FULL DAY OF RELIEF

Sometimes when the mail is heavy, as it was on Wednesday, January 3, 2007, managers decide to "manage" the mail, as there is way too much mail for a rural carrier to handle in one day. While it is admirable that your manager wants to even out the work load, some



carriers and/or RCAs may end up doing more work than they should when they follow whoever worked the route the day before and mail is delayed for the next day. More than one rural carrier has come to work after being off on annual leave and found a tub of flats, or perhaps, more than just a tub of flats, from the day before, or from several days before. Seeing this mail can push the hot button for most of us, as nowadays it is difficult enough to do our own work in a day, much less work that should have been done by someone else. More than one rural carrier has gotten into trouble for loudly announcing in no uncertain terms that this is unfair! It is one thing if every route in the office has mail left, but we have all seen it happen that just one or two routes have mail left, and the other routes had all their mail cased and delivered, as it should have been for all routes.

A WALL STATES

Problems arise when the rural carrier's work day varies above the daily evaluation. If the mail volume fluctuates above the average, leave replacements in some instances may not perform the same work that the regular carrier would have performed if the regular carrier had been working. Managers will sometimes allow curtailing of mail for a variety of reasons or may instruct leave replacements to leave the office after working the evaluated time for the route. These actions cause work to be left unperformed, even though the leave replacement is receiving pay for performing the work. This causes additional work for the regular carrier on his/her next scheduled day. The regular carrier should not be required to perform work that should have been performed by the leave replacement. Neither the rural carrier nor the leave replacement should leave mail for the next day if he/she is not working the next day. We should not have to do someone else's work.

This situation of having mail left, although not specifically referred to in the contract in black and white, gave rise to enough concern from enough regular carriers that it became an issue.

GRIEVANCES AND DECISIONS

Leave replacements being allowed to leave mail on the relief day that the regular carrier had to case and deliver on his/her next scheduled day caused enough problems that grievances were filed. The regular carriers felt that they were not being given a full day of relief when they had to perform work that was left over from their relief day. The reasoning was that had the regular carriers worked on this day themselves, they would have completed the work. The feeling was that the leave replacements were receiving pay for the daily evaluation of the route and yet not performing all of the work. This resulted in the regular carriers performing the remainder of the work on their next scheduled workday along with their own day's work without additional compensation. In other words, the regular carriers were doing work that someone else had been paid to do and were not being compensated for it.

Eventually, one of these many grievances made its way to Step 4 of the Grievance/ Arbitration Procedure. On April 15,1988, a grievance filed by A. Szyperski of Sanford, MI, was discussed and the following decision was rendered.

Re: A. Szyperski Sanford, MI 48657 H4R-4M-C 39280

"...During our discussion, we mutually agreed the replacement for the relief day is compensated for full-day evaluation for the relief day. Accordingly, the substitute should perform the normal duties on the relief day the same as the regular carrier on any other day. This includes casing all mail..."

STEP 4 DECISION IS A TOOL TO USE

This Step 4 decision has become a tool to use in a variety of ways in many "Full Day of Relief grievances. Eventually the "Full Day of Relief" issue expanded to include not only relief days, but also any time that the regular carrier was on leave.

Some Step 3 decisions went a step further to prescribe remedies for carriers who were left work from their "day off." Some of these include pay for the additional work, an additional day off, and auxiliary assistance. Auxiliary assistance provided by the leave replacement to complete the work that was left from the "day off" is probably the most common remedy.

Although most of the above is addressing the situation of a leave replacement's not completing the full days work and leaving this work for the regular carrier, the reverse is equally true. Regular carriers should not fail to complete the day's work and expect the relief to take care of it the next day.

A WORD OF CAUTION

Carriers and Stewards should be cautious when initiating a "full day's relief" grievance. The Step 4 decision states "... the substitute should perform the normal duties of the regular carrier on any other day." There may be instances due to exceptionally heavy mail volume, adverse weather conditions, etc., where some mail may be curtailed for operational or service reasons, but this delayed mail should be delayed on all routes, not just some routes, as this can certainly cause hard feelings.

A rule of thumb may be, "If the regular carrier had been working under the same conditions, would he/she have stayed until completion, or would he/she have been allowed to leave some of the work for the next day?"

Some questions may help us understand the situation better:

- Did the regular carrier work on the day following the leave replacement's failure to perform the work?
- Did other regular carriers work on the day when the mail was curtailed by the leave replacement(s)?
- If other regular carriers worked on the day in question, did they all perform the work as part of their normal day's activity, or did they also have to curtail mail?
- Did the regular carrier case all mail on the day preceding his/her day off?
- Was the RCA instructed by management not to case the afternoon mail?
- Was the RCA required to work other routes on the day in question? This is a very important question, as the RCA should have finished all work on the primary route before working on another route.

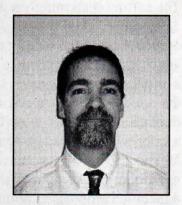
- How long did it take the carrier to case the mail left from the relief day?
- How much mail was left? (DUVRS as well as piece count)
- Did the grievant ask management for auxiliary assistance and what was the reply?

If at all possible, it is best to talk with your manager and appeal to his/her sense of fairness. After all, no one likes to do someone else's work, especially with the workloads we all carry on our rural routes. If you have kept track of the amount of time it took you to case the mail that was left for you, a reasonable manager will give you the same amount of auxiliary assistance. It is the manager's right to manage the mail, but it is also your right to be paid for casing mail that was left for you from the day before.

The position of District 1 Representative will be up for election at our State Convention in June and this will be the meeting where nominations are made from District 1 carriers. Nominations may also be made at the convention where all attendees will vote for the representative.

Annual Leave Sharing Program Cheri Freeman District 3 Representative

Most of us have heard of donating leave to a fellow carrier who has the misfortune to have a medical condition preventing them from working and who is running out



of sick and annual leave. We may have wanted to donate some of our annual leave and didn't know how to go about it. The following is a condensed version of the Annual Leave Sharing Program.

Annual Leave Sharing Program EL-510-2003-2/ELM 512.64

LSP (Postal Service Annual Leave Program) allows employees to share leave by donating or receiving earned unused annual leave. Participation is strictly voluntary.

- Eligibility to Receive Donated Leave:
 - 1.) Must be incapacitated due to personal health condition (includes incapacitating pregnancy). Medical documentation may be required.
 - 2.) Must be absent or expected to be absent from work 40hrs more than earned sick and/or annual leave will cover. (40 hrs of LWOP need not be consecutive, but must be due to qualifying health condition).
 - 3.) Submit Form 3970-R, Request to Receive Donated Leave to supervisor for processing. If unable to complete the form any other person can act in the employee's behalf.

• When Eligibility Begins & Ends:

- 1.) When request is approved, earned unused sick and/or annual leave is exhausted and 40 hrs of LWOP are accumulated (due to qualifying health condition) or the date stamped by personnel on the Form 3970-R whichever is later.
- 2.) Employee has the option (if they have been approved for advanced sick leave) of discontinuing use of approved advance sick leave or waiting until the advance has been used, before using donated leave.
- 3.) Eligibility ends when the employee separates from the Postal Service or returns to work and is no longer affected by the qualifying health condition. Use of donated leave is allowed during recovery periods or relapse due to the qualifying condition, even though the employee is working intermittently or part-time.

Donation of Leave:

 An employee may donate up to ½ of the hrs of annual leave the donor will earn during the current leave year. Based on the leave category of the donor at the time of donation.

2.) Restrictions:

- a.) Generally within a specified geographical area or facility, except for an eligible parent, spouse, or child who is an eligible employee.
- b.) May not donate to supervisor.
 - c.) Must be 8 or more whole hrs of annual leave that has been earned. (Fractions or amounts less than 8 hrs may not be donated.)
 - d.) Once the Form 3970-A has been processed, the donor may not reduce or cancel the donation. Additional hrs may be donated to same employee by completing another Form 3970-A. The 8 or more whole hrs applies to each form submitted.
 - e.) The donor may not donate annual leave that would otherwise be forfeited by the annual leave carryover limit (leave in excess of the maximum carryover the employee would not be permitted to use before the end of the leave year).

Donated Leave May be Used:

- 1.) During the recipient's eligibility period while there is a balance of donated leave available.
 - 2.) When recipient would be in normal pay status except the incapacitation due to the qualifying health condition.
 - 3.) To retroactively replace the 40 hrs that is the LWOP requirement to be eligible to receive donated leave.
 - 4.) After earned annual and sick leave is exhausted. If employee had an earned sick or annual leave balance, leave is charged in the following order: first earned sick leave; second, earned annual leave; third, donated leave.

Dated of donated leave maybe adjusted to dates immediately following the last day actually worked under the following conditions:

- 1.) OPM has approved the employee's application for disability retirement due the qualifying health condition.
- 2.) The employee has not returned to work.
- 3.) Donated leave has been use intermittently between the last day actually worked and OPM's approval of disability retirement.
- How to Use Donated Leave: Submit Form 3971 (Request for or Notification of Absence) noting 'Donated Leave' in the remarks section. The form may by completed and submitted by others acting in the employee's behalf if necessary.
- Pay Status for Donated Leave:
 - 1.) The period an employee uses donated leave is considered to be paid leave status, except they do not earn sick and/or annual leave on the donated leave hours used. All mandatory and optional deductions, allotments, and net checks to banks continue.
 - 2.) A donated leave balance appears the earnings statement once donations have been transferred. The donated leave balance will continue to appear until depleted or employee separates from the Postal Service.
- Disposition of Unused Donated Leave:
 - 1.) Remains in the employee's donated leave account and may be used to cover subsequent absences for new periods of eligibility.
 - 2.) Carried over from one leave year to the next without limit.
 - 3.) May not be returned to the donor.
 - 4.) May not be donated to another

employee.

- 5.) May not be transferred to another governmental agency.
- 6.) May be used to offset negative sick or annual leave balances caused by serious personal health conditions.
- 7.) Is included in the employee's terminal leave check upon separation. Except for separation for death or disability, it is fiorst applied to negative sick leave balances, then to negative annual leave balances, and then to the terminal leave payment. If the employee separates and then is reemployed with the Postal Service before the period covered by the lump-sum payment for terminal leave expires, usused donated leave must be reaccredited to the employee's

IMPORTANT ADDRESS CHANGE INFORMATION

Why should I change my address with my Postmaster on the blue page of the USPS when I move? I have submitted a COA, shouldn't that do it?

No it won't!

Social Security gets their addresses from the USPS for active employees. If you don't change your address online in your Post Office you will not get the yearly updates from Social Security, Thrift Savings, Flexible Spending, nor any health benefit changes, information about retirement, etc. Even your W2 goes to your address that you have on file with the USPS.

Don't delay. Take your employee ID number found on your pay stub and your PIN number and have your PM/Supervisor update your address online in your office.

State Secretary – Treasurer's Report

State Convention: WHAT IS YOUR VOTE WORTH? Priceless - the same as each and every one of your fellow county members, board members, and stewards! All county credentialed delegates get paid the same rate for mileage (\$.33 per mile) and same convention allowance (\$250), up to the cap, which has been set at \$27,000 for 2007. (Last year the total delegates pay was \$22,142 for the 57 delegates).

Here are your duties as a credentialed county delegate to State Convention:

- Ø Specific assignments to a committee as notified by the State President.
- Ø Be in attendance at all business sessions of the State Convention beginning with the opening session and not leaving until the Convention has been adjourned.

So, if you can attend all 3 days of State Convention, then make sure you attend your county meeting and ask to have your name on the ballot for State Convention delegate!

You are also welcome to attend any day or part of the convention; however unfortunately, you will not receive reimbursement for it.

National Convention Delegates: The National Convention delegate nomination form will be in the

February Issue thru the May Issue of the National paper. All you need to have your name on the ballot is to complete this nomination form and mail it to the State Secretary. Homestead Farms Convention Center, Lynden, WA

Judith Peck, Retired Carrier, was not in attendance and sent a letter of resignation that was read at this meeting.

At 8:30 AM the board meeting was called to order by President Patricia. The board did a positive go around and reviewed the agenda.

PRESIDENT'S OPENING REMARKS:

President Patricia reported on the National Constitution and Bylaws Review Committee and on the NJSC.

Patricia has asked Shawn Johnson to continue on the Seattle District EAP committee. Monte Hartshorn is on the Portland EAP Committee.

Patricia said the Presidents of all the unions, including the Postmasters, go to an informational meeting at the District Office. Patricia has been going and Patrick will be going when she is not able to attend.

GROUND RULES:

The reading of the ground rules was waived by consensus.

MINUTES:

The minutes from July 6-9, 2006 board meeting was reviewed and approved.

BOARD POLICY:

The board policy was reviewed and updated as follows:

Add Under State Convention:

- 6. "All expenses generated for State Convention need to be vouchered through the State Secretary/Treasurer with itemized receipts (original if possible) within 30 days of when the expense was incurred and have board approval. All expenses generated by someone other than the chair needs to be approved by the Convention chair first."
- 7. "All income generated for State Convention needs to be deposited in the WARLCA checking account within a week after receipt."

Add Under State Secretary/Treasurer:

2. "All WARLCA Bank Accounts Statements (APCU checking, savings, certificate of deposits; Washington Trust checking account) will be sent to the President directly from the bank.

Under 2010 National Convention:

1. "The WARLCA 2010 National Convention APCU bank account will be sent to Susie Hill directly from APCU."

REVIEW OF 2006 STATE CONVENTION:

2006 State Convention account will be closed and ended with \$1300.00 sent to WARLCA in October and \$22.10 in November.

STATE CONVENTION 2007 SPOKANE:

The contract has been signed for the Red Lion in Spokane. The dates are: Board Meeting, Wednesday, June 13, 2007

State Convention starts at 8:30 AM on Thursday, June 14, 2007, with county training scheduled for Thursday evening. Friday evening would be the banquet on the River Queen boat in Post Falls. Per diem lunches to be scheduled for Thursday, Friday, and Saturday.

State Convention ends on Saturday, June 16, 2007. Under new business would be time set for 2010 National Convention update, tour of facilities, and setting up committees. Labor Enhancement Training will be Sunday, June 17, 2007 from 9 AM to 3 PM with a buffet lunch (Potato Buffet)

Total of 100 sleeping rooms have been blocked.

Meeting room rentals are based upon Hotel's realization of 80% of the overnight guest room block and food and beverage revenues placed to the master account. Based on our tentative agenda, meeting room rental charges will be \$200, plus applicable tax. Food and Beverage Minimums are based on WARLCA having a minimum of \$3200 in food and beverage revenue. If less than \$3200, the difference in the amount spent and \$3200 will be charged in meeting room rental.

The board discussed the 2007 State convention fund.

The board discussed the Junior Program and the liability of having additional juniors with the friends of juniors attending.

STATE CONVENTION 2008 DISTRICT ONE:

The board toured Homestead Farms Golf Resort and Convention Center in Lynden. WA and Patricia signed the contract. They have 30 rooms in the hotel, plus 6 Great Links Lodge condos, so we would be their only guest during this time. Cost is \$74 single/double farmhouse std and \$89 single/double farmhouse deluxe. The Great Links Lodge Condos are \$129 single/double. All have \$2 resort fees per night. Dates are:

Friday 6/20/08: 5 rooms held in Great Links

Saturday 6/21/08: 14 rooms held. Board meeting all day Sunday 6/22/08: 36 rooms held. Steward Training all day

Monday 6/23/08: 36 rooms held. Convention Starts, Officers Training in Evening Tuesday 6/24/08: 36 rooms held. Convention 2nd day, Association Banquet in Evening

Wednesday 6/25/08: no rooms held. Last day of convention...

Becky reported that National is looking at getting the information on orientation so that a union representative can attend. The board brainstormed ideas:

- ✓ Send welcome kit to new members inviting them to county meeting
- ✓ Use incentive to get new hires to join, such as returning the form and getting a gas card, etc.
- ✓ Using a cash award to those signing someone up and/or those signing up (use in the spring)

Future Meeting Dates:

Steward Training - Local:

Reimbursement for new local steward is \$150, first enhancement is \$100, and 2nd enhancement is \$35. This year we need to have 2 different trainings minimum. One was in October, and one will be in January from National. Board decided to have the stand alone training, 2 on the west side (Olympia/Tacoma and Everett) and one in Spokane in conjunction with State Convention. Patrick has already done the first training at Snohomish on October 29 with 15 being enhanced. Charles will set up dates and training places as well as trainers. Training will be just for certified local stewards. Anyone is welcome to audit a new local steward training. If they have observed a new local steward training they can then observe enhancement training, no reimbursement. If anyone is interested in observe a new local steward training they can contact the State Steward, no reimbursement. Charles suggested a pin for those attending all 3 trainings as an elite status.

National Steward Training Seminar 2007: Renee' goes with Charles in March 22, 23, and 24th, 2007 at NRLCA in DC for National Steward Training.

<u>District Meetings</u>: District meetings will have current issues and possibly National speaker or State Steward.

District One: March 11, 2007 from 1 to 4, in Seattle area.

District Two: February 25, 2007 from 1 to 4, in Olympia area possibly.

<u>District Three and Four</u>: April 15, 2007 from 1 to 4 combine district meeting. Contract has been signed with the Red Lion Inn at the Park in Spokane.

Spring Board Meeting: Spring Board meeting will be in conjunction with District One, March 12, 2007, Monday, from 8 to 5. On Tuesday, March 13, 2007 board will be from 8 to noon.

<u>Convention Board Meeting</u>: Last board meeting just before State Convention will be in Spokane on Wednesday, June 13, 2007, from 8:30 AM to 5 PM.

<u>First Board Meeting for 07/08</u>: Susie suggested we reserve dates in July next year for the board meeting so that time will be set aside.

ING TRUSTEES:

Charles reported that Judi asked to be replaced as a trustee for ING.

WASHINGTON RURAL CARRIER:

The board set up the dates for the upcoming paper:

3rd paper: To printer by Jan 10, articles to Susie by Jan 5. Included will be State Convention Registration, new members, deceased members, financial statement, information article on State Convention (by Cheri), Thank you to Judi (by Patricia), articles from all board members, next deadline, all articles need to be in black and white, Western States, Campaign notice (Feb 20 deadline)

4th paper: To printer by Mar 1st, articles to Susie Feb 20. Included will be campaign announcements and State Convention Registration.

5th paper: To printer by end of April, articles to Susie April 15. Included will be State Convention Registration.

Note: Last day to have county meeting is May 4, 2007.

STEWARD PROGRAM UPDATE:

Charles updated the board on grievances and the dynamics in the different Districts. Charles said 90% of the grievances are out of Seattle. He has had 8 Step 3 just this week. Charles said Step 3's are up 60% from same period last year. We are up to 116 Step 3's on the current contract as of now (Spring 2002 to present).

Charles pulled up a list by all offices in the Seattle District and wants to have each office assigned to a local and assistant State Steward. He thinks it would be nice to have this as a master list for all the board and assistants. Charles will put together a mailing for all active carriers with the main focus to be to give each member 2 of the Weingarten cards. Charles will design letter to emphasis the Weingarten Cards. It will be 3 pages and have the chart for which office has which steward representing it.

Charles updated the board on CDS (Contract Delivery Service). It is a new name but same as HCR (Highway Contract Routes). HCRs were on sparsely populated highways. Postal Service needed to change the name so they could change the rules. CDS is a way to create employees without benefits, without union, without health insurance, cola's, etc. This is an assault to the rural carriers, especially where there is land boom, like new developments building in open area with thousands of homes close together. Renee' has filed 2 grievances on this already.

Charles is meeting with the District Manager and/or Bob Nelson on CDS and the formula. Patrick's argument on the formula went back to the original 3 criteria; Regulars working relief day on more than infrequent basis, shortage of relief carriers, and inability to hire

leave replacements. Focus on the inability. District is just looking at DACA 3/5, not on the local PM hiring leave replacements which they are doing. Patrick's argument: if they are hiring leave replacements how do they have an inability to hire? Patrick has 2 grievances from Silverdale and Bremerton on this.

Charles said there might be possible denied time to attend union meetings. This is on Charles list and he will talk to Seattle and with NRLCA on this. Patricia will also check with NJSC on denying time for QWL work.

Patrick and Cheri updated the board on the Assistant State Steward retreat and training. Both felt it was the best training they have had. Feedback from the group was that they appreciated the training and want to continue it yearly. Charles handed out the agenda from the 1.5 day training which included:

Delegate at Large Patricia announced that all delegates were in attendance and all seminars were covered by delegates. Patrick suggested that the State organize a dinner night on Tuesday night for the delegates to work through the proposed CBL and Resolutions.

Patrick suggested that the State pays for an alternate delegate. The board discussed that other states pay half or full delegate pay to one or more alternate delegates. This would need a constitution and bylaw proposed change for the state convention delegates to decide.

NATIONAL CONVENTION 2010 IN SPOKANE:

The board decided to hold a logo contest for the 2010 National Convention. Rules are as follows:

Logo Contest – your logo will be used and credit given. Open to Washington members and families. Deadline is March 1, 2007, to be decided by the board at the March 12, 2007 board meeting. Winner gets Logo shirt and \$50 Savings Bond. Theme can be up to each

artist but suggest it be around rural delivery and Spokane and/or Washington theme. Logo entry must be on standard 8 1/2 by 11, no less than half page size, and either be in black/ white or color. Digital format would be appreciated but not required. Electronic or mail in submissions to Susie Hill with Name, Address, and Phone number on back or with the electronic submission.

Spokane DJSC: Brian Draper will be replacing Deb Hurd from Idaho on the Spokane DJSC. Cheri reported on their pilot project, which is training the reliefs to take DPS to the street and merged it with the left hand drive project. Pat Conrad and Patricia Connelly are both coming to the November 16-17 Spokane DJSC meeting. Managers do not see DPS as an error when it is delivered wrong, which is hard to understand as it is a misdelivery. Mentoring does work no matter how it is done.

July 6, 2006 Spokane, WA

- 1. An Approved PS Form 3971 for all scheduled work days shall be submitted with the voucher for ADOP.
- 2. ADOP cannot be paid in conjunction with sick leave or any day while on official postal employment.
- 3. Any required meeting, when a person's total travel/meeting time exceeds 12 hours in 1 day, that person is eligible for ADOP the following day.
- 4. The Board policy is to preview ADOP needs for current and future meetings.
- 5. The Senior and Assistant State Stewards should notify the State Steward on their ADOP usage.
- 6. The Area Stewards will notify the appropriate Senior or Assistant State Steward prior to using ADOP.

- 2. Lost sick leave and annual days will be paid at the time they are lost. Each employee is responsible to track his/her lost sick leave and annual and submit a voucher for reimbursement. Only USPS LWOP days taken for union business are eligible to be used for lost sick leave and annual. Unscheduled days, relief days, annual days, sick leave days, F, P, X, or Z days, and holidays at the Post Office are not added to the lost sick leave and annual days tracked total. 2. Campaigning in the "Washington Rural Carrier" will be unedited, no more than 1/4 of page in size, and may be modified by the Editor to fit the paper's format.

August 16, 1998 Renton, WA

3. No Board member shall include campaign announcements in their reports including the intent to run for re-election or for any other position. Reports are not to include candidate endorsements.

July 26, 2004 Spokane, WA

4. The WARLCA Secretary's office will make available to any candidate or candidate's campaign, self-adhesive, preprinted address labels of all WARLCA Officers, State Steward, Assistant State Stewards, Area Stewards, and County Officers for any campaign announcement or mailing desired. The fee for the labels is 4 cents each. Requests must be made in writing and sent to the WARLCA State Secretary. The request must contain a statement that the purpose in obtaining the labels is for the announcement or campaigning related to the individual seeking a state officer position and/ or as a delegate to national convention. A copy of that mailing must also be included with the request for the WARLCA files. The recipient will receive an invoice for the number of labels on the list at the time of mailing from the State office. 5. The WARLCA Secretary's office will also provide the Department of Labor rules concerning the use of the WARLCA membership's address being available for campaigning for state officer position and/or as a delegate to National Convention. Once Department of Labor rules are complied with, the WARLCA State Secretary's office will honor any reasonable request, as determined by the board, by a WARLCA member candidate/delegate to distribute campaign literature to all WARLCA members at the candidate's expense. Requests will be honored in the order received. Campaign literature must be provided to the Secretary's Office in sealed, return address affixed, stamped envelopes, which are ready for mailing. Each candidate should check with postal officials to determine the proper postage. The hourly cost to affix the label to each envelope will be the responsibility of the candidate, and the recipient will receive an invoice for the hourly cost at the time of mailing from the State office. The hourly cost will be the same hourly rate as a 48 K, step 12. The candidate will also need to provide with the request a statement that the purpose in using the WARLCA's membership labels is for the announcement or campaigning related to the individual seeking a state officer position and/or as a delegate to National Convention. A copy of that mailing must also be included with the request for the WARLCA files.

August 2, 1997 Spokane, WA

6. At State Convention, campaign materials may only be distributed at or near the entrance of the convention floor.

7. The Editor will review all articles from the Board Members and Stewards for compliance to the Board policy on campaigning and has the right to edit it.

BOARD REPRESENTATION AT COUNTY MEETINGS:

1. The Board recommends that county meetings holding elections have state officer(s) in attendance.

2. District Representatives are encouraged to attend each county meeting in their District. District Representatives (or their State-level designee) must attend each annual county meeting in their District. District Representatives are not required to attend any county meetings outside their District unless designated to do so by the Board. For attending the counties Annual meeting in their District, except for their own county, District Representatives (or their state-level designee) will be reimbursed a stipend of \$100 plus round trip mileage or ADOP if total time expenditure is over 12 hours plus round trip mileage. District Representatives or their designee are to send to the Board members an E-mail overview of the county meetings they attend within one week following the meeting.

- 3. If a Board member receives a written invitation to be the speaker at a county meeting other than their own, they should consult with the President or Vice President first. (This applies to District Representatives only if the county meeting is outside their district.) 1. Local Steward reimbursement for training will be established by the board on a meeting-by-meeting basis.

2. No vouchers are paid without receipts.

3. All payroll vouchers are due on the Monday before the Postal payday. All expense vouchers are due within 30 days of the expense being incurred, except for local stewards which are due within 90 days. Any person late on expense and/or payroll vouchers must first notify the State Steward for steward reimbursement or the State President for board expenses. All expenses must be turned in on a WARLCA Expense Claim Form that is signed, dated, and includes receipts. (Original Receipts whenever possible.) 4. Secretary to review all bills before paying. The Secretary will call the President with any questionable bills. President then will call person submitting the bill. The President, Vice President, State Steward, and 1 District Representative will review all bills on a quarterly basis. Each District Representative shall be responsible for reviewing one quarter of each year.

8. WARLCA will pay \$50 a month, excluding July, to the Assistant State Stewards, Senior Assistant State Stewards, State Steward, and Secretary Treasurer for personal office and equipment usage. The Editor shall receive \$50 per WRC issue for personal office and equipment usage.

October 27, 2004 Seattle, WA

9. Any equipment and/or software over \$200 needs to have prior board approval. Such approval can be from a board meeting and/or E mails by a majority of the board members.

July 27, 2005 Spokane, WA

- 10. Actual reasonable cost of lodging and a meal allowance of \$30.00 will be reimbursed for each overnight stay that is required for association business.
- 11. Mileage, at the current IRS allowable rate, will be reimbursed to driver only for approved association business.

13. With advance approval by the board, a stipend of \$150 will be paid to non WARLCA employees to testify at an arbitration.

14. For conducting the District Meeting, the District Representative will be reimbursed a stipend of \$100 plus round trip mileage, or ADOP if total time expenditure is over 12 hours plus round trip mileage, starting with the 2006 District meetings.

CONTRACTS AND PO 603'S:

July 26, 2004 Spokane, WA

1. The PO 603's, contracts, and analysis will be sold to any one who requests them. Certified Local Stewards will receive at no cost one copy of the PO 603, contract, analysis, and Supervisors Guide to Discipline after certification.

MEMBER OF THE YEAR:

July 26, 2004 Spokane, WA

1. Member of the Year Forms to be available from all Officers and at District Meetings. Form will also be printed in the "Washington Rural Carrier." The State Secretary will send forms to all county presidents and/or secretaries once a year.

March 28, 2004 Spokane, WA

- 2. Selection Committee to be all members of the Board not nominated for Member of the Year.
- 3. Nominations for Member of the Year should be postmarked no later than 14 days prior to the opening of State Convention but received no later than the beginning of the Board meeting preceding State Convention.
- 4. Nominations to be sent to Vice President.

October 18, 1997 Wenatchee, WA

5. Decision will be made at Board Meeting before State Convention by secret ballot. Selected nominee must receive more than 50% (majority) of the votes cast.

August 16, 1998 Renton, WA

6. The current Vice President will be responsible for securing photo and plaque, and writing a short article for the convention and fall issue of WRC.

STATE CONVENTION:

July 13, 2003 Spokane, WA

1. The Vice President will be responsible for developing 'Convention Standing Rules' that will first be reviewed by the Board for Board approval and then submitted to the delegates for approval.

3. The Editor may include articles and letters from the membership at his/her discretion.

STATE SECRETARY-TREASURER:

August 2, 1997 Spokane, WA

1. A full audit will be authorized by the Board whenever the State Secretary-Treasurer leaves office.

November 1, 2006 Lynden, WA

2. All WARLCA Bank Accounts Statements (APCU checking, savings, certificate of deposits; Washington Trust checking account) will be sent to the President directly from the bank.

BOARD OFFICERS & STATE STEWARD ANNUAL DUTIES & RESPONSIBILITIES:

- 1. At the first Board meeting all meeting dates for the year will be established and published in the minutes and in the WRC subject to unforeseen circumstances and with board approval.
- 2. At the first Board meeting all mailing dates for the WRC will be established and published in the minutes and in the WRC subject to unforeseen circumstances and with board approval.
- 3. At the first Board meeting the budget will be projected and published in the WRC.

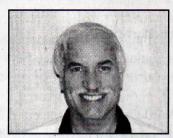

NEXT DEADLINE

Deadline for the next issue is February 20. This issue will include campaign notices for those wishing to run for State office and/or a National Delegate position. Candidates may submit a short campaign statement, using Microsoft Word if possible.

DEALING WITH LETTERS OF DEMAND

The Postal Service has been issuing a large number of Letters of Demand to rural carriers. These letters are issued in an attempt to collect alleged debts that the Postal Service



has determined that we owe. Some of the reasons for the Letters of Demand are the following: being paid at an incorrect evaluation; being paid for a day of Leave Without Pay; being the recipient of a grievance award that changes the route classification from high to low option; continuing to receive protected pay after an OWCP claim is closed and the route's evaluation has declined; and so forth.

What do you do when a Letter of Demand is delivered to you? You can accept the fact that you owe the money and pay the balance due, or you can make arrangements to make payments from your paycheck, and you may request that these payments be no more than 15% of your disposable income each payday until the debt is paid. When hundreds or thousands of dollars are owed, then being able to pay this debt at 15% of your disposable income each payday is much more manageable than having to pay the entire amount at once.

What if you agree that you owe the debt and wish to pay either in entirety or at 15% or more of your disposable income? According to the ELM – Employee and Labor Relations Manual, Sections 452.232 and 452.233, and Article 28.5 of the National Agreement, and this is directly from the 12/06/03 Question Box in "The National Rural Letter Carrier" magazine, "An employee who acknowledges the validity of the Postal Service's claim has at least two methods of repayment. The employee who wishes to repay the entire amount voluntarily should be instructed to remit to the postmaster or installation head, for transmittal to the Eagan ASC, a check or money

order no later than 15 calendar days from the date the employee receives the notice of the Postal Service's determination of a debt, if he or she does not request copies of postal records relating to the debt, or within 15 calendar days from the date the employee receives any requested records.

If the employee acknowledges the validity of the Postal Service's claim and would like to repay the debt voluntarily through offsets of 15% or more of his or her disposable pay, the employee and the postmaster or installation head should complete the appropriate sections of PS Form 3239, Payroll Deduction Authorization to Liquidate Postal Service Indebtedness. This form must be completed no later than 15 calendar days from the date the employee receives the notice of the Postal Service's determination of a debt, if he or she does not request copies of Postal records relating to the debt, or within 15 calendar days from the date the employee receives any requested records."

What if you wish to repay the debt and the 15% of your disposable income would cause an undue hardship? According to the ELM – Employee and Labor Relations Manual, Section 452.234 and Article 28.5 of the National Agreement, and this is also from the 12/06/03 Question Box in "The National Rural Carrier" magazine, "If the employee acknowledges the debt, but contends that the proposed deductions of 15% of disposable pay would be too severe, he or she may propose an alternative offset schedule."

If you feel that you owe the money, but it would be a hardship to repay the debt, the other alternative is to request PS Form 3074, Request for Waiver of Claim for Erroneous Payment of Pay. In some cases, if it has been less than three years since you received the first invoice, by completing the PS Form 3074, you can then start your own campaign against the Letter of Demand. ELM – Employee and Labor Relations Manual, Section 437, provides detailed instructions for PS Form 3074.

What if you feel that the Letter of Demand is in error and that you owe nothing to the Postal Service? In this case, it would be a good idea to call the Accounting Help Desk for help with payroll questions. The toll free number is

1-866-974-2733. You will need your I.D. Number and your USPS Pin Number. Your I.D. number is on the top of your earnings statement (pay stub). It is an 8-digit number. Your USPS Pin number is the same one you use to access PostalEASE. If you have forgotten your PIN number, or if you never got one, dial 1-877-477-3273. Your PIN number will be mailed to you.

After talking with the Accounting Help Desk and receiving their help and information, if you still feel that you do not owe this debt, or if there are extenuating circumstances, then it is time to talk with your manager or installation head to see if you can get this situation straightened out. If your manager or installation head does not agree with you, then it is time to file a grievance at Step 1 of the grievance process. Filing a grievance will effectively keep the Postal Service from collecting this alleged debt until the grievance is settled. The issue statement in the grievance should be the following: "Did management violate the National Agreement by issuing this Letter of Demand? and and an established

Be prepared to give your steward a clear statement of why the debt is not justified. If you were overpaid because of a change in route classification, for example, the steward will need to document on your PS Form 4240 Trip Sheet what days you actually worked during the misclassification.

Sometimes rural carriers, through no fault of their own, are overpaid and do owe the Postal Service money. However, if you have any doubts about the validity of the claim, or if you don't feel the claim is justified, you have both PS Form 3074 and the grievance procedure to help you fight back.

I hope that none of you ever receives a Letter of Demand, but I want to let you know that even

State Stewards are not immune receiving Letters of Demand. On two different occasions, I received Letters of Demand. In both instances, it turned out that the Postal Service was correct that I did owe the money. On the other hand, both errors were caused by Postal Service management making time-keeping errors that credited me with pay that should have credited to my leave replacement. I decided to test the system and pay one of these debts at 15% a payday. Together with my Supervisor's assistance, the correct forms were completed and turned in. However, as sometimes happens, the best laid plans go awry, and the entire amount was deducted from my next paycheck! Since it was only one day's pay, I let it go, but for a larger amount a grievance would have been filed.

It is always a good idea not to spend the money if you know you are being overpaid. It's best to just put this money aside, and then when the Letter of Demand inevitably surfaces, you will have the funds to meet your obligation. Also, be sure to inform your manager that you are being overpaid. In that way, you are seen as the honest person you are who just wants to be paid for what you do, no more, and certainly, no less.

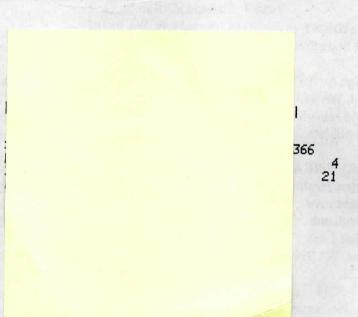
