary dues, which of course have not been paid at the \$7.00 amount

Judi Peck made a motion to accept proposed language and Marlene Hagedorn seconded. Discussion. Lynn Walker made a motion to extend the discussion time on Constitution and By-Law change #21 for two minutes. Janice Sisley seconded the motion and it was voted on and passed. Discussion. Judi Peck made a motion to extend the discussion time on this issue again by five minutes. Renee' Cowan seconded the motion and it was voted on and passed. Becky Wendlandt made a motion for copies of the Auxiliary's Financial Statement to be made and distributed to the Association for their review. Joanne Blackburn seconded this motion, and it was voted on and passed.

Shawn Johnson then made a motion for Auxiliary President Steve Roakes to address the Association for five mimutes and answer any questions regarding the financial statement. This motion was seconded David Ray. Discussion. The motion was voted on and passed. Steve Roakes then came forward to answer some questions from the Association. David Ray made a motion to extend this question/answer period with Steve for ten minutes. This motion was seconded by Pat English, voted on and failed. Shawn Johnson made a motion to extend this question/answer period with Steve for only two minutes. This motion was seconded by Jennifer Steffensen and as voted on and passed. Steve continued to answer the Association's questions. Judi Peck then made a motion to extend the discussion time

on the constitution and by-law by five more mimutes. This motion was seconded by Renee' Cowan and it was voted on and passed. Judi Peck made a motion to amend by <u>adding</u> "....of the Association, <u>providing the Auxiliary Secretary/Treasurer provide a financial statement at the beginning of State Convention to the Financial Committee</u>. If a member....". Renee' Cowan seconded the motion. Discussion. The amendment was voted on and passed. The amended proposed language was then voted on.

Proposed language passes as amended.

# (23) WRLCA By-Laws, Article X, Section 3

**Present Language:** 

SECTION 3 Each County Unit at their annual meeting shall elect their delegates to the State convention by secret ballot (secret ballot defined as a written ballot) in all cases where there is more than one candidate for each delegate position. Delegates will be listed in accordance with the number of votes received. The delegate receiving the most votes will be the delegate-at-large. In case of tie, the members will decide the placement by another secret ballot. Each County Secretary shall immediately, after the regular annual meeting of their County, fill out in duplicate, credentials of Delegate-at-Large, Regular, and Alternate delegates to the State Convention in order of votes received. The duplicate is to be retained for identification by the delegate and the original is to be sent to the State Secretary with proper endorsement by the County President and the County Secretary. Also each County Secretary shall submit the names of the newly elected County Officers to the State Secretary. Such newly elected officers shall assume office upon election.

**Proposed Language:** 

SECTION 3 Each County Unit at their annual meeting shall elect their delegates to the State convention by ballot in all cases where there is more than one candidate for each delegate position. Delegates will be listed in accordance with the number of votes received. The delegate receiving the most votes will be the delegate-at-large. In case of tie, the members will decide the placement by another ballot. Each County Secretary shall immediately, after the regular annual meeting of their County, fill out in duplicate, credentials of Delegate-at-Large, Regular, and Alternate delegates to the State Convention in order of votes received. The duplicate is to be retained for identification by the delegate and the original is to be sent to the State Secretary with proper endorsement by the County President and the County Secretary. Also each County Secretary shall submit the names of the newly elected County Officers to the State Secretary. Such newly elected officers shall assume office upon election.

#### Intent and Reason of Change:

To use the correct wording as per Roberts Rules concerning a paper ballot.

Judi Peck made a motion to accept proposed language and Marlene Hagedorn seconded. The motion was voted on.

# Proposed language was passed. (24) WRLCA By-Laws, Article X, Section 4

Present Language:

SECTION 4 County units having \$500 or more in total liquid assets as per previous year LM report, and failing send a state-paid delegate to State Convention, or having total liquid assets per previous year LM report over \$21 per member and failing send a county funded delegate to State Convention, will have their next year's per annum payment revert to the general fund. When the county resumes sending a state and/or county funded delegate to State Convention, future per annum payments will be restored at the prescribed level, beginning with the first payment of the new fiscal year.

**Proposed Language:** 

SECTION 4 A single year's per annum payments from the state to a county unit shall revert to the state's general fund if either of the following conditions are met: (1) The county unit failed to send a Delegate-at-Large to either of the two most recent State Conventions and has \$500 or more in liquid assets as of the most recent LM report; or (2) The county unit failed to send a second delegate to either of the two most recent State Convention and has liquid assets of \$21 or more per member as of the most recent report.

Expanding the period of limited participation allows for the small counties to have years when no one, or only one person, is able and willing to attend State Convention.

3. If a second delegate attends, the state has no reason to care if the county funded that delegate or not.

Judi Peck made a motion to accept proposed language and Marlene Hagedorn seconded. Discussion. The motion was voted on.

Proposed language was passed.

# (25) WRLCA By-Laws, Article X, Section 4

# Present Language:

SECTION 4 County units having \$500 or more in total liquid assets as per previous year LM report, and failing send a state-paid delegate to State Convention, or having total liquid assets per previous year LM report over \$21 per member and failing send a county funded delegate to State Convention, will have their next year's per annum payment revert to the general fund. When the county resumes sending a state and/or county funded delegate to State Convention, future per annum payments will be restored at the prescribed level, beginning with the first payment of the new fiscal year.

# **Proposed Language:**

Delete By-Laws, Article X, Section 4, and renumber.

# Intent and Reason of Change:

The purpose of this section was to encourage participation in the Association meetings (i.e. Convention). The actual effect has been the opposite in refusing County dues to a County Unit which seated 4 delegates at the 2001 Convention. Another effect of this section is to ignore the trust given to the Association when dues began to be collected by check withholding. The County Unit dues belong to the members of that unit. Dues were collected by withholding for the convenience of the members and not be appropriated for other State Association purposes.

Judi Peck made a motion to accept proposed language and Marlene Hagedorn seconded. Discussion. The motion was voted on.

Proposed language was defeated.

# (26) WRLCA By-Laws, Article XI, Section 4 & 5

# Present Language:

SECTION 4 The duties of the Committee on Constitution and By-Laws shall be: To examine all changes proposed for amending or changing the Constitution and By-Laws that have been passed and submitted by the county units. They may examine and correct, when called upon, proposed laws governing County Units or District Associations so that they will no conflict with the National or State Constitutions.

SECTION 5 The duties of the Committee shall be to examine all proposed resolutions passed and submitted by the county units and present same to the elected delegates, identifying them as binding (and to whom) or non binding. The Resolutions Committee can also propose any courtesy resolutions they deem necessary and present same to the elected delegates at State Convention.

Proposed Language: <u>SECTION 4</u> The duties of the Committee on Constitution and By-Laws shall be: To examine all changes proposed for amending or changing the Constitution and By-Laws that have been passed and submitted by the county units, and those submitted by the finance committee. They may examine and correct, when called upon, proposed laws governing County Units or District Associations so that they will no conflict with the National or State Constitutions.

SECTION 5 The duties of the Committee shall be to examine all proposed resolutions passed and submitted by the county units, and those submitted by the finance committee, and present same to the elected delegates, identifying them as binding (and to whom) or non binding. The Resolutions Committee can also propose any courtesy resolutions they deem necessary and present same to the elected delegates at State Convention.

#### Intent and Reason of Change:

To have the Resolutions and Constitution and By-Laws Committees' read out and if so choose, express opinions on those resolutions and constitution and by-laws submitted by the finance committee.

Judi Peck made a motion to accept proposed language and Marlene Hagedorn seconded. Patrick Pitts made a

motion to amend by <u>adding</u> (both sections) "....finance committee <u>that fall within the parameters of their responsibilities</u>. They may...." and Mike Cammack seconded. The amendment was voted on and passed. The amended proposed language was voted on.

Proposed language was passed as amended.

#### (27) WRLCA By-Laws, Article XII, Section 2

#### Whereas:

In the interest of safety, due to late dismissal on the last day of business at State Convention,

#### Therefore be it resolved:

That the delegates who meet the criteria of traveling more than 250 miles one way, be granted an additional day of per diem. This would apply to state paid delegates only.

#### Intent and Reason of Change:

Safe travel for persons making long trips to return home after Convention.

Janice Sisley made a motion to postpone Constitution and By-Laws #26 indefinitely and seconded by Jennifer Steffensen. The motion was voted on and passed.

President Schrup asked Pat Alexander to come forward to present the Carrier of the Year Award. The recipient for the 2002 Carrier of the Year was Karen Crombie. Karen received a standing ovation from the Association.

President Schrup then called for New Business. (Any resolutions and/or constitution and by-laws that were postponed until this time have already been typed in their entirety.) Shawn Johnson made a motion to dismiss the Resolutions Committee with the Associations thanks and Doug Rinehart seconded. The motion was voted on and passed. Judi Peck made a motion that the Constitution and By-Laws Committee be excused with the Associations thanks and Shawn Johnson seconded. The motion was voted on and passed. President Schrup then asked for any Unfinished Business. There was none President Schrup then announced that the next item on the agenda was the election of officers. The nominees for each office were reread from the Nominating Committee's report given earlier. Dan also stated that all nominations were open until closed by the Chair.

A ballot vote was conducted. Mike Cammack, Tellers Committee Chair, gave the results of the ballot vote. Dan Schrup was announced as President.

President Schrup announced the nominees for Vice-President as Patricia Alexander and Janice Sisley. The nominations for Vice-President were closed. Patricia and Janice each spoke briefly to the Association. Dan then asked for the Tellers Committee to come forward. A ballot vote was conducted. Mike Cammack gave the results of the ballot vote. Patricia Alexander was announced as Vice-President.

President Schrup announced the nominee for Secretary/Treasurer as Becky Wendlandt. Tammy Donaghue made a motion to close nominations for Secretary/Treasurer and that the President cast a unanimous vote for Becky Wendlandt for Secretary/Treasurer. Lynn Walker seconded the motion and it was voted on and passed. President Schrup cast a unanimous vote for Becky Wendlandt for Secretary/Treasurer. President Schrup announced the nominees for Editor as Margene Horrell and Doug Rinehart. The nominations for Editor were closed. Margene and Doug each spoke briefly to the Association. Dan then asked for the Tellers Committee to come forward. A ballot vote was conducted. Mike Cammack gave the results of the ballot vote. Margene Horrell was announced as Editor of the Washington Rural Carrier.

President Schrup announced the nominee for District II Representative as Ann Lamm. Marlene Hage-dorn made a nomination for Joanne Blackburn. Kathy Brown made another nomination for Patrick Pitts. The nominations for District II Representative were closed. Ann, Joanne, and Patrick each spoke briefly to the Association. Dan then asked for the Tellers Committee to come forward to conduct a ballot vote. Mike Cammack gave the results of the ballot vote. The two nominees who received the most votes, Ann Lamm and Joanne Blackburn, were voted on again. Mike Cammack from the Tellers Committee gave the results of the second ballot vote. Ann Lamm was announced District II Representative.

President Schrup announced the nominee for District IV Representative as Dave Reppe. Jim Hemrich made a motion to close nominations for District IV Representative and that the Secretary/Treasurer cast a unanimous vote for Dave Reppe for District IV Representative. David Ray seconded the motion and it was voted on and passed. Secretary/Treasurer Becky Wendlandt cast a unanimous vote for Dave Reppe for District IV Representative.

Dave Reppe then asked the Association to acknowledge appointed District III Representative, Noretta Stritzke.

President Schrup made a motion to dismiss the Tellers Committee with the Associations thanks and Carrie Smith seconded. The motion was voted on and passed. Dan then made a motion to dismiss the Credentials Committee with the Associations thanks and Doug Rinehart seconded. The motion was voted on and passed. Secretary/Treasurer Becky Wendlandt then collected the Yea/Nay cards.

President Schrup then asked NRLCA Director Labor Relations, Randy Anderson, to come forward, along with all the newly elected officers, to be sworn in. Randy Anderson installed the 2002-2003 Officers and asked that the Association support their new officers. Randy congratulated each officer and the Association welcomed their new officers with a standing ovation.

Secretary/Treasurer Becky Wendlandt then dispersed checks to the state-paid delegates. President Schrup then asked Lynn Walker to come forward to give the benediction. Lynn Walker and Neil Buchanan were then asked by President Schrup to retire the colors, the Washington State flag and the American flag. President Schrup made a motion to adjourn and Doug Rinehart seconded.

President Schrup adjourned the 2002 Annual Convention of the Washington Rural Letter Carriers Association, Silverdale, Washington, at 6:30 p.m.

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#### W.R.L.C.A CONSTITUTION AND BY-LAWS

#### **JULY 1, 2002 THROUGH JUNE 30, 2003**

#### **CONSTITUTION**

#### ARTICLE I (NAME)

<u>SECTION 1</u> This association shall be known as the Washington Rural Letter Carriers' Association (here-in referred to as 'the WRLCA').

#### ARTICLE II (OBJECT)

SECTION 1 The object of the WRLCA shall be: to unite fraternally all regular rural carriers, substitute rural carriers, part time flexible rural carriers, rural carrier reliefs, rural carrier associates, and retired carriers of the State of Washington for the improvement of their own conditions and that of the rural carrier service; to assist in establishing and maintaining County Units, and supporting the National Association and to cooperate at all times with the United States Postal Service (USPS) for the advancement of the Service.

#### ARTICLE III (MEMBERSHIP)

<u>SECTION 1</u> Active members of all County Units shall be eligible for membership in the WRLCA; such members to be regular rural carriers, substitute rural carriers, part time flexible rural carriers, rural carrier reliefs, rural carrier associates, and retired carriers.

<u>SECTION 2</u> Also eligible for membership in the WRLCA are associate members (non-rural craft employees) that may elect to be a member by paying associate member dues. Associate members are not entitled to vote, hold office or be a delegate to National Convention.

SECTION 3 Membership shall be in the County Unit and District representing the office from which the route emanates. A Retired Carrier shall have the option of being a member of the County Unit and District in which he/she resides or in the County Unit and District where previously employed as a regular rural carrier.

#### ARTICLE IV (REPRESENTATION)

SECTION 1 Each County Unit shall be entitled to representation in this Association by one delegate-at-large. Each County Unit is also entitled to one delegate for each (5) members or major faction thereof of its own members, based on the current membership year. Each credential and seated delegate is entitled to one vote. The Delegate-at-Large is responsible for collecting the ballots for his/her delegation and for returning the ballots to the Teller's Committee after his/her county delegates have voted.

<u>SECTION 2</u> No delegate can be seated from any County Unit without properly signed credentials and current membership dues paid.

SECTION 3 Delegate positions vacant at the time of the State Convention may not be filled by a vote of the delegates present from the subject County Unit or District or from other County Units or Districts, or delegates at the State Convention.

<u>SECTION 4</u> Election of State Convention delegates by county units shall be by ballot in all cases where there is more than one candidate for each delegate position. If there is a tie for a delegate position, the county shall hold another ballot to break the tie. The delegates shall be listed in order of votes received, with the Delegate-At-Large being the one who received the most votes.

#### **ARTICLE V (MEETINGS)**

SECTION 1 The WRLCA shall meet annually (here-in referred to as the State Convention) on a date and place assigned to Districts on a rotation basis in the following order: District One, District Four, District Two, District Three. If for any reason the date or place so assigned shall be undesirable or for reasons deemed advisable by a majority of the State Officers, the Board shall have the authority to change said date or place or set up a date and place by giving official notice to the County secretaries not less than sixty (60) days before the new date.

SECTION 1A If due to war or other conditions that would make it impossible or impractical to hold a State Convention, the Board shall have the authority to discontinue the State Convention entirely by giving the official notice as provided in Section 1 of this Article.

<u>SECTION 2</u> Special sessions may be called by the President upon written request of one-half of the County Units in good standing.

<u>SECTION 3</u> At each State Convention a report in writing must be rendered by each State Officer and the report then placed on file by the State Secretary.

SECTION 4 Informational and/or training meetings may be authorized by the Board.

#### ARTICLE VI (QUORUM)

<u>SECTION 1</u> Seventeen (17) members representing not less than six (6) County Units shall constitute a quorum for the transaction of the business of the WRLCA, but a lesser number than that may adjourn to some future time.

#### ARTICLE VII (PARLIAMENTARY AUTHORITY)

SECTION 1 The rules contained in the current edition of ROBERT'S RULES OF ORDER NEWLY REVISED shall govern the Association in all cases to which they are applicable and in which they are not inconsistent with the State and National Constitution and By Laws and any special rules of order the WRLCA may adopt.

<u>SECTION 2</u> A ballot vote can be called for by a simple majority vote of the delegates present at the State Convention.

#### ARTICLE VIII (OFFICERS)

SECTION 1 The officers of the WRLCA shall consist of: President, Vice-President, Secretary-Treasurer, Editor of the WASHINGTON RURAL CARRIER, four, (4) District Representatives and the Retired Carriers' Representative who shall be elected at the State Convention and serve one (1) year, except the District and Retired Representatives, who shall serve two (2) years, or until their successors are elected and installed.

SECTION 1A Each district shall nominate its own District Representative at a District meeting prior to the State Convention. Notice of said meeting will be sent to all members at least fifteen (15) days prior to the meeting. Such nominations shall then be presented to the Nominating Committee, who shall place them before the State Convention. In case no nomination is made by the District, the Nominating Committee at the State Convention shall select and place in nomination the name of a member of said District. Any delegate who is a member of said District is entitled to nominate from the floor any additional nominees who are qualified.

SECTION 1B The Retired Carriers' Representative shall be a retired carrier, nominated by a retired carrier and elected by the delegates at the State Convention assembled who shall have been elected and installed.

<u>SECTION 2</u> There shall be a Board of Control (here-in referred to as the Board) consisting of: President, Vice-President, Secretary-Treasurer, Editor, four (4) District Representatives and the Retired Carriers'

Representative. This Board shall meet upon the call of the President or by a majority vote of the Board to the Secretary when matters of importance arise that need immediate attention during the interim between meetings of the WRLCA. Each elected officer shall be entitled to a vote on every question before the State Convention.

<u>SECTION 2A</u> There shall be an Executive Committee consisting of the four (4) District Representatives and the Retired Carriers' Representative.

SECTION 3 Any officer of the WRLCA who shall be separated from the rural service through no fault of his/her own, as determined by the Board, shall hold office until the next State Convention of the WRLCA. However, a former rural carrier who has been appointed to the position of Postmaster, Officer-in -Charge or other supervisory position, may not vote, hold office or be appointed to any committee.

SECTION 4 The nomination of officers shall be made by a Nominating Committee of three (3): one (1) of whom shall be selected by the President, one(1) by the Vice-President, and these two (2) so chosen shall select the third member. This Committee shall report their list of nominations when called upon. However, before closing the ballot on the nominations submitted by the Committee, the President shall state, "Are there any other nominations?". If so, then the names of the additional nominees shall be added to the list. The election of officers shall take place at each State Convention of the WRLCA. The installation of officers shall take place immediately before adjournment.

SECTION 5 The election of officers shall be by ballot and, in no case, by acclamation, except by unanimous consent, and where there is more than one candidate for the same office, it shall require the majority of all votes cast to elect; and where there are more than two (2) candidates for the same office after the third ballot, the one receiving the least number of votes in each succeeding ballot shall be dropped until the election is had. Write-in votes shall not be considered valid.

SECTION 6 No State Officer may be declared a National delegate by virtue of his/her office.

<u>SECTION 7</u> To be elected an officer of the WRLCA, one must be a dues paying member of the craft and is ineligible for election if dues are in arrears.

#### ARTICLE IX (NATIONAL DELEGATES)

SECTION 1 Nominations for National Delegates will be accomplished by submitting nominations on a Nominating Ballot which will be published in THE NATIONAL RURAL LETTER CARRIER in the first issue of February, March, April, and May. Such nominations may include self-nomination. The nominating ballot shall be signed, showing the name and address of the member making the nomination. No member shall be nominated or be a National Delegate who, from the time of nomination through the end of the National Convention, holds a position in management (either permanent or temporary) in the Postal Service; in any other postal craft; or any other job which competes with the Postal Service and/or the NRLCA. A retired Associate member, a non-member or a craft member who has been separated involuntarily from the Postal Service cannot be nominated, elected or seated as a National Delegate. Delegates must be an active or retired carrier, in paid status, at the time of nomination, election and seating as a National Delegate.

<u>SECTION 2</u> Nominations for candidates for National Delegates shall be in the office of the State Secretary at least forty (40) days prior to the opening of the State Convention.

SECTION 3 The State Secretary shall arrange for the rental of two (2) post office boxes; one post office box for receipt of the ballots and the other for return of undeliverable ballots. It shall be the duty of the State Secretary to have prepared a ballot listing the nominees for the position of Delegate to the National Convention. The State Secretary shall verify membership as of April 15 and the ballot shall be mailed to all April 15 listed members at least twenty (20) days prior to the opening of the State Convention. The listing of the nominees on the ballot for the position of delegate to the National Convention shall be in order of random drawing. Random Drawing will be done on the 39<sup>th</sup> day prior to the opening of the State Convention at the State Secretary's office, with two other WRLCA members present that are not nominated and listed on the ballot. Any member may observe the random drawing.

SECTION 4 An envelope marked "Ballot" in which to send the ballot shall be provided each member.

SECTION 5 The sealed envelope containing the ballot shall be mailed in another envelope by the member to the designated post office box. The other envelope also marked "Ballot" shall clearly identify name and address of the member to permit verification of membership enrollment and to maintain the integrity of the voting procedure.

SECTION 6 A Teller's Committee shall be appointed by the State President. No member whose name appears on the ballot may serve on the Teller's Committee. Any candidate may observe the ballot tabulation. Ballots shall be returned to a post office box accessible only to the Teller's Committee. At the end of the cut-off period, said ballots shall be collected and counted at the State Convention.

SECTION 7 The number of candidates to be voted upon by each member shall not be more than the total number of delegate votes to which the WRLCA was entitled the previous year. Appropriate instructions shall be on each ballot stating the number of delegates to be elected and the mailing address of the designated post office box at which it must be received prior to the cut-off date. In reporting the results of the vote tabulation, the candidates shall be placed on a roster in accordance with the number of votes received. In case of a tie, the tellers committee will decide who is to be listed first with a coin toss.

SECTION 8 The National-paid Delegate-at-Large to the National Convention shall be the delegate receiving the most votes. Other National-paid delegates shall be the delegates receiving the next most votes. Delegates shall be listed according to the number of votes received. The required number of delegates for the WRLCA, in accordance with the National Constitution, shall be declared regular delegates and the remaining candidates shall be declared alternates in the order of their finish. If a delegate decides not to attend National Convention and either notifies the State Secretary in writing or does not check in with the National Convention Credentials Committee by noon on the first day of the National Convention, all the following delegates will move up in order of votes received.

<u>SECTION 9</u> The WRLCA will pay mileage one way and per diem allowance to all regular State paid delegates to the National Convention. The per diem allowance will be paid for six days (4 days for when the convention is in session and two days travel time). The rate of pay for mileage and per diem shall be decided at each State Convention of the WRLCA.

SECTION 10 Paid delegates to the National Convention are required to give a report of said Convention at their county meeting before the next year's State Convention. Paid delegates are to attend all association general sessions at the National Convention with the following permitted exceptions upon the approval of the National delegate at large:

- 1. Specific assignments to a committee
- 2. Required to man a booth
- 3. Illness

The delegate at large shall be responsible for the following:

- 1. Polling delegates for their preferences for the afternoon break out sessions they wish to attend, and then jointly agreeing to have at least one delegate to cover each of the sessions.
- 2. Taking roll of the delegates at the beginning of each general session.
- 3. Establishing an adequate seating space for the Washington Delegation, including placement and collection of seat back covers and the Washington sign.
- 4. Reporting to the Board any problems concerning delegates meeting their responsibilities at the convention.
- Collecting the ballots for his/her delegation and returning the ballots to the National Teller's Committee after his/her National delegates have voted.
- 6. Submitting a single report to the State Board for publication in the Washington Rural Carrier.

#### ARTICLE X (IMPEACHMENT AND REMOVALS)

<u>SECTION 1</u> In case of neglect of duty or violation of this Constitution on the part of any officer in the WRLCA or subordinate Unit thereof, in the interim of State Conventions, the Board shall have the power to suspend such officer after a fair hearing and subject to an appeal to the next State Convention.

#### ARTICLE XI (APPEALS)

SECTION 1 Any member aggrieved by any action of a State Association, or Officer thereof, shall have the right to appeal to the State Board. Such appeal must be in writing and must be filed with the State President within thirty (30) days of the action. Within ten (10) days of receipt of such appeal, the State President shall cause to be notified all members of the State Board, and NRLCA Assigned Executive Committee Representative and, also, request that the charging party provide a letter outlining the specific charges, complete documentation and relief sought. The letter outlining the specific charges, complete documentation and relief sought must be returned within twenty (20) days of receipt of such request. Upon receipt, the State President shall cause a copy to be forwarded to the charged party for response. The charged party will have twenty (20) days to respond in writing and provide documentation to the State President. The State Board will review the charging party's letter of specificity, documentation, relief sought and the response of the charged party. The State Board is authorized, in consultation with the NRLCA assigned Executive Committee Representative, to take the necessary action to resolve the issue within thirty (30) days, unless extensions of time limits are necessary, not to exceed an additional fifteen (15) days. If the State Board resolves or is unable to effect the relief sought, all parties must be notified in writing.

SECTION 2 Any member not satisfied with this decision, or any action of the State Board on said appeal, shall have the right to appeal to the National Board. This appeal must be in writing and must be filed with the President of the National Association within thirty (30) days of receipt of the State Board's decision.

SECTION 3 At any level of appeal, all members shall be afforded the rights of due process, and all members have the right to appeal an adverse decision to the next level. At any time the National Board shall have full authority to intervene to protect the members of this Association. All correspondence shall be by certified mail, return receipt requested. All costs of the State Investigation and action shall be borne by the State Association and all costs of the National Appeals Committees shall be borne by the National Association. No court proceeding may be instituted until and unless the appeal procedures provided herein have been exhausted.

#### **ARTICLE XII (AMENDMENTS)**

SECTION 1 The Constitution and By-Laws shall take effect immediately upon its adoption.

SECTION 2 This State Constitution and By-Laws shall be in harmony with the National Constitution and By-Laws. The county Unit is subordinate to the WRLCA and the WRLCA is subordinate to the NRLCA. Any provisions of this Constitution and By-Laws which conflicts with any Federal or State Law, regulation or ordinance shall be inoperative as to those jurisdictions in which said Federal or State Law, regulation or ordinance is in force.

<u>SECTION 3</u> Constitution and By-Laws amendments shall become effective upon adjournment of the State Convention unless otherwise stipulated and can only be amended by submitting the amendment in writing at a State Convention and shall require a two-thirds vote to amend.

#### **BY-LAWS**

#### ARTICLE I (DUTIES OF OFFICERS--PRESIDENT)

SECTION 1 The President shall preside at all meetings of the WRLCA and of the Board and enforce all laws thereof. He/She shall sign all papers and documents that require his/her signature to properly authenticate them.

SECTION 2 Previous to the first day of each State Convention, he/she shall appoint from the list of regularly elected delegates, then in the hands of the Secretary, a committee of three (3) on Credentials, a committee of four (4) on Teller's, a committee of three (3) on Constitution and By-Laws, a committee of three (3) on Resolutions, and a committee of three (3) on Finances. On the first day of the State Convention he/she shall also appoint from said delegates an Auditing Committee of three (3) members; a committee of three (3) on Mileage and Per Diem; a committee of three (3) on THE WASHINGTON RURAL CARRIER. He/She shall be responsible that a Nominating Committee be appointed according to Article VIII of the Constitution of the WRLCA. He/She may appoint any other Convention Committee advisable and may also appoint more delegates to serve on a committee if so needed.

SECTION 2A The President can, if necessary, ask the Constitution and By-Laws Committee, the Resolutions Committee, the Teller's Committee, and/or the Finance Committee to meet one (1) day prior to the State Convention. These persons would be regular delegates to the Convention and would receive one (1) additional day per diem. They will also receive round trip mileage if they are not already reimbursed from the State and/or County as a delegate.

SECTION 2B On the first day of the State Convention the President will ask the elected convention delegates to decide by voting if they want to hear resolutions and proposed constitution and by law changes from the floor during new business. The Resolutions Committee and Constitution and By Laws Committee will only be responsible for resolutions and proposed constitution and by law changes that have been submitted and passed by county units, and those submitted by the finance committee that fall within the parameters of their responsibility. If the delegation decides to hear resolutions and proposed constitution and by law changes from the floor during new business, then the delegate who is submitting it must use the proper form, have enough copies for all elected delegates, and submit them to the Vice President by the close of business the second day of the convention.

SECTION 3 His/Her decisions upon all questions of law shall be final during the recess of the WRLCA. He/She shall report all such decisions to the WRLCA at its State Convention for approval or rejection. Such decisions, when approved or revised by the WRLCA, shall have all the effect and force of the general laws of the WRLCA.

SECTION 4 At the close of each State Convention he/she shall, in conjunction with the Board, appoint the Auto Insurance Director, Provident Guild Director, Political Action Committee Director, and have the authority to fill any vacancies therein during the recess. Also, in conjunction with the Board, he/she shall evaluate the work of the State Steward, and if in the best interest of the WRLCA, terminate the incumbent State Steward and nominate a replacement.

<u>SECTION 5</u> He/She shall fill all vacancies pro tem caused in any way in the Board of the WRLCA subject to the approval of the remaining members of the Board.

SECTION 6 He/She shall have power to grant charters and, in conjunction with the Secretary, issue them during the interim between State Conventions of the WRLCA. He/She shall perform other duties as the Constitution and By-Laws require.

SECTION 7 The President, with approval of the State Board, may place in trusteeship any Local/County/District Association (Unit) or subordinate body for any of the following reasons:

- a. To uphold the principles and integrity of this Constitution;
- b. To correct corruption or financial malpractice;

- c. To assure performance of collective bargaining agreements or other duties of a bargaining representative;
- d. To restore democratic procedures; and
- e. To otherwise carry out the legitimate objectives of the State Association.

<u>SECTION 7A</u> The trustee shall assume immediate control and authority of the Local/County/District Association, with full authority over the Officers and property thereof. The trustee shall continue to act in such a capacity for the duration of the trusteeship.

SECTION 7B Within 30 days of the imposition of the trusteeship, a hearing shall be held before an impartial member of the State Association acting as a hearing officer, to determine facts on continuing the trusteeship. All interested persons shall have the right to present evidence at the hearing to the hearing officer, who shall have the sole discretion on the conduct and procedures at the hearing.

SECTION 7C The hearing officer shall report, as soon as practicable, after the close of the hearing, the findings and recommendations to the President. The President may accept or reject these findings and recommendations, and the trusteeship may be continued or terminated accordingly.

SECTION 7D Upon a petition filed with the President, no earlier than six months after the appointment of the trusteeship, and at six-month intervals thereafter, any party may request termination of the trusteeship. The President, acting on such petition, or at any time, may terminate the trusteeship and restore government to the Local/County/District Officers.

SECTION 7E Any party not satisfied with the decision of the President under Sections 7C or 7D shall have appeal rights as provided under Constitution Article XI (APPEALS).

#### ARTICLE II (VICE-PRESIDENT)

SECTION 1 The Vice-President shall preside in the absence of the President, and in the case of death, resignation, disqualification, refusal or neglect of the President to discharge the duties of his/her office, the Vice-President shall become the President and serve until such time as his/her successor shall be duly elected and installed.

#### ARTICLE III (SECRETARY-TREASURER)

SECTION 1 The Secretary-Treasurer shall keep a correct record of the proceedings of the WRLCA, read or cause to be read, all communications, reports, etc. He/She shall affix the seal of the WRLCA to all official documents. He/She shall prepare for publication in the Washington Rural Carrier, an overview of the speakers at the WRLCA State Convention or special meetings and a correct record of the business session of the WRLCA State Convention or special meetings, not later than one (1) month after the close of each State Convention or special meeting, and shall also present on the first day of the State Convention a complete statement of the condition of the WRLCA, including a statement of the membership of same.

SECTION 2 He/She shall conduct the correspondence of the WRLCA, keep a record and submit same when demanded by the Board.

SECTION 3 He/She shall have charge of the seal, books, papers and documents belonging to the WRLCA; shall deliver to the WRLCA, or his/her successor, all property of the WRLCA at the expiration of his/her term of office, or upon an earlier termination thereof; he/she shall be given an itemized receipt for all property delivered by the party or parties receiving same.

SECTION 4 He/She shall keep a true and correct account between the WRLCA and the County Units.

SECTION 5 He/She shall perform all the duties of the Treasurer as are required by this office.

SECTION 6 He/She shall receive all monies due the WRLCA and shall deposit all monies in a convenient depository; such deposits to be made in the name of the "Washington Rural Letter Carriers' Association" and any interest thereon shall be credited to the funds of the WRLCA.

SECTION 7 The Secretary-Treasurer will issue checks in payment of all properly itemized invoices, statements, vouchers, authorized payroll payments, and for other obligations of the WRLCA as directed by the State Board. He/She will have the President review the payments and supporting documents on a quarterly basis.

SECTION 8 The Secretary-Treasurer may at each State Convention employ a stenographer to take down the proceedings as directed by the State Board, and the cost shall be paid out of the treasury of the WRLCA.

SECTION 9 He/She shall render a report to the WRLCA at its State Convention or to the President and Board when they may request it, showing in detail the receipts and expenditures of the WRLCA's funds as shown by his/her books.

<u>SECTION 10</u> After the close of each State Convention the Secretary shall send the appropriate resolutions to the National Secretary-Treasurer, keeping a copy on file.

SECTION 11 Upon receipt of the nominations for the position of Delegate to the National Convention, he/she will have prepared a ballot listing the nominees for the position of Delegate to the National Convention and the ballot shall be mailed to all members at least twenty (20) days prior to the opening of the State Convention. He/She will fulfill all duties concerning delegates to National Convention in accordance with Article IX (National Delegates) of the Constitution of the WRLCA.

SECTION 12 He/She will notify all members, at least fifteen (15) days prior to the opening of the State Convention, of the time and place, the nominating and election procedures and the offices to be filled. This notice may be included with the National Delegate ballot mailed to each member.

SECTION 13 He/She will retain for one (1) year in a safe location all ballots used at the State Convention. These ballots should be placed in envelopes marked to indicate for which election they were used.

#### ARTICLE IV (EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE)

SECTION 1 The Executive Committee, or a majority of them shall act as Trustees of the WRLCA, and in conjunction with the President, have general supervision and control of the WRLCA.

SECTION 2 At the expiration of their term of office, or upon an earlier termination thereof, they shall turn over to the WRLCA or their successors, all books, papers, and other property they may have in their possession belonging to the WRLCA.

<u>SECTION 3</u> It shall be the duty of the Executive Committee members to aid in keeping carriers in their particular Districts interested in WRLCA work and in keeping up the membership of their Districts. They shall perform such other duties as the WRLCA may, from time to time, direct.

SECTION 4 It shall be the duty of the Executive Committee members to search out future convention sites in their District and to work with the board on establishing a Convention site contract for said Convention. They are also to enlist Convention committee members to help assist them in holding the Convention in the appropriate Convention year for their District.

#### ARTICLE V (EDITOR)

SECTION 1 The Editor shall publish four issues of the WASHINGTON RURAL CARRIER as a convention issue, fall issue, winter issue, and spring issue. At the first Board meeting after the State Convention, the Board will determine the mailing deadlines for the fall, winter, and spring issues of the WASHINGTON RURAL CARRIER. In addition to articles and information, each specified issue will contain the following: The fall issue will contain the fall booster announcement and report of delegate-at-

large to the National Convention. The winter issue will contain information on up-coming District Meetings and the up-coming State Convention, and the spring issue will contain information about the up-coming State Convention, campaign announcements and criteria for Carrier of the Year. Within thirty (30) days following the receipt of the minutes of the State Convention, the Editor shall publish a convention issue of the WASHINGTON RURAL CARRIER with the proceedings of the State Convention that is provided by the State Secretary, including the updated Constitution and By-Laws, and distribute the same to all members at the expense of the WRLCA. The Editor will publish current Washington State board meeting minutes, the latest WRLCA financial statement, State Steward article, Association Officer articles and any received Auxiliary Officer articles, and a current list of Association Officers, Auxiliary Officers, and Junior Officers as they occur in a timely manner in each edition of the WASHINGTON RURAL CARRIER. In addition, all items mandated by the State Board.

SECTION 2 The Editor will receive a salary after the mailing of each issue of the WASHINGTON RURAL CARRIER. Said salary will be determined at each State Convention. The salary will be reduced 10% for each week that the mailing exceeds the Board-determined deadline for mailings, unless waived by the Board. The Editor will also receive a salary for the publication of the State Convention program, if directed by the board to publish it. Said salary will be determined at the State Convention.

<u>SECTION 3</u> The Editor shall mail each issue of the WASHINGTON RURAL CARRIER to all members of the WRLCA and will be reimbursed for all expenses incurred in publication and mailing.

#### ARTICLE VI (STATE OFFICERS' EXPENSE)

<u>SECTION 1</u> No State Officer shall receive a salary except the Secretary-Treasurer and the Editor. The salary of the Secretary-Treasurer and Editor shall be decided at each State Convention of the WRLCA after the Finance Committee reviews the suggestions of the Board and delegates at the State Convention. The State Convention delegates vote on the Finance Committee recommendations.

SECTION 2 The officers, Insurance Director and Political Action Committee Director of the WRLCA shall be reimbursed for all postage, office supplies, telephone calls and mileage to all meetings outside of their own County Unit, connected with the business of the WRLCA. Per diem will be paid if business necessitates an overnight stay. Expenses incurred in excess of per diem will be reimbursed with the approval of the Board. Reimbursement of said expenses shall be made by the Secretary-Treasurer upon receipt of a voucher and supporting documents. Leave Without Pay (LWOP) will not be compensated to attend the State Convention or National Convention while they are in session, but may be authorized by the Board for other required business. All State Officers attending the State Convention shall receive mileage at the same rate as paid to the Delegates-at-Large. Officers are encouraged to fly rather than drive whenever flying results in a significant savings to the WRLCA. In cases where travel shall be by commercial airlines, the mileage factor shall not apply. The cost of the lowest reasonable airline fare shall be reimbursed in lieu of mileage.

SECTION 2A When the Board requests that a State Officer, State Steward, and/or Assistant State Steward attend any National training, the officer and/or steward will receive the National paid allowance for mileage and per diem. If the National paid allowance does not cover the LWOP needed or they do not get reimbursed from National at all, the officer and/or steward is authorized to submit their LWOP, not including EMA, for travel and days of training. If National does not pay for mileage and per diem, the officer and/or steward is authorized to submit their mileage or cost of airline ticket, whichever is less, and per diem. This must be approved in advance by the Board.

SECTION 2B The Officers, Insurance Director, and Political Action Committee Director of the WRLCA will be reimbursed for any authorized LWOP used for conducting WRLCA business. Reimbursement will be the wages at the same rate of pay as earned when serving his/her route, not to include EMA. Also, the Officers, Insurance Director, and Political Action Committee Director shall be reimbursed for sick and annual leave days lost due to authorized LWOP days taken in performing his/her responsibilities for the WRLCA.

SECTION 3 The State President in conjunction with the Board, shall recommend to the NRLCA the member that the WRLCA would like to have appointed as State Steward. His/Her service shall be

continuous until terminated by the State President in conjunction with the Board or National President or by resignation. The State Steward shall work with and be subject to the State President and the Board. The State Steward shall supervise and administer the Steward Program within the State using the following guidelines:

- A) Make all Step 3 Grievance appeals, coordinating all efforts closely with the Regional Representative and the Assistants to the Executive Committeemen and report monthly to the appropriate Local Steward and grievant.
- B) Be responsible for certifying and maintaining certification records of all local and area stewards.
- B) In the event there is a need to fill or replace an Area or Local Steward position, the State Steward has the responsibility to the WRLCA and NRLCA in naming an individual to temporarily serve as steward.
- C) Be responsible for the distribution of Steward Manuals and Grievance forms to each Area and Local Steward, as well as for steward training.
- E) The State Steward will approve payment of expenses incurred by the Area and Local Stewards, while they are involved in grievance-related business. Reimbursement shall be made by the State Secretary-Treasurer, after he/she reviews the voucher, supporting documents and receives the State Steward's approval. Expenses for the Area and Local Stewards shall be submitted no later than three (3) months after the expense has been incurred. The State Steward will review payment of expenses incurred by the Assistant State Stewards, while they are involved in grievance-related business. Reimbursements shall be made by the State Secretary-Treasurer, after he/she reviews the voucher and supporting documents. Expenses for the Assistant State Stewards shall be submitted no later than one (1) month after the expense has been incurred. All reimbursements for Assistant, Area, and Local Stewards must first meet the guidelines of the State Board Policy and State Constitution and By Laws. Any expense that does not meet the guidelines must be reviewed by the State Board before payment can be made, and only paid after board approval.
- F) The State Steward, in conjunction with the State President, shall appoint from the Assistant State Stewards, an Acting State Steward when he/she is unavailable. The Acting State Steward will be in charge of all State Steward duties that need to be performed while the State Steward is unavailable.

SECTION 3A The salary of the State Steward shall be decided at each State Convention of the WRLCA after the Finance Committee reviews the suggestions of the Board. The State Steward shall be reimbursed for sick and annual leave days lost due to LWOP days taken in performing his/her responsibilities for the WRLCA. When grievances are being processed and it is essential that the State Steward be on LWOP, the WRLCA shall pay his/her wages at the same rate of pay as earned when serving his/her route, not to include EMA. The State Steward shall be allowed a mileage allowance for all Steward business. When an overnight stay is required in order for the State Steward to conduct necessary Steward business, the State Steward shall be entitled to per diem. The rates for mileage and per diem will be determined at the State Convention after the Finance Committee reviews the suggestions of the Board. The State Steward is encouraged to fly rather than drive whenever flying results in significant savings to the WRLCA. In cases where travel shall be by commercial airlines, the mileage factor shall not apply. The cost of the lowest reasonable airline fare shall be reimbursed in lieu of mileage. The State Steward shall be reimbursed for one (1) day LWOP for steward training at National Convention.

SECTION 3B The State President in conjunction with the Board and the State Steward, shall recommend to the NRLCA the members that the WRLCA would like to have appointed as Senior Assistant State Steward, Assistant State Stewards, and Area Stewards. Their service shall be continuous until terminated by the State President in conjunction with the Board, or National Board, or by resignation. The Senior Assistant State Steward, Assistant State Stewards and Area Stewards shall work with and be subject to the State Steward. The geographical area served by each Senior Assistant State Steward, Assistant State Steward and Area Steward shall be determined by the State Steward in conjunction with the Board. At the State Convention, a salary will be determined for all Senior Assistant State Steward, Assistant State Stewards and Area Stewards and administered in the same fashion as for the State Steward. Provision for mileage, per diem, office supplies, telephone, flying and LWOP apply in the same manner as with the State Steward.

SECTION 3C Charges against a State, Senior Assistant State, Assistant State, Area, or Local Steward must be in writing and filed with the State President of the WRLCA by a member within thirty (30) days of the time that knowledge of the alleged offense comes to such members. Within ten (10) days of receipt of such appeal, the State President shall cause to be notified all members of the State Board and NRLCA Assigned Executive Committee Representative, and also, request that the charging party provide a letter outlining the specific charges, complete documentation and relief sought. The letter outlining the specific charges, complete documentation and relief sought must be returned within twenty (20) days of receipt of such request. Upon receipt, the State President shall cause a copy to be forwarded to the charged party for response. The charged party will have twenty (20) days to respond in writing and provide documentation to the State President. The State Board will review the charging party's letter of specificity, documentation, relief sought and the response of the charged party. The State Board is authorized, in consultation, with the NRLCA Assigned Executive Committee Representative, to take the necessary action to resolve the issue within thirty (30) days, unless extensions of time limits are necessary, not to exceed an additional fifteen (15) days. If the State Board resolves or is unable to effect the relief sought, all parties must be notified in writing.

SECTION 3D Any member not satisfied with this decision, or any action of the State Board on said appeal, shall have the right to appeal to the National Board. This appeal must be in writing and must be filed with the President of the National Association within thirty (30) days of receipt of the State Board's decision.

SECTION 3E At any level of appeal, all members shall be afforded the rights of due process, and all members have the right to appeal an adverse decision to the next level. At any time the National Board shall have full authority to intervene to protect the members of this Association. All correspondence shall be by certified mail, return receipt requested. All costs of the State Investigation and action shall be borne by the State Association and all costs of the National Appeals Commission and Appeals Committees shall be borne by the National Association. No court proceeding may be instituted until and unless the appeal procedures provided herein have been exhausted.

<u>SECTION 4</u> Each State Officer and Appointed Officer will submit a proposed budget for the operating expenses of their office for the coming fiscal year to the Board for approval.

SECTION 5 The WRLCA will operate on a budget each year.

#### ARTICLE VII (REVENUES AND DUES)

<u>SECTION 1</u> The revenues of the WRLCA shall be derived from per capita dues and allowance for insurance promotions.

<u>SECTION 2</u> The Board may levy a special tax when conditions seem to demand it, but the whole amount of such levies in any one year shall not exceed the amount of State per capita for that year.

SECTION 3 The State shall underwrite the County units, the Convention Fund, and any special funds. The combined State and National portions of the per capita dues for regular carriers, part time flexible carriers, and associate members shall be 1% of the yearly salary of a 40 hour route at Step 3 on the salary schedule as of January 15 of each year. The combined State and National portions of the per capita dues for relief carriers shall be 25% of the regular carriers' per capita dues as calculated above. The combined State and National portions of the per capita dues for retirees shall be 12.5% of the regular carriers' per capita dues as calculated above. All per capita dues described in this article shall be rounded up to the nearest whole dollar and become effective October 1, 2000 and July 1 of each year thereafter and will be reviewed each year at the State Convention. The portion of the State per capita dues to be distributed to the County Units, Convention Fund, and other special funds shall be decided at each State Convention. The National portion of the per capita dues is decided by the delegates at the National Convention. The membership and fiscal year shall begin July 1 and end June 30.

<u>SECTION 4</u> The Auxiliary of the Washington Rural Letter Carriers' Association shall be funded through an annual assessment of \$8.00 for all members, excluding associate members. Said assessment shall be in

addition to the current per capita dues of the members of the Association, providing the Auxiliary Secretary-Treasurer provides a financial statement at the beginning of State Convention to the finance committee. If a member does not wish to pay the assessment he/she may request a refund of the current assessment from the Auxiliary Secretary-Treasurer.

#### **ARTICLE VIII (CHARTERS)**

<u>SECTION 1</u> Charters shall be granted County Units upon members' application and payment of one (1) years dues for each member. The amount of dues shall be specified in ARTICLE VII of the By-Laws.

#### ARTICLE IX (FISCAL YEAR)

SECTION 1 The fiscal year of the WRLCA shall be from July first (1) to June thirtieth (30th). The term of the officers of the WRLCA shall be from the time of installation to the installation of their successors.

<u>SECTION 2</u> The fiscal year of the County Units and District Associations shall be from July first (1) to June thirtieth (30th).

# ARTICLE X (RULES GOVERNING COUNTY UNITS AND DISTRICT ASSOCIATIONS)

#### SECTION 1 Districts and Counties:

DISTRICT ONE (1) shall be composed of the County Units of: ISLAND-SKAGIT-SAN JUAN (Island, Skagit and San Juan Counties); K-S (King and Snohomish Counties); WHATCOM (Whatcom County).

DISTRICT TWO (2) shall be composed of the County Units of: KITSAP (Kitsap County); CLALLAM-JEFFERSON (Clallam and Jefferson Counties); LOWER COLUMBIA (Clark, Skamania, Cowlitz, Wahkiakum, and the 986 offices of Pacific and Klickitat Counties); MUTUAL (Pierce, Grays Harbor, Thurston, Mason, Lewis, and the non 986 offices of Pacific Counties)

DISTRICT THREE (3) shall be composed of the County Units of: CHELAN-DOUGLAS (Chelan and Douglas Counties); LGA (Lincoln, Grant and Adams Counties): OKANOGAN (Okanogan County); NORTHEAST WASHINGTON COUNTIES (Stevens, Ferry and Pend Oreille Counties); SPOKANE (Spokane County)

DISTRICT FOUR (4) shall be composed of the County Units of: SOUTHEAST WASHINGTON (Walla Walla, Columbia, and Garfield Counties); WHITMAN-ASOTIN (Whitman and Asotin Counties); YAKIMA VALLEY (Franklin, Kittitas, Yakima, Benton, and the non 986 offices of Klickitat Counties).

SECTION 1A Each District shall hold at least one (1) meeting a year by either combining with another District to have a joint meeting or by having its own District meeting. If the District meetings are combined with another District, the meeting location shall be in the District nominating the District Representative. All members of each District shall be notified of the time and place of said meeting or meetings. Notice will be sent to all members fifteen (15) days prior to an election.

SECTION 2 Secretaries of the County Units shall remit to the State Secretary-Treasurer within fifteen (15) days of their receipt, all monies for per capita dues. County secretaries shall also inform the State Secretary-Treasurer of any changes in membership ( such as change of address, resigned or deceased) in a timely manner.

SECTION 3 Each County Unit at their annual meeting shall elect their delegates to the State Convention by ballot in all cases where there is more than one candidate for each delegate position. Delegates will be listed in accordance with the number of votes received. The delegate receiving the most votes will be the delegate at large. In case of tie, the members will decide the placement by another ballot. Each County

Secretary shall immediately, after the regular annual meeting of their County Unit, fill out in duplicate, credentials of Delegate-at-Large, Regular, and Alternate delegates to the State Convention in order of votes received. The duplicate is to be retained for identification by the delegate and the original is to be sent to the State Secretary with proper endorsement by the County President and the County Secretary. Also each County Secretary shall submit the names of the newly elected County Officers to the State Secretary. Such newly elected officers shall assume office upon election.

SECTION 3A The County Secretary, when submitting resolutions and propose changes to the Constitution and By-Laws to the State Secretary, shall submit them in the proper form as follows: Make a copy of each resolution and proposed change to the Constitution and By-Laws, preferably typewritten, following the form provided by the State Secretary-Treasurer, and state whether it is a resolution or a proposed change to the Constitution and By-Laws.

SECTION 4 A single year's per annum payments from the state to a county unit shall revert to the state's general fund if either of the following conditions are met: (1) The county unit failed to send a Delegate-At-Large to either of the two most recent State Conventions and has \$500 or more in liquid assets as of the most recent LM report; or (2) The county unit failed to send a second delegate to either of the two most recent State Conventions and has liquid assets of \$21 or more per member as of the most recent LM report.

SECTION 5 Each County Unit shall hold its annual meeting after October 1st and at least forty (40) days prior to the State Convention and the regular meeting shall be designed by statute. The County Secretary will notify all County members, their District Representative, State Secretary, State President and State Steward at least fifteen (15) days prior to the election of County Officers and Delegates. They shall make and adopt such other By-Laws as their needs may suggest and such laws must harmonize with this code of laws.

<u>SECTION 6</u> All County Unit or District Constitution and By-Laws shall be in harmony with the National and State Constitution and By-Laws.

SECTION 7 The County Unit or District Association is subordinate to the WRLCA. Likewise, the WRLCA is subordinate to the NRLCA. Any County Unit or District Association or any member thereof who shall cause to have introduced or endeavor to have passed in Congress or the State Legislature any measure relative to legislation for Rural Carriers which has not had the approval of the WRLCA or its officers shall have charges preferred against such County Unit, District or member, as the case may be, and if charges are proven true, the County Unit, District or member shall be indefinitely suspended.

#### ARTICLE XI (COMMITTEES)

<u>SECTION 1</u> The Committee on Credentials shall examine the credentials of all delegates to the State Convention. They shall also back up and assist the teller's committee, when voting on the issues on the floor at the State Convention requires the use of a 2<sup>nd</sup> teller's committee.

SECTION 1A On the first day of the State Convention, the Credentials Committee will give a preliminary report. Final report of the Credentials Committee shall be given not later than ten (10:00) a.m. on the second day of the State Convention. All delegates shall be seated by the passing of the final report of the Credentials Committee.

<u>SECTION 2</u> The Committee on Audit shall examine the books of the Secretary-Treasurer, as well as the reports of the County Units, and shall report to the WRLCA when called upon.

SECTION 3 The Committee on Mileage and Per Diem shall make up a listing of delegates and/or elected and appointed officers who are entitled to receive mileage and per diem as per the WRLCA Constitution and By Laws. The listing shall show the name, title (delegate at large or state paid county delegate, elected or appointed officer), mileage, and per diem due for each person.

<u>SECTION 4</u> The duties of the Committee on Constitution and By-Laws shall be: To examine all changes proposed for amending or changing the Constitution and By-Laws that have been passed and submitted by the county units, and those submitted by the finance committee that falls in parameters of their

responsibility. They may examine and correct, when called upon, proposed laws governing County Units or District Associations so that they will not conflict with the National or State Constitutions.

SECTION 5 The duties of the Committee on Resolutions shall be to examine all proposed resolutions passed and submitted by the county units, and those submitted by the finance committee that falls in parameters of their responsibility, and present same to the elected delegates, identifying them as binding (and to whom) or non binding. The Resolutions Committee can also propose any courtesy resolutions they deem necessary and present same to the elected delegates at State Convention.

SECTION 6 The duties of the Teller's Committee shall be: To count the ballots for National Convention delegates and to total the results of paper count voting on the floor. If the Teller's Committee is off the floor then the Credentials Committee will act as a backup to the Teller's Committee concerning paper count voting on the floor.

SECTION 7 The duties of the Finance Committee shall be: To review the finances of the past year and to review any suggestions from the board and delegates for the next year, and then to propose financial suggestions concerning State, County, and Auxiliary dues, salaries and expenses for the upcoming year.

SECTION 8 The duties of THE WASHINGTON RURAL CARRIER Committee shall be: To review the expenses to publish and mail THE WASHINGTON RURAL CARRIER and to make any suggestions concerning future publications.

<u>SECTION 9</u> The duties of the Nominating Committee shall be: To seek nominees for the offices open and present these names to the convention delegates.

SECTION 10 The duties of all other committees shall be those usual to such committees and they shall report when called upon.

#### ARTICLE XII (MILEAGE AND PER DIEM)

SECTION 1 The WRLCA shall pay round trip mileage to each Delegate-at-Large, State Paid Delegates, State Officers, Insurance Director, Political Action Committee Director, State Steward, Assistant State Stewards, and Area Stewards attending the State Convention. The mileage will be computed using a current door-to-door computer mileage program. The mileage rate shall be decided at each State Convention of the WRLCA.

SECTION 2 The WRLCA shall pay a 3 day per diem allowance to each Delegate-at-Large, State Paid Delegates, State Officers, Insurance Director, Political Action Committee Director, State Steward, Assistant State Stewards, and Area Stewards attending the State Convention. The amount of per diem allowance shall be decided at each State Convention of the WRLCA.

SECTION 3 In addition to paying mileage and per diem for one (1) Delegate-at-Large for each County Unit, the WRLCA shall pay mileage and per diem on the same basis as paid the Delegate-at-Large for one (1) regular delegate for each one-hundred (100) county members, provided this shall in no way increase the total number of delegates to which each County Unit is entitled.

#### ARTICLE XIV (PRINTING CONSTITUTION AND BY-LAWS)

<u>SECTION 1</u> The Secretary shall have the Constitution and By-Laws printed in the Convention issue of THE WASHINGTON RURAL CARRIER, which will be mailed to all members.

#### ARTICLE XV (AMENDMENTS)

SECTION 1 The Constitution and By-Laws shall take effect as soon as adopted.

SECTION 2 This State Constitution and By-Laws shall be in harmony with the National Constitution and By-Laws. The County Unit is subordinate to the WRLCA and the WRLCA is subordinate to the NRLCA. Any provisions of this Constitution and By-Laws which conflicts with any Federal or State Law, regulation or ordinance shall be inoperative as to those jurisdictions in which said Federal or State Law, regulation or ordinance is in force.

<u>SECTION 3</u> Constitution and By-Laws amendments shall become effective upon adjournment of the State Convention unless otherwise stipulated and shall require a two-thirds vote to amend.


