VP & Legislative Director's Annual Report

Greetings to all the WARLCA members. This past year has been a learning curve as I settle into the job as your Vice President taking on the various tasks to keep the association strong and healthy. Much of what is done is more behind the scenes with board planning, implementation and answering questions. The following is a snapshot of what I have done the past year.

June 2024 state convention had a short board meeting scheduling out the various meeting dates and introductions of the board with both a new President and Vice President.

July 2025 all board members met in Ellensburg for four days and went over the required training for the board laying out the year's agenda. I was tasked to assist President Ayers with various projects. Of particular note was the conversion to the .org for both the WARLCA website and

Board emails. Doing this brings the association in line with both national and are mission as a statewide union.

August 2024, I attended the NRLCA national convention in Reno, NV. My first national convention was both exciting and at times confusing, learning to understand how a national convention operates. I took it all in enjoying not only the pomp and circumstance but how the national association works with all the other states to make changes and reaffirm its commitment to the rural craft.

The board met again in October of 2024 in Bellingham to get a feel and look at the Best Western and surrounding area for this year's State Convention. Much was discussed with even more work to be done before June of 2025.

Last week of January 2025 the Board met in Ellensburg working towards State Convention and the 2025 Legislative conference with President Ayers and I would be attending.

Last full week of March 2025 President Ayers and I went to Washington DC for a four-day legislative conference. The first two days were training and guest speakers not necessarily with the postal service but those who do business with the postal service. It was informative and prepared us to meet with the Washington State Representatives, Senators and/or their staff. President Ayers and I spent two days meeting with our elected Representatives as we walked all over the Capital grounds to the respective offices.

Most representatives were receptive to the anti-privatization efforts to keep the postal service as a service and not a forprofit business. A few were more skeptical when the mention of dollars came up to provide safety both in Ekeys and protection enforcement towards postal employees. You lobby as best you can and hope your message gets through. As a side note we mostly met with staffers. I learned developing a working relationship with a staffer is the best route to go when lobbying for your particular concern. Most staffers were generally interested in hearing what is going on back home, especially with the postal service. It was a whirlwind four days but educational and for those who enjoy American history, the Capital grounds and national mall these are definite bucket list to visit. Additional information on the WARLCA legislative visit and progress can be found on the website (warlca.org).

April 2025 was the last Board meeting before the state convention as we finalized everything to be done by June. It was productive and a bit overwhelming knowing there was still so much to accomplish in so little time. The Western State Conference was in Helena, MT this year. While it is short (day and a half) there is a wealth of pertinent information that comes out along with meeting with most of the national officers. It's exactly like I was told, WSC is a mini national convention.

May 2025 was the build up to State Convention in Bellingham this year. Putting presentation, timers' together first and legislative presentation learning parliamentary procedure. I've also taken courses on parliamentary procedure with the ambition of becoming a certified parliamentarian in a few years. I'm excited about the State Convention being so involved this year and looking forward to working with all the delegates and finding ways to improve in the next year.

May 18, 2025, has been 45 years since Mt St Helens came to life and changed State. It was Washington also ratification informational meeting at the Double Tree Suites Hotel in Tukwila/ Seattle for those fourteen of us who attended. While the information was invaluable in understanding the proposed contract, I can only state the obvious of what a misappropriation of expenditures are made for such a small group attending. I know everyone is busy and/or the location is too far to attend. Granted, our NRLCA constitution clearly states that an in -person ratification meeting must take place in every state. I just wonder if there is a smarter way in which to do so that doesn't make the cost to benefit ratio skewed against the membership. In this respect I would encourage the Washington state membership to consider supporting change to the National Constitution to a

Zoom or different more cost-effective means to hold ratification meetings.

Secretary-Treasurer's Annual Report

Whew! Seeing 2024 in the rear-view mirror sure was a welcome sight this year. The struggles of being under staffed remain a problem still, both state wide and natioinaly. It seems to get harder and harder to get people through the door that want to work and are willing to put in the hours needed. I went back and counted the hard copies of the 1187s that were entered into the National Database this year, the number I had just didn't seem to be right. But it was, I only entered 364 new members for the entire year, that is half of what we did in the previous year. Of the 364 I would estimate that at least a third, or more, have been separated or resigned. There are another 50 or so that have never even made it to the academy and I have 20 or so notifications of dues cancelations. We have several members that I would like to wholeheartedly thank though. They recruit at the orientations and at the academies, they are the biggest reason that we have the membership that we have today.

Recruiting remains one of our top priorities. In May I did an annual recruitment blitz and sent out a little over 600 recruitment letters accompanied by the

1187 form that is needed in order to join the union. The non-member retirees were not included in this mailing. Throughout the year I have continued to recruit not only new retirees, but also those that have become delinquent with their dues and carry our medical insurance. I have also attempted to recruit those carriers that were separated and then rehired as well as the newly hired nonmembers that did not sign up at orientations or the academy. I regularly review and process the NOA sent out by the National Office.

Like so many of your offices, we suffered from the lack of relief carriers this year, which meant working 6 days a week 10-14 hours a day for weeks on end. I don't think I have ever been so exhausted. Although I had to do some prioritizing and put some things off for a short period of time. I did make payroll in a timely manner and salaries were paid monthly. All tax forms, including the LM2 and form 5500, were all filed on time and all taxes were paid on time and in full. All event deposits we paid on time including all of the association's bills.

As you should all know by now,

because of a "clerical error" there was an issue with the election for National Delegates this year. After conferring with Tommy Turner, the National Secretary/ Treasurer, it was clear that to ensure a fair and accurate result the election had to be redone. The new ballots were mailed on June 5, 2025, they are on a different color of paper and have a heading stating it is a revised ballot. On June 30,2025, they will be picked up at the Ferndale Post Office at 5703 4th Ave, Ferndale WA 98248 to be tabulated. The Specifics on the time and location for tabulation will be announced at the 2025 State Convention, posted on the WARLCA website and sent out via email updates.

One of the many responsibilities of the Secretary/Treasurer is to ensure that all of the County Units file their LM4s with the DOL on time. This is a group effort and takes the cooperation of the County Officers, I am happy to report that Washington State had all of their LM4s filed in a timely manner. I filed the 990 forms for the County Units, which maintains their tax exempt status. The Budget was updated

several times over the year; I did discover the correct filter that allows me to more easily make the necessary changes. Please make sure to review the current Budget included in this report, you will see that we are in good shape financially and have at least a year's operating revenue in reserve.

Last January the Lynden Tribune notified us that they were shutting down their presses and would no longer be able to print the WRC for us. They recommended the Skagit Valley Herald in Mount Vernon for our printing needs. I have been working closely with Terry Fain while applying for a non-profit mailing permit and working on our printing and billing concerns.

This last year I attended all of the board meetings and was able to attend the National Convention, the Western States Conference this last April in Montana, and in February attended the National Secretary/Treasurer training in Florida.

Annual Reports From Washington's NSS Stewards Annual Report

July 1, 2024 - June 30, 2025

This has been a year of more challenges as the Postal Service managers have continued to violate the Agreement between the United States Postal Service and the National Rural Letter Carriers' Association. It never ceases to amaze me that they have an expectation that rural carriers are never supposed to become ill but are expected to work six and seven days a week as they continue to fail to provide sufficient staffing and to retain the staff they do have. There is also the continued misuse of Article 16.5 and emergency procedures and managers forgetting the basic principle that discipline be corrective in nature rather than punitive. These employer violations continue to overwhelm the stewards and have led to a plethora of investigative interviews and discipline being issued. Add in inept managers botching route adjustments and the grievance load increases steadily.

During this association year, I have traveled 3,522 miles in my personal vehicle and another 4, 244 in a rental car. I had 21 stays overnight which includes attending the combined Regional Steward Training in Las Vegas. I handled approximately 1,100 phone calls and approximately 85 Zoom meetings. I completed new local steward certification training with 16 new stewards, however 6 of those have already resigned from the position. While I am always able to assist any local steward, I currently am assigned 15 local stewards to mentor.

This year I attended my first arbitration hearing for a removal, which consisted of several Zoom meetings in preparation for the hearing. District Representative Renee' Pitts did an excellent job handling the grievance throughout steps 1 & 2 and up to the step 3 appeal which led to a favorable outcome and the grievant was returned to work.

I attended 6 local county unit meetings this year. I also attended two State Board meetings telephonically and one in-person session post State Convention. I attended National Convention in Reno, Western States Conference in Helena, and the State Convention in

Bellingham. I attended three "Rural America Relies on the Postal Service" rallies, one in Reno at the National Convention, one in Puyallup on March 23rd and again in Bellingham on June 22nd. I was one of a small handful of members attending the contract ratification meeting in Seatac on May 18th. I was invited by Washington District Manager Trent McNeal to attend the District Safety Symposium with District Representative Renee' Pitts on March 27th in Seattle, which was a great opportunity to show managers that safety is important to the NRLCA.

Over the course of the year, I have handled grievances at step 1 and 2, that resulted in over \$92,082.10 in monetary awards back in the hands of rural carriers.

Below is a breakdown of my other steward activity;

- 87 Investigative Interviews
- 63 Individual Contractual Grievances
- 29 Disciplinary Grievances- 4 Removals Rescinded
- 17 Class Action Grievances
- 60 Grievances Settled at Step 1
- 39 Grievances Settled at Step 2
- 1 Notice of Removal Grievance Appealed to Step 3 and remanded to Step 2 to be held in Abeyance pending Arbitration

I want to thank Executive Committeewoman Jeanette Dwyer and the National Board for allowing me the opportunity to serve in my position and for the tools and training you provide. I also want to express my deepest appreciation for the guidance and support of District Representative Renee' Pitts. There is no way to measure the abundance of knowledge and experience Renee' has shared with myself and our team. I also want to thank the rest of the team ADR Isabell Lopez, ADR Ethan Whitney, Area Stewards Dawn Ayers, David Blackmer and Tina McCay, it is a pleasure to work with all of you for the betterment of the lives of rural carriers. To the 34 Local and Chief Stewards, THANK YOU! Your hard work and dedication have not gone unnoticed. You have some of the toughest jobs in the steward system and it is more important than ever to make the employer financially responsible for the cost when they violate the National Agreement.

This association year was my first full year as an ADR and the workload has increased compared to last year. Most of the areas assigned to me covers Whatcom, Island-Skagit San Juan and a portion of Snohomish County. To date I have attended 51 pre-disciplinary interviews, many of which resulted in grievances. Of those grievances that were filed 39 were settled at step 1.

23 grievances were appealed to step 2 and closed;11 were appealed to step 3. 19 grievances were of a contractual nature while 15 were disciplinary grievances, two of which were notice of removals with both carriers successfully returned to their jobs.

In addition to working grievances, I have also answered calls and emails from carriers, entered grievance information on the database and trained several new local stewards with at least one more to take place before the end of next month.

In addition to handling grievances, I have also attended several local county unit meetings throughout the year. These meetings required a topic of discussion followed by Q&A.

I would like to thank DR Renee' Pitts and ADR Alicia Peterson for giving wonderful advice and a different perspective when looking at particularly hard to work grievances. I would also like to thank the NRLCA Board for giving me the opportunity to continue serving as an NRLCA Assistant District Representative.

Annual Report Ethan Whitney Assistant District Representative

I began this year as a PTF and Area Steward for Spokane. Shortly after bidding onto a route and becoming a regular rural carrier, I accepted the position of Assistant District Representative. I consider it the highest compliment that the National Steward System has the confidence in my abilities to offer me such an opportunity. My only hope is that I prove to the membership their confidence is not misplaced.

I will provide a quantitative description of my progress as a steward for Eastern Washington. First however, I consider my greatest accomplishment to be the relationships I have made with both carriers and management. I work to make myself available to the membership as much as possible. I see it as a fundamental responsibility that I advise and educate carriers in a timely manner, and it is a mutually beneficial relationship. I need carriers that will be my eyes and ears in the offices I am responsible for. Additionally, I endeavor to convince management of the uniqueness of our craft, and at the same time build an appreciation for that uniqueness. Perhaps management would say different, but thus far I feel successful in this endeavor.

In this association year, I adjudicated 44 total grievances. Of those grievances, 6 required appeal to Step Two. At that level, 1 has been settled, 2 are being held in abeyance, and 1 was remanded back to me where it was sustained; the rest remain appealed at Step Two. Disciplinary grievances have been time consuming. Of my total grievances, 11 were disciplinary, and 3 of those required appeal. Of the discipline that was settled at Step One, 4 were rescinded and the rest were reduced by over half of their retention period. My contractual grievances resulted in a total of \$18,634.81 in awards to carriers. As of writing, I have taken a total of 19 LWOP days for association business. I drove a total of 1,360 miles in my POV, and attended 15 PDIs.

As an ADR, I am eagerly anticipating the ability to represent carriers at Step Two of the grievance process. This will be yet another chance for me to learn from representative Renee' Pitts. I genuinely hope Mrs. Pitts understands the value I accredit to working with her. Similarly, I encourage the local and area stewards assigned to me to reach out for assistance no matter how large or small. We are a union; we work best when we do so in unison. It is a privilege to work with and represent you all.

Area Steward Report for 2024-2025:

Effective October of 2024, I was appointed to the position of Area Steward. My assigned offices included Auburn, Buckley, Eatonville, Enumclaw, Gig Harbor, Milton, Olympia S&DC, Rainier, Spanaway Main and the Bethel Office, Sumner, Toledo, and Yelm. The local steward in the Bonney Lake office resigned and I was then assigned to that office, and a local steward was elected in Eatonville so that office was removed from my duties. As of May 2025, a new local steward was elected to the Gig Harbor office but has yet to be trained so I continue to serve as the Area Steward until he is certified. I have been trying to recruit local stewards in each office I have been in to pass the cost on to the USPS. From October 2024 until June 30th, 2025, I conducted approximately forty investigative interviews. Of those investigations, only a handful were conducted telephonically. All the others were in person interviews. On average, I take two days a week of LWOP for steward duties and I have traveled over 1500 miles.

Across all those offices there have been twenty-four grievances. Eleven of them were contractual, nine were disciplinary and four were class action grievances. One of the disciplinary grievances was a removal which was settled at Step 1 with full back pay totaling over \$9000.00. I have also attended one Day of Reflection meeting. There were five grievances that I appealed to Step 2.

In addition to working with carriers on their grievances and representing them in investigative interviews, I have answered numerous calls and emails every week from carriers in all the offices I am assigned. I have also attended the training necessary to maintain my certification as well. I would like to extend my thanks to District Representative Renee' Pitts and Assistant District Representative Alicia Peterson for the guidance and different perspectives given when working on particularly hard grievances.

 with a seven-day suspension. Discipline was grieved with a settlement of a Letter of
 Warning held in abeyance for six months provided the carrier was not involved in an
 adjudicated at fault accident.
- Answered various contractual questions from assigned office carriers.

September 2024

- Carrier injured finger closing mailbox. II was conducted without discipline.
- Carrier II concerning four sick days taken over several months. No discipline issued.
- Answered various contractual questions from assigned office carriers.

October 2024

- Day of Reflection from a fourteen-day paper suspension meeting with carrier and PM.
- Fourteen Day paper suspension settled to a Letter of Warning.
- Discussion with PM settled a carrier/management dispute concerning LLV backing (using scanner as a means of discipline).

Carrier was placed on Emergency Placement for a vehicle/pedestrian accident. Pedestrian

charges against the carrier. Police determined the pedestrian was most likely at fault
providing their investigation to management. Management continued its practice of placing

carriers involved in any accident regardless of the facts shown on Emergency Placement. The Carrier was on EP for approximately 30 days. An II was conducted with the carrier. I continued to point out to management the just cause violation of the EP during the II.

Minutes of the 2025 WARLCA State Convention

DAY 1, JUNE 22, 2025

The 117th annual WARLCA Convention was called order bv to chair Region convention and 1 Committeeperson Isa Lopez. She made a few announcements, and Philip Bergman came forward to give the invocation. Al Cortez and Jeff Taylor presented the colors, after which Isa led the delegation in the Pledge of Allegiance. She next presented the gavel to President Dawn Ayers who gave her opening remarks. We then proceeded with group recognition and photos, including veterans/active military, retirees, first timers, stewards, past and present state officers, current county officers, delegates-at-large, academy instructors, OJI trainers, and relief carriers. Secretary-Treasurer Lorrie Crow proceeded with the roll call of officers. Roll call of officers was then done with all officers present.

President Dawn explained the proceedings to the delegation. YEA/NAY cards were distributed to the delegates, after which the roll call of delegates was done.

Roll Call of Delegates: North Central – 2 Peninsula – 4 Lower Columbia – 7 Mutual – 11 Island Skagit San Juan – 5 King Snohomish – 9 East Central – 6 Northeast – 3 Whatcom – 6 Whitman – Southeast – 1 Apple – 4

There was some clarification required on the correct number of seated delegates. Due to a couple of late registrations, there was some confusion. Final numbers will be given by the Credentials Committee in their report.

Renee' Pitts, Mutual, made a motion to suspend the reading of the standing rules. The motion was second and passed with the required 2/3 majority. The standing rules were not read to the delegation. Jim Hemrich, Whitman-Southeast, made a motion to add language to Standing Rule 13. "The extended time shall be divided equally between those speaking for and those speaking against". The motion received a second. Jim Hemrich then made a motion to amend the proposed language to add "as equally as possible". The motion to amend was seconded and passed with no debate. Back to the original amendment, there was no further debate, and the motion passed. The language "The extended time shall be divided as equally as possible between those speaking for and those speaking against" was added to Standing Rule 13. The delegation then voted to accept the Convention Standing Rules as amended. They were as follows:

CONVENTION STANDING RULES:

GENERAL

Rule 1. Each Session shall start at the time announced in the convention program. The Chair may make changes to the order of business as may be necessary to expedite proceedings or accommodate guest speaker(s).

Rule 2. The convention shall proceed using <u>Robert's Rules of Order, Newly Revised</u> (12th Edition).

Rule 3. Before a member can make a motion or address the convention, the member must rise and be recognized by the Chair, state their name, whether they are a delegate or a non-delegate, and their county affiliation. Non-delegates may be recognized and allowed to speak at the discretion of the Chair. All those speaking before the chair shall address only the chair and no member(s) of the delegation. Only seated delegates shall be allowed to make motions, vote on issues before the assembly, and object to unanimous consent.

Rule 4. There shall be no talking on cell phones, unless expressly authorized. Unauthorized videotaping, recording, or transmission of the convention proceedings is prohibited. Cell phones shall be turned off or set to silent.

Rule 5. The reports of the officers of the WARLCA shall not be read to the delegation.

VOTING

Rule 6. Voting on specific issues shall be by **using the provided** YEA/NAY cards.

Rule 7. Voting on the election of officers shall be by ballot and, in no case, by acclamation, except by unanimous consent.

DEBATE

Rule 8. No delegate shall speak in debate more than twice on the same motion.

Rule 9. No delegate shall speak in debate longer than two (2) minutes on any motion.

Rule 10. The Chair shall attempt to let the floor alternate, as far as possible, between those favoring and those opposing any motion.

Rule 11. Total time on any resolution and pending secondary motions, including amendments, shall not exceed ten (10) minutes.

Rule 12. If during consideration of a resolution, there is no opposing position presented, the resolution shall be brought to an immediate vote.

Rule 13. The limit on total time may be extended on any resolution by a majority vote. The extended time shall be divided as equally as possible between those speaking for and those speaking against.

Rule 14. No delegate while speaking in debate to a motion may move the previous question.

RESOLUTIONS

Rule 15. Resolutions will be segregated as advisory in nature or binding on the state or national board. (A binding resolution is defined as the state or national board having the full **and sole** authority to implement.) Resolutions shall be read and be adopted at the sound of the gavel, unless there is an objection by a delegate. The delegate objecting to the resolution shall state their name and county affiliation.

Rule 16. All resolutions objected to shall be brought before the delegates for consideration after all resolutions have been presented. The delegate who objected to the resolution shall be allowed to present their argument or call for clarification at the first reading. The delegate-at-large for the county of origin or a designee shall be allowed to present the first arguments for the resolution.

Rule 17. Amendments shall only be permitted on binding resolutions.

CAMPAIGNING

Rule 18. Campaign materials may be distributed outside and near the entrance to the convention floor. Any campaigning including distribution of campaign material shall not be disruptive to the conduct of the business of the Association. Members of the tellers and sergeant-at-arms committees, while on duty during elections, shall not display campaign materials.

Rule 19. After nominations are closed for each officer position, and prior to voting, each candidate shall receive up to four (4) minutes at the podium to address the delegates.

Rule 20. Five (5) minutes per candidate per officer position will be allowed for questions by the delegates. Each question shall be limited to one minute. Responses by candidates shall be limited to two minutes per question. No delegate may ask a second question while other delegates are waiting in line. No delegate may ask more than two questions per candidate per officer position.

RULES

Rule 21. These standing rules shall be in effect throughout the convention unless suspended or amended by a two-third vote of the delegates.



Delegates at the 117th WARLCA State Convention

Philip Bergman, Whatcom, moved to accept resolutions and constitution changes from the floor during new business. The motion was second and passed with no debate.

State PAC Chair Christiana Lee gave a presentation on PAC. She spoke about the various PAC fundraisers and also spoke about the Armed Forces Veterans' Club, recognizing the members present. The

fundraising goal for the convention was \$8,000.

President Dawn Ayers next went over committee assignments. Several additions and modifications were made to the assignments. She made an announcement that a physical address and any ferry tolls needed to be given to the Credentials Committee so that the Mileage and Per Diem Committee would be able to calculate

mileage correctly. Committee meeting locations were then decided and given to the delegates.

Renee' Pitts, Mutual, made a motion to suspend the reading of the officers' reports. President Dawn Ayers noted that it was already in the standing rules to not read the reports, and the motion was withdrawn. Dawn let the delegation know that they were welcome to come to board with any questions regarding the reports.

The Election Committee came forward. Chair Sharlene Arras introduced the members of the committee David Hamilton, Tammy Packard, and Rena Wise. Sharlene explained that the Elections Committee report was not ready due to issues with the election itself, as well as explaining the election procedures. Secretary-Treasurer Lorrie Crow will explain the election issues later in the morning. Dawn answered a question from a delegate. After a few clarifications the convention went on break. The convention was called to order with all officers and delegates present.

USPS Washington District Manager Trent McNeal gave a presentation to the delegation. Trent spoke about his role as well as issues facing the Postal Service and rural carriers. He specifically spoke about privatization, noting that the incoming Postmaster General does not want to privatize currently. He also noted that at this time, implementation of the Delivering for America Plan was to be continued. He also spoke about changes to service standards, cost savings, and revenue generation. Trent answered a few questions from the delegation. Lastly, Trent presented Patrick Pitts with a 35-year service pin. Isa presented Trent with a thank you gift.

The convention was called to order with all officers and delegates present. Kinginitially Snohomish reported nine delegates, but correction was given that all 10 were present.

Vice President Dave Blackmer gave a legislative PowerPoint presentation. He talked about the legislative conference they attended in Washington DC and their

speaking experience with Representatives. He also spoke about the current legislative issues affecting rural carriers. He stressed the importance of us contacting our Representatives and gave some good talking points. He lastly gave some links to interesting articles related to privatization.

PAC Chair Christiana Lee came forward to give a PAC update. At that time, we had

raised \$1,683.97. She encouraged people to keep bidding on the silent auction items.

The Credentials Committee was called forward to give their final report. Chair Susan Durgan introduced the members of her committee, Jim Hemrich and Kristian Granish, and explained the purpose of the committee. Jim Hemrich read the report to the delegation, giving delegate counts and naming the Delegates-at-Large for each county unit. The Mileage and Per Diem Committee called forward give to preliminary report. Chair Bryan Potter introduced the members of the committee, Jeff Sherry Cortez and Taylor, explained that all delegates must attend the entire convention to receive payment. He also explained how the mileage was calculated. All delegates were encouraged to review the report and let them know of any corrections.

The Finance Committee was called forward to give their preliminary report. Chair Al Cortez introduced the members of the committee, James Arvin, Shira Latch, and Carol Marchand. The committee noted that constitution change #1 would result in added costs to the state association and recommended taking into consideration the number of individuals required to attend Monday sessions at national convention. They also noted that constitution change #2 would change payouts for responsibilities at state convention and recommended assigning a monetary value to daily sessions to make the costs clearer. There were no major discrepancies noted in the financial reports. The final report will be given on Tuesday morning.

The Nominating Committee came

forward to give their report. Chair Renee' Pitts introduced the members of the committee, Duane Johnson and Sharlene Arras, and presented their report. The nominations were as follows:

Vice President, 2-year term: **Dave Blackmer**

RCP1, 2-year term: **Isa Lopez** RCP3, 2-year term: **Delsey Reed**

Renee' noted that nominations would be accepted from the floor on Tuesday morning during elections. She moved that the nominating committee be dismissed with our thanks. The committee was dismissed without objection.

The Auditing Committee was called forward to give their report. Chair Lyndee

White introduced the members of the committee, Benjamin Rochon, Dina Bliznyuk, Alicia Peterson, and Ethan Whitney, and presented the report. Each member of the committee chose a specific month at random to review. The committee noted several concerns and made a number of recommendations. After presenting the report, the committee made a motion to dismiss the committee with our thanks. Kurt Eckrem, King-Snohomish, asked that printed copies of the report be made available to the delegates. The consensus was that the delegates wanted the copies, so the committee was not to be dismissed until the copies were provided.

AUDITING COMMITTEE REPORT:

The committee recommends that the board policy be changed regarding the requirement to provide a map with their vouchers. Further, only a PS 3971 should be attached with the voucher, but that PS form should be supplied with the voucher.

Every 3 months president and treasurer exchange documents for the president to verify against the bank statement. Exchange of a hard copy should be prioritized. Any handwritten additions and corrections to a fiscal document should be initialed by two members of the board.

We recommend that the committee be provided with office materials, such as sticky notes and flags, to assist in processing the documents.

All voucher reviewed should be completed prior to the convention. Five months of voucher reviews were incomplete during this committee.

Additional notes from the committee are:

The recommendation of the previous committee was to find a new CPA. This committee determined that the cause is no longer an issue. Further, an alternative CPA was not feasible.

It is a concern of the committee, the number of voided checks, handwritten corrections to vouchers and statements, and the missing check numbers – these constitute a trend of errors in our review.

March, August, October, November, and January were the months that were actually reviewed. They were chosen at random and assigned to committee members at random.

To prepare for unforeseen circumstances, the committee recommends further planning to ensure continuity of service by the board. For example, the committee considered the combination to the association's safe.

The Communications Committee was Angela Thelen introduced the committee called forward to present their report. Chair members, Dawn Kiehn and Daniel Mellott,

then gave the report. The committee looked at the *Washington Rural Carrier*, email updates, and website. They found most items satisfactory but made a few recommendations. They felt more

membership engagement was needed. Angela Thelen moved that the report be accepted, and the committee be dismissed with our thanks. They were dismissed without objection.

COMMUNICATIONS COMMITTEE REPORT:

Website: Some words on the website not displaying properly on mobile devices. Recent news needed to be updated on the new contract. Photos of stewards should be updated. The site is easy to navigate, under forms and documents some words overlapped on mobile devices.

Magazine: Overall good, no recommendations.

Social media: Suggest increasing followers with more engagement. Look into creating a poll.

Email Updates: No recommendations.

Finances: The difference in increase due to staggering subscriptions could be lower next year. Idea of having to share subscriptions.

Lisa Levitt, King Snohomish and WRC editor, asked that anyone interested in submitting pictures to the WRC email her at the editor's email address.

Dawn introduced Lesa Routh-Holcomb of the National Auxiliary to the delegation. She told everyone about the great trip to the Spark Museum the previous day and spoke about the purpose of the Auxiliary. She recognized Alicia Peterson as a past Juniors President and talked about her daughter's experiences and how they helped her in her adult life. She also talked about the Juniors activities planned for National Convention and scholarships. She next spoke about "The Cure Starts Now" and stressed how common skin cancer is for rural carriers. Lastly, she shared the fundraising items with the delegation and explained how to donate directly.

Vice President Dave Blackmer made a few announcements. Kurt Eckrem, King-Snohomish, asked if the Auditing Committee could be called back forward in order to dismiss them. Jim Hemrich, Whitman-Southeast, asked a question regarding vouchers. Both the committee

and Dawn gave clarification. Charles Alexander, Whatcom, asked the committee to clarify the last paragraph of the report regarding unforeseen circumstances. Both the committee and Dawn gave clarification on this issue as well. Renee' Pitts asked where the "In Case of Emergency" forms were located, and the question was answered. Becky Wendlandt, East Central, asked if the ICE forms were emailed to the board members, and the answer was no. After the questions were finished, the committee was dismissed with our thanks. The convention went on a short break.

The convention was called back to order, with all officers and all but one Mutual delegate present. Mutual's 11th delegate was present within 10 minutes.

NRLCA Vice President Patrick Pitts came forward to continue with his presentation. Topics covered today included carrier demographics, RRECS statistics, labor relations statistics, national legislative level grievances, issues, membership, financial statistics, National Steward System, impact of natural disasters, and the Postal Employees Relief

Fund (PERF), Rural Carrier Benefit Plan (RCBP), and national convention. He ended the presentation by thanking rural carriers for all that they do. Patrick then answered questions from the delegation on various issues.

The Constitution Committee was called forward to present their report. Chair Curtis Carstens introduced Aron Godfrey and Maricel Pearson. Dawn clarified that constitution changes will go into effect at the end of the convention. Committee Chair Curtis Carstens went over the voting procedures. He made a motion to dispense with the reading of the current language. There was some confusion and discussion on the intent of the motion. After discussion, the motion was passed and only the new language and intent was to be read.

CONSTITUTION CHANGES:

PROPOSED CONSTITUTION CHANGE #1: FAILED

Article VII, Section 4, Paragraph A

Be it Resolved:

(Add 1.) The WARLCA Shall...

(NEW) 2. Any delegate required **by the state president** to attend a seminar on the Monday preceding National Convention shall be entitled to a per diem of \$75.00 **for those not being paid by national**.

Dawn Ayers, Mutual, made a motion to amend the language to read "(NEW) 2. Any delegate required to attend a seminar on the Monday preceding National Convention shall be entitled to a per diem of \$75.00 for those not being paid by National." The motion to amend was seconded. Becky Wendlandt, East Central, moved to amend the amendment which was ruled out of order. There was some confusion on discussion of the main motion and the amendment. The amendment was passed after discussion.

Becky Wendlandt, East Central, made a motion to amend the proposed language to read "...required by the state president to...". The amendment was passed after extensive discussion, some of which was not related to the amendment.

Final amended language read "(NEW) 2. Any delegate required by the state president to attend a seminar on the Monday preceding National Convention shall be entitled to a per diem of \$75.00 for those not being paid by National." After extensive discussion, as well as clarification on whether it was truly new language (it was) clarification was made on time limits. After extensive discussion as well as several points of order, the amended constitution change was eventually voted on and it failed.

CONSTITUTION CHANGE #2: NOT CONSIDERED

Article VI, Section 2 & 3, Paragraph A & B & C

Be it Resolved:

That county credentialed delegates who do not meet their delegate responsibilities be paid a reduced allowance for responsibilities met. That compensation should mirror the constitutional language for state paid national delegates. Article VI, Section 3, Paragraph B should be changed,

after existing language, to read "If a county credentialed delegate does not meet their delegate responsibilities by being late more than 30 minutes to required functions, their compensation shall be reduced by 25% for each function that they miss entirely or are late in their attendance. The compensable functions of the state convention shall be one each daily session (for a total of 3) and their committee assignment." In addition, Article VI, Section 2, Paragraph B.2 and C.2 should be amended to read: "Registered prior to the first report of the credentials committee."

of order due to the change addressing two different sections at the same time. After

Renee' Pitts, Mutual, brought up a point discussion, it was ruled out of order and there was no objection. This change was not considered.

CONSTITUTION CHANGE #3: NOT CONSIDERED

Article IV, Section 2, Paragraph D

Be it Resolved:

D. Each County Unit at their annual meeting shall elect their delegates to the State Convention by ballot in all cases where there is more than one candidate for each delegate position.

Those members who are unable to attend their county unit meeting can notify their county officer in advance and/or another county member attending the county meeting that they would like to be a delegate to the State Convention as per their County Constitution. The member's name will be submitted on the nomination list and one absentee vote will be entered on behalf of the member wanting to be a delegate by the county officers. This vote will be added to the credentialed list of county delegates to State Convention submitted by the County Secretary/Treasurer.

Delegates will be listed in accordance with the number of votes received. The delegate receiving the most votes will be the Delegate-at-Large. In the event of a tie, the position will be determined by random drawing of names then listed in the order drawn; except for the Delegate-at-Large position, which would then be decided by another ballot.

E. No delegate can be seated from any county unit without properly signed credentials and current membership dues paid. Each delegate shall be seated with the County Unit the delegate was elected in.

This Constitution Change was ruled out of order as the new language would have resulted in a Department of Labor violation. There was no objection and the change was not considered. The committee was then dismissed with our thanks. Isa Lopez information presented some to delegates about the dinner cruise and after a few announcements, the convention adjourned for lunch at 12:01 p.m.

The convention was called back to order

at 1:05 p.m. All officers and delegates were present within 15 minutes. PAC Chair Christiana Lee introduced the PAC Committee members Debby Aumack, Jennifer Johnson, Katre Milliron, Taralee Mohr and presented their report. Christiana moved to accept the report. A question was asked about per capita versus national. The motion to accept the report passed.

PAC COMMITTEE REPORT:

The committee recommends the removal of all old handbooks. There is one included from 2019. Also include additional copies of the instructions. We only had 3 copies but had 6 people on our team.

Our instructions state we should review past donations and remits but there were none provided to review.

The Resolutions Committee came forward. Chair Emily Hull introduced the members of the committee Jennifer Berg and Kurt Eckrem. She then went over the voting procedures. The amended language of Rule 13 was omitted in the reading, and clarification was given. Resolutions #7 and #8 were improperly submitted on New Hampshire state resolution forms and the chair made the decision not to consider them. Becky Wendlandt, East Central, challenged the decision of the chair. The motion was not debatable. and the delegates voted to sustain the decision of the chair. Resolutions 7 and 8 were not

considered.

There was a brief discussion about making sure that the votes of the committee standing behind the chair were counted. Resolution #3 was also ruled as improperly submitted due to the lack of the county unit secretary-treasurer's signature. This decision of the chair was also challenged, however the delegates voted to sustain the decision of the chair. Resolution 3 was not considered. Lastly, there discussion of the top lines of Resolution #1 not being properly filled out, however it was decided to proceed with the reading of that resolution.

RESOLUTIONS:

Submitted by Mutual:

PROPOSED RESOLUTION #1 - PASSED by drop of the gavel

Whereas: During peak season it is sometimes difficult to find route coverage for an area steward or a part time Assistant District Representative; and taking LWOP during the Christmas overtime period negatively impacts a regular carriers pay...

Be it Resolved: The National Board will work to negotiate an automatic grievance extension during Peak season like what's in place for grievance extensions during National convention.

Intent of / Reason for Change: It is difficult to get route coverage during peak season because of the lack of leave replacements. Additionally, it is unfair to part time stewards that are required to take LWOP to provide representation as it negatively impacts their pay during peak season. Taking LWOP during peak season typically results in a carrier working long hours on their route for free.

PROPOSED RESOLUTION #2 - FAILED after extensive debate

Whereas: The WARLCA has sent multiple meeting notices for the same meeting either containing mistakes or misinformation and/or failed to mail meeting notices timely.

Be it Resolved: Any board member whose errors have a financial impact on WARLCA funds will be published in each WRC as a separate box with the amount of the cost associated with the error.

Intent of / Reason for Change: Transparency: WARLCA members should be notified and aware of any membership money being utilized unnecessarily for mistakes created by an elected official. The voting members should be aware of the additional costs created by the members of the board to be able to make sound voting choices, knowing all the facts during elections of WARLCA board members.

This resolution was objected to by Lorrie Crow, Northeast. There was extensive debate, with debate time being extended by 1:30 for each side speaking as per amended Standing Rule 13. Clarification was given

that the amendment to Rule 13 took effect immediately after adoption at the beginning of convention. After debate, this resolution failed.

Submitted by North Central:

PROPOSED RESOLUTION #3 - IMPROPERLY SUBMITTED - Ruled out of order

Whereas: We presently do not get credit to dismount for parcels that we place in customer's supplied private tubs, boxes and lockboxes.

Be it Resolved: That a credit be given to carriers for dismount and package deliveries to customer's personally provided tubs, boxes and parcels are delivered to.

Intent of / Reason for Change: To properly compensate carriers for the dismount deliveries that are required to deliver to the personal tubs, boxes and lockboxes.

This resolution was ruled improperly county unit secretary-treasurer's signature. submitted by the chair as it lacked the This resolution was not considered.

Submitted by Island-Skagit-San Juan:

PROPOSED RESOLUTION #4 - PASSED by drop of the gavel

Whereas: N/A

Be it Resolved: Carriers would be able to access remotely a forward book for addresses, and in real time make changes for mistakes made by the customer or carrier, be able to remove forwards that are no longer needed

Intent of / Reason for Change: Forwards were added to scanner over 180 days that allowed being able to see forwards without the use of a written card

PROPOSED RESOLUTION #5 - FAILED after debate

Whereas: RRECS mini mail surveys are conducted every six months and evaluations potentially change

Be it Resolved: Route evaluations utilizing the RRECS Program shall only be update once per year following the second mini mail survey.

Intent of / Reason for Change: Under current RRECS carriers are being adversely affected. Evaluations and salaries potentially changing every six months. This is causing undue stress and financial hardships in major decisions like home purchases. Carriers are seeking more stability.

This resolution was objected to by Renee' Pitts, Mutual. It failed after debate.

Submitted by King-Snohomish County:

PROPOSED RESOLUTION #6 - FAILED after debate

Whereas: Volunteering to work on Sundays or other routes does not provide a guarantee or entitlement to work these assignments.

Be it Resolved: Volunteering to work on Sundays, Holidays, or on other routes be offered via seniority on a rotating basis.

Intent of / Reason for Change: Management does not have a fair way of offering OT equally. Carriers receive OT when carriers work other routes leading to management playing favorites.

This resolution was objected to by Isa order. This resolution failed after the maker Lopez, King-Snohomish. The original gave their explanation for wanting to maker of this resolution asked for it to be withdraw it.

No County Unit Specified:

PROPOSED RESOLUTION #7 - IMPROPERLY SUBMITTED - Ruled out of order

Whereas: The National Board is in charge of scheduling trainings for state officers

Be it Resolved: That State Secretary/Treasurers will have an in person training nationally once a year but not limited to once if needed.

Intent of / Reason for Change: In person trainings have been discontinued for a number of years due to several circumstances. This will establish a schedule for this important training to take place annually. This will continue to insure that our state Secretary/Treasurers will get the training and guidance timely.

This resolution was improperly submitted on a New Hampshire state resolution form and had no county unit listed or county unit secretary-treasurer's signature. It was ruled out of order together

with Resolution #8, which appeared to be identical to Resolution #7. That decision was challenged, however the delegates voted to sustain the decision of the chair. It was not considered.

PROPOSED RESOLUTION #8 - IMPROPERLY SUBMITTED - Ruled out of order

PROPOSED RESOLUTION #9 - PASSED by drop of the gavel

Whereas: None

Be it Resolved: That information obtained via Geotags/Telematics, being the sole evidence obtained, shall not be sufficient grounds for issuing discipline against a carrier.

Intent of / Reason for Change: Technology glitches and malfunctions, and carriers should not be disciplined when an uncorroborated event by a potentially malfunctioning device is logged

PROPOSED RESOLUTION #10 - PASSED by drop of the gavel

Whereas: None

Be it Resolved: That information obtained by Geotags/Telematics, being the sole evidence obtained, shall not be sufficient grounds to conduct an investigative interview against a carrier

Intent of / Reason for Change: Technology malfunctions and glitches frequently, and a carrier should not be subject to a predisciplinary hearing based solely on a logged event by a device that may be on the fritz

PROPOSED RESOLUTION #11 - FAILED after debate

Whereas: None

Be it Resolved: That information obtained by Geotags/Telematics, being the sole evidence obtained, shall not be sufficient grounds to place a carrier on emergency placement or any such unpaid status.

Intent of / Reason for Change: Technology glitches and fails all the time, and carriers should not be held liable solely on a piece of technology that could have malfunctioned.

This resolution was objected to by Renee' Pitts, Mutual. After debate and division being called for a standing vote, the resolution failed. Kurt Eckrem, King-Snohomish, made a motion to reconsider the vote on Resolution #11. The motion was seconded but failed. Kurt then requested a point of personal privilege and noted some inconsistency in the way people voted on 9, 10, and 11. Committee Chair Emily Hull made a motion to dismiss the Resolutions Committee. The motion passed and the committee was dismissed with our thanks.

Jeff Taylor, East Central, asked for a point of personal privilege, speaking briefly about his experience with NARFE. Becky Pike, Whatcom, asked a question on the differing resolution forms, which were addressed. Dave Blackmer made a few announcements and questions, and the convention went on a short break.

The convention was called to order with all officers and delegates present. An announcement was made about cruise tickets.

Steven Roy of NARFE came back up to speak. He spoke about the attempts of the current administration to eliminate official time and attempts to break the federal employee unions. NARFE is supporting the efforts of the federal government unions. He also spoke about the importance of having working relationships with both Senators and Representatives. Next were resolutions and constitution changes from the floor.

CONSTITUTION CHANGE FROM THE FLOOR:

CONSTITUTION CHANGE FROM THE FLOOR #1 - FAILED after debate

Article VI Meetings, Section 2 Delegates, Paragraph D

Whereas: D. Each County Unit at their annual meeting shall elect their delegates to state convention by ballot in all cases where there is more than one candidate for each delegate position.

Be it Resolved: D. Each County Unit at their annual meeting shall elect their delegates to the State Convention by ballot in all cases where there is more than one candidate for each delegate position.

New Language to be added to the end of D:

Any member unable to attend their county unit meeting can notify their county officer in advance, and/or another county member attending the county meeting, that they would like to be a delegate to the State Convention as per their County Constitution. The county member unable to attend the county meeting may also submit a campaign announcement to be read at the county meeting.

Intent of / Reason for Change: To make it clear in the WARLCA Constitution the procedure for county members who can't attend their county meeting to be put on the ballot for delegate to

State Convention. Any member can have family or work commitments that prohibit their attendance at the county meeting, yet want to be a delegate. In the history of the WARLCA no county unit has ever reached its full delegate strength, and the more members who get involved as convention delegates, the more likely it will be that they will want to continue their union involvement and encourage others to become involved.

This constitution change was presented by Charles Alexander, Whatcom. Kurt Eckrem, King-Snohomish, moved to extend speaker time for five minutes, which was seconded and passed. This constitution change failed after extended debate and a standing vote.

RESOLUTION FROM THE FLOOR

RESOLUTION FROM THE FLOOR #1 - FAILED after debate

Whereas: Volunteering on Sundays or other routes does not provide a guarantee or entitlement to work these assignments

Be it Resolved: The National Office consider adding language that volunteering to work on other routes or Sundays be offered on a rotating basis

Intent of / Reason for Change: Management does not have a fair way of offering this work equally. Management tends to play favorites when offering the additional work.

This resolution was presented by Isa Lopez, King-Snohomish. Renee' Pitts, Mutual, had a parliamentary inquiry, noting that this could not be binding to the national board. Renee' made a motion to amend the resolution from binding to non-binding, which was seconded and passed. The resolution failed after debate.

Several delegates then asked for a point of personal privilege. Becky Wendlandt, East Central, spoke about the history behind our state logo as well as the importance of cancer screenings, RCBP's personal cancer coverage, and her experiences with them. Dawn Ayers, Mutual, spoke about the Lady Carrier's and the Georgiana Peet-Miller Scholarship. Jennifer Johnson, Kingabout Snohomish, spoke the experience she had at the convention and was very appreciative of the county officers training. She wants to encourage new people to come and be involved. Come up

and speak! Vice President Dave Blacker also encouraged everyone to try to bring in new people from their office. The convention went on a short break at 8:47 a.m. to allow the delegates to check out of their rooms, being called back to order at 9:02 a.m. All officers and delegates were present. Officer elections began. Dawn went over the standing rules regarding elections.

Vice President, 2-year term

Dave Blackmer

There were no other nominations for Vice President. Dawn cast a unanimous ballot without objection. Dave thanked the delegates.

Region Committeeperson 1, 2-year term **Isabella Lopez**

There were no other nominations for RCP1. Dawn cast a unanimous ballot without objection. Isa thanked the delegates.

Region Committeeperson 3, 2-year term **Delsey Reed**

There were no other nominations for RCP3. Dawn cast a unanimous ballot without objection. Delsey thanked the delegates.

Kurt Eckrem, King-Snohomish, addressed the delegates as the state historian. He told the delegates that the "Mail Hawk" device was actually invented here by a carrier out of Okanagan and went over some of the history of it.

Estee Javiniar asked for a point of personal privilege, speaking about the Armed Forces Veterans Club.

Becky Wendlandt, East Central, asked if we could have a historical section in the WRC. Dawn noted that they are working on it.

Christiana Lee gave a final PAC update. Before the live auctions, the total raised was \$5,402.21. The remaining raffle items were passed out to the winners. Dawn reminded everyone to keep giving the feedback, so they know what the carriers would like to see. Christiana then auctioned off the two glass items donated by Kristy Mckee. The first bird feeder went to Estee Javiniar for \$220. The second bird feeder went to Brian Poage for \$160. The flower sculpture went to Angelea Thelen for \$214. An "NRLCA Proud Union Home" sign, signed by the national board, went to Dawn Ayers for \$150.

Dawn recognized the Tellers Committee for all of their election prep work, even though there were only unanimous elections this year.

Kurt Eckrem, King-Snohomish, made a motion to dismiss all standing committees. The motion was second, passed and all committees were dismissed with our thanks. Delegates-at-Large collected YEA/ NAY cards and turned them in to the state Secretary-Treasurer. The 2025-26 State Officers were installed by NRLCA Vice President Patrick Pitts. Kurt Eckrem, King-Snohomish, asked about the Election Committee for national delegate elections. Dawn explained that the committee will be recalled the following week to tabulate the results and that the results would be put on the website, convention issue of the WRC, and that delegates elected would be notified. Christiana Lee gave a final PAC total of \$6,147.21. The colors were then retired. Each delegate-at-large was called up to return the YEA/NAY cards for their county units and delegate checks were distributed.

The 2025 State Convention was adjourned at 9:51 a.m.

JUNE 30th

The Election Committee, Sharlene Arras Committee Chair, David Hamilton, Tammy Packard, and Rena Wise, met at the convention site Best West Plus Hotel on June 30, 2025, and proceeded to the Ferndale Post Office to collect the ballots and close the post office boxes, returning to the Best Western Plus Hotel to tabulate the votes. Below is the report of the 2025 Election Committee and the election results.

ELECTION COMMITTEE REPORT:

The Election Committee reconvened this morning at 9:00 am to meet in the Maplewood Boardroom to go over the rules and regulations of our duties. Committee members included Sharlene Arras, David Hamilton, Tammy Packard, and Rena Wise.

Board member, Dawn Ayers started with us and signed her confidentiality statement for all observers. Dawn Ayers drove Sharlene Arras and Tammy Packard to the Ferndale Post Office to

pick up all ballots and the returned ballots. Sharlene confirmed all ballots collected and confirmed with the Postmaster and box section clerk all mail for PO Boxes were delivered. All DPS mail not put up was checked. Tammy was in possession of the tub and collection of ballots as Dawn and Sharlene were closing out PO Box 1940 and PO Box 1950. Dawn Ayers also submitted two Change of Address forms from the Post Office Boxes to the State Secretary address. 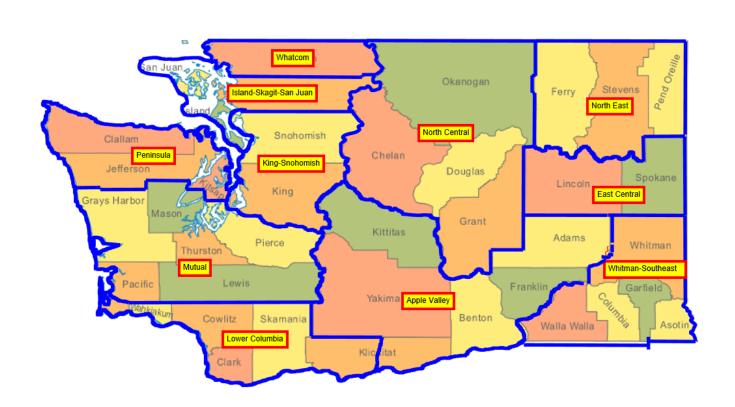

CONSTITUTION

July 1, 2025, to June 30, 2026 (25/26 Year)

Updated at the June 22-23-24, 2025 State Convention Bellingham WA

ARTICLE I Name

This association shall be known as the Washington Rural Letter Carriers' Association (here-in referred to as 'the WARLCA'). The Washington Rural Letter Carriers' Association (WARLCA), by its Secretary-Treasurer, maintains custody and control of the State Association name as well as any State Association logo or symbol. Unauthorized use of the State Association name, logo, or symbol shall be addressed by the filing of an internal union charge or legal action or both.

ARTICLE II Purpose

The Association is established upon the long-recognized need of Rural Letter Carriers to organize and create a united force, advance the interests of all members, ensure job security, enhance opportunities and assure our full share in the success of the United States Postal Service to which we contribute so substantially.

The Association shall seek, with all of the resources at its command, to assist its members in the realization of their highest aspirations as workers and as citizens. Such aspirations are our right and shall be protected against all threats.

The Association is dedicated to the discharge of its responsibilities and the achievement of its objectives in accordance with the democratic principles embodied in this Constitution.

The object of the Association shall be to improve conditions of labor with the United States Postal Service, advance the methods used by Rural Letter Carriers and promote fraternal spirit among its members.

This Association shall not affiliate or merge with any other organization or group without a majority vote of the delegates at a National Convention

ARTICLE III Members

Section 1. Member in Good Standing.

A "member in good standing" is a member who has made timely payment of dues and has not voluntarily withdrawn or been expelled or suspended by the Association.

Section 2. Classifications

A. Bargaining Unit Member: Membership is open to the following rural carriers:

- Regular Carriers (Designation Code 71), including regular carriers on limited duty assignments and assigned to (960-979) rural routes or who are in Injured-on-Duty/Leave Without Pay (IOD/LWOP) status and assigned to (980-989) rural routes;
- 2. Part-Time Flexible Rural Carriers (PTFs, Designation Code 76);
- 3. Substitute Rural Carriers (Designation Codes 72 and 73);
- 4. Rural Carrier Associates (RCAs, Designation Codes 74, 78, 79);
- 5. Rural Carrier Reliefs (RCRs, Designation Code 75);
- 6. Auxiliary Rural Carriers (Designation Code 77);
- 7. Assistant Rural Carriers (ARCs, Designation Code 70-5); and
- 8. Rural Carriers in the Armed Forces of our country, provided they were members when their duty began.

Bargaining Unit Members in good standing are entitled to all voting rights and to hold both elective and appointive office at all levels of the Association.

B. Retired Member. Retired membership is open to Rural Carriers who were members in good standing at retirement on an annuity. Eligibility for Retired membership expires on June 30 of the year following retirement. Failure to pay dues for

one full membership year terminates Retired membership. However, a Retired carrier whose membership has lapsed, due to extenuating circumstances, may apply for reinstatement to the National Secretary-Treasurer by providing proof of prior membership and the current year's dues. The National Secretary-Treasurer shall present the request for membership to the National Board for a decision. Retired Members in good standing are entitled to all voting rights with the exception of ratification of National Agreements. Retired Members may not be elected to National office.

- C. Associate Member. Associate membership is open to Rural Carriers who were members in good standing and are now either working in other non-managerial Postal Service jobs or have left the service and are not receiving an annuity. Failure to pay dues for one full membership year terminates Associate membership. Associate Members shall not be entitled to vote or to hold elective or appointive office in the Association.
- D. Retired Associate Member. Retired Associate membership is open to Associate Members who have retired on an annuity. Eligibility for Retired Associate membership expires on June 30 of the year following retirement. Failure to pay dues for one full membership year terminates Retired Associate membership. Retired Associates may not apply for reinstatement. Retired Associate Members shall not be entitled to vote or to hold elective or appointive office in the Association.
- E. Honorary Member. Honorary membership may be bestowed by the Association at the National Convention upon recommendation of the National Board. Honorary Members shall not be entitled to vote or to hold elective or appointive office in the Association.

Section 3. Restrictions.

Inasmuch as it is an unfair labor practice under the Labor Management Relations Act (LMRA) for any employer (including persons acting in that capacity) to dominate or interfere with the administration of any labor organization, it follows that employers, while they may be members, may not be candidates for office or serve as officers.

Members are prohibited from participation in the Association while serving in managerial or supervisory positions, such as Officer-in-Charge (OIC), Acting Supervisor (204-B) or Postmaster Relief (PMR) or acting in any capacity normally performed by a manager. Members who accept managerial positions shall be deemed to have resigned from all elected and appointed positions within the Association and shall be prohibited from holding any elected or appointed union positions for a period of one year from the last day served in that capacity.

Section 4. Affiliation.

Members in good standing shall have the option of being a member of the County Unit and Region in which he/she resides or in the County Unit and Region representing the office from which the route emanates. The member must provide in writing prior to the start of the fiscal year to the State Secretary that member's desire to be in a different county unit. A Retired Carrier shall have the option of being a member of the County Unit and Region in which he/she resides or in the County Unit and Region where previously employed as a regular rural carrier, at time of retirement.

Section 5. Dues.

- A. The revenues of the WARLCA shall be derived from per capita dues.
- B. The Board may levy a special tax when conditions seem to demand it, but the whole amount of such levies in any one year shall not exceed the amount of State per capita for that year.
- C. The State shall underwrite the County units and any special funds as needed. The State per capita dues for regular carriers, part time flexible carriers, and associate members shall be .5% of the yearly salary of a 35-hour route at Step A from Table One of the current rural carriers evaluated schedule in effect. The State per capita dues for regular carriers, part time flexible carriers, and associate members shall be reduced by a flat amount of \$53.00 for the 2022-2023 year. The State per capita dues for substitute, rural carrier associates, rural carrier reliefs, assistant rural carriers, and auxiliary rural carriers shall be 35% of the regular carriers' State per capita dues for the 2022-2023 year, including the reduction, as calculated above. The State per capita dues for retirees shall be a set rate of

\$27.00. The annual dues will be the total of the State per capita dues in addition to the National per capita dues. All per capita dues described in this article shall be rounded up to the nearest whole dollar. The portion of the State per capita dues to be distributed to the County Units and other special funds shall be decided at each State Convention.

D. Family Plan:

- 1. In addition to the above defined amounts, annual State Auxiliary Per Capita dues shall be designated as follows, plus the National Auxiliary per capita dues as defined in the National Auxiliary Constitution.
 - a. Regular Rural Carriers; \$4.00
 - b. Part-Time Flexible Rural Carriers; \$4.00
 - c. Substitute Rural Carriers; \$4.00
 - d. Rural Carrier Associates; \$4.00
 - e. Rural Carrier Reliefs; \$4.00
 - f. Assistant Rural Carriers; \$4.00
 - g. Auxiliary Rural Carriers; \$4.00
 - h. Retired Rural Carriers; \$4.00
- 2. Those members who have signed an authorization for deduction of dues form 1187 and those that have paid by cash shall have the above amounts deducted pro-rata from the total defined dues amount by the NRLCA and remitted to the National Auxiliary quarterly.
- 3. Those NRLCA members who have signed an authorization for deduction of dues form 1187 or have paid by cash and do not wish to participate in the Family Plan may request a refund of Auxiliary dues. Such refund request must be made in writing to the NRLCA Secretary-Treasurer not more than twenty (20) days and not less than ten (10) days prior to the beginning of the NRLCA fiscal year. This refund request will stay in effect each year until the member notifies the NRLCA Secretary-Treasurer otherwise.
- 4. Should the Washington State Auxiliary cease to exist the State Auxiliary identified per capita shall default to the State Association until such time that it can be stopped.

Section 6. Membership Year.

- A. The membership and fiscal year of the WARLCA shall be from July 1 to June 30.
- B. The fiscal year of the County Units and Region Associations shall be from July 1 to June 30.

Section 7. Discipline.

The National Board may discipline any member of the Association or subordinate unit for misconduct or neglect of duty in office after a fair and impartial hearing. Any member so disciplined shall have a right of appeal as provided in this Constitution.

Section 8. Magazine.

Members in good standing shall receive each issue of *The Washington Rural Carrier*.

Section 9. Standards of Conduct for the Association and its Members.

- A. Maintain democratic procedures and practices.
- B. Ensure members' rights to participation in the affairs of the Association through periodic elections, fair and equal treatment under the governing rules and due process in any disciplinary proceedings.
- C. Prevent discrimination on the basis of race, color, age, gender, religion, creed, national origin or disability, or on the basis of marital, economic, social or political status.

- D. Maintain the fiscal integrity of the Association.
- E. Prohibit business or financial interests on the part of its officers and agents which conflict with their duty to the Association.

ARTICLE IV Subordinate Units

Section 1. Subordinate Units.

- A. Charters shall be granted County Units upon members' application and payment of one (1) year's dues for each member. The amount of dues shall be specified in WARLCA Constitution ARTICLE III.
- B. The County Unit or Region Association is subordinate to the WARLCA. Likewise, the WARLCA is subordinate to the NRLCA.
- C. All County Unit Constitutions shall be in harmony with the State and National Constitution.
- D. Region and County Associations

REGION ONE (1) shall be composed of the County Units of: ISLAND-SKAGIT-SAN JUAN (Island, Skagit and San Juan Counties); K-S (King and Snohomish Counties); WHATCOM (Whatcom County).

REGION TWO (2) shall be composed of the County Units of: PENINSULA (Clallam, Jefferson, and Kitsap Counties); LOWER COLUMBIA (Clark, Skamania, Cowlitz, Wahkiakum, and the 986 offices of Pacific and Klickitat Counties); MUTUAL (Pierce, Grays Harbor, Thurston, Mason, Lewis, and the non 986 offices of Pacific Counties).

REGION THREE (3) shall be composed of the County Units of: NORTH CENTRAL WASHINGTON (Chelan, Douglas, Grant, and Okanogan Counties); NORTHEAST WASHINGTON (Stevens, Ferry, and Pend Oreille Counties); EAST CENTRAL WASHINGTON (Lincoln and Spokane Counties).

REGION FOUR (4) shall be composed of the County Units of: WHITMAN-SOUTHEAST (Whitman, Asotin, Walla Walla, Columbia, and Garfield Counties); APPLE VALLEY (Adams, Franklin, Kittitas, Yakima, Benton, and the non-986 offices of Klickitat Counties).

- E. Each County Unit shall hold its annual meeting after October 1st and at least forty (40) days prior to the State Convention and the regular meeting shall be designated by statute. The County Secretary will notify all County members, their Region Committeeperson, State Secretary, and State President at least fifteen (15) days prior to the election of County Officers and Delegates. They shall make and adopt such constitutional changes as their needs may suggest, and such laws must harmonize with this code of laws.
- F. Secretaries of the County Units shall remit to the State Secretary-Treasurer within fifteen (15) days of their receipt, all monies for per capita dues. County secretaries shall also inform the State Secretary-Treasurer of any changes in membership (such as change of address, resigned, or deceased) in a timely manner.

Section 2. Stipend.

- A. Each County President, Vice President, and Secretary-Treasurer in attendance at their County Unit meeting shall receive compensation of \$25.00 each if they so choose, except for any meeting which the Officer campaigned for any elected or appointed position.
- B. Maximum times an Officer shall be compensated will not exceed four (4) per year per County Officer.

- C. The State Secretary-Treasurer will pay the County Unit Officers upon receipt of the meeting minutes and sign-in sheet.
- D. Each County President and Secretary-Treasurer will receive compensation of \$25.00 each for completing their county LM online by July 30 of the fiscal year just ended.

Section 3. Annual Report.

- A. Each County Secretary shall immediately, after the regular annual meeting of their County Unit, fill out credentials of Delegate-at-Large, Regular, and Alternate delegates to the State Convention in order of votes received. The original is to be sent to the State Secretary with proper endorsement by the County President and the County Secretary. Also, each County Secretary shall submit the names of the newly elected County Officers to the State Secretary.
- B. The County Secretary, when submitting resolutions and proposed changes to the Constitution to the State Secretary, shall submit them in the proper form as follows: Make a copy of each resolution and proposed change to the Constitution, preferably typewritten, following the form provided by the State Secretary-Treasurer, and state whether it is a resolution or a proposed change to the Constitution.

Section 4. Trusteeship.

A. Purpose.

The State Board may place any subordinate unit in trusteeship for any of the following reasons:

- 1. To uphold the principles of this Constitution.
- 2. To prevent or correct corruption or financial mismanagement.
- 3. To ensure performance of collective bargaining agreements or duties of a bargaining representative.
- 4. To restore democratic procedures.
- 5. To otherwise carry out the objectives of the Association.

B. Authority.

The trustee shall assume immediate control of the subordinate unit with full authority over all officers and property. The trustee shall act in such capacity for the duration of the trusteeship.

C. Hearing.

A trusteeship hearing shall be held before a committee of three members within 30 days of imposing trusteeship. The members shall be selected as follows: one member selected by the State Board, one selected by the Board in trusteeship and a chairman selected by the other two members. The committee shall have sole discretion regarding the conduct and procedures of the trusteeship hearing. Only Bargaining Unit Members may serve on this committee. No member of this committee shall be chosen from the Unit in Trusteeship or from the State Board. The committee shall report its findings and recommendations to the President as soon as practical following the hearing. The State Board shall determine whether to continue or to terminate the trusteeship.

D. Termination.

The affected subordinate unit may petition the State Board to terminate the trusteeship at six-month intervals following the decision of the State Board. The board of the subordinate unit in trusteeship may appeal the decision of the State Board as provided in this Constitution. The State Board may terminate a trusteeship at any time.

ARTICLE V Officers and Appointees

Section 1. Officers.

- A. The officers of the WARLCA shall consist of President, Vice President, Secretary-Treasurer, and four (4) Region Committeepersons who shall be elected at the State Convention and serve two (2) years, or until their successors are elected and installed. Proviso: The election of the Vice President at the 2018 State Convention be for a one-year term, and thereafter the term of the Vice President shall be a two-year term, beginning with the election at the 2019 State Convention.
- B. There shall be an Executive Committee consisting of the four (4) Region Committeepersons.
- C. The term of the officers of the WARLCA shall be from the time of installation to the installation of their successors.
- D. Any officer of the WARLCA who shall be separated from the rural service through no fault of his/her own, as determined by the Board, shall hold office until the next State Convention of the WARLCA.

Section 2. Duties.

A. President

- 1. The President shall preside at all meetings of the WARLCA and of the Board and enforce all laws thereof. He/She shall sign all papers and documents that require his/her signature to properly authenticate them.
- His/Her decisions upon all questions of law shall be final during the recess of the WARLCA. He/She shall
 report all such decisions to the WARLCA at its State Convention for approval or rejection. Such decisions,
 when approved or revised by the WARLCA, shall have all the effect and force of the general laws of the
 WARLCA.
- 3. At the close of each State Convention, he/she shall, in conjunction with the Board, appoint the Editor of the Washington Rural Carrier, Provident Guild Director, Political Action Committee Director, and Webmaster, and have the authority to fill any vacancies therein during the recess.
- 4. He/She shall fill all vacancies pro temp caused in any way in the Board of the WARLCA subject to the approval of the remaining members of the Board.
- 5. He/She shall have power to grant charters and, in conjunction with the Secretary, issue them during the interim between State Conventions of the WARLCA. He/She shall perform other duties as the Constitution requires.

B. Vice President

The Vice President shall preside in the absence of the President, and in the case of death, resignation, disqualification, refusal, or neglect of the President to discharge the duties of his/her office, the Vice President shall become the President and serve until such time as his/her successor shall be duly elected and installed.

C. Secretary-Treasurer

- The Secretary-Treasurer shall keep a correct record of the proceedings of the WARLCA, and read or cause to
 be read, all communications, reports, etc. He/She shall affix the seal of the WARLCA to all official
 documents. He/She shall prepare for publication in the WASHINGTON RURAL CARRIER, an overview of
 the speakers at the WARLCA State Convention or special meetings and a correct record of the business
 session of the WARLCA State Convention or special meetings, not later than one (1) month after the close of
 each State Convention or special meeting, and shall also present on the first day of the State Convention a
 complete statement of the condition of the WARLCA, including a statement of the membership of same.
- 2. He/She shall conduct the correspondence of the WARLCA, keep a record, and submit same when demanded by the Board.
- 3. He/She shall have charge of the seal, books, papers, and documents belonging to the WARLCA; shall deliver to the WARLCA, or his/her successor, all property of the WARLCA at the expiration of his/her term of office, or upon an earlier termination thereof; he/she shall be given an itemized receipt for all property delivered by the party or parties receiving same.
- 4. He/She shall keep a true and correct account between the WARLCA and the County Units.
- 5. He/She shall perform all the duties of the Treasurer as are required by this office.

- 6. He/She shall receive all monies due the WARLCA and shall deposit all monies in a convenient depository; such deposits to be made in the name of the "Washington Rural Letter Carriers' Association" and any interest thereon shall be credited to the funds of the WARLCA.
- 7. The Secretary-Treasurer will issue checks in payment of all properly itemized invoices, statements, vouchers, authorized payroll payments, and for other obligations of the WARLCA as directed by the State Board. He/She will have the President, Vice President, and all Region Committeepersons review the payments and supporting documents on a quarterly basis.
- 8. The Secretary-Treasurer may at each State Convention employ a stenographer to take down the proceedings as directed by the State Board, and the cost shall be paid out of the treasury of the WARLCA.
- He/She shall render a report to the WARLCA at its State Convention or to the President and Board when they
 may request it, showing in detail the receipts and expenditures of the WARLCA's funds as shown by his/her
 hooks
- 10. After the close of each State Convention, the Secretary shall send the appropriate resolutions to the National Secretary-Treasurer, keeping a copy on file.
- 11. Upon receipt of the nominations for the position of Delegate to the National Convention, he/she will have prepared a ballot listing the nominees for the position of Delegate to the National Convention, and the ballot shall be mailed to all members at least twenty-five (25) days prior to the opening of the State Convention. He/She will fulfill all duties concerning delegates to the National Convention in accordance with Article VII (National Convention Delegates) of the Constitution of the WARLCA.
- 12. He/She will notify all members, at least fifteen (15) days prior to the opening of the State Convention, of the time and place, the nominating and election procedures, and the offices to be filled. This notice may be included with the National Delegate ballot mailed to each member.
- 13. He/She will retain for one (1) year in a safe location all ballots used at the State Convention. These ballots should be placed in envelopes marked to indicate for which election they were used.
- 14. The Secretary shall have the Constitution printed in the Convention issue of the WASHINGTON RURAL CARRIER, which will be mailed to all members.

D. Executive Committee

- 1. The Executive Committee, or a majority of them, shall act as Trustees of the WARLCA, and in conjunction with the President, have general supervision and control of the WARLCA.
- It shall be the duty of the Executive Committee members to aid in keeping carriers in their particular Regions interested in WARLCA work and in keeping up the membership of their Regions. They shall perform such other duties as the WARLCA may, from time to time, direct.
- 3. It shall be the duty of the Executive Committee members to search out future Convention sites in their Region and to work with the board on establishing a Convention site contract for said Convention. They are also to enlist Convention committee members to help assist them in holding the Convention in the appropriate Convention year for their Region.

E. Editor

- 1. The Editor shall publish issues of the WASHINGTON RURAL CARRIER as instructed by the State Board. Also, the State Board shall have the authority to identify which articles and notices will be published in each issue, and to determine and change issue dates as current events may require.
- 2. The Editor shall mail each issue of the WASHINGTON RURAL CARRIER to all members of the WARLCA and will be reimbursed for all expenses incurred in publication and mailing.
- F. At each State Convention, a report in writing must be rendered by each State Officer and the report then placed on file by the State Secretary.
- G. Each State Officer and Appointed Officer will submit a proposed budget for the operating expenses of their office for the coming fiscal year to the Board for approval.

Section 3. Election.

A. The election of officers shall take place at each State Convention of the WARLCA.

- B. To be elected an officer of the WARLCA, one must be a dues paying member of the craft and is ineligible for election if dues are in arrears.
- C. The nomination of officers shall be made by a Nominating Committee of three (3): one (1) of whom shall be selected by the President, one (1) by the Vice President, and these two (2) so chosen shall select the third member. This Committee shall report their list of nominations when called upon. However, before closing the ballot on the nominations submitted by the Committee, the President shall state, "Are there any other nominations?" If so, then the names of the additional nominees shall be added to the list.
- D. The election of officers shall be by majority vote, and write-in votes shall not be considered valid. Election shall be by ballot when there is more than one nominee for the same office. When there are more than two nominees for the same office, the one receiving the least number of votes on the third ballot and on each succeeding ballot shall be dropped, until election is accomplished. When there is only one nominee for an office and nominations have been closed, the President or Secretary-Treasurer shall declare that the nominee is elected.
- E. The installation of officers shall take place immediately before adjournment.

Section 4. Salaries.

A. The elected WARLCA State Officers' salaries are as listed below. These monthly salaries are compensation for all hours worked beyond a normal work day.

President: \$200 Month Vice President: \$100 Month Secretary Treasurer: \$350 Month Region Committeepersons: \$100 Month

B. Salary for the editor will be determined, per issue of the WRC, by the State Board.

Section 5. Expenses.

- A. All elected and appointed state officers of the WARLCA shall be reimbursed for all office expenses for representing the WARLCA. Actual expenses, as defined in Board policy, will be reimbursed. Reimbursement of said expenses shall be made by the Secretary-Treasurer upon receipt of a voucher and supporting documents.
- B. Association Day of Pay (ADOP) will be reimbursed at a 44K, step 12, on Table One of the current salary schedule, or their route evaluation, whichever is higher, for all elected and appointed State Officers. Association Day of Pay (ADOP) will not be compensated to attend the State Convention, National Convention, or Western States Conference while they are in session, but may be authorized by the Board for other required business or trainings.
- C. WARLCA employees, once meeting the requirements, will be eligible and receive the WARLCA VOYA retirement plan. All elected and appointed State Officers that are full time for the WARLCA will have their Postal Benefits and Retirement funded and administered by the WARLCA in the same manner as the USPS does for Thrift Savings, FERS, Health Insurance, Life Insurance, Annual and Sick Leave.
- D. All lost sick and annual leave days will be compensated at a 44K, step 12, on Table One of the current salary schedule, or their route evaluation, whichever is higher, at the time of loss except for the full-time employees, who will be paid out their accrued annual and sick leave upon completion of full time.
- E. All elected and appointed WARLCA State Officers will be reimbursed mileage at the IRS allowable rate for authorized business of the WARLCA.
- F. All elected and appointed State Officers will be reimbursed actual hotel expenses if an overnight stay is required.

- G. All elected and appointed State Officers will be reimbursed \$40 food per diem while on travel status, and an overnight stay is required.
- H. All elected and appointed State Officers will not be paid actual expenses for business sessions of State or National Convention, but will be reimbursed the same as regular delegates to State and National Convention if they qualify as a credentialed regular delegate.
- I. All office expenses, ADOP, mileage, hotel, and food per diem reimbursements must meet Board policies, be approved in advance if possible, and be submitted on a voucher with supporting documents.

Section 6. Removal.

In case of neglect of duty or violation of this Constitution on the part of any officer in the WARLCA or subordinate Unit thereof, in the interim of State Conventions, the Board shall have the power to suspend such officer after a fair hearing and subject to appeals as listed in NRLCA Constitution, Article X Appeals, Section 1. State.

A. No officer or appointee may be disciplined or discharged except for Just Cause unless the position is eliminated.

Section 7. Association Property.

At the expiration of their term of office, or upon an earlier termination thereof, they shall turn over to the WARLCA or their successors, all books, papers, and other property they may have in their possession belonging to the WARLCA.

ARTICLE VI Meetings

Section 1. State Convention.

- A. The WARLCA shall meet annually (herein referred to as the State Convention) on a date and place assigned to Regions on a rotation basis in the following order: Region One, Region Four, Region Two, Region Three. If for any reason the date or place so assigned shall be undesirable or for reasons deemed advisable by a majority of the State Officers, the Board shall have the authority to change said date or place or set up a date and place by giving official notice to the County secretaries not less than sixty (60) days before the new date.
- B. If due to war or other conditions that would make it impossible or impractical to hold a State Convention, the Board shall have the authority to postpone the State Convention to a date and place suitable to the needs of the Association by giving the official notice as provided in Section 1 of this Article.

Section 2. Delegates.

- A. Each County Unit shall be entitled to representation in this Association by one Delegate-at-Large. Each County Unit is also entitled to one delegate for each (5) members or major fraction thereof of its own members, based on the current membership year. Each credentialed and seated delegate is entitled to one vote.
- B. The county credentialed State Paid Delegate to State Convention is responsible for the following:
 - 1. Specific assignments to a committee as notified by the State President.
 - 2. Be in attendance at all business sessions of the State Convention beginning with the opening session and not leaving until the Convention has been adjourned.
- C. The county credentialed State Paid Delegate-at-Large is responsible for the following:
 - 1. Specific assignment to a committee as notified by the State President.
 - 2. Be in attendance at all business sessions of the State Convention beginning with the opening session and not leaving until the Convention has been adjourned.

- 3. Receiving the ballots and Voting Cards for his/her delegation and for returning them at the conclusion of each business session.
- 4. Verifying his/her county delegates' attendance at the beginning of each business session.
- 5. Reporting any discrepancies in his/her county delegates' attendance to the State President and Mileage and Per Diem Committee as soon as possible.
- 6. Submitting an oral report of the State Convention at his/her county meeting during the upcoming year.
- D. Each County Unit at their annual meeting shall elect their delegates to the State Convention by ballot in all cases where there is more than one candidate for each delegate position. Delegates will be listed in accordance with the number of votes received. The delegate receiving the most votes will be the Delegate-at-Large. In the event of tie, the position will be determined by random drawing of names then listed in order drawn; except for the Delegate-at-large position, which would be decided by another ballot.
- E. No delegate can be seated from any County Unit without properly signed credentials and current membership dues paid. Each delegate shall be seated with the County Unit that the delegate was elected in.
- F. Delegate positions vacant at the time of the State Convention may not be filled by a vote of the delegates present from the subject County Unit or Region or from other County Units or Regions, or delegates at the State Convention.

Section 3. Compensation for State Delegates.

- A. The WARLCA shall pay round trip mileage at the IRS rate, capped at 850 miles plus tolls and/or ferry fees, by the most cost effective route to each county credentialed delegate who fulfills the responsibilities identified in Article VI Section 2.B or 2.C of the WARLCA Constitution, provided that this shall in no way increase the total number of delegates to which each county unit is entitled, and also in compliance with Section 3.C of Article VI of the WARLCA Constitution concerning mileage and allowance. The mileage will be computed using a current door-to-door computer mileage program.
- B. The WARLCA shall pay a State Convention allowance of \$400 to each county credentialed delegate who fulfills the responsibilities identified in Article VI Section 2.B or 2.C of the WARLCA Constitution, provided that this shall in no way increase the total number of delegates to which each county unit is entitled, and also in compliance with Section 3.C of Article VI of the WARLCA Constitution concerning mileage and allowance.
- C. The Board will set a total dollar cap at the first budget Board meeting of the year for the following State Convention allowance and mileage expense reimbursement. If the number of county credentialed regular delegates' reimbursement for State Convention allowance and mileage exceeds that set total dollar cap, each delegates' reimbursement will be reduced by an equal percentage to comply with the cap.

Section 4. State Officers. Each elected officer shall be entitled to a vote on every question before the State Convention.

Section 5. Quorum. Seventeen (17) members representing not less than six (6) County Units shall constitute a quorum for the transaction of the business of the WARLCA, but a lesser number than that may adjourn to some future time.

Section 6. Order of Business.

- B. On the first day of the State Convention, the President will ask the elected convention delegates to decide by voting if they want to hear resolutions and proposed Constitution changes from the floor during new business. The Resolutions Committee and Constitution Committee will only be responsible for Resolutions and proposed Constitution changes that have been submitted and passed by county units, and those submitted by the Finance Committee that fall within the parameters of their responsibility. If the delegation decides to hear Resolutions and proposed Constitution changes from the floor during new business, then the delegate who is submitting it must use the proper form, have enough copies for all elected delegates, and submit them to the Vice President by the close of business the second day of the convention.
- C. A ballot vote can be called for by a simple majority vote of the delegates present at the State Convention.

Section 7. Special Meetings.

- A. Special sessions may be called by the President upon written request of one-half of the County Units in good standing.
- B. Informational and/or training meetings may be authorized by the Board.

ARTICLE VII National Convention Delegates

Section 1. Eligibility.

- A. Each state association shall be entitled to representation by one delegate for every 100 members or major fraction thereof and one Delegate-at-Large. Membership shall be based on the number of dues withholding and cash pay Bargaining Unit and Retired Members on June 30th of the Association year just ended.
- B. Only Bargaining Unit Members and Retired Members in good standing may be nominated, elected or seated as delegates. Such "good standing" status shall be the sole prerequisite for determining eligibility or entitlement to service as a delegate or to any payment or benefit, except that a state may establish reasonable rules to ensure attendance at the Convention.
- C. A member who accepts or acts at any time in any capacity normally performed by a manager from the end of one Convention to the end of the next Convention shall be ineligible to be nominated or serve as a delegate.

Section 2. Nomination.

A. Within each state association, nominations for National Delegate shall be submitted by U.S. Mail to the designated post office box on a nominating ballot or copy. The nominating ballot shall be signed and show the

- name and address of the member making the nomination, and may include self-nomination. The nominating ballot shall be published in the February, March, April and May issues of The National Rural Letter Carrier.
- B. Nominations must be received in the designated post office box at least 50 days prior to the opening of the state convention. Upon receipt, the State Secretary shall send a notice of nomination to the candidate by U.S. Mail.

Section 3. Election.

- A. A member must be on the rolls at least 50 days prior to the opening of the state convention in order to be eligible to vote for National Delegates.
- B. The State Secretary shall prepare a ballot listing the candidates for National Delegate. Instructions on each ballot shall include the number of delegates to be elected, the deadline for return of the ballot and the mailing address of the designated post office box. The number of votes cast on each ballot shall not exceed the number of delegates to which the state association was entitled at the previous convention.
- C. The State Secretary shall cause the ballot to be mailed to eligible members at least 25 days prior to the opening of the state convention. In addition, the State Secretary/Designee shall arrange for the rental of a post office box for the receipt of the ballots and another for the return of undeliverable ballots.
- D. An envelope marked "Ballot" shall be provided in which to seal the ballot. To permit verification of membership and to maintain the integrity of the voting procedure, an outer envelope, also marked "Ballot" which clearly identifies the name and address of the member, shall also be provided. The sealed envelope containing the ballot shall be placed in the outer envelope by the member and mailed to the designated post office box.
- E. An Election Committee shall be appointed by the State President. No candidate for National Delegate may serve on the Election Committee. After the deadline for receipt of ballots, the Election Committee shall collect and tabulate the ballots and report the results at the State Convention. The post office box designated for the return of ballots shall be accessible only to the Election Committee.
- F. Any candidate or designee may observe the ballot tabulation. In reporting the results of the election, the candidates shall be placed on a roster in the order of votes received. The number of delegates to which the state is entitled shall be declared regular delegates; the remaining candidates shall be declared alternates. In the event of tie, the position will be determined by random drawing of names then listed in order drawn.
- G. Each state association shall be entitled to one Delegate-at-Large from the roster of elected regular delegates. That position shall be filled by a state officer in ranking order, beginning with the State President. A state officer may not be automatically declared a delegate by virtue of office unless elected by direct vote of the membership. National-Paid Delegates shall be named in accordance with the plurality of votes received.
- H. The State Secretary shall prepare and send credentials to the National Secretary-Treasurer for the Delegate-at-Large, regular delegates and an appropriate number of alternates immediately following the state convention. The credentials shall be embossed with the state's seal to verify authenticity.
- I. Delegate-at-Large and regular elected delegates presenting identification to the Credentials Committee at the National Convention shall be certified and seated.

Section 4. Compensation of State-Paid National Delegates.

A. The WARLCA will pay all regular credentialed delegates to National Convention that are not reimbursed by National, the same way and rate that National reimburses, up to a total dollar cap decided by the WARLCA board at the first board meeting of the year. The WARLCA will pay the first alternate delegate, in order of votes received, the full normal pay of regular credentialed State-paid delegates. Such State-paid alternate delegate shall have the same responsibilities as set forth for regular credentialed State-paid delegates. If the reimbursement amount for both regular credentialed and alternate delegates exceed the set total dollar cap, each delegates' reimbursement will be reduced by an equal percentage to comply with the cap. Further, all State-paid delegates to the National Convention must attend all business sessions, Western State caucus, and at least one seminar. If a State-paid delegate does not meet his/her delegate's responsibilities, except for NRLCA National Steward System business, their compensation shall be reduced by 10% for each missed function after 30 minutes. The compensable functions of the National Convention shall be one each daily morning and afternoon session, and one seminar, and the Western States Caucus, excepting that attendance to the WSC function shall not be required if participating in the election campaign of a WARLCA member for National Office with notification to the Delegate-at-Large by the candidate.

- B. Paid delegates to the National Convention are required to give a report of said Convention at their county meeting before the next year's State Convention. Paid delegates are to attend all association general sessions at the National Convention with the following permitted exceptions upon the approval of the National Delegate-at-Large:
 - 1. Specific assignments to a committee
 - 2. Required to man a booth
 - 3. Illness
- C. The Delegate-at-Large shall be responsible for the following:
 - Polling delegates for their preferences for the seminar they wish to attend, and then ensuring at least one delegate covers each of the sessions.
 - 2. Taking roll of the delegates at the beginning of each general session.
 - 3. Establishing an adequate seating space for the Washington Delegation, including placement and collection of seat back covers and the Washington sign.
 - 4. Reporting to the Board any problems concerning delegates meeting their responsibilities at the convention.
 - 5. Collecting the ballots for his/her delegation and returning the ballots to the National Tellers Committee after his/her National delegates have voted.
 - Submitting a single report to the State Board for publication in the WASHINGTON RURAL CARRIER.

ARTICLE VIII State Board

Section 1. Members. There shall be a Board of Control (herein referred to as the Board) consisting of President, Vice President, Secretary-Treasurer, and four (4) Region Committeepersons.

Section 2. Duties. The WARLCA will operate on a budget each year.

Section 3. Meetings. This Board shall meet upon the call of the President or by a majority vote of the Board to the Secretary when matters of importance arise that need immediate attention during the interim between meetings of the WARLCA.

Section 4: Record of Votes. A record of each WARLCA Board member's vote on board decisions at board meetings and via e-mail will be kept on file and published in the WRC, except for those made during executive sessions.

ARTICLE IX Committees

Section 1. Appointment.

- A. Previous to the first day of each State Convention, the President shall appoint from the list of regularly elected delegates, then in the hands of the Secretary-Treasurer, the following committees: Credentials, Tellers, Constitution, Resolutions, Finances, Auditing, Mileage and Per Diem, Communications, PAC, Media, Minutes, Hospitality, and Sergeant-at-Arms. He/She shall be responsible that a Nominating Committee be appointed according to Article V, Section 3.D of the Constitution of the WARLCA. He/She may appoint any other Convention Committee advisable and may also appoint more delegates to serve on a committee if so needed.
- B. The President can, if necessary, ask any committees to meet prior to State Convention. These persons should be credentialed delegates to the Convention but are not required to be, as delegate elections may not have occurred at the time of selection. The President can, if necessary, authorize a stipend of \$75 or ADOP, plus mileage, hotel costs, and food per diem expenses to any/all delegates serving on these committees for each additional day that they are asked to meet prior to State Convention.

Section 2. Duties.

- A. The Committee on Credentials shall examine the credentials of all delegates to the State Convention. They shall also back up and assist the Tellers Committee, when voting on the issues on the floor at the State Convention requires the use of a 2nd Tellers Committee.
- B. The report of the Credentials Committee shall be given not later than ten (10:00) a.m. on the second day of the State Convention. All delegates shall be seated by the passing of the report of the Credentials Committee.
- C. The Committee on Audit shall examine the books of the Secretary-Treasurer, as well as the reports of the County Units, and shall report to the WARLCA when called upon.
- D. The Committee on Mileage and Per Diem shall make up a listing of delegates and/or elected and appointed officers who are entitled to receive mileage and per diem as per the WARLCA Constitution. The listing shall show the name, title (Delegate-at-Large or State-Paid County delegate, elected, or appointed officer), mileage, and per diem due for each person.
- E. The duties of the Committee on Constitution shall be: To examine all changes proposed for amending or changing the Constitution that have been passed and submitted by the county units, and those submitted by the Finance Committee that fall within the parameters of their responsibility. They may examine and correct, when called upon, propose laws governing County Units or Region Associations so that they will not conflict with the National or State Constitutions.
- F. The duties of the Committee on Resolutions shall be to examine all proposed resolutions passed and submitted by the county units, and those submitted by the Finance Committee that fall within the parameters of their responsibility, and present same to the elected delegates, identifying them as binding (and to whom) or non binding. The Resolutions Committee can also propose any courtesy resolutions they deem necessary and present same to the elected delegates at State Convention.
- G. The duties of the Tellers Committee shall be: To total the results of paper count voting on the floor. If the Tellers Committee is off the floor, then the Credentials Committee will act as a backup to the Tellers Committee concerning paper count voting on the floor.
- H. The duties of the Finance Committee shall be: 1) To review the financial condition of the WARLCA, and recommend any changes, if necessary, 2) To review the proposed changes to the Constitution and binding resolutions to the State Board that would affect finances and make recommendations, if necessary, 3) To review funding of county units, food per diem rates, and hotel reimbursement and make recommendations.
- I. The duties of the Communications Committee shall be: To review the expenses and publications of the following and make suggestions for future publications and communications.
 - 1. WASHINGTON RURAL CARRIER
 - 2. WARLCA.com website
 - 3. E-mail Updates from the WARLCA.com website
 - 4. WARLCA social media
- J. The duties of the Nominating Committee shall be: To seek nominees for the offices open and present these names to the Convention delegates.
- K. The duties of the Convention Media Committee are to present the proposed resolutions and constitution changes to the delegates on the LCD projector as well as any reports and/or presentations. Another duty shall be photography of different portions of the proceeding.
- L. The duties of the Minutes Committee are to audio record the State Convention and keep a written record of the business sessions, as well as an overview of the speakers.
- M. The duties of the Hospitality Committee are to write thank you notes to the speakers and guests and to make sure the meeting room and sound system are set up prior to each meeting, as well as securing the room and WARLCA

- equipment during breaks and upon adjournment each evening. At the end of convention, the Hospitality Committee will assist break down of WARLCA equipment and load out.
- N. The duties of the Sergeant-at-Arms are to facilitate the recess, as well as the use of the stopwatches during proposed resolutions and constitution changes.
- O. The Duties of the PAC Committee are to help out at the PAC table during State Convention and to review past donations and remits to NRLCA. After talking to the PAC Chair, the committee can make suggestions as part of their report.
- P. The duties of all other committees shall be those usual to such committees, and they shall report when called upon.

ARTICLE X Appeals

Section 1. State

- A. A member aggrieved by any action of a state association and/or officer shall have the right to appeal to the State Board.
 - 5. Appeals must be filed and mail individually, in writing and be filed with the State President via first class mail within 30 days of having knowledge of said action.
 - 6. Within 10 days of receipt of the appeal, the State President shall notify all members of the State Board and the assigned Executive Committeeman and shall request that the Charging Party provide a letter outlining the specific charges and any relief sought. This letter of specificity, along with complete documentation, must be returned within 20 days of receipt of the President's request.
 - 7. Upon receipt of the letter of specificity, the State President shall forward a copy to the Charged Party for response. The Charged Party shall have 20 days from receipt of said letter to respond in writing and provide documentation to the State President via first class mail.
 - 8. The State Board shall review the Charging Party's letter of specificity, documentation, relief sought and the response of the Charged Party. The State Board is authorized, in consultation with the Executive Committeeman, to take the necessary action to resolve the issue within 30 days. Extension of this 30-day time limit, when necessary, shall not exceed 15 days. The Charging Party(s) and Charged Party(s) (hereafter referred to as the Party or Parties) shall be notified in writing of the decision of the State Board.
- B. A Party not satisfied with this decision, or any other action of the State Board on said appeal, shall have the right to appeal to the National Board.
 - 1. This appeal must be in writing and be filed with the President of the National Association via first class mail within 30 days of receipt of the State Board's decision.
 - 2. Within 15 days of receipt of an appeal, the National Board shall notify the National Appeals Commission. The President shall notify the State President and the Parties that the appeal has been received and forwarded to the National Appeals Commission.
 - 3. Within 30 days, the National Appeals Commission shall investigate each appeal and report its findings and recommendations in writing to the National Board. Upon receipt of the findings and recommendations of the Appeals Commission, the National President shall notify the Parties that the findings and recommendations are before the National Board. The National Board shall render a decision and notify the Parties in writing within a reasonable period of time.
- C. A Party not satisfied with the decision of the National Board shall have the right to appeal to the next Convention of the National Association.

- This appeal must be in writing and be filed with the National President within 30 days of receipt of the National Board's decision. The appeal, if received more than 45 days prior to the National Convention, will be scheduled for that Convention. If received within 45 days of the Convention the appeal may be held until the following National Convention.
- 2. Within 15 days of receipt of said appeal, the President shall notify the Parties that the appeal has been received and shall be forwarded to a National Appeals Committee.
- 3. The Appeals Committee shall complete an investigation and report its findings and recommendations in writing to the Parties and to the President of the state association at least 24 hours before the report is presented to the National Delegates.

Section 2. National

- A. A member aggrieved by any action of the National Association or Officer, representative or steward thereof shall have the right to appeal directly to the National Board.
 - 1. Appeals must be filed and mailed individually, in writing, and be filed with the National President via first class mail within 30 days of having knowledge of said action.
 - 2. Within 15 days of receipt of the appeal, the National Board shall retain the appeal for investigation, forward the appeal to the National Appeals Commission or, if received within 90 days of the first business session of the National Convention, refer the appeal to the Appeals Committee. The President shall notify the Charging Party(s) of the appeal's receipt and disposition, and if necessary, request that the Charging Party provide a letter outlining the specific charge and any relief sought. The letter of specificity, along with complete documentation, must be returned via first class mail within 20 days of receipt of the National Board's request.
 - 3. Should the National Board retain the appeal, it shall investigate, render a decision and notify the Charging Party(s) in writing within a reasonable period of time.
 - 4. Should the National Board forward the appeal to the National Appeals Commission, the commission shall complete an investigation and report its findings and recommendations in writing to the National Board within 30 days. Upon receipt, the National President shall notify the Charging Party(s) that the Commission's report is before the National Board. The National Board shall render a decision and notify the Charging Party(s) in writing within a reasonable period of time.
 - 5. Should the National Board refer the appeal to the Appeals Committee, the appeal shall be handled in accordance with the provisions that follow.
- B. A Party not satisfied with a decision rendered by the National Board shall have the right to appeal to the next National Convention.
 - The appeal must be in writing and be filed with the National President via first class mail within 30 days
 of receipt of the National Board's decision. The appeal, if received more than 45 days prior to the
 National Convention, shall be scheduled for that Convention. If received within 45 days of the
 Convention the appeal may be held until the following National Convention.
 - 2. Within 15 days of receipt of the appeal, the President shall notify the Party(s) that the appeal has been received and shall be forwarded to a National Appeals Committee.
 - 3. The Appeals Committee shall complete an investigation and report its findings and recommendations in writing to the Parties at least 24 hours before the report is presented to the National Delegates.

Section 3. Administration

At every level of appeal, members shall be afforded the rights of due process and the right to appeal an adverse decision to the next level. The National Board shall have full authority to intervene to protect the members of this Association. Correspondence shall be by certified mail, return receipt requested. Timeliness shall be determined by postmark. Costs of the state investigation and action shall be borne by the state association; costs of the National Appeals Commission and Appeals Committee shall be borne by the National Association. No legal proceeding may be initiated until the appeal procedures provided herein have been exhausted.

ARTICLE XI Parliamentary Authority

The rules contained in the current edition of ROBERT'S RULES OF ORDER NEWLY REVISED shall govern the Association in all cases to which they are applicable and in which they are not inconsistent with the State and National Constitution and any special rules of order the WARLCA may adopt.

ARTICLE XII Amendment of Constitution

The Constitution shall take effect immediately upon adoption.

This State Constitution shall be in harmony with the National Constitution. The county Unit is subordinate to the WARLCA, and the WARLCA is subordinate to the NRLCA. Any provisions of this Constitution which conflicts with any Federal or State Law, regulation, or ordinance shall be inoperative as to those jurisdictions in which said Federal or State Law, regulation, or ordinance is in force.

Constitution amendments shall become effective upon adjournment of the State Convention unless otherwise stipulated and can only be amended by submitting the amendment in writing at a State Convention and shall require a two-thirds vote to amend.

Local stewards are paid by the Postal Service for all their time while performing their NRLCA representational duties including investigating and processing grievances. Local stewards are the bedrock of our National Steward System and make our dues go farther. The NRLCA compensates local stewards for all necessary training. What to Do When an Active Rural Letter Carrier Dies...

- Notify the employee's immediate supervisor/ postmaster.
- Notify Human Resources Shared Service Center (HRSSC) at 1-877-477-3273, Option 5.
 - HRSSC will advise about any benefits payable and how to apply for them. It will assist in completing the application for death benefits under the employee's retirement system, the claim for death benefits—Federal Employees' Group Life Insurance (FEGLI), and the claim for unpaid compensation.
 - Application for Death Benefits:
 - (CSRS) SF 2800 OR
 - (FERS) SF 3104 and SF 3104B
 - Claim of Designated Beneficiary for Unpaid Compensation, SF 1153
 - Claim for Unpaid Compensation, No Designated Beneficiary, SF 155
 - Claim for Benefits, Federal Employees Group Life Insurance, FE 6
- Notify the Thrift Savings Plan (TSP) at 1-877-968-3778.
- Notify the secretary-treasurer of the National Rural Letter Carriers' Association and the state secretary of the state RLCA, where the deceased was a member.
- If the employee was a veteran, notify Veterans Affairs at 800-827-1000. Spouses may be entitled to VA death benefits and assistance.
- If the deceased has retired from military service, notify the commanding officer of the nearest military installation.
- Notify the Social Security Administration at 1-800-772-1213 or the local office.
- Notify banks, postal credit unions, and other financial institutions.
- Notify insurance companies (life, health, home, automobile, etc.).
 - If the employee had an NRLCA Life Insurance policy, contact NRLCA at 1630 Duke St., Alexandria, VA 22314.
 - If the employee had health insurance

through the Rural Carrier Health Benefit Plan, call the insurance department at 703-684-5552.

- If the employee had health insurance through a different Postal Service Health Benefits (PSHB) plan, call the number on the back of the insurance card.
- --Health insurance coverage for a surviving spouse and dependent children continues if the employee had family coverage at the time of death, and a monthly survivor annuity is payable.
- If the employee had home and/or automobile Insurance with National General Insurance, contact NGIC at PO Box 3199, Winston-Salem, NC 27102-3199. Tel: 1-855-752-8477
- If a Provident Guild member, write Secretary-Treasurer, P.O. Box 105, Minster, OH 45865-0105.
- Notify the postmaster, employees, and State Association of the time and place of the memorial service.
- Obtain a sufficient number of death certificates from your funeral director. They can advise on how many are needed.
- Give the supervisor/postmaster any items belonging to the Postal Service.
- If the cause of death is due to a job-related injury, the Office of Workers' Compensation Programs (OWCP) will pay up to \$1,000 in burial and administrative expenses, minus any amount the VA pays.
- In the case of a job-related death, the survivor may also apply for an annuity from the OWCP.
 They may then choose the higher amount, but there are precautions that you need to discuss with personnel on this subject.
- As a surviving spouse, you are eligible to continue receiving the NRLCA magazine. Contact your state RLCA secretary to see if the state association pays for subscriptions. If it does not, you can mail a check for \$20 to the NRLCA to continue receiving the magazine.

What to Do When a Retired Rural Letter Carrier Dies...

- Notify the Office of Personnel Management (OPM).
 Report the death of a deceased annuitant immediately in ONE of the following ways:
 - Go to rsreporting.opm.gov, "Report an Annuitant Death." or login to servicesonline. opm.gov. This will take you to an online form to complete and submit.
 - Call OPM at 1-888-767-6738
 - Write to OPM and include the following information: Retired letter carrier's full name, CSA number, date of birth, Social Security number, survivor's full name, relationship to the deceased, Social Security number, date of birth, address, and phone number.

Survivor annuities are not paid automatically. They must be applied for.

- Once the death of an annuitant has been reported,
 OPM will stop payment of the monthly annuity and
 mail the applicable claim forms to the survivor.
 - Application for Death Benefits:
 - (CSRS) SF 2800 OR
 - (FERS) SF 3104 and SF 3104B
 And
 - Claim for Benefits, Federal Employees Group Life Insurance, FE 6
- Notify the bank where annuity payments are deposited and any other financial institutions. OPM will reclaim any annuity payments deposited after the date of death.
- Notify the Thrift Savings Plan (TSP) at 1-877-968-3778.
- Notify the secretary-treasurer of the National Rural Letter Carriers' Association and the state secretary of the state RLCA, where the deceased was a member.
- If the deceased was a veteran, notify Veterans Affairs at 1-800-827-1000. Spouses may be entitled to VA death benefits and assistance.

- If the deceased has retired from military service, notify the commanding officer of the nearest military installation.
- Notify the Social Security Administration at 1-800-772-1213 or the local office.
- Notify banks, postal credit unions, and other financial institutions.
- Notify insurance companies (life, health, home, automobile, etc.).
 - If the employee had an NRLCA Life Insurance policy, contact NRLCA at 1630 Duke St., Alexandria, VA 22314.
 - If the employee had health insurance through the Rural Carrier Benefit Plan, call the insurance department at 703-684-5552.
 - If the employee had health insurance through a different Postal Service Health Benefits (PSHB) plan, call the number on the back of the insurance card.
 - --Health insurance coverage for a surviving spouse and dependent children continues if the employee had family coverage at the time of death, and a monthly survivor annuity is payable.
 - If the employee had home and/or automobile Insurance with National General Insurance, contact NGIC at PO Box 3199, Winston-Salem, NC 27102-3199. Tel: 1-855-752-8477
 - If a Provident Guild member, write Secretary-Treasurer, P.O. Box 105, Minster, OH 45865-0105.
- Notify the postmaster and State Association of the time and place of the memorial service.
- Obtain a sufficient number of death certificates from your funeral director. They can advise on how many are needed.
- As a surviving spouse, you are eligible to continue receiving the NRLCA magazine. Contact your state RLCA secretary to see if the state association pays for subscriptions. If it does not, you can mail a check for \$20 to the NRLCA to continue receiving the magazine.
