

Hello, Washington Rural Carriers:

I have attached the Year-to-Date (YTD) Log of Grievances Appealed to Step 3. It is interesting to note that all of them are the result of Seattle District Designees denying grievances at Step 2, or issuing settlements that were in reality denials. There have been NO Step 3 appeals for Washington carriers in either the Spokane or the Portland Districts. It is no wonder that the Assistants and I are a bit charred around the edges. The 9 discipline and 33 contract grievance files YTD add up to a total of 3,282 pages, or an average of 78 pages each. Just the Step 2 Decisions alone total 141 pages, or an average of 3 and 1/3 pages each, and our 126 pages of Additions and Corrections average 3 pages each. I suspect that the number of grievances for our WRLCA July 1, 2002, through June 30, 2003, year will be pretty close to 48, or exactly double what we saw last year.

Congress threatening RLC's benefits, pension

The House Budget Committee has assigned savings of \$39.5 Billion over 10 years to the House Government Reform Committee. The cuts are supposed to eliminate "waste, fraud, and abuse" from mandatory programs. These cuts will affect Rural Letter Carriers' pensions possibly, retirement benefits, increase Health insurance costs, and possibly decrease or get rid of retiree's COLAs.

In order to stop these cuts, we MUST have as many Rural Letter Carriers and Auxiliary as possible writing letters to their Congressmen! I have put a draft letter up on the NRLCA Web Site. It is that time of the year again when I begin to prepare for the Annual Legislative Seminar in Washington DC. There are a number of issues that we as Rural Carriers

and we as part of the family of Federal workers should be concerned about.

The Presidential Commission on the Postal Service is still meeting and considering ideas about the organization of the USPS. There are still bills pending and in various states of preparation on the issue of the Social Security Windfall Elimination and the Government Pension Offset. There are bills pending on the Rural Carriers' tax issues. These are all issues that we as Rural Letter Carriers should be concerned about. If you go to the website of the NRLCA – www.nrlca.org – you can find out more about these issues and how they may affect you in the future. Take the time to contact your Representatives and Senators, make your opinions known.

Right now, <u>TODAY</u>, an issue that is of grave concern to us as members of that vast family of federal employees is the House Budget Committee Chairman's misguided notion that to eliminate "waste, fraud and abuse" drastic cuts should be made in mandatory and discretionary funds.

With proposed cuts approaching nearly \$40 billion over 10 years, some or perhaps all of the following things could occur:

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- 1. A voucher plan for FEHB program
- 2. Base retirees' health benefits on length of service
- 3. Eliminate COLAs for federal retirees
- 4. Change the formula used to set pensions
- 5. Reorganize the government's matching contributions to TSP

If you go to the NRLCA website you will find in the legislative updates section an example of a letter that you can download as a word document. If you use this template you can fill in your Representative's name and address and let her or him know that you as a Rural Carrier do not support these flawed notions. At this point we are concerned with bringing our power of the pen to bear on just the members of the House of Representatives.

## GUEST AT WASHINGTON APWU CONVENTION

The Washington President of the American Postal Workers Union invited your State Steward and me to attend their State convention in Wenatchee on April 9-11, 2003. To my knowledge, this is the first time that a member of the NRLCA has attended a Washington APWU Convention, and on April 10, Charles was privileged to speak before the group. Charles talked about Workplace Environment, as often when management is causing trouble for rural carriers, trouble is being caused for clerks as well. The sharing of information, interviews, and

history should help both Unions. Charles gave the example of one

office where he had recently appealed to Step 3 a grievance on Sexual Harassment and a bad Workplace Environment caused by an out-of-control supervisor who was transferred from a previous post office for the same reason. The steward who handled an APWU grievance at the former post office has offered to share letters to the Seattle District and documents from his case. The more the APWU and the WA-RLCA can work together and network, the more likelihood of actually being able to correct bad management's actions.

There were 64 voting delegates at the Convention, as well as two National officers and five guests. The minutes were passed as printed, with no reading of the minutes aloud. The Sheridan Tacoma Hotel is the site of their convention next year, with a room cost of \$99/night and \$5 for parking. This is a Union hotel.

Charles Smith from Ann Lamm's office handled the Hospitality Room. Incidentally, when there was a removal in Ann's office last year, Charles was very helpful and sent information and files to me.

Tunstall spoke about the Presidential Commission, as the Union feels this Commission is a big threat to the APWU. Already 45,000 members/jobs have been lost in the clerk craft, and with mechanization, automation, contracting out, and work sharing, not to mention the possibility of taking away Collective Bargaining, the clerks have much to worry about. When clerks retire, they are not being replaced. About 78-79% of the craft belong to the Union, but with the loss of 45,000 members and their dues, the Union is looking at downsizing the number of officers, especially in the Washington, D.C., area. Even at the State level, a Constitution and Bylaws was passed to eliminate two Districts, so now the State has four Districts, very similar in composition to

those of the WA-RLCA.

There is only one Labor person on the Presidential

Commission, and all members are Republicans, according to Mr. Tunstall. The APWU calls their Political Action Committee COPA, and just as we do with PAC, they look at Union issues and support those who support the Union and the Postal Service, whether they are Republicans or Democrats. Mr. Tunstall then said that there was a meeting of all Postal Union National Secretary/Treasurer Representatives, and NRLCA Secretary/Treasurer Clifford Dailing was in attendance.

Mr. Tunstall urged a grassroots campaign with all Postal Unions fighting to keep privatization at bay. The clerks also have a problem with postmasters in small offices doing clerk work, thus causing clerks to lose hours.

It was interesting to see the APWU members debating issues, as there are many different crafts represented: Clerks, Maintenance, and Motor Vehicle Drivers, and the clerks were further divided by those who work in Post Offices and those who work in plants, although they are all still called clerks.

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
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## \*\*\*\*\*\*\*\*\*\* District 1 ... Spring 2003

## \***\*** District 2... Do We Value our State and Assistant State Stewards?

How many of our members REALLY know or even care about what these people do for them on a daily basis? I myself really had no clear picture until I became a member of the State Board. Let me help by describing **SOME** of their duties:

- 1) With only 74 local stewards we are down 35 local stewards from covering the offices in the Seattle District---therefore the Assistant stewards have to cover them by going out to the offices and try to settle at Step 1s, do all the investigations, meet repeatedly with management and grievant and do all the paperwork. I as a local steward can tell you that this step alone takes a lot of time, energy, patience and Time away from my family.
- 2) They appeal all the Step 2 and 3. This entails more paperwork, phone calls, additions and corrections from the Step 1 paperwork, and DEALING with STEP 2 designee from management. Step 2s and 3s are up 3 to 4 times what they were just 1 year ago.
- 3) They have NO days or evenings off. They are always on call, answering emails. Even if they take a day of LWOP to stay home and work on a grievance- most have J or H routes. That means they are only getting compensated for about 7 hours a day. These people put in 12-14 hours that day. How fair is that????
- 4) The stress level is off the WALL!! NO family life. Husbands and wives understandably upset because their partners have too much work to do, or the phone keeps ringing and they are just to tired or sick to go and do anything as a family.
- 5) Health problems: High blood pressure is always a dangerous problem. And when anyone gets so tired and stressed out this generally occurs.







## \*\*\*\*\*\*\*\* **District 4...Drive Safely**

Rural motor vehicle accidents have been occurring at an alarming rate throughout the country. There have been numerous serious accidents causing serious injuries and deaths. An alarming number of these accidents involve RCA's and TRC's.

This year in the Spokane District there have been 26 motor vehicle accidents involving rural carriers. 17 of these accidents involved RCA's or TRC's which amounts to 65% of these accidents. It is estimated that replacement carriers work roughly only 15% of the rural carrier work hours in the district. These statistics indicate that our replacement carriers are involved in a disproportionate share of these motor vehicle accidents.

All carriers, whether regular or replacement:

- Are you alert and aware of hazards around your vehicle?
- Is your delivery vehicle well maintained, good tires and brakes?
- Do you drive defensively at all times, whether at work or on your own time?

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## \*\*\*\*\*\*\*\*\*\*\*\*\*\*\*\* Is my vote more important then yours?

\*\*\*\*\*\*\*\*\*\*\*\*\*\*\*\*\* Of course my vote is not more important then any other member. Yet each year we hold a State Convention where not all of the county credentialed delegates are paid equally to attend. Some are paid round trip mileage and per diem, some are paid more then that, yet many are paid less then that, usually not even one third of what the delegate at large is paid, and sometimes not at all. So what is that saying to our potential county delegates, especially the new members wanting to get active? Is only the delegate at large and state paid delegate's vote more important?

Each year the finance committee and the delegates at State Convention try to find a way to adequately fund the counties so that they can reimburse their delegates that attend State Convention, but as of today, some counties have inordinate amounts of money in their treasury, and some have hardly any. I personally have spent hours trying to figure out how to get more participation at State Convention (which would also increase participation at the county level) while equaling reimbursing those delegates so that no one is paid more or less. I asked how other States reimburse their delegates at State Convention and was amazed how different each State can be. Some do not reimburse anything; some reimburse all who attend, and many versions in between. So this last year I asked as many members I could, including most of the county officers, and this is the feedback I got. As goals:

- INCREASE participation at the county meetings. The county meeting's is where the delegates need to be credentialed, and resolutions need to be first presented, as well as having informative speakers and agendas.
- 2. ADEQUATELY fund the counties so the are empowered to meet the needs of their members, whether it is holding one meeting a year or one a month.
- 3. REIMBURSE the credentialed county delegates the same, so that ALL have the same

same opportunity to attend state convention remembering that all are giving up their annual or taking LWOP to attend.

4. SUPPORT the county's by having the State fund the steward system so that each county has steward representation, in the offices and at the county meetings.

So, with these great ideas and goals, I am hoping at this years State Convention we can come up with a way to pay all the county credentialed delegates the same. I can not go on being a conscientious delegate at State Convention while not recognizing that some delegates get paid more to attend then others. All delegates and their vote are just as important and valued, and all have donated their time to attend. Let's make it fair for all!

This year has been tough on the steward system. . Steward costs are up 46% from the same period last year. The cost of arbitrations as well as increased grievances have kept our assistants and state steward on the edge of burnout trying to complete more and more in a "office" day to keep costs down, most of the time working over 12 hours a day. This would not be acceptable from our employer, the USPS, so why do we expect and allow our assistants and state steward to do this? It is past time to review the steward system reimbursement plan, and make necessary changes. Most States pay their assistants and state steward the same rate of pay per day (such as a 46K at step 12) and pay them a ADOP (association day of pay) for any day worked on association business, including weekends. In fact, the National board policy suggests that the State reimburse anyone working a day of association business to get a day of pay. We can not expect our stewards to donate more and more of their family time; it is not ethical or moral!

I hope you all plan to attend State Convention and let your ideas be heard. It is our union, so let's join together to make our career what we want it to be.

## MINUTES FROM WRLCA BOARD MEETING

March 31 - April 1, 2003

## West Coast SeaTac Hotel, Seattle, Washington

MEMBERS IN ATTENDANCE: Dan Schrup, President; Patricia Alexander, Vice President; Becky Wendlandt, Secretary/Treasurer; Margene Horrell, Editor; Becky Pike, District One; Ann Lamm, District Two; Noretta Stritzke, District Three; Dave Reppe, District Four; Lynn Walker, Retired Carrier; and Charles Alexander, State Steward on April 1. Also in attendance was Senior Assistant State Steward Judith Peck on March 31.

## AGENDA:

The board, after a positive go around, reviewed the agenda and reached consensus to waive the reading of the ground rules. The meeting started 8:30 a.m.

#### **GROUND RULES:**

The reading of the ground rules was waived with consensus by the board.

#### **BOARD POLICY:**

The board policy was reviewed concerning those items coming up before the next board meeting. Discussion on vouchers procedures, with no changes made in board policy.

#### **MINUTES:**

The minutes from the January 7-8, 2003 board meeting were approved as read.

## SECRETARY'S UPDATE:

- Magnetic Signs: The board reviewed Dave Reppe's information about the 4 X12 magnetic sign that stats "Proud to be a Rural Carrier". The company offered them for half price at \$2.00 each. The board authorized Dave to purchase 100 signs and bring them to State Convention. They are to be used by the Ad Hoc trainers to promote membership recruitment. Any new RCA/TRC that signs an 1187 will receive one for free.
- Finances: The board reviewed the 8-month financial statement and budget against future expenses and needs.
- The board authorized Becky to purchase a new Dell desktop to replace the Secretary's Gateway. The Gateway's floppy disk drive and CD drive are no longer working.

- The board authorized Margene, Dave, and Becky to meet prior to State Convention to review the finances and put together a proposal for State Convention.
- Membership Recruitment: The board discussed the need to have a coordinator for the 3 District's Ad Hoc Trainers that would provide them information, supplies for recruitment, and check on stats of RCA/TRC's being trained.
- GMAC Promotional Allowance: Dan, as the GMAC representative, received a promotional allowance of \$500 in March to be used to recruit new policies to help us and GMAC meet our goal for 2003. Since the check was payable to the State, Dan gave it to Becky to be deposited into the State's checking account. Discussion on how it was to be used, with suggestions of giving \$10 to everyone who submits an insurance quote at State Convention, and putting cash into envelopes to be drawn out for those who have GMAC to encourage renewals.
- Funding of delegates to State Convention: Discussion on a plan to fund all state convention delegates for 1 ½ mileage one way and 3 days per diem for all delegates who are credentialed at their annual county meeting and attend all of State Convention. In 2002 we had a total of 76 delegates with 43 being state paid for a total of \$13,428.11. The State returned \$10,400 to the counties to fund the additional 33 delegates, with some being paid more then the delegate at large and some only partial. Discussion on how each delegates vote is important and all should be equally compensated. Suggestions were to fund each delegate equally with the board putting a cap on the total paid out each year. Also discussion on how important county participation is and how to encourage it by funding each delegate the same, as well as only allowing delegates that have been voted on and credentialed at the county unit to be seated as delegates at State Convention.

Membership Totals: The total membership as of March 31 is 1754 members. The breakdown is as follows:

**Delegates Names**: Becky to inform Bev (the steno) to put in the minutes, all the delegates' names and county they represent, as well as listing of retirees, first timers, and juniors.

Consensus items for 2003 State Conventions and Labor Relations Seminar:

- 1) Have a separate mailing (postcard) to invite members to the labor relation's seminar on Sunday. (This increased attendance at 2002 convention)
- 2) Get group picture of County Presidents, Secretary/Treasurers, First Timers, Retirees, Juniors, Carrier of the Year, Auxiliary Board and Association Board for Convention Issue of the WRC.

### STATE STEWARD UPDATE - SPRING 2003

THE ANNUAL RITE OF 2080/2240 PROJECTIONS
By Charles Alexander, WA-RLCA State Steward

Every year in the spring, managers dust off their broken record spiels and begin warning regular rural carriers whose workhours are projected to exceed 2,080 by the end of the guarantee year in November, that special measures might have to be taken. Typical of the written warnings, where written warnings are given, is the following:

#### Dear Problem Carrier:

The attached printout is an indication of possible problems with your year-end carrier hours staying within the 2080 hours and/or 2240 hours. It is early yet, but this official notification is to give you clear notice that your hours are such that indicate a problem. I am required to manage all routes to stay within these limits. At the very least, the printout is to alert us both to the fact that you are using more hours a week than your evaluation. Your weekly hours must stay at or below your evaluation, or you will continue to have problems. As stated before, it is my obligation to review all aspects of your work methods and delivery area. If you wish an adjustment or have any ideas that will result in more efficient casing and delivery, please feel free to speak to your Supervisor.

Some of you may have already been approached by your managers regarding potential 2080 and/or 2240 problems. I feel it is a bit too early to start worrying about these figures since the heavier Christmas volumes still account for a disproportionate number of the recorded workhours.

Managers hope to eliminate the possibility of any rural carrier exceeding the annual work hour guarantee, and the "Rural Carrier Projected Annual Work Hours" report is being closely monitored. Each pay period, managers must review this report to be certain that the rural carrier in question has a sufficient leave balance to keep from exceeding 2080 and/or 2240 hours. Furthermore, it is typical for postmasters' bosses to apply extra pressure. For example, I once managed to obtain an email from a Manager of Post Office Operations (MPOO) to all of his postmasters which stated the following:



"Your office has one or more rural carriers that are in danger of exceeding 2080/2240 workhours in the current guarantee period. Action plans and guarantees that the carriers will not exceed these maximums are no longer adequate. You are instructed that these routes must be cut in evaluation, now. Contact me immediately with the date that this will be accomplished."

The report that causes management's annual 2080/2240 hyperactivity is titled "Rural Carrier Projected Annual Work Hours Report." In my opinion, the underlined language in the part of this report copied below just isn't accurate. In fact, a Washington Rural Carrier filed a grievance against the Postal Service for under compensating him after he exceeded 2,240 workhours in a guarantee year. That grievance was appealed to Step 3 and is currently awaiting a hearing at Step 4. Without re-arguing the grievance in the confines of this article, suffice it to say that the following language from the "Rural Carrier Projected Annual Work Hours Report" represents the Postal Service's viewpoint:

**"2080:** FLSA B carriers must be paid overtime for any actual hours that exceed 2080 for the guarantee year. Since Xmas Overtime, FLSA overtime, and DACA Code 5 hours are paid at the overtime rate in the pay period in which they are worked, these hours are not included in the calculation toward 2080. For example, if a carrier works 2090 hours in a guarantee year, but he/she worked 12 hours of Christmas overtime in December, the carrier's total hours toward the 2080 limit would be 2078.

If a regular rural carrier exceeds 2080, all hours worked in excess of 2080 must be paid at the overtime rate.

2240: Regular rural carriers who are FLSA Code B are paid evaluated hours for working their route. All actual hours worked, regardless of the rate at which they are paid, are counted toward the 2240 limit. Any carrier who works in excess of 2240 hours in a guarantee year is no longer under the evaluated system and must convert retroactively to FLSA Code A (hourly rate) for the entire guarantee year.

If a regular carrier exceeds 2240, all of the carrier's pay for the entire guarantee year <u>must be</u> recomputed and paid on an hourly basis, instead of an evaluated basis."

The viewpoint represented in the grievance referenced above is that when a rural carrier works his/her relief day for 150% of the daily evaluation of the route, those hours **should** 

count toward 2080 since they are not bona fide FLSA overtime hours, like Christmas overtime. Furthermore, if a rural carrier's total workhours do happen to exceed 2,240 in the guarantee year, then that carrier should be paid a sum of money, in addition to what he/she was already paid. representing the total of all hours exceeding 40 in any week in the guarantee year times the FLSA overtime rate for the total of those hours in excess of 40.

It is possible for a regular rural carrier to be projected to exceed 2240 hours, but not exceed 2080 hours. There are different criteria that apply to each work hour limit.

For example, if a regular rural carrier works 50 hours of Christmas overtime, all of those hours count toward 2240, but none of them would count toward 2080.

"Rural carriers cannot be forced to use leave without pay or forced to pre-schedule their annual leave far in advance of any certainty of being in

2080 trouble."

The Postal Service believes that it is also possible for a rural carrier to end up owing money if he/she exceeds 2240, because it is the Postal Service's position that every week you work under 40 hours, you will have to pay back the built-in overtime amount represented by the evaluation hours in excess of 40, plus the straight-time hours equal to the number of hours actually worked that were less than 40. As stated above, the Union position in the grievance awaiting Step 4 is that the Postal Service owes overtime in addition to the salary already paid for every hour of every week that a carrier's workhours exceeded 40.

Reports that are run early in the guarantee year will be less accurate, because there are fewer weeks on which to base the estimates. and because most rural carriers will have used little or no leave. Also, reports that are run early in the year include the Christmas period, which is typically a high work hour usage, and these reports do not include the summer months, which traditionally have

less mail and fewer work hours. At the end of each count, every rural carrier has the opportunity to sign on the Form 4241 that sufficient leave will be taken to keep from exceeding 2080. Annual leave should be taken into consideration, and if 2080 danger occurs toward the end of the year, then leave without pay is an option. At no time, however, can the Postal Service require a rural carrier to take LWOP in order to stay under 2080.

Everyone should ensure that his/her Form 4240-Trip Sheet is completely filled out, listing the number of hours used by the regular rural carrier and the number of hours

> used by the leave replacement. These figures should help us keep track of our hours, especially if baselines are provided for each

Accounting Period (AP). As I have often said to managers, rural carriers are usually more than willing to help monitor their own work hours if they are provided with the necessary data. Far too often, when I visit a rural office, I find that the top of the Form 4240 is either completely blank or will only have the name and route of the rural carrier.

Some uninformed managers think that they have the right to require rural carriers to schedule their annual leave early in the year or at any time the Christmas-weighted projections indicate a potential problem. Rural carriers cannot be forced to use leave without pay or forced to pre-schedule their annual leave far in advance of any certainty of being in 2080 trouble.

What are the potential consequences of going over 2080 or 2240? One of the first options the manager has is to adjust the route, and most of us would not want this to happen. Carriers who have elected the high option (more money, but less time off) are likely to see that option reduced to low

(less money, but more time off.) Managers may also give auxiliary assistance, but with the on-going budget problems, it is difficult to believe that managers will use this option. Managers may also require that we use sufficient annual leave to stay under 2080, but they cannot force us to use annual leave early in the year just in case 2080 may become a problem.

Good luck in staying under 2080 and 2240. As you can see, this is extremely important to your manager, and in the long run, important to us as rural carriers. With decreased mail count standards, higher percentages of DPS, red-lined "R" time, and in some cases, adjusted or rebuilt routes, it is easy to argue that we continue to do more and more work for any given evaluation. Rural carriers who were previously close to exceeding 2080 or 2240 could easily find it more difficult to stay under these important benchmarks.

# ELECTRONIC TIMEKEEPING FOR RURAL CARRIERS

There are currently more questions than answers about the new system of electronic time keeping for rural carriers. Historically, and as stipulated in the Rural Carrier Duties and Responsibilities PO-603, Section 152.7, rural carriers are required to "Record daily on Form 4240 in hours and minutes the exact time of reporting, leaving, returning to the office, and completion of duties. No other time record is required."

Obviously, language will have to be modified when Electronic Badge Readers (EBRs), are used in conjunction with new Time and Attendance software for rural carriers known as the Rural Time and Attendance Collection System (RTACS) to record rural carrier time and attendance.

The NRLCA National Board has discussed everything from compensation for extra duties to whether the Form 4240 Trip Sheet

will be eliminated or partially eliminated. As of this writing, the Postal Service is planning to roll out RTACS in many offices with rural delivery in Washington State as early as May 2003, without any answers, proposals, or decrees regarding the financial consequences that RTACS is certain to bring.

Rural carriers in offices where RTACS is implemented need to pay special attention to their pay stubs. Supervisors or postmasters who have historically sent the rural time cards to the District where Data Entry Technicians then entered the relevant data and transmitted same to the Minneapolis Data Center will now be transmitting rural time card data directly to Minneapolis themselves. The possibility of increased errors is almost a certainty.

Assuming all of the financial consequences and duties have not been worked out by the time RTACS is implemented, a pretty good assumption, rural carriers would be well served to keep accurate records of any extra time associated with the RTACS program. To do otherwise would be to invite the Postal Service to once again add extra duties at your expense.

As a little bit of an introduction, I am the spouse of an association member and a wheat farmer in eastern Washington.



## Eligibility:


- \* Any member of the Association may be nominated as a candidate for the Carrier of the Year Award.
